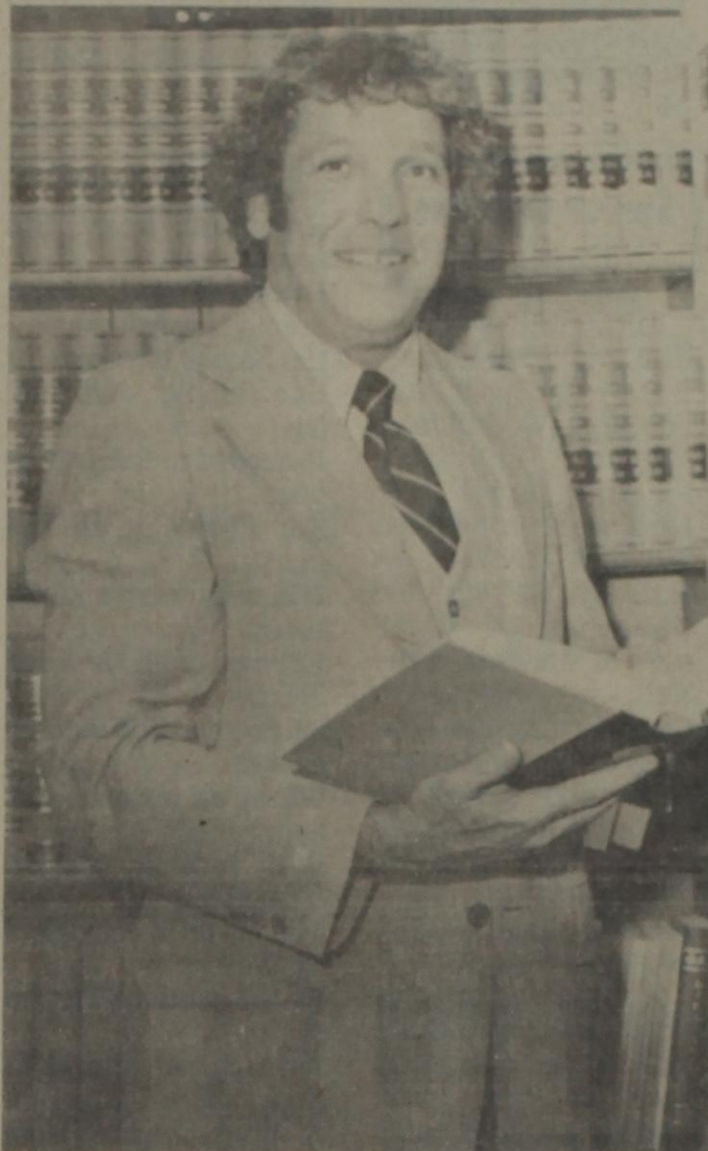

In just a few days I celebrate my first anniversary behind bars. One year of my life spent paying my debt to society and I'm not through yet.

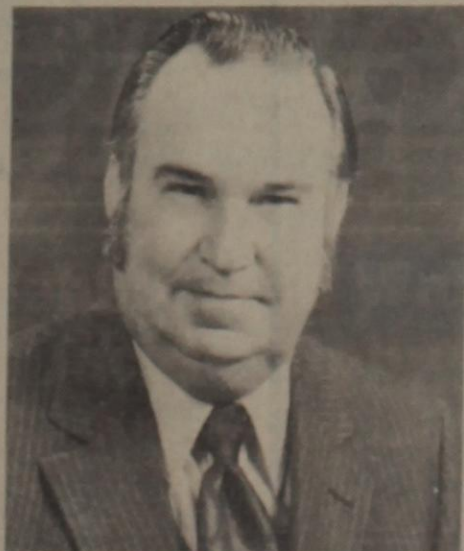

### National Peanut Growers Group

The National Peanut Growers Group testified much along the same line as in previous sessions. In concluding the NPGG statement, Chairman Emmett Reynolds addressed three questions to the Administration—(1) Where do we (producers) go for help if USDA will not or can not help us? (2) Why does government stop price increases for agricultural producers saying they are inflationary, but permit price escalation on everything the producer buys? and (3) Who in government is concerned about an assured food and fiber supply and the continuation of the farming sector?

Chairman Talmadge instructed his staff to seek a reply for the record from the administration on each of the three questions.

The Senators gave

strong support to the NPGG statement and reemphasized many of the pertinent points.

Senator Helm noted that the \$502 level sought by NPGG was actually a compromise since some grower segments held out for a higher level.

To emphasize the plight of farmer financing, Emmett Reynolds replied in answer to a question from Senator Helm that only a few years ago about one-third of the nation's growers were financed by FHA. Now, about 84 per cent of the farmers are financed by that agency, after being referred to FHA by private lending institutions.

Floyd King, departing from his prepared statement for Gold Kist, soundly chastised the USDA for suggesting the abolition of the peanut price support program and was openly critical of the peanut product manufacturers for their opposition to the opposed bill. He provided first hand information on the wildly escalating cost of farm implements, tractors, irrigation equipment, etc.

Buddy Davis, Tom Chandler and General Counsel John Greene represented the Southeastern Association and expressed strong support for the bill.

The American Agricultural Movement groups strongly endorsed the NPGG statement.

Odds are heavily against the enactment of this bill. The Senate Committee may at a future date hold a "mark-up" session probably for this and other bills. At that time the bill could be passed out of committee (either singly or as a part of a larger bill) and placed on the Senate calendar for action by the full Senate. Passage of the bill is possible in the Senate. The Chairman of the House Subcommittee is reported to have indicated that he will await action by the Senate Committee or by the full Senate prior to resuming action on the House side.

## Tomato Tips For Growers

Growing a few tomato plants can be a fascinating and rewarding venture, or it can be frustrating.

If you're growing tomatoes for the first time, a few pointers can help you avoid some common pitfalls.

First, don't grow tomatoes unless you have an area that receives sunlight for at least six hours during the day.

Next, good soil is a must. Oftentimes, garden soil is poor but can be improved with the right amount of organic matter and fertilizer.

Select a variety of tomatoes with the maximum resistance to common diseases.

Bonus, Big Set, Better Boy, Spring Giant and Florida all carry multiple disease resistance to most common diseases.

Buy short, stocky, young plants. Select plants four to six inches tall and about as wide.

If plants are in peat pots or peat blocks, do not remove

## Canning Season Is Here

Canning season is here -- so do it right! It's not difficult, but it must be done properly to avoid food poisoning, such as botulism, in the words of a foods and nutrition specialist.

Here's most of what you need to know as outlined by Mary K. Sweeten with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System:

Before you start canning, carefully read reliable water bath or pressure-canner instructions for preparing, packaging and processing each food.

You can get this information from your local County Extension Office.

them, says the horticulturist. Set the plants deeply into the ground with the top of the peat pot or peat material container below the surface. Plant them into well-prepared soil and water thoroughly immediately after transplanting.

When tomatoes start blooming, begin a weekly dust or spray program to prevent insects and diseases that are common in Texas gardens.

Stake, trellis or cage tomato plants for best results, adds Colner. Any method is good if it keeps fruit off the ground to prevent rotting.

# FROM OUR CHURCHES

## Church of Christ

**ALMOST INCREDIBLE PROMISES:** When we stand with Christ in glory, looking over life's finished story, "the most amazing feature of that life as it is looked back upon will be its prayerlessness. We shall be almost beside ourselves with astonishment that we spent so little time in real intercession. It will be our turn to "wonder." In our Lord's last discourse to His loved ones, just before the most wonderful of all prayers, the Master again and again held out His kingly golden sceptre and said, as it were, "What is your request? It shall be granted unto you, even unto the whole of My kingdom." Do we believe this? We must do so if we believe our Bibles. Shall we just read over very quietly and thoughtfully one of our Lord's promises, reiterated so many times? If we had never read them before, we should open our eyes in bewilderment, for these promises are almost incredible. From the lips of any mere man they would be quite unbelievable. But it is the Lord of heaven and earth who speaks; and He is speaking at the most solemn moment of His life. It is the eve of His death and passion. It is a farewell message. Now listen! "Verily, verily I say unto you, he that believeth on Me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do: because I go unto the Father. And whatsoever ye shall ask in My name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son.

**WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES**

Question: How are men "called" by God? Answer: The scriptures teach that God calls men through the gospel of Jesus Christ. The apostle Paul wrote to the Christians at Thessalonica and said, "We are bound to give thanks to God always for you, brethren beloved of the Lord, for that God chose you from the beginning unto salvation in sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth: whereunto he called you through our gospel, to the obtaining of the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 thess. 2:13-14). The gospel is "the power of God unto salvation" (Rom. 1:16). everyone who truly believes and obeys the gospel of Jesus Christ is truly called by God.

Men should not seek some special call from God separate from the gospel. The call of God is "a heavenly calling" (Heb.3:1) for us to belong to Jesus Christ and become saints of God (Rom.1:6-7). The call of God is a call for us to "lay hold on eternal life" (1 Tim.6:12) and "receive the promise of the eternal inheritance" (Heb.9:15). God calls everyone who will believe and obey his word "out of darkness into marvellous light" (Pet.2:9).

If winter weather passes, can Spring and its West Texas assortment of surprises be far behind?

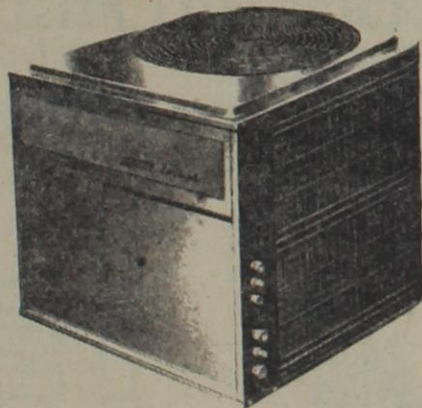

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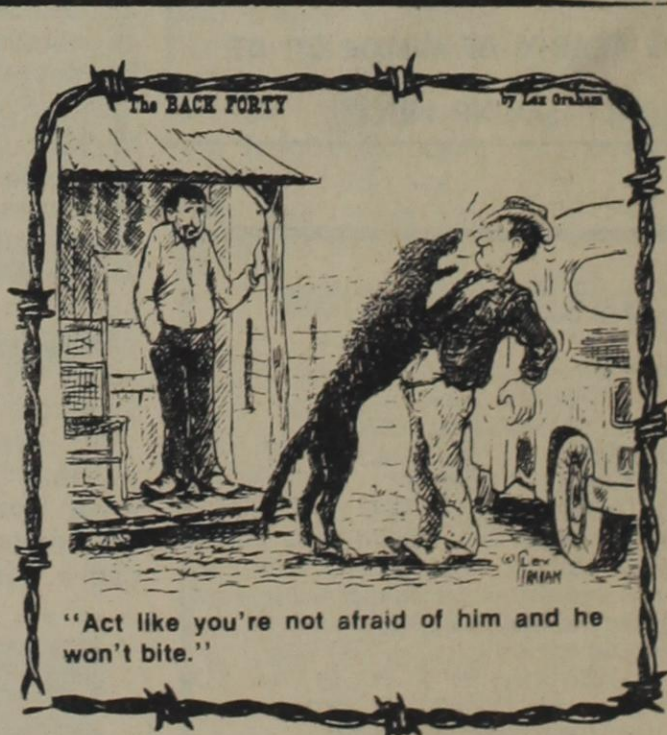
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## Driving Course Planned

Chenilles, lenos, cotton string-knit sweaters and other opened-up fabrics will create a whole new spring world that will move right on into summer.

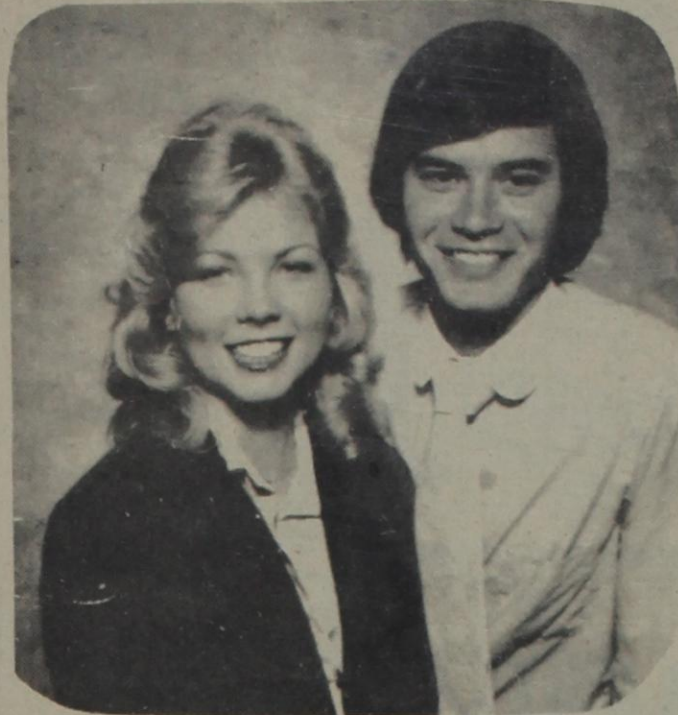
Wovens have more body, being crisp, tightly woven and shaped.

### Dr. Treadwell Continuing Education

KANSAS CITY, MO.—Dr. M.A. Treadwell has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 a headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

1980 crop of peanuts. Appearing in support of the bill were the National Peanut Growers Group, Southeastern Peanut Shellers Association, Georgia Farm Bureau, American Agriculture Movement (Georgia and Virginia), Gold Kist and the National Farmers Union. A telegram endorsing the bill has been filed by the Southwestern Peanut Shellers Association. A letter from the American Farm Bureau Federation endorsing the bill was entered in the hearing record by the chairman.

Dr. Howard Hjort, Director of Economics Policy and Budget for USDA presented the Department's position opposing the bill. Deputy Secretary Jim Williams was to have been present for USDA but was reported to be suffering with influenza. The Peanut Butter and Nut Salters Association and the National Confectioners Association filed a written statement in opposition to the bill. Both USDA and the peanut product groups ended their statements with recommendations that the next peanut program be patterned after the soybean, wheat and feed grain programs.

Members of the Senate who participated in the hearing other than Chairman Herman Talmadge were Jesse Helms (R-N.C.), Donald A. Stewart (D-Ala.), Richard Stone (D-Fla.) and Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.).

All Senators present went on record as strongly favoring the bill. Senators Lloyd Bentsen (D-Tex.), John Tower (D-Tex.), and David Boren (D-Okla.) are among the six sponsors of the bill. Committee Chairman Talmadge made an excellent

opening statement which clearly and impressively described the need for a higher quota support level and cited progress made since 1977 in achieving lower program cost and expanded export markets sought by USDA.

A major portion of the USDA statement, following its negative comments on the 1980 quota support level, was devoted to the administration's goal of eliminating peanut acreage allotments first or eliminating both acreage allotments and poundage quotas so as to free peanut producers to fully take advantage of the export markets. This route, USDA says, is preferable to the alternative of accelerating the annual reduction in the poundage quota in an effort to bring domestic production and consumption into balance. The statement says in part, "We suggest that there are two general kinds of program changes that should be considered".

The first would be an acceleration of the annual reduction in the poundage quota in an effort to bring domestic consumption into balance at a more rapid rate than the 5 per cent annual quota reductions specified in the 1977 Act.

"In order to bring production and expected domestic consumption into balance in 1980, a significant additional reduction in the poundage quota would be required--an additional 10 per cent, or more (a total reduction of 15 per cent from the 1979 level) in order to bring the quota loan surplus down below the 100,000 ton range--the level projected for the current program. The attached

analysis shows the expected supply and use of peanuts, and program costs at 2 quota loan rates with and without such a reduction.

"In conjunction with the poundage quota reductions, the Congress should consider eliminating the acreage allotments.

"The effective reductions in quota loan production to date have come from reductions in the poundage quota. By law, the allotment cannot be reduced. Since the allotments provide no significant production adjustment, and since they do provide a basis for windfall returns to land owners, we suggest that the Congress consider eliminating the acreage allotments altogether and retaining only the poundage quotas which would be allocated to producers on the basis of production levels.

"The allotments imply abnormal rents. They tend to increase costs of production above levels necessary to attract land resources into peanut production. We estimate that 70 per cent of our peanuts will be produced on non-owned land in 1980. Most will be leased, but about a fifth will be on a share rent basis. The elimination of the allotment provision in the law would set into motion a series of adjustments that would mean significant savings for producers who lease land.

"Alternatively, the peanut program could be operated without either acreage or poundage restrictions in order to permit the most efficient producers to produce for both the export and domestic markets, and to do so at a profit.

"Both of these program changes would imply a shift

by high cost producers from peanut production to other crops. And, they imply a reduction in the value of allotments for those who lease them to operators.

"It is the policy of this Administration to offer farmers the maximum flexibility to make decisions about what to produce on the basis of expected market prices. We have consistently favored voluntary programs in order to avoid having the value of allotments capitalized into land and into leases, and to facilitate economic adjustment to changing consumption and production conditions.

"In general, those senators of agriculture where programs are voluntary have found that they are able to achieve levels of production efficiency that permit them to sell profitably in export markets. There appears to be little sentiment on the part of soybean, wheat and feed grain producers for mandatory programs. Although many would prefer higher prices, very few would choose to relinquish their foreign markets."

Chairman Talmadge told Dr. Hjort that USDA should be comparing the peanut support level with other special crops such as dairy and wool. Under questioning Dr. Hjort responded that USDA is supporting dairy at over 68 per cent of parity (80 per cent was quoted by USDA) in a subsequent response and the support level for wool is 71.5 per cent of parity. Mr. Talmadge also dwelled to some degree on the effects of an average price support level (54 per cent) for the producer who plants all of his peanut allotment and receives only \$250 per ton for the additional peanuts.

Senator Helms said that the administration may be forced to choose between the "workers and the shirkers." He said recently a \$79 million duplication of spending was discovered in the food stamp program. He asked Dr. Hjort how many peanut producers would be pushed into bankruptcy for many growers. Senator Helm suggested that Dr. Hjort come to North Carolina and look at the real situation produced there.

Senator Helm then asked a very key question as to whether USDA would reflect the true production cost increase a year from

now when the 1981 support level is set, since USDA apparently intends to tie the support rate to the national average cost of production. Hjort skirted the questions as expected by saying USDA would look closely at production cost increases but said the other 8 factors (in Sect. 401b of the Agriculture Act of 1949) must also be considered.

In answer to a question, USDA economist Bill Motes said a support rate of \$502 would be expected to increase program cost about \$25 million from the 1980 estimate of \$27 million to a total of \$52 million.

The general consensus is that the bill may not be considered for a vote by the Senate Committee, considering the hazards it would be subjected to in subsequent steps, particularly in the House with practically no chance for final passage in that body.

Growers have demonstrated to both the House Sub-committee and the Senate Committee as well as USDA the serious economic situation, which should be helpful a year from now on the 1981 support rate. It has been demonstrated to key Congressmen a unanimity of purpose among growers and shellers, not seen in a long time, regarding the need to maintain a livable program. This should prove helpful in writing the 1981 Farm Bill. It was obviously helpful to have a prestigious group of U.S. Senators for an audience on March 12 to become informed on the problems.



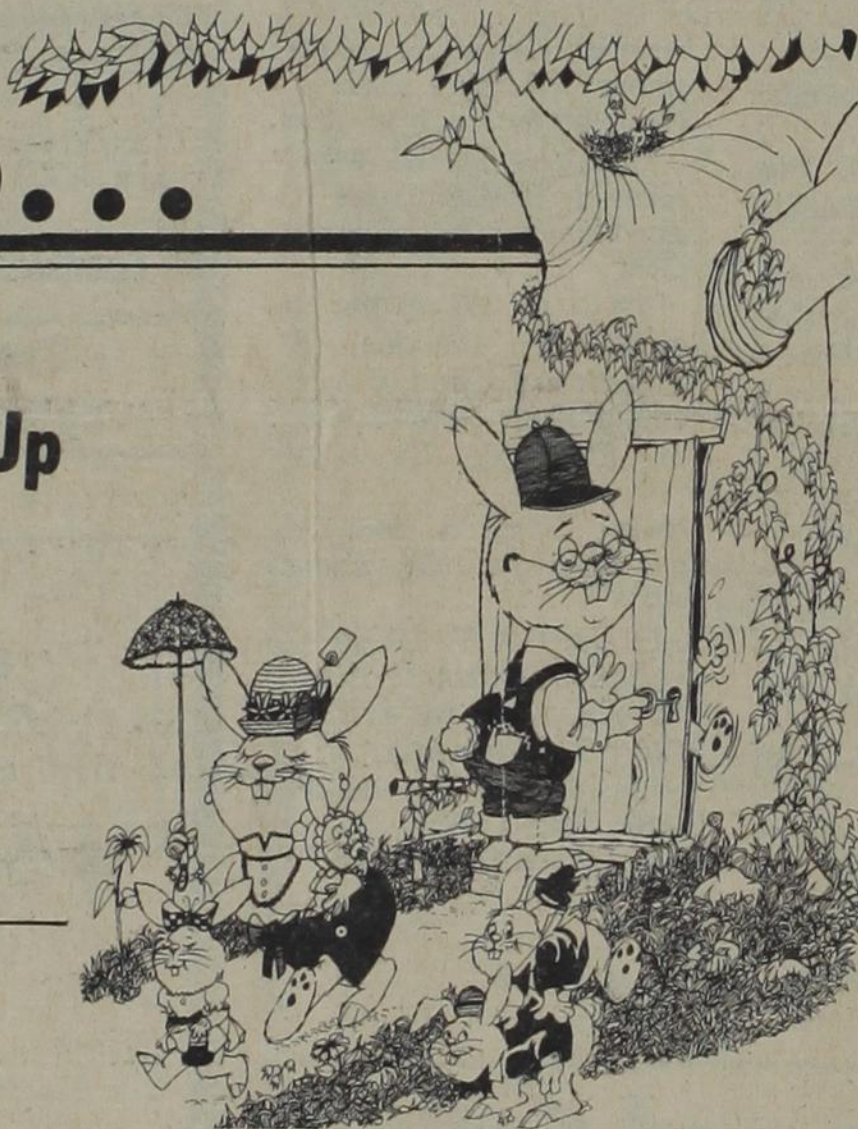
