## Rising Star ISD Board Meeting

The Board of Trustees of Rising Star Independent School District met July 7 at 8 p.m. in the board room with President Larry Wilson, secretary David Harris, Tony Long, Dr. Charles Barnes, Gary Wilson and Larry Chambers present. Vice President Ronnie Green was absent.

Also present were Dr. Scott Eddington of Education Service Center Region 14 and Dr. Donald Bryan, superintendent. The minutes of the June 13 meeting were read and approved.

The Texas Education Agency Compliance and Monitoring Visit occurred March 1, 1988; a letter from TEA was read stating that RSISD was in compliance with federal and state regulations in the areas of Chapter I & II, Vocational and E.S.L. No action was taken.

A motion by Dr. Barnes, seconded by G. Wilson, to hire Le Jones as a teacher and coach for the 1988-89 school year subject to assignment and reassignment carried 6-0.

Dr. Scott Eddington, with the Education Service Center region 14, made a presentation concerning the advantages of the technical assistance services; a motion was made by Harris, seconded by G. Wilson, to enter into a contract with Region 14 ESC for Learning Resource Consultant and Administrative Technical Assistance. Motion carried 6-0.

Drs. Barnes and Bryan gave a report on lab results of suspected asbestos in the school building. The board was pleased to learn that asbestos findings were very small and that this substance can be controlled through normal operations

and maintenance. No action taken.

The date for the budget hearing and adoption of the official budget was set for August 22 at 8 p.m. A budget workshop will be held July 25 at 7 p.m.

Use of school equipment was discussed.

By a vote of 6-0 the trustees gave Rising Star ISD approval for the Appraisal District of Eastland County to receive the Perry's 5 & 10 Cents building in Eastland as a gift.

A comparison of revenue to budget and a statement of cash in bank was presented by Dr. Bryan.

## Commodities

Central Texas Council of Opportunities, Inc. will distribute USDA commodities in Rising Star on Tuesday, July 26, from 1:00 to 2:30 p.m. at the Senior Citizens Center.

Items available are flour, milk, meal and butter with milk, flour and meal in very short supply. Items will be distributed on a first come, first served basis.

Central Texas Council has no control over what items are available or the quantities of the items. Allocation depends on the availability of items from USDA.

All eligible persons will receive emergency food assistance without regard to race, sex, political beliefs, age, national origin or handicap.

## Firefighters Want Control, City Says 'You Fluffed It'

The following letter is printed for consideration by those interested in the Rising Star Fire Department and the unprotected status of Rising Star for insurance rate purposes. The enclosure mentioned was not included for publication.

The mayor and council for the City of Rising Star have charged on a number of occasions that the Board of Directors for the Fire Department has not had regular enough meetings, resulting in an increase in

the city's key rate of insurance. The State Board of Insurance in Austin couldn't care less about the Fire Department's Board of Directors.

If you will read this letter, it reveals that Rising Star firefighters send no records of training drills, or send records on an irregular basis. Reports of monthly training drills with the number of volunteers attending are a requirement of the State Board of Insurance.

Records of fire training

drills held by the firefighters must be sent to Austin each month for the city residents to benefit by having a protected status for insurance purposes. Other requirements and regulations pertain to firefighting equipment, housing for the equipment and fire hydrants.

Taking the position of a fire marshal into consideration for key rate purposes may be made by the State Board if it is given the information requested and the regulations are carried out, the letter says.

A reorganization meeting of the Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department was held on January 21, 1986 at 7:00 p.m. The minutes of the meeting were as follows: Rising Star Volunteer Fire Department

Reorganization Meeting Tues., Jan. 21, 1986

Mayor Henry Burk called meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with 31 persons present, five of those being firemen.

Mayor Burk presented a letter from The State Board of Insurance regarding monthly fire reports not being received, without these reports key rate insurance will go up.

Discussion to combine rural and city fire departments but each having its own secretary and finances, also discussion to dissolve present board and appoint new board members.

Discussion as to why and when two fire departments were set up in the first place. Split because of disagreement about where the money was going to be used. Rural Fire Department was formed so fires outside the city would be fought.

Motion was made to combine the two fire departments into one and for the board to have control of the money. Motion made by Frank Winchester seconded by L.E. Allen. Motion carried.

New board members were appointed, board consisting of three members from the Rural and three from the City. Rural board members are Charles Murphree, Steve White, Larry White.

City board members are Fred Rabe, Darren White, Bob Lucas.

The new board is to appoint a Fire Chief, Fire Marshal and secretary-treasurer.

Forty-eight Fire Department caps are being made by Bibby's.

Those present at the organizational meeting of the Fire Department were David Tharp, Johnny Childers, Bob Lucas, Fred Rabe, Clinton Crisp, Arley Bibby, Jackie Palmore, Davy Jones, C.A. Claborn, Ed Witt, Larry White, Bud Linney, Cole White, Kim Joyce, L.T. Owen, Frank Winchester, L.E. Allen, Bernie Barnes, Gene Hicks, Darren White, Charlie Moore, John David Lee, K.E. Murdoch, Bill Gregg, Willie Vandivere, Charles Murphree, Steve White, Dean Bailey, Henry Burk, Travis Williams, Gaylon Swift.

After this meeting the City Council and the Mayor decided to stay out of the Fire Department because the Board of Directors being elected could carry through with the operations of the Fire Department.

In Feb., 1988 the board was informed to have a meeting which never took place; consequently, the City is considered an unprotected City. At this point in time, we called people to have a meeting at the American Legion on the 2nd day of May, 1988. At that time the meeting selected Fred Rabe, Chester Novak, Mike Nall, Curtis Hill and J.T. Morrow for the board. At this writing Chester Novak and J.T. Morrow have resigned.

We did not need more regulations, as the State of Texas requirements are sufficient for an incorporated city.

Dear Mr. Williams:

Enclosed is the letter which followed the last key rate inspection of Rising Star. Listed in this letter are some very general, basic requirements which the Board will need before considering the city for the protected status.

We will also need a record of the training drills conducted within the department. In July, 1987 this office received five months of training reports. Since then, we have no indication that the department is training. Enclosed are some additional Training Report forms which should be sent to this office monthly, indicating the training received by the Rising Star Fire Department. A roster of the volunteers in the department will also be needed.

For the city to obtain key rate recognition for the fire marshal, we must have evidence that an ordinance exists which creates the position, describes the duties, and conveys the authority to carry out these duties. Fires should be investigated and all non-residential structures should be inspected regularly. Regular Monthly Information Reports should be submitted to this office.

# County Agents to List Available Hay

COLLEGE STATION--July 13 hay crops are hurting from the drought in many parts of Texas, but a few areas that received timely rain are holding up well.

Agronomists and district directors with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reported Tuesday that the state has some critical hay shortage areas, while other regions have a surplus. In the rolling Plains, some dryland farmers are planting hybrid sudan for hay after recent rains. Some hay harvesting is under way in North Central Texas, while first hay cuttings in Northeast Texas are extremely short. In East Texas, hay yields are less than 50 percent of normal.

Hay yields also are low in much of South Central Texas. Hay supplies are getting critical in much of South, Southwest and parts of the Coastal Bend Districts. In those areas, hay that is being produced is mostly on irrigated acreage. Dr. Billy Harris, Extension soils specialist who works with the educational aspects of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), said drought conditions in much of Texas have created serious shortages of hay and other livestock feed stocks.

To assist farmers, the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) has announced that in certain counties, haying of CRP acreage will be granted for a 30-day period. Producers interested in making hay on CRP lands should contact their local ASCS offices to determine full details.

Terry Harman, executive director of the Texas ASCS office, has announced that extensions of the 30-day haying period may be granted if conditions worsen.

Harman said haying on CRP land will be allowed in counties where emergency haying and grazing of

agricultural conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation use (CU) acreage already has been approved. CRP program participants must file a request within 10 calendar days of the county's approval for haying on CRP lands.

In addition, grazing on CRP acreage and harvesting of seed and grain crops are prohibited, the ASCS official said. Producers need to obtain written permission before harvesting hay, and they will receive a 25 percent reduction in CRP contract payments for this year on acreage harvested as hay.

Federal requirements also indicate that CRP participants may sell the hay for any price to livestock producers, but cannot sell to hay traders.

Dr. Robert Schwartz, Extension economist in dairy marketing, said that although the Texas hay acreage was up 5 percent from year earlier levels, lack of timely moisture in many areas has resulted in lower volume and lighter yields. In irrigated areas, the second alfalfa cutting has taken place with good yields.

To assist producers in locating hay, the Extension Service will implement a listing of counties that have a surplus of hay available, beginning July 27. People needing hay should contact their local county Extension agents for these hay updates.

The Texas State ASCS office reported July 11 that 182 counties have been approved for haying and grazing of 1988 ACR and CU acreage and for haying on CRP acreage. In addition, 90 counties have been approved for the emergency feed program (EFP) and the emergency feed assistance program (EFAP).

# Gordon Spot

Sclerotinia blight is a relatively new disease of peanuts in this area. It has been very destructive to peanuts in Mason County and was identified in several Eastland County peanut fields last year.

Early symptoms include white tufts of cottony-like growth on stems near the ground line. Later stems shred and reveal black sclerotia inside the stems. Peanut plants die much like Southern blight symptoms. The fungicides that control Southern blight will not control Sclerotinia blight.

Botran is the only fungicide that has been effective in the control of Sclerotinia blight and it was not labeled for use on peanuts. However, last week the Environmental Protection Agency notified the Texas Department of Agriculture that specific exemption (Section 18) for the use of Botran to control Sclerotinia blight on peanuts has been granted.

The Eastland County Extension Agents are among more than 900 faculty members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service taking part in a professional development conference at Texas A&M University this week, July 11-15.

The conference theme is "Extension Education: Addressing Issues for a Changing Texas".

The conference is aimed at updating Extension Service faculty from throughout the state on current and emerging issues facing Texans so that more effective educational programs can be developed. Stay abreast of

new technologies and methodologies is vital to our efforts in delivering educational programs to clientele.

Featured speakers during the week will include Dr. Zerle Carpenter, Director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Dr. Perry Adkisson, Chancellor of the Texas A&M University System; Dr. Charles Arntzen, Deputy Chancellor and Dean of Agriculture at Texas A&M; Dr. Chester Black, Director of the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service; Doc Blakely of Wharton, an internationally known lecturer and humorist; and State Sen. Kent Caperton of Bryan.

Part of the week will be devoted to 27 technical sessions dealing with such areas as computer technology, community revitalization, alternate crops, cholesterol issues, price risk management, new energy technologies, biotechnology in agriculture, total ranch management, rangeland recreation, community tourism, groundwater quality protection, pesticide application technology, parenting education, urban 4-H programming, the global economy and human nutrition.

The conference will conclude July 15, with the presentation of the Knapp-Porter Award to three long-time supporters of Extension Service programs. The award is the highest given by Extension Service to individuals who have provided long-time support to Texas Agriculture and rural living.

There has been much discussion on this matter, but no action has been taken. The single most important factor to remember is that this organization was not formed to win money or actually to even award cash. Trophies were once the only award offered, and sometimes members had to even wait a little to get those due to lack of club funds.

Many possible solutions to the money problem have been offered. The bottom line is without more participants an increase is not likely. However one possible solution has been brought to my attention and I thought I would pass this along.

Based on last years 16 man average per event the E.C.B.C. cleared an average \$80.00 per event. Originally this money was used to purchase trophies for our top 3 winners in each event. It has been suggested that since we now award 1 plaque per person our trophy cost are cut by about 2/3. The money previously kept by the club could be turned back into the prize awards. A 10 percent off the top would probably cover the cost of plaques at the years end it was pointed out. This would leave a First 50 percent, second 30 percent, and third 10 percent. This based on a field of 16 entrants would look like this First \$80.00, Second \$48.00, Third \$16.00. These figures are based on the percent of entry of \$10.00 for the tournament. It was suggested also that with a 90 percent pay back that the E.C.B.C. could possibly recover some of its lost membership by reducing the entry some. A possible set up that was mentioned was to go \$8.00 tour-

nament \$2.00 big bass with both being mandatory. Then having an optional big bass pot of \$5.00 paying one to three places.

bottom line to it all is to raise participation before the pot can be sweetened. If only 10 percent of the entry money is kept for the club this would mean members would have to seek other means to finance club expenditures.

The Eastland County Bass Club is an important resource for our area in many ways. And growth can occur with some work and cooperation from the members and the community.

The comments above are the words of an E.C.B.C. member who is attempting to start the ball rolling towards growth for the E.C.B.C. and stop recession.

# Water Quality Study at Possum Kingdom

The Brazos River Authority has begun a special water quality study to help determine the appropriate stream standard in the portion of the Brazos River affected by the hydropower releases from Possum Kingdom Reservoir. This study is referred to as a Use Attainability Analysis (UAA). The Texas Water Commission and the Environmental Protection Agency have concurred with the study.

The UAA will help determine whether the stream standards recently adopted by the Texas Water Commission are attainable for the river segment immediately below the dam. The UAA will also document the abundant fish population and habitat present there.

The UAA requires field measurements of the dissolved oxygen conditions during a hydropower release. The hydropower

release must be during the warmest summer conditions. In order to meet the UAA requirements, the Brazos River Authority intends to make a hydropower release of four to six hours duration on two to three consecutive days in mid to late August 1988. This hydropower release should have only a minimal effect on the water level of the reservoir and is necessary to enable the Brazos River Authority to complete this important water quality study.

The hydropower release will be coordinated with the Brazos Electric Power Cooperative (BEPCC) and will be made solely for the purpose of this water quality study. The BEPCC has been extremely cooperative in curtailing hydropower generation since April 1987 when the reservoir water elevation was lowered in connection with repairs to the dam.

# Rail Garrison Public Hearing Date Set

DYESS AFB - A public hearing covering an environmental impact statement for the proposed deployment and operation of the Peacekeeper Intercontinental Ballistic Missile in the Rail Garrison basing mode has been set for July 25 starting at 7 p.m. in the Abilene Civic Center, 1110 N. 6th St.

The Air Force invites government agency representatives, interest groups and private citizens to participate in the public hearings to identify environmental issues not already addressed in the draft EIS.

A panel comprised of Air Force and contractor personnel who worked on the EIS will respond to questions relating to the Peacekeeper Rail Garrison program. The period set aside for comments and questions will be limited to two hours. In order to give everyone in attendance an equal chance to speak, oral comments and questions will be limited to three minutes. Commentators are encouraged to submit their comments and questions in writing, especially if they are very long.

The panelists will be as responsive as possible in answering questions. Some questions, however, may require additional research and study and may be answered only in the final EIS. All substantive comments, whether asked orally during the hearing or submitted later in writing, will be responded to in the final EIS. Responsible opposing views will be discussed at appropriate points in the final EIS.

The EIS will be used in the decision making process for

base selection, siting and mitigation actions. The EIS will also describe the nature, scope and extent of impacts which may be associated with the deployment and operation of the Peacekeeper Rail Garrison system.

On December 19, 1986 the White House announced the

President's decision to develop a Rail Garrison mode for the Peacekeeper ICBM. The Peacekeeper Rail Garrison program responds to the need for enhanced survivability of our missile force and to the congressional mandate to modernize that deterrent capability.

The proposed Peacekeeper Rail Garrison system consists of 50 Peacekeeper missiles deployed on 25 Air Force trains with two missiles per train. An alternative action is to deploy 100 Peacekeeper missiles on 50 trains.

The trains will be parked in secure garrisons on existing Air Force bases, between four and six trains parked in each garrison. During periods of increased international tension, the trains could be directed by higher authority to disperse from the Rail Garrison onto the nation's rail network. Once on the rail network, the Peacekeeper trains become virtually unattackable.

In addition to Dyess AFB, public hearings are also planned for communities adjacent to the ten other candidate deployment bases.

The comments received from the public hearings will be combined with environmental concerns listed in the draft EIS. These comments will be used to complete the final EIS scheduled to be released in late 1988. The public comment period for this EIS will end August 30. Alligator Public Hunt Applications Forms

Prospective alligator hunters may apply now for September hunts at two wildlife management areas in Southwest Texas.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said application forms and instructions may be obtained in person or by mail from TPWD headquarters, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744, or by calling the statewide toll-free number 1-800-792-1112. The forms also may be picked up in person at the J.D. Murphree WMA at Port Arthur.

The deadline for returning completed forms to TPWD headquarters is 5 p.m. August 1. A drawing will be held to select the hunters. There is no application fees, but a fee of \$40.00 will be charged successful applicants.

Approximately 180 alligator hunting permits will be issued for the Murphree area, located on the south side of State Highway 73, three miles west of the State Highway 82 intersection. Another eight permits will be issued for hunts on the new Mad Island WMA, located 15 miles south of El Maton in Matagorda County.

Last year, 198 hunters at the Murphree area harvested 178 gators.

The general alligator season for selected areas of Southeast Texas is Sept. 2-18. Tag quotas will be announced during the first week of August, after alligator census surveys are completed, according to Dr. Bruce Thomas, alligator program director.
