How much longer do we intend to take it?

For some time now, and since the voters of the community, by an overwhelming majority, expressed their wishes for a change in the policies and personnel at the City Hall, this small town has been viotimized in the public press, and particularly on the airways, as defenseless, dominated by a lawless element and open to any invasion of iniquity that an outside 'Mafia' might attempt to bring against it.

There is little, if any news value in these stories, but the sensation factor is high, and the ridiculous theme has been exploited gleefully by certain TV and radio stations in particular, who seem to have little sense of responsiblity for what their broadcasts wantonly reflect upon a small community and its people.

These stories, as we here know, are keyed to the demand of the Rising Star Mayor, that the City Council reemploy a police chief whom a majority of that city governing body refused at a recent meeting to retain.

This calculated publicity campaign had a climax only Wednesday in a farcical interview purportedly filmed at the City Hall and broadcast over an Abilene TV medium. In it the Rising Star mayor was pictured as a beleaguered and righteous champion of law and order in the community, appealing for support. This stance of course, is open to question. The station quite evidently, made no effort to canvass the whole picture, as a responsible news medium would have done.

It makes small comfort that the sponsors of this ridiculous campaign are themselves made laughingstock. The onesided mis-representation of what is strictly a Rising Star problem, reflects almost criminally upon the good character of our little town.

Nothing like it has ever happened here and I doubt it has hapened anywhere else in this so-called enlightened and civilized day. You wouldn't believe it could happen. For generations Rising Star has been known as a decent and law-abiding community, much as scores of other small and homey towns which dot the Texas hinterland. It has had its share of disorders, surely, but none worse than those that are common to other and normal small communities.

It is not yet time to spray your pecan trees for the control of the pecan nut casebearer, but get your equipment ready. As far as we can determine the date to spray will be sometime after May 20. The casebearers started emerging as adult moths on May 4. Only a few of the pupae have emerged as moths as of May 9. Mr. A. D. Ellington of Cisco trapped 92 pupae and larva and is keeping record of their emergence. This is one of the best ways we have of determining the spray date. We should be able to give you the exact days to spray next week. This date will be sooner in the Rising Star area than in the northern part of the

Several insecticides are good for the control of the casebearer. They include Malathion, Sevin, Guthion, DDT, Toxaphene, Thiodan, Parathion and Nicotine Sulfate. Seven and Malathion are less toxic and safer to use on trees in the vard. Be sure to add zinc sulfate to your spray at the rate of two pounds per 100 pallons of water. Zinc is a nutrient which most pecan trees need.






