May Group Represented By Lawyer

The Citizens For Our School met Wednesday, May 16th in the May Community Center. The purpose of the meeting was to hear a progress report from the lawyer who has been hired by the group in behalf of Coach and Principal Dan McGhee and Mrs. Faye Morton. Attorney Charlie Gamblin of Brownwood has been retained as a representative for the group.

Mr. Gamblin stated that a petition has been filed in 35th District court of Brown County against Supt. M.H. Buchanan and the Board of Trustees of the May Independent School District.

The petition filed Tuesday states, "In accordance with VTCA Texas Education Code, Article 13.110, Defendants (the May School Board) are not entitled to refuse to renew Plaintiff's contracts...as none of the reasons which Defendants specified are reasons for refusing to renew Plaintiff's contracts..."

McGhee and Morton have appealed the board's action to the Commissioner of Education, but because any action by the commissioner will require six weeks to complete, the plaintiffs are asking the court to enjoin the board from hiring anyone to replace them pending action on their appeal.

In addition the petition states, "Plaintiffs specially request that they be awarded \$10,000 each as punitive damages as a result of the malicious and unlawful acts of defendants..."

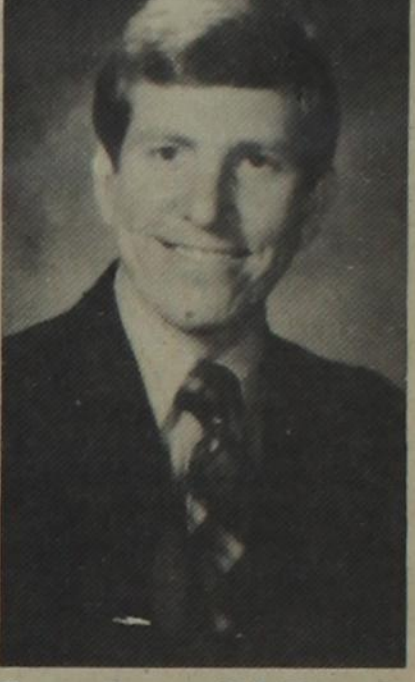

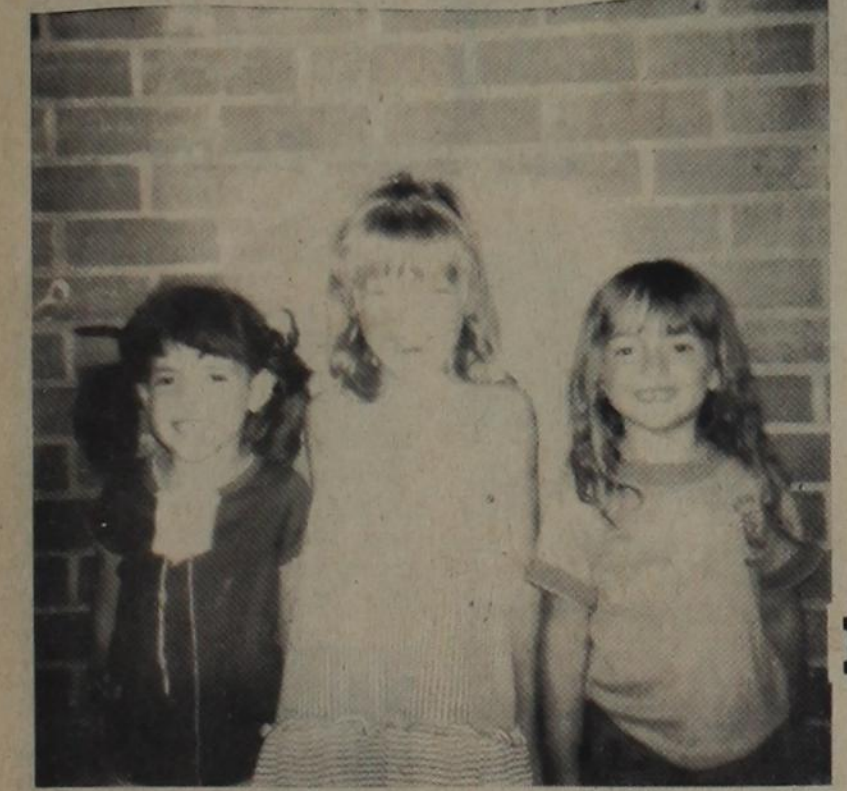

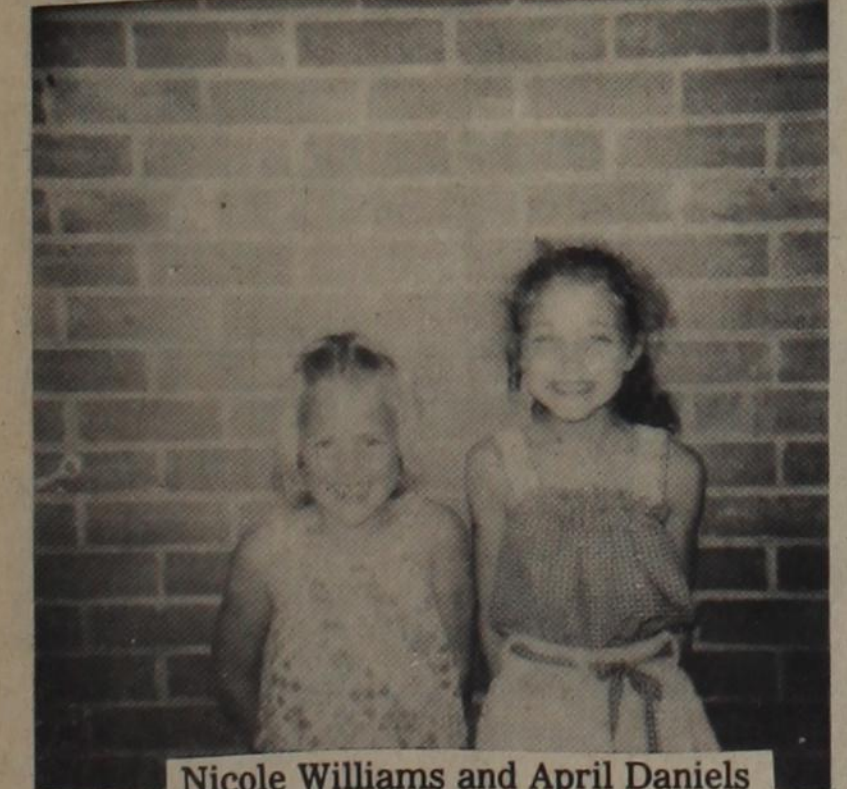

The club voted to donate \$20.00 to the React Club of Rising Star.

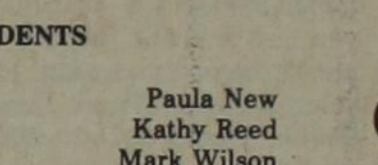
Mrs. Melvin Shook was appointed as temporary chairman of the maintenance committee.

Ted Murphree, son of Mr. and Mrs. W.E. Murphree, is an 18 year old Senior at May high. He has attended May for twelve years.

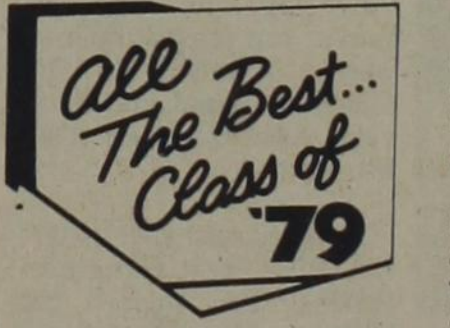

FERTILIZER

FACTS (Part 2)

By Wayne Parker
-Nitrogen is used in large amounts by plants.
-Ten tons of Coastal Bermudagrass would contain about 500 Lb. of actual nitrogen.

-Nitrogen fertilizer directly increases protein content in plants.
-Adequate amounts of phosphorus and potash actually increases the plants efficiency in using nitrogen to get more true protein.
-Nitrogen increases the chlorophyll concentrations in leaves which produces a dark green color. The dark green color in chlorophyll absorbs light energy that is used to manufacture "plant food".

-Nitrogen increases plant efficiency in using water. A good fertilizer program may be worth several inches of rain over the course of a growing season.
-Fertilizer encourages deeper root growth to reach subsoil moisture.
-The deeper and thicker the root system, the more nutrients and moisture used by plants.

-Fertilizer thickens plant cover which reduces evaporation.
-Good vegetative cover slows runoff and allows the soil to soak up water.
-Fertilizer helps plants to grow fast and shade out moisture-robbing weeds.

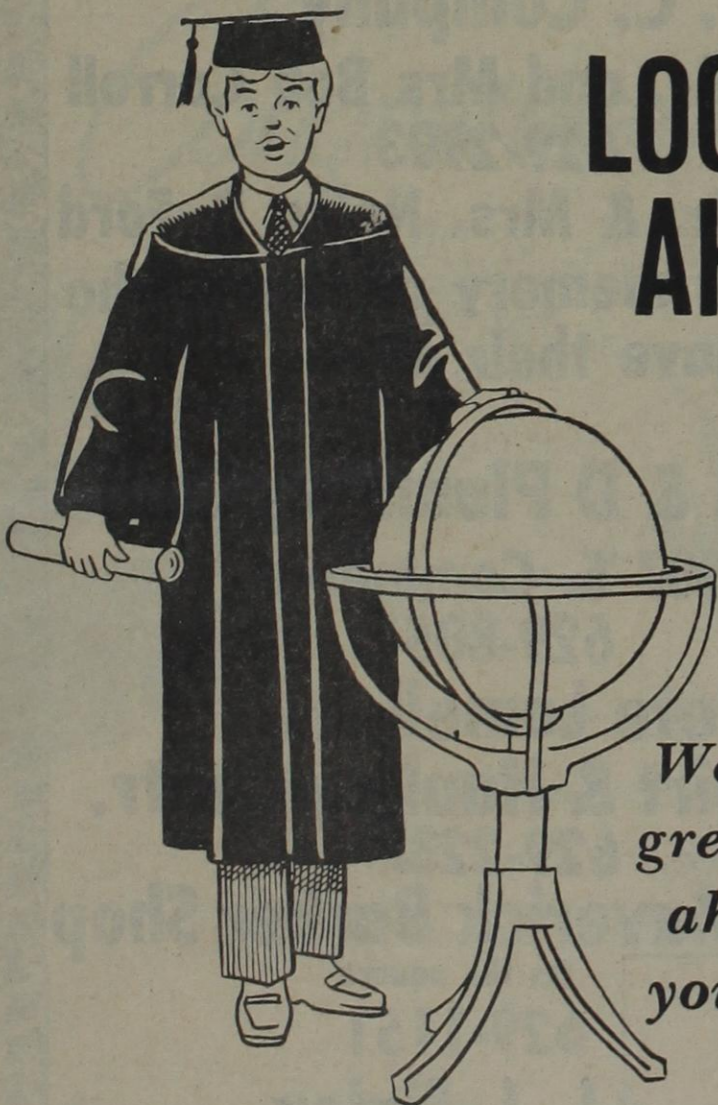

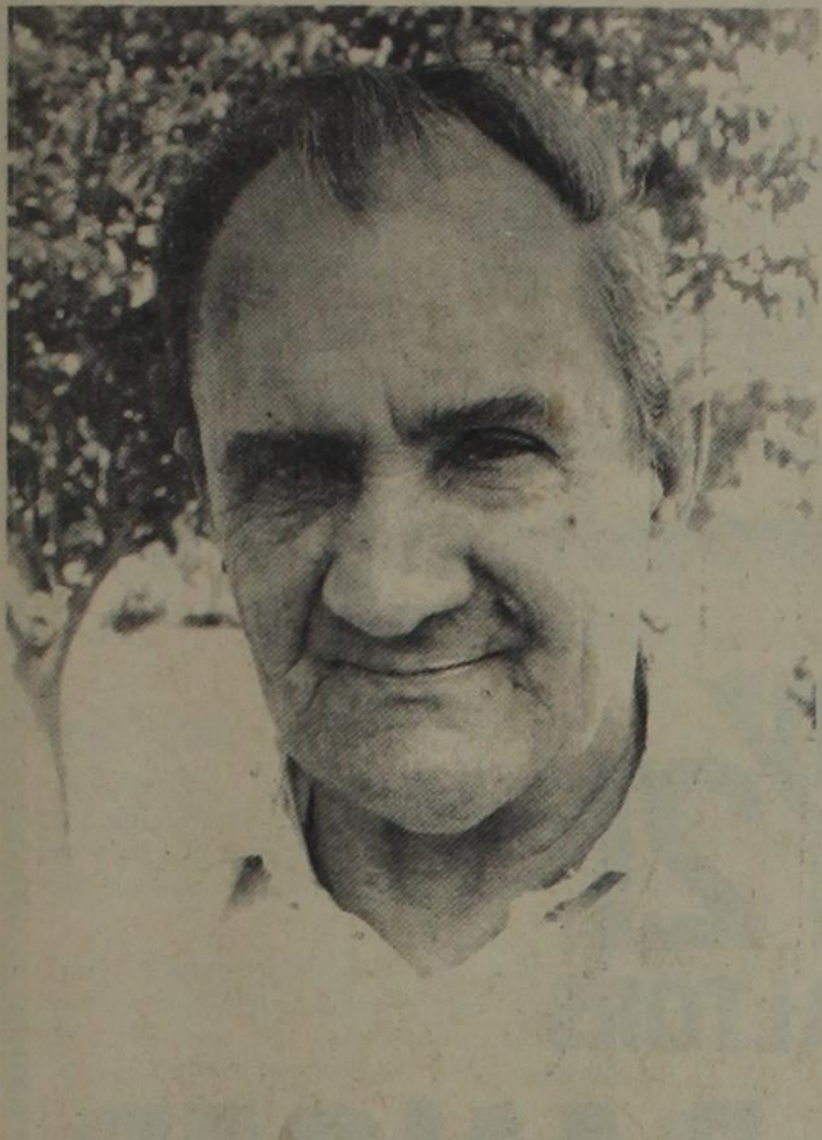

Bryant Houston Makes The Fiddle Sing



growing-up time Bryant heard some of the finest fiddlers in the country. He singles out three as being the very best. "My father, Cap, had a very unique way of playing, especially on handling the bow. And Lum Sellers was a great Texas fiddler - he taught me a lot. Bill Collins was a fine Oklahoma fiddler. Both Sellers and Collins could read music. I never did learn to do that. I just listen to things played, and pick them up."

Bryant learned to play on an old Stainer Model violin. Soon he could handle "Turkey In The Straw". But actually, at that time, his idol was the great concert violinist Fritz Kreisler, and he longed to play that type of music.

Several times, in cities, violin teachers heard young Bryant play, and would offer to teach him without charge. But Bryant and his family were very close, and they always traveled on together.

By 1931 they came home to Eastland County -- to stay. They lived in Cisco, worked at various things, and played their violins. Cap ranged out occasionally to pick up a few more Championships, and Bryant began his long history of winning contests. But while the other young men in his age group were anxious to leave for "greener pastures", Bryant had enough memories of those pastures to want to stay in Eastland County the rest of his life.

"When they try to get me out of State," he smiles, "I tell them I am too busy playing in good old Texas Contests."

And here, of course, his record is awesome. Over 400 first place in Contests, with winnings over World Champions unwary enough to up. Trophies stacked around, and awards such as "International Old Time Fiddle Championship" in 1967 and 1968 -- State Championships in Kerrville. Towns and crowds and titles, blurring into each other. Legends clinging about him. And always the music, calling him back.

"Which are your best tunes, Bryant?"

"Grey Eagle, Lim Rock, Butterfly Hornpipe, Shuck In The Bush, Brown Kelly Waltz, and Listen To The Mocking Bird. My Dad composed Shuck In The Bush, and I believe I'm the only person in the world who plays it."

"So this was part of Cap Houston's legacy -- a lilting tune. Bryant quietly speaks of the death of his father, in the late 1950's. Several years ago he lost his Mother and brother, the last of his immediate family. We do not dwell on a loss this deep, but turn to another difficulty -- a chilling one for violin players.

"About eight years ago I was playing down in Houston, and had my three special violins with me. One of these had been Spade Cooley's Recording Violin -- a great instrument with big, full, round tones. These were all stolen from my hotel room, and I've never been able to find them. A friend gave me this good violin I use now."

He test his bow. Time to stop talking now, and do some playing.

He begins with "Grey Eagle", an awesome Scottish tune calculated to stir the heart of the most bored Contest Judge. And call it magic -- call it what you will -- but the "Grey Eagle" as played by Houston is a dazzling display of energy transformed into sound. Wild reaches into the third and fourth position, double tones, and unusual bowing makes this a formidable tune for other players to equal.

"Lime Rock", another winning tune, is a hybrid with its own grace and delicacy. Like the playing of Houston, it transcends any style. There are harmonics and many difficult passages. It becomes obvious that this unassuming man can any violistic effect he desires, including pizzicato, spiccato bowing, and an unusual rocking movement across the strings which he learned from his Father.

When Cap Houston composed "Shuck In The Bush", he wrapped up everything he knew about fiddle-playing in a kind of joyful, rakish abandon. As Bryant plays his piece, it is plain that it belongs uniquely to him, and may always. For

no one else has been able to play it in the manner Cap intended. Perhaps Cap knew it would be that way.

From this type of music, Bryant swings into "sovenir" by Drala, handling the classic with ease. Soft, streamy notes, then bright showers of notes, finishing with a flourish.

And "Listen To The Mockingbird", the Southwestern

Classic, is not too far removed.

This showcase tune for fiddle players has been largely shelved in recent years, for obvious reasons. Very few people have the ability to play it. Bryant has his own version -- six different bird calls woven into the melody, with all sorts of warbles and trills. The tones are liquid and natural, and Bryant reveals

why.

"I used to catch small mockingbirds and keep them for awhile, so I could listen to them sing. After I learned the right tones, I put them into this piece."

What he puts into all his pieces will be obvious to the public again this summer, as he makes the familiar rounds of contests. Judges and spectators will say that he is

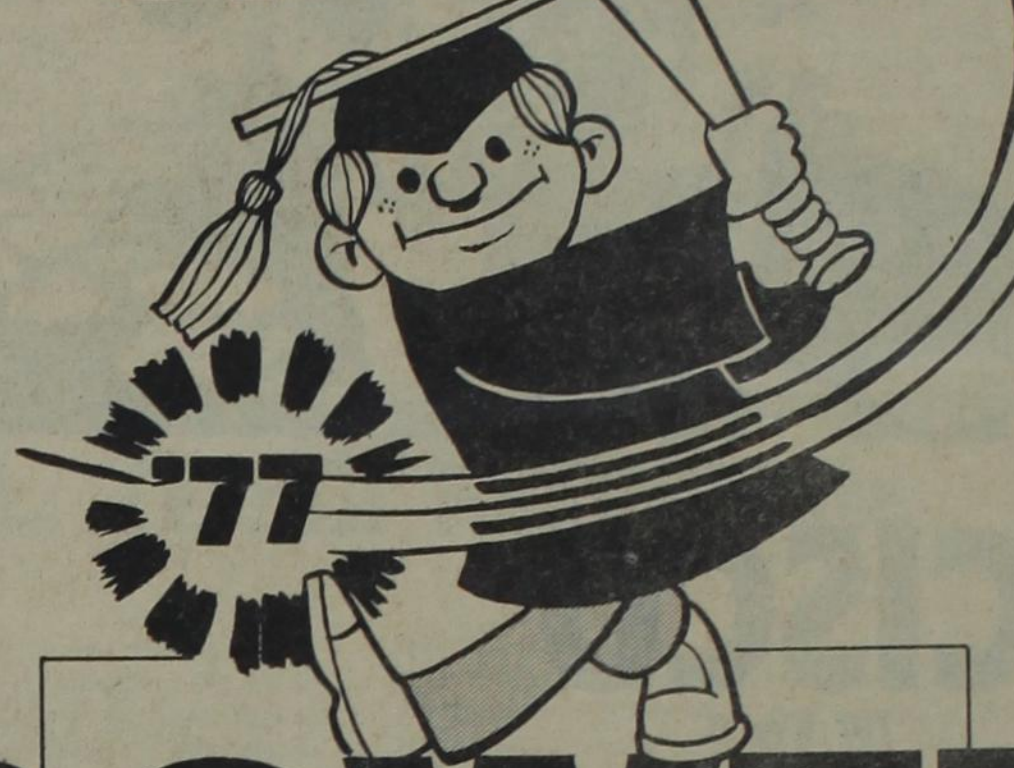
"The best of the Texas style and fiddle playing", and other things. Some will realize that this music can create visual images, and rouse ethnic memories buried in the subconscious. Some will recognize that he has interpreted the soul-music of an area, and the magnitude of this.

The home place of the Houston family, several miles down the Leon River from Cisco, is deserted now. Only the wind breaks the silence, or the hum of bees gathering nectar from the blooms in an old apple orchard.

A few scattered stones mark the place where Bryant Houston, the son of Captain (Cap) Houston, was born in 1912.

But the violin music cradled on this hillside has survived, and can be heard most any time at the Nursing Home at Rising Star, where Bryant Houston lives.

Some musicians demand great preparation and fanfare before they present their talents--or contracts, high pay, and Press Agents. But Bryant, one of the world's great fiddle players, demands nothing.

For special occasions he plays with Nell Maynard on the piano, and Buddy Weeks on the guitar. But many times he plays alone--spilling his music out freely to the old, infirm, visitors, or children coming in for programs. When he walks up the hall toward the recreation room, carrying his old Italian violin, he always collects listeners. Bryant is a personable man - dark eyes and

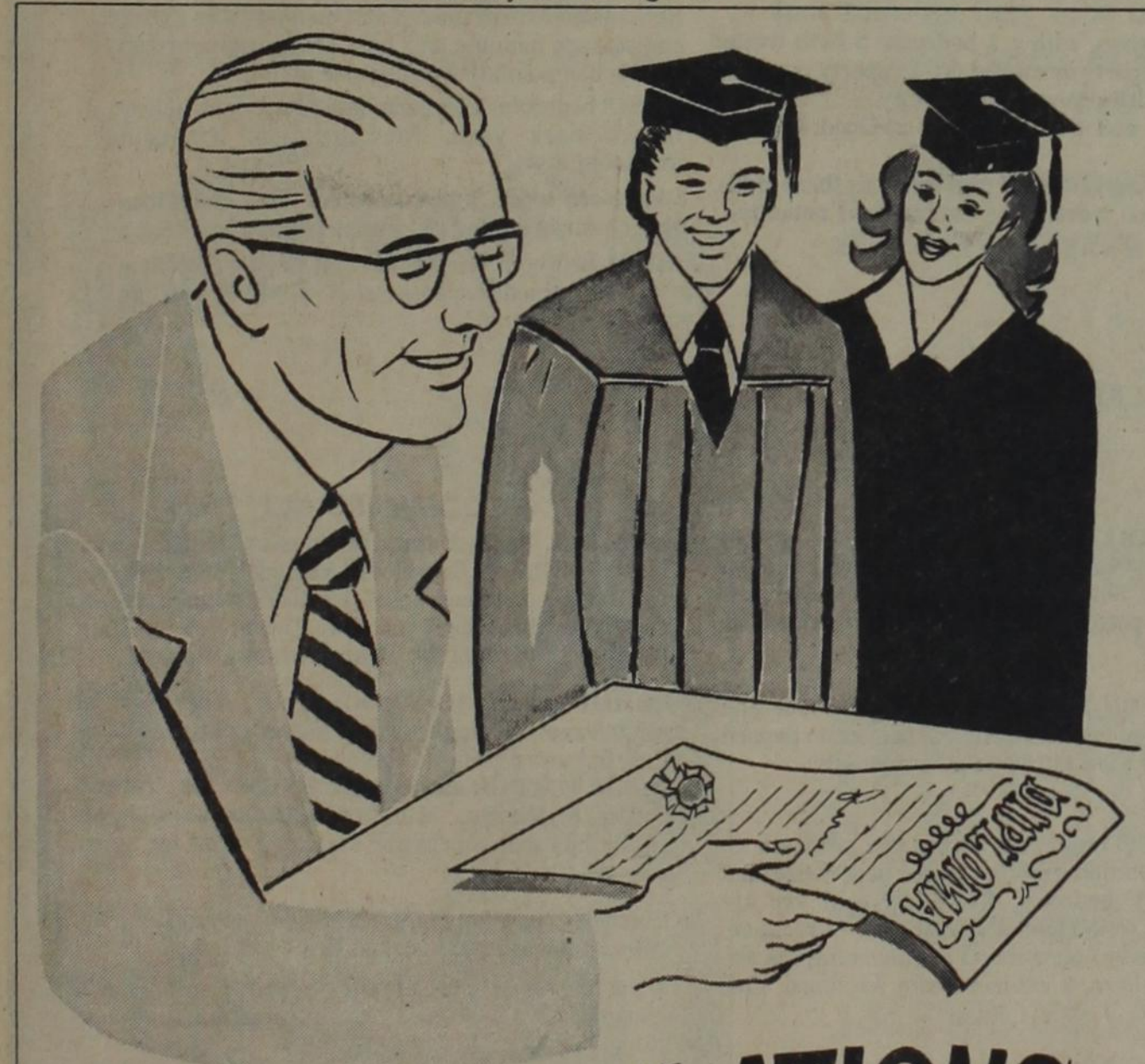
hair, medium-sized, soft-spoken. But the people of Rising Star have a phrase which describes him more accurately: "Bryant-Houston-and-his-Magic-Vi-o-lin."

I stopped by the Nursing Home recently to hear Bryant play again. He drew out his violin carefully, with the light glowing against the amber varnish.

"My people were some of the early settlers in Eastland County," he mentioned. "Grandfather brought his family from Alabama when my Dad, Captain, was a boy. Yes, he was really named 'Captain', but everyone called him 'Cap'. As he grew up, he became a fine fiddle-player--won many Championships. When I was three years old he had an offer from the Luther Browder Shows to travel and play for the public. So Dad took us and left the farm. First we covered Oklahoma and Arkansas, and went from there to Long Beach, California.

The family consisted of Cap, his wife Anna Helen, and the young sons, Bryant and Leck. Bryant's Mother played the violin, and Leck, like Bryant, learned to play.

This was only the beginnings of the travels for the family, which ranged across the country and lasted for sixteen years. During this

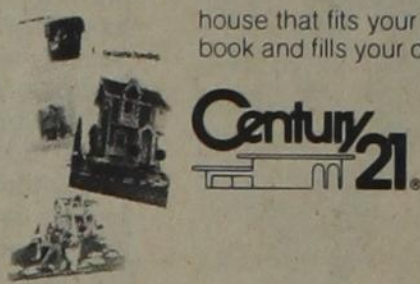

Former Cross Plains Newspaper Owner & Publisher Of Glen Rose Reporter Mailbox Improvement

Jack D. McCarty, 62, former Callahan County newspaper owner and publisher of the Glen Rose Reporter, drowned during the weekend, apparently after becoming entangled in a fishing line.

McCarty, a native of Cleburne, had gone alone to a family farm Saturday after-

noon to check on a trout line in a stock tank. McCarty's son, Dan, said the body of his father was recovered in water about eight feet deep. The younger McCarty said his father was an excellent swimmer. After working on newspapers in Grand Prairie, Goldthwaite and Rising Star, McCarty bought a half

interest in the Rising Star paper in 1948. He purchased the Cross Plains Review in 1951 and in 1963, he and a partner purchased the Glen Rose Reporter. McCarty bought out his partner in 1964. McCarty was appointed by former Gov. Dolph Briscoe to an unexpired term on the Brazos River Authority, then

was reappointed by Gov. Bill Clements this year, an appointment that was pending with the State Senate at his death. A Democrat, McCarty headed his party's executive committee in Somerville County for several years. Services were held at 2:00 p.m. Monday at the Martin Pitts Funeral Chapel in Glen

Rose. Survivors include his wife, Lois; a son, Dan of Granbury; a daughter, Mrs. Joe Vandiver of Nederland; a sister, Mrs. Raymond Young of Baird; five grandsons and a great-grandson.

It consisted of a detachable scoop with a weather-proof outer casing, and a metal flag that could be raised to indicate when mail was to be collected. "Until Collins came along," Sectional Center Manager WATSON said, "many makeshift receptacles-including tin cans nailed to trees-were used as mailboxes, particularly after rural mail service began in 1896." Today, he said, a variety of approved commercial mailbox designs are available for use with decorative posts, and those who prefer a custom-made mailbox may check with their local postmaster to make sure it meets specifications and requirements.

Peanut Contracting Volume Slashed

According to Ross Wilson, Manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association the quantity of additional peanuts contracted by growers to shellers this year is expected to be vastly reduced from 1978 in Texas and Oklahoma.

Wilson pointed to a recent announcement by Gold Kist calling for no contracting of additional peanuts in the Southwest area this year. He said an official of that organization informed him that Gold Kist expects to do its contracting with growers in the Southeast, apparently due to lower costs of acquisition and shipping.

Birdson Peanuts announced plans on May 18 for contracting only about 50 percent of its 1978 contract purchases. Birdson Peanuts will be mak-

ing contract offers through its company owned and commissioned buying points throughout Texas and Oklahoma and therefore expects to be contracting with essentially the same growers who delivered contract peanuts to the company in 1978. Wilson said these developments mean that the 1978 tonnage contracted to the Southwest will probably be reduced by about 65 percent this year.

The Birdson Peanuts announcement stated that growers will be offered 95.24 percent of the quota price for the additional peanuts contracted, but the company will charge each grower with a freight participation fee of about \$9.00 per ton. The net price to the grower will be just above 93 percent of the

quota price. Tom Birdson, General Manager of Birdson Peanuts in Gorman, Texas, said that freight costs on exported peanuts are considerably greater when shipped from the Southwest area to the ports than from the Southeast area to ports.

Wilson said to his knowledge no other Southwest sheller has announced pricing plans for contracting 1979 crop additional peanuts from growers. He concluded that the plantings of additional peanuts will probably be substantially reduced in 1979 due to the certain major reduction in contracted tonnage. He urged that growers not plant additional peanuts for contracting to shellers until a firm understanding is reached with the sheller.

Medicare Insurance Deductible Increased

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible—the cost of covered services in each benefit period not paid by Medicare—has been increased to \$160 for benefit periods beginning in 1979 from the 1978 figure of \$144, a social security spokesperson said recently.

The deductible is intended to be roughly equal to the cost of one day of care in the hospital. The increase was necessary, the representative said, because of the continually rising cost of medical care.

The deductible is the only amount a Medicare patient is responsible for during the first 60 days of hospital care in a benefit period for covered services.

From the 61st through the 90th day of hospital care in a

benefit period, hospital insurance pays for all covered services except for \$40 a day (up from \$36).

For each reserve day (there are 60 during a person's lifetime) hospital insurance will pay for all covered services except for \$80 a day (up from \$72).

For the 21st through the 100th day of care in a skilled nursing facility during a benefit period, hospital insurance pays the cost of all covered services except for \$20 a day (up from \$18).

These increases apply only to benefit periods starting in 1979. They do not apply to benefit periods which began before 1979.

More information about Medicare covered services and costs can be obtained at any social security office. The address and telephone number of the nearest social security office can be found in the telephone directory.

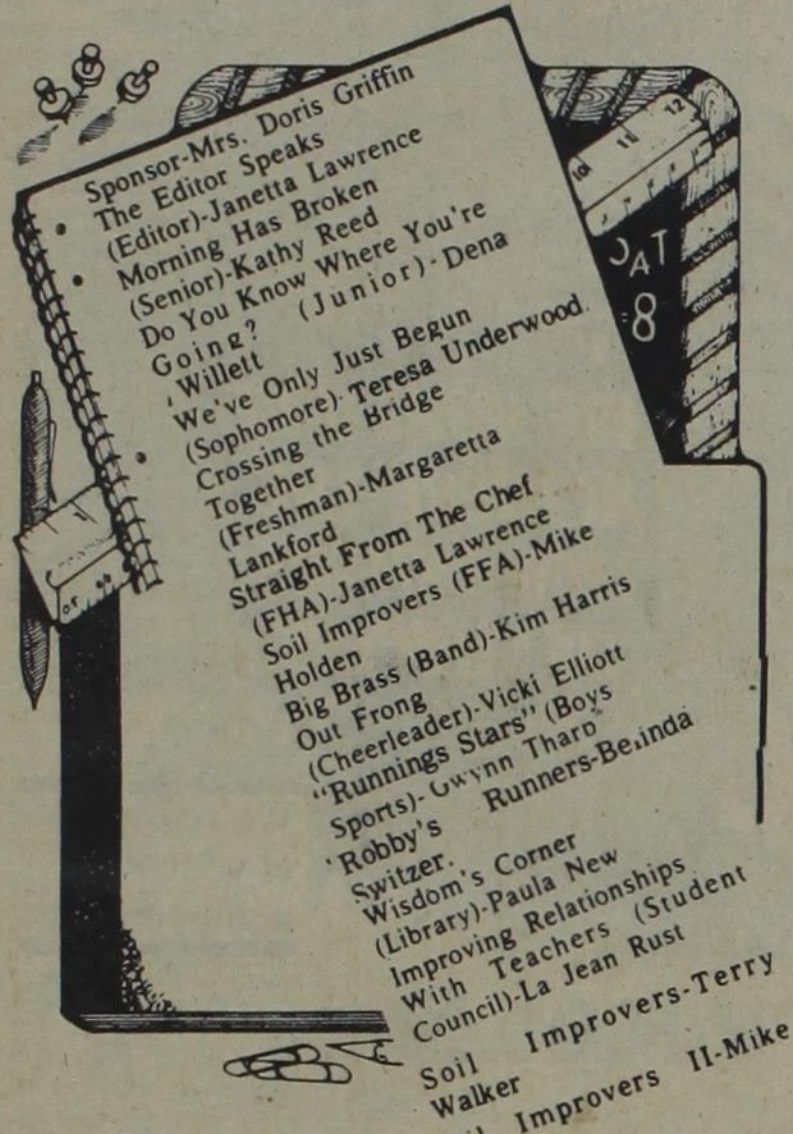

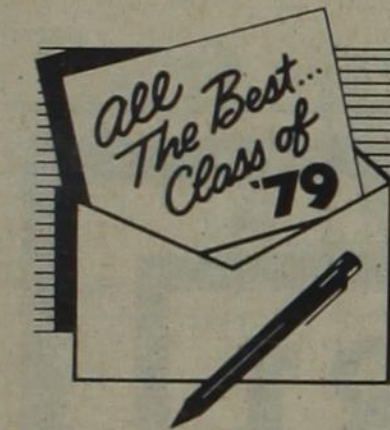
