by Dr. Donald E. Bryan The existing Rising Star High School main building was constructed in 1926. In 1972 it was remodeled and the present gym was built. As graduates reflect over the years they will be reminded of happy and well-spent years in Rising Star High School.

In 1987 a structural engineer for Caddo Construction, Abilene, checked the building for sagging ceilings. The beams in the science room were sagging eight and onehalf inches from north to south and four and one-half inches from east to west. The engineer provided specifications for repairing the roof and mentioned that the building was in great need of repair.

In 1988 when the carpet was changed in one location, holes were discovered throughout the flooring, necessitating a new sub-floor.

The original plumbing needs replacing and the walls are separating in various locations. This information is shared to bring to your attention the need for a new secondary facility for grades 7-12.

The administration, school board and teachers feel that a new facility is needed and will greatly enhance our instructional program. This project can be accomplished without increasing taxes and while continuing to maintain enough funds to operate our budget for two or three months. If you would care to view preliminary drawings they can be seen in the window of the superintendent's office at 116 North Main. If you have strong feelings, positive or negative, or suggestions, please contact the superintendent's office or one of the school board members.

During May, 1990 a Parent Opinion Survey was requested to be completed and returned. Thirty-three (33)

percent of the survey forms were completed and returned. The administration wishes to express our sincere thanks for your frank opinion and suggestions for the improvement of our school system. This information was used by the school board, superintendent and principals to develop district and campus goals for the 1990-1991 school year.

Respondents felt that the district's overall grade was a B. They also felt that communication from the district to parents needs to improve and that there was too much emphasis on physical education and athletics and too little emphasis on sex education, drug education, writing, dropout prevention, reading and choral music. The most serious problems facing the RSISD included drug and/or alcohol abuse, discipline, drop outs and communication between school and

The three most common causes, in the opinion of the respondents, for school dropouts in the RSISD included low expectations of students on the part of teachers and parents, student apathy and lack of parent support. The best five things about RSISD listed by this group included small classes, student/teacher involvement, athletics, band, science and computer pro-

Sharp Announces State Drug Tax Seizure

The state law, which went into effect September 1, 1989, gives the Comptroller's office the authority to seize bank accounts and other personal property for failing to purchase the required tax stamps on felony amounts of marijuana and controlled substances. The tax rate is \$3.50 per gram of marijuana and \$200 per gram of a controlled substance.

"It's my unequivocal policy that, whenever possible, the state will return the proceeds from any property seized in a drug raid to local law enforcement officials for their continued drug enforce-

The Texas Veterans Land Board is offering approximately 456 tracts of land for sale exclusively to eligible Texas veterans through a special sale set for February 26. Located in 118 Texas counties, these tracts can be purchased with no down payment. In addition, the VLB will finance the entire amount of all winning bids.

There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans are limited to one land purchase in the sale.

Successful bidders receive a 7.99 percent interest rate with a 30 year assumable fixed rate loan. The purchaser will be responsible for the current year's taxes.

A \$25 none-refundable bid

fee just be submitted for each bid. In addition, bidders must submit \$320 to cover closing costs. Unsuccessful bidders will have all money refunded except the \$25 bid fee.







He appointed David Franklin, Chief Deputy, as Interim Sheriff. Franklin had been acting in the capacity of Sher-


Hogan on a Federal Warrant charging obstruction of justice, a felony, and tampering with a government record


Hogan is currently lodged in the Lubbock County Jail in Federal custody, with a bond hearing set for Jan. 24, 1991.

Eastland County Criminal District Attorney Leslie B. Vance Tuesday filed suit in 91st District Court asking for the removal of Hogan from office. The lawsuit was filed at 2:10 p.m. As provided in Article 74 of the Government code of the State of Texas, the administrative judge was contacted and the case was assigned to the Hon. Donald R. Jones.

The disqualification of the presiding District Judge in the county where the removal suit is filed is a manditory requirement whenever an election contest or removal of local official suit is filed.

The suit to remove Sheriff Hogan alleged that on Jan. 11 1991 Hogan was arrested by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Texas Rangers on warrant issued by Federal Magistrate W.C. Warnick of Lubbock, charging Hogan with obstruction of justice and tampering with a government Continued Inside


