8-Inch Snow Thanksqiving Week Surprise

The first pre-Thanksgiving snow within living memory here blanketed the Rising Star Country Sunday morning. A surprised populace, who had retired with weather predictions of light rain and mist, awoke Sunday morning to look out upon a fall ranging from 5 to 10 inches and the big flakes still swirling.

Church services had only a scattering of attendance as most worshippers were hampered by snow clogged roads and slippery footing. The fall in Rising Star was at least eight inches deep in most places, and a great deal of the earlier snow melted upon touching the earth so that the correct depth could only be estimated. The flakes began to fall here about 12:30 Sunday morning and for several hours they swarmed down to cover the ground with a layer of white that put out from 1.5 to 2 inches of moisture in the already soaked earth and assured farmers and ranchers of the best moisture season in ten years.
