## Through The Editor's Specs By BAB

I see by the newspapers that a prominent western educator, the president of a college, has indicted the American educational system for producing too many chiefs and not enough Indi-

"Unless," said he, "far more and better education in the semi-professional, technical and skilled levels is soon made available to greater numbers of cieizens, the national economy and social structure will suffer irreparable harm."

According to his indictment our educational system is geared to the 20 per cent of the students who complete college. It places primary emphasis on the greater prestige of a liberal arts program, while it neglects the skills essential to translating ideas into useful things. With job openings for four million skilled workers, we have millions of unemployed.

Well, the linotype machine in the small country newspaper shop has been making a small contribution toward meeting that deficit in the educational system. In these areas of limited industrial opportunities, it has afforded quite a number of boys, and even girls, opportunities, to learn the rudiments of a trade by which they have been able to support themselves and, in quite a number of cases to pay for college and university courses while actually carrying those

In this respect the "old mill" as printers call it with affectionate irreverence has actually been an extention of the local public schools, and a very important extention for those who have utilized

It isn't a skill to be easily learned. There are times when it seems that these machines-which are actually type founderies in that they mold type selectively at the will of the operator-are the very devil's fabrication. If there is anything on earth that will test a person's character, prove hs religion and plumb his sanity, it is a typesetting machine that is fractionally and mysteriously off in some operation of its anatomy. Not even the human body in all its various interrelationships, is more sympathetically responsive to a malfunction of some remote organ or gland than is a typesetting machine to an unhappiness in its gizzard or degree too little or too much in the temperature of its digestion.

But for all that, it is workhorse and the very heart of a printing plant. It has amazing durability and an even more astonishing capacity to deliver galleys of type to survive its temperament and deliver galleys of type to fill the columns of a newspaper.



The wrecking yards are checked anyway by Department personnel. It's just policy. Current plates on wrecked automobiles are picked up by THD field men and destroyed on the spot, says Townsley, to prevent reuse of stolen auto-

Until 1961, scrapped cars complete with plates and negotiable ownership papers could be purchased for \$50. To prevent both plates and papers from falling into the hands of auto theft rings, the Texas Legislature passed a law in 1961 requiring each salvage yard operator in Texas to remove immediately the current plates from any vehicle purchased as salvage. The plates and papers then are kept under lock and key until claimed by the High-

way Department. "We pick up an average of 10,000 titles and 3,000 current license plates per month," reveals Townsley.
