Wildcats Concede to Baird in Scrimmage



Charles LeFlore Testifies In Murder Trial

the Garcia Crime Trial in the 91st District Courtroom Tuesday, visiting Judge Herman Fitts said he hoped to complete the trial this week.

A jury of eight men and four owmen was sworn in late Monday after five days of questioning. They were secelted from a group of 48 prospective jurors who were told to return to the courtroom Monday.

On Monday Joe Perry and Barbara Williams heard Special Prosecutor Bill Hart read the indicinents against them. Williams is charged with organized crime, murder and conspiracy, and Perry is charged with the same counts plus robbery and rape.

Court appointed attorneys Leslie Vance and Steve Davis are representing the defendants. Perry and Williams are the seventh people to be tried on the 1981 abductionmurder of Debra Jo Garcia of Cisco.

First Charles LeFlore and then his brother Thomas were. given prison sentences for taking part in the crime. Last summer Brenda Andrews was given a 33 yr. prison sentnece, and two men - Richard Hinton and Pat Starr - were acquitted.

After the jury was seated Monday witnesses Dwight Hamilton and Roy Dennis and others. took the stand. Hamilton said that on Nov. 29, 1981 he and his wife delivered the Abilene Reporter News about 5:30 a.m. to the Quickway Grocery, where Debra Garcia

Testimony continued in worked. Mrs. Garcia waited on them for some purchases.

Roy Dennis, the owner of Quickway Grocery at that time, told of a telephone call a little before six a.m.

reporting Debra Garcia missing. He helped search for her at the store. Her body was found about three days later west of Cisco, with a bullet hole in her

Court resumed Tuesday with more witnesses called by the Prosecution.

Fire Chief Guthrie of Cisco told of finding Debra Garcia's body near a road west of Cisco. He described it as "Very neat, glasses on - hair was neat - no sign of anything." He checked for a pulse, found none, and called authorities.

Then Charles Allen LeFlore took the stand. He said he pled guilty in 1981-82 Wood, Contel of Texas, Mike to the death of Debra Garcia, and is serving a long term in prison. He agreed that on March 15, 1985 he told the Special Prosecutor "Others Nursing Home, Vernice were involved."

He told his story of the abduction and murder to the Courtroom, continuing in a halting voice at times and apparently pausing to weep.

He said he was present at the abduction, and named those who allegedly helped him, one of the defendants

He said Garcia was carried to a house near Cisco, where the defendants and others held her and engaged in various acts. According to LeFlore Garcia was then car-

ried to Rising Star, where she was kept for a time. She was then brought back to the house near Cisco and shot.

Pork producers in Eastland County will have an opportunity to vote in a referendum special September 7-8, as authorized by the Pork Promotion. Research and Consumer Information Act of 1985.

Purpose of the referendum is to determine the continuance of the 100 percent checkoff program which provides funds for pork research and promotion to enhance the pork industry. The checkoff is at the rate 25 cents per \$100 on all hogs and pigs as well as on all imported hogs and pork pro-

Referendum voting will be conducted in the county Extension office during normal business hours September

All pork producers who produced and owned porcine animals in the U.S. for sale in commerce and who are subject to assessment during the representative time period are also eligible to vote. Also, eligible are 4-H, FFA and other youth who owned porcine animals and are subject to assessment during the representative time period.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will count ballots, and report referendum results.

A meeting for Shackelford County and surrounding county livestock producers who will need their livestock scales on private ranches tested in order to buy and sell cattle, will meet at the Courthouse in Albany, Texas at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 8, 1988, according to Lawrence E. Winkler, County Extension Agent, Shackelford County.

The purpose of the meeting will be to explain the change in policy of checking private livestock scales and this will be done by the Texas Department of Agriculture personnel. The second phase of the meeting will be devoted to scales companies that are registered with the Texas Department of Agriculture, presenting proposals to carry out this registration procedure. The final decision will be for the ranchers to independently or as a group, to form their own decision as to how they will proceed with registering their scale. All livestock producers with private livestock scales in Eastland County are invited to attend this meeting.

It is time to spray your pecan trees to control the pecan weevils. This is one of the most destructive pests of pecans. The adult weevils, which look much like a cotton boll weevil except that the pecan weevil is slightly larger, comes from the ground in late summer to lay eggs in pecans. The weevils emerge from moist soil sooner than from dry soil. I have already seen weevil damage in yard trees that have been watered.

The weevils puncture a hold in the pecan and deposits eggs. The eggs hatch larvae which then eats the kernel as it grows. The larvae are creamy-white grubs with reddish-brown heads. They grow to about 3/5 inch long at maturity.

in the adult stage while on the pecan trees, but preferably before they begin laying eggs.

Carbaryl (Sevin) has been shown to be an effective labeled insecticide for pecan weevil control. Its residual has been found to remain active for 8-12 days following application. The trees should be sprayed to the point of run off. If weevils continue to emerge a second or third application of insecticide may be needed at two week inter-

There are already too many empty buildings around and no one wants to see any more. Many of the merchants are looking at avenues they never looked at before and they're experimenting here and there and often they're finding things that do work - and things that don't work so

Lean and mean may be a little terse, but it could almost describe the attitude

of many. community newspapers have had to make adjustments and others may be called for. No one wants to reduce services but often it is a case of doing what has to be done. 

The City Council reminds all residents and city water users that Voluntary Water Conservation is still very much in effect. 

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature

Being aware that older Texans are the fastest growing segment of the population, with the number of persons over age 60 in Texas having increased 32 percent between 1970 and 1980, SCR 37 was passed by the 69th Texas Legislature in 1985. This established the Texas Silver Haired Legislature.

The Silver Haired Legislature is an elected. representative, nonpartisan body of citizens 60-plus years of age, elected by persons 60-plus years of age. With the continuing growth of the number of senior citizens in Texas, some approximately 2.5 million at the current time, we wanted to give them a forum to voice their concerns for the needs of older Texans.

The objective of the Silver Haired Legislature is to serve the needs of both present and future older Texans. More specifically, this

an opportunity to become knowledgeable about the legislative process through involvement; to develop a forum for older Texans for discussion of senior citizens' issues, debating these issues and establishing legislative priorities for the Texas Legislature to consider; providing advocacy training enabling delegates to continue their role within the community and offer informed assistance to policy makers; and providing an avenue through which older citizens may serve as a resource to public and private sectors, boards and commissions.

The Silver Haired Legislature first met in September of 1986, and is scheduled to convene again in Austin on September 19, 1988, for a four day session. The new legislators were elected May 24, 1988. I am very pleased that two of the officers, selected during a

meeting of the Silver Haired Legislature earlier this month, are from my Senatorial District. Millard Guess of Millsap was elected Speaker, and James Earl VonTungeln of Cleburne was elected Deputy Speaker Protem; both representing the North Central Texas area.

Either-Sex Deer Harvest

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would like to remind landowners and sportsmen in Eastland County that no antlerless deer permits will be required for the 1988-1989 deer season. Antlerless deer taken during the season need only to be tagged with the appropriate tag from the required hunting license.

Annual deer population surveys are being conducted at the present time in order tor deer numbers and ratios and to develop recommended harvest rates. These harvest recommendations

will be made available to the general public by mid-October.

Landowners are reminded that these recommendations are very general and are intended only as quidelines

Landowners should carefully decide on the number of deer to be harvested from their individual ranches. depending upon their particular knowledge of the ranch.

Hunters and sportsmen are also reminded that, although no antlerless deer permits will be required, the landowner makes the ultimate decision as to how many deer may be harvested on his land.

The general deer season in Eastland County will open on November 5, 1988 and run through January 1, 1989. Please refer to the 1988-1989 Texas Hunting Guide for information concerning seasons, bag limits, and means and methods for taking wildlife in various counties.

Alpha-hydroxy acids, the kind in sour milk and oranges, seem to reduce wrinkles, a Philadelphia dermatologist found. He says the fruit acids won't irritate, if used correctly.

Mumps, long thought of as a disease of childhood, has been appearing on college campuses. The disease is highly contagious and may be dangerous to young men. Vaccination is advised.

Silicon chip tied into a microcomputer constantly tests blood chemical levels during operations, giving anesthesiologists visual analyses. Chip was used in transplant operations in Newcastle University in England and should be adaptable to other surgery, say its developers.

Cyclosporine, the anti-rejection drug, helps burn victims accept skin grafts from cadavers without affecting the immune system that fights bacterial infections, according to doctors at the Southern California Burn Center of the Sherman Oaks Community Hospital.

Asthmatics do better if they exercise, say researchers at the New York University Medical Center. In time the body "learns" to be more efficient at sending oxygen-rich blood to the muscles, which learn to use the oxygen available.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each vear as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians. American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines

1. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammagram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast

A screening mammagram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to

find very early cancers. A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.



The strongest weapon in West Texas in the War on Drugs is running out of steam, and if the West Central Texas Interlocal Drug Task Force isn't strengthened with cash soon, it could be out of busi-

A number of Eastland Countians attended a meeting of the 13-county force Thursday, and heard Native Eastland Countian James Eidson, Taylor County District Attorney, report: "Without funding, this task force is in danger of being extinct."

The Force in its short eight-month life has solved 133 drug cases involving 92 defendants and seized some \$800,000 in cash, five vehicles, 12 weapons and 100 pieces of jewelry.
