WTU's current construction program, the core of which is the coal-fired power plant at Oklaunion, is the biggest and most expensive in the Company's history. By the time the proposed rates become effective, WTU will have invested more that \$84.4 million in new

facilities and must spend considerably more in the years ahead to satisfy the growing demand for electricity in West Texas.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total retail revenue of \$26.6 million. This amounts to 11.4 per cent.

No major changes in rate structure are included in the proposal. For residential customers, average electric bill, including fuel costs, would go up by about 13.2 per cent, although the actual increase would vary with the amount of usage.

## Gas Rate Approved For Unincorporated Areas

AUSTIN--The Railroad Commission has approved new gas rates for customers of Canyon Gas Co. in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County.

The new rates will increase an average monthly bill for five Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas from \$17.05 to \$23.96. Approximately 68 customers will be affected by the change.

A Commission evaulation of the previous rates revealed that Canyon Gas was experiencing a negative cash flow.











#### The "Bull Of The Woods" Captured







Tom Steed, 79, died June 9, at Shawnee Medical Center.

He retired in 1979 after serving 16 terms as U.S. Representative for his Oklahoma district.

Thomas Jefferson Steed was born in Rising Star, Texas, 1904, one of 11 children. His family moved to Konawa, Okla., when he was a boy.

#### **New Gas Rate For Unincorporated Areas**

AUSTIN, Texas, June 7-The Railroad Commission has approved new gas rates for customers of Canyon Gas Co. in the unincorporated areas of Eastland County.

The new rates will increase an average monthly bill for five Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas from \$17.05 to \$23.96. Approximately 68 customers will be affected by the

Commission A evaluation of the previous rates revealed that Canyon Gas was experiencing a negative cash flow.

The new rates are \$7 for the first Mcf and \$4.24 per Mcf for any additional amounts. A purchased gas adjustment clause was also established so that Canyon Gas can recover costs for gas above a base cost of \$2.125 per Mcf. A new charge of \$20 for reconnects was also approved. The company will collect \$228 in rate case expenses with a 10 cents

per Mcf surcharge. The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of the state.
