Standard Cow-Calf Performance Analysis Short Course Is Friday

If you are operating a cow-calfenterprise, mark your calendar for July 24th! The "standardized performance analysis (SPA)" shortcourse will start at 8:30 a.m. at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension center at Stephenville. The morning session is open to all cow-calf producers, while the afternoon session will be limited to those who register for the SPA computer session, described below.

What is SPA? SPA is a standardized cow-calf enterprise production and financial performance analysis system developed by Texas A&M in cooperation with the National Cattleman's Association. SPA facilitates comparisons of an operation's performance between years, producers, production regions and production systems. SPA


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

WHAT FISHERMEN (AND WOMEN) TELL US:

The following comments were gathered by the TP and WD concerning the proposed permitting of Bass Tournaments in Texas. The writer was Lyndal Waldrip TPWD news editor.

Perception many times is reality. Whether or not fishing tournaments, particularly bass tournaments, are harmful to the state's reservoirs is beside the point. Tournaments do not have a good reputation with many other anglers.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department studies have shown that bass tournaments are not hazardous to the resource. However, a department plan to permit freshwater fishing tournaments in an attempt to gather additional data has tournament anglers up in arms.

What's the deal? Are tournament fishermen really looked down upon?

The Texas Black Bass Fishing Study, completed this spring, provides an insight into the various views and opinions of bass fishermen. Here are a few responses, both pro and con, about tournaments from the survey:

"My only complaint is

with bass tournaments. I don't believe they are really hurting the fish, but they are honestly hurting my enjoyment of the sport. I really cannot take my family fishing to a lake to fish and enjoy ourselves with a tournament in progress. It has to do with a matter of 'competition' or 'relaxation.' Everyone's definition is different."

". . . I feel bass fishing tourn'aments commercialize bass fishing and in many instances take over a lake from Texas residents on tournament weekends."

". . . I absolutely hate tournaments and bass clubs. They are rude and obtrusive."

"We are not members of bass clubs and do not wish to be. Our experience on the lake with a tournament in process usually is negative. They generally show little concern for the others on the water or on the shore."

"Every time I go fishing on Lake Sam Rayburn, the boat launches are crowded with tournament fishermen... I almost feel lakes are being taken over by tournament fishermen on the weekends."

"I believe that money tournaments like the KILT tournaments fished on Lake Conroe should be

Some other comments from the bass study dealt with the economics of tournament fishing. Two examples are:

"Tournaments should return some proceeds to TPWD for the management of fish populations!"

"I think it would be unfair to penalize the tournament fisherman, for we all should have the right to enjoy our sport as we see fit. Don't penalize me because I like to compete. I put a lot of money back into our economy doing so."

"There are almost as many opinions on fishing tournaments as there are fishermen," Durocher said. "Remember, this survey is of bass fishermen and most of the tournaments in Texas are for bass. What about the opinions of the crappie and catfish fishermen? "Our only goal with the

proposed permit system is to make sure that any future action concerning this activity is based on accurate data and not on these varied opinions," he said. "We are not trying to regulate tournaments or use tournaments as a source of revenue. Tournaments are becoming an ever increasing part of the fishing scene. We just want to make sure that it's not at the expense of the resource or other anglers."

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
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Bishop Wilson Is Leader Of **Central Texas Methodists**

A new bishop will be leading the 137,000 United Methodists in Fort Worth and Central Texas for the next four years.

Bishop Joe A. Wilson was assigned July 15 as leader of the United Methodist Church's Fort Worth Episcopal Area until August 31, 1996. That area covers the Central Texas Annual Conference, which includes some 350 congregations in Arlington, Brownwood, Fort Worth, Temple, Waco, Waxahachie, Weatherford, and other Central Texas communities. The Eastland County United Methodists Churches are in this group.

Wilson, 54, is to replace Bishop John W. Russell September 1. Russell, 66, is retiring August 31 after 12 years as leader of the Central Texas Annual

Announcement of the change came during the July 13-16 South Central Jurisdictional Conference in Fort Worth. The jurisdictional conference meets every four years to replace bishops who have reached mandatory retirement age and assign bishops to their geographic areas of supervision across the jurisdiction for the next four years. That region stretches from Texas to Nebraska and Louisiana to New Mexico.

Wilson, now senior pastor of Marvin United Methodist Church in Tyler, was one of six bishops elected at the Fort Worth meeting. Others were the Rev. Joel N. Martinez, 52, of Dallas; the Rev. A. Frederick "Fritz" Mutti, 54, of Kansas City, Mo; the Rev. Alfred L. Norris, 54, of Atlanta; the Rev. Raymond H. Owen, 60, of Bartlesville, Ok., and the Rev. Ann B. Sherer, 49, of Houston.

Martinez is the first Hispanic bishop, and Sherer is the first woman bishop ever elected to serve in the eight-state South Central region.

In the 9.9 million-member United Methodist Church the office of bishop is an administrative post, not an order of ministry. Bishops oversee spiritual and administrative affairs of the nation's second largest Protestant denomination. Bishops also appoint pastors each year to all congregations in their episcopal areas.

Bishops are elected to the \$72,654 a year post for life but must retire from active administration by age 70

Wilson, a Newton native who grew up in Orange, has been senior pastor of the 3,900-member Marvin congregation since June 1991. Before that he was assistant to the bishop and executive director of the Texas Annual Conference in Houston for five years.

He was superintendent of the church's Texarkana District from 1984 to 1986, senior pastor of First United Methodist Church in Lake Jackson from 1978 to 1984 and pastor of League City United Methodist Church from 1972 to 1978. He has served other congregations in Calvert, Rosebud and Tyler.

Wilson can serve three four-year terms as an active bishop.

More United Methodists live in Texas than in any other state- - some 800,000 in more than 2,200 congregations.

"We want to teach them how to relax using imagery, breathing techniques and positive thinking," she said.

The study will compare professional therapists as "coaches" versus parents or no coach at all. It will also determine if it is realistic to except parents to coach their children.

"Some parents will pick up the techniques easily," said Dahlquist. "Working with their child may help the m feel in control. but others may find it too emotional."

The therapy program consists of five to six sessions lasting about one hour immediately before treatment. Patients will be followed for up to eight months. CHildren with

cancer between the ages of 6 and 15 are participating in the \$400,000 study, funded by the National Cancer Institute.

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

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
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

A study at Harvard found that men 5'7" or shorter have a 60 percent greater risk of heart attack than those 6'1" or taller.

Researchers at the University of Michigan report that Retin-A, the prescription cream that eases wrinkles, is also effective in clearing the age spots known as "liver" spots.

"Sun badge" that changes color in the presence of sunlight has been invented by a San Diego company. Wearers are warned to get out of the sun at different color changes, depending on skin type.

Regular exercise seems to protect against colon cancer, according to studies at Harvard School of Public Health and University of Southern California Medical School. It may protect against other cancers, too.

Remember this: when women who were deficient in iron and zinc were given supplements, their memory scores improved in a study at the University of Texas. The researchers noted best results when women took one mineral or the other; both upplements together were less effective.

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

Lump Sum Distributions Part 2

Last column we discussed the different options in-






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volved in how one handled a lump sum distribution from an employer's plan. Today let us look more closely at one's option to take the money now. This income will be included in your taxes for the year as ordinary income. However, if you reached age 50 before January 1, 1986, you are eligible to use a one time option known as 5-year or 10-year forward averaging. In forward averaging your lump sum is taxed as if it were your only income for 5 or 10 years. In the case of 5-year averaging you use the current year's tax rates, in 10-year averaging one must always use the 1986 rates. In most cases you will pay less in income taxes with this method. Here is an example.

Examples of Forward Averaging

In addition to this, if you were in your plan prior to 1974, the portion of your lump-sum that was in your plan before that year is eligible for preferential longterm capitol gain treatment. Now if you were under age 50 as of January 1, 1986 this will not apply to you. Let's see what might happen if you combined these two strategies, say 60% taxed on forward averaging and 40% as long term capitol gains.


Cook Infant Is Home and Doing Well
