## Rising Star Man Dies In Truck Mishap

Jay Frank Benson, 37-year-old Rising Star man, died in a Balinger hospital about 1 p. m. Wednesday of injuries after his truck overturned and burned about two miles from Falco at 7 a. m. Wednesday. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at Higginbotham Chapel here with the Rev. Lee Roy Gaston of South Copper Church, Brownwood, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Lee Rutledge of the Bible Baptist Church here.

Burial will be in the Stag Creek Cemetery under the direction of the Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mr. Benson was a driver for the Central West Texas Produce Ass'n of Abilene. He was returning from San Angelo to Brownwood at the time of the accident.

He is survived by his wife and four children, Mary Jean, Judy Lynn, Shirley Jay and Jay Frank, Jr., and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil D. Benson, all of Rt. 5, Comanche; five brothers, D. W., of Amarillo, Charlie, Robert Dale and Cleo, of Rising Star, and Delbert of Rt. 5, Comanche, and five sisters, Mrs. Purnal Hurin of Lubbock, Mrs. Homer Cain, Mrs. Hubert Cain and Mrs. J. D. Clark of Rising Star, and Yvonne Benson of Rt. 5, Comanche.

## Record Load of Peanuts Brought To Rising Star Mon.

What may have been the biggest—and one of the best—loads of peanuts ever marketed in Rising Star was brought here Monday of last week by Hulon Erwin and sold to Jones Brothers. The enormous truck load, weighing 43,860 pounds—1,462 bushels—was a record peanut load weighed by the Rising Star scales, according to Jim Ray Bucy, public weigher. It graded 66. Mr. Erwin is a progressive farmer living a few miles northwest of Rising Star. He is well known for the quality of the peanut crops he raises. Several seasons ago he installed an irrigation system on his farm which helped him to produce fair yields of peanuts even in the severe drought.

Grade of peanuts marketed on the Rising Star market has been improving greatly during the latter part of the season. The best grade so far reported was a 76 registered by a load brought in Thursday of last week by Eldon Murphy of May. The preceding Wednesday both Murphy and Altus Butler, another very successful farmer living west of Rising Star, each brought in loads that graded 74, and on Monday Monroe Chambers of May marketed a load grading 73.

## Former Rising Star Merchant Dies At Midland

Midland — Dwight Clifford Wilcox, long-time Midland resident, and founder of Wilcox Hardware, died unexpectedly at his home at 910 West Texas. The death occurred at 8:30 Sunday morning. D. C. Wilcox was born in Burlington, Iowa, October 26, 1883. His father was D. W. Wilcox. Mr. D. C. Wilcox moved to Kansas City, Missouri in 1900 and married Grace Jackson on March 18, 1905. While in Kansas City Mr. Wilcox was employed as clerk with the Kansas City Power and Light and later served in the capacity of foundry manager of Prier Brass Works, a company still in production in Kansas City. Near 1912 he joined Richards and Conover Hardware Company as assistant to John Conover, Vice President of the company. In March, 1919, Mr. Wilcox moved his wife and son, Waldo Clifford, to De Leon, Texas, and, with the help of Richards and Conover Hardware, founded the first Wilcox Hardware. In 1921 a branch firm was opened in Rising Star, Texas, and later, in 1922, a third store was opened in Pioneer, Texas. Leaving the Rising Star firm with his son, Waldo, Mr. Wilcox and his wife, Grace, moved to Midland and opened for business on April 17, 1937, his death, Sunday, concluding over fifty years in the hardware business serving oil, farm, ranch, business, home, and general customers.

Surviving his are his wife, Grace, his son, W. C. Wilcox of 1201 West College, three grandchildren; J. C. Wilcox, 911 West Wall, Midland, Janeda Grace and James Waldo Wilcox of Baylor University, Waco. Survivors also include two great grandchildren. Interment was at Resthaven Memorial Cemetery Monday.

## Peanut Receipts Here Total 2,800 Tons To Monday

The cold wave of last week interrupted the flow of the 1958 peanut crop into the Rising Star market because it aggravated the moisture condition, but with the prospect of good weather the movement of the crop to storage here was getting under way again Monday. Already total receipts at the local market, according to the records at the grading station, were above 2,800 tons, totalling 5,600, 102 pounds through Saturday.

Exhaustion of storage space elsewhere was turning large numbers of peanuts from other sections to the market here where several hundred tons of storage capacity was still available Monday. Included in these distant receipts was a load of Valencia Red peanuts from the irrigated district at Plains, Texas, on the Texas-New Mexico line. The load, brought here by Sebring and Fancey of Hobbs, N. M., totalled 600 sacks and graded 63, according to J. R. Racnel and Fred McMullin, of Gorman, USDA graders here. The Valencia is a red jumbo type peanut used for candies and roasting, and it weighs only 25 pounds to the bushel. It carries slightly different price structure from the Spanish type. The load was bought for the account of the Southwestern Peanut Co. by Glen Shults and sold in the City Market building.

Every year between 400 and 500 children are the guests of the Chamber of Commerce for the big party. Each receives a bag of candy, nuts and fruit from old Santa.

In the past there has always been a Christmas tree and a program, but due to the lack of room these will be dispensed with. It is quite likely that the distribution of the gifts will be made in the open in front of the hall.

Every child in the Rising Star area is invited to come and receive a gift.

## Bank Deposits Here Near 2.7 Millions Monday

Deposits in the Rising Star First State Bank reached an all-time high of \$2,668,000 Tuesday, according to Vice-President Charles Tyler. Previous high recorded by the bank during a harvest season was \$2,250,000.

With much of the peanut crop yet to be sold, there was good prospect that deposits would top the \$2,700,000 mark. Even so, much of the money obtained from the good crop this season has been drawn away to Brownwood and Eastland to pay on crop loans from the FHA. If that were not the case, it is quite probable, local bankers said, that the deposits here would near or exceed the \$3,000,000 mark.

## Achievement Tests Are Given Local Students

The so-called "Iowa" standardized tests - known as achievement tests - which supply information as to attitudes, etc., helpful in determining the organization and conduct of instruction in the schools were given to students of the High School and Elementary School here last week. Students in the fourth, sixth and eighth grades of the Elementary School took the tests under the supervision of the local school authorities, while members of the High School were given the tests by O. L. Stamey, county supervisor, Supt. Sam Jones said.

# Changes Made in Social Security By '58 Amendments

(Editor's note: This is the 6th in a series of 10 articles.)

Ever since the enactment of the original social security law, marriage or remarriage has often been a reason for ending social security benefit payments to dependents or survivors of insured workers. In many cases, it is still a cause for the termination of benefits. The law, as recently amended, however, removes some of the restrictions.

For example, Mrs. Florence Jackson, 64, was widowed 2 years ago. She has continued to live in the home she and her husband bought soon after their marriage, and has been receiving \$81.40 a month as a social security widow's benefit. Naturally, she's been lonely and has welcomed the friendship of Frank Brown, a lifelong neighbor. Frank, 72, and a widower for many years, owns a small furnished room, on the income from the monthly social security checks paid to him because he was dependent upon his son, Bill, when Bill died a number of years ago.

Recently, it has occurred to Mrs. Jackson and Mr. Brown that it would be both pleasant and sensible for them to marry and spend their remaining years together. Until just a month or so ago, however, their marriage would have meant financial disaster because it would end social security payments for both of them. Under the provisions of the social security law, benefits paid to the dependents of a worker - to his child, to his widow (or widower), or to an aged dependent parent - stop when that dependent marries.

A change in the social security law will now make it possible for them to go ahead with their marriage plans. Under this change, a dependent's social security benefit payments will not stop if he or she marries another person who is also receiving social security payments as a dependent. A woman receiving widow's benefits can therefore marry a person who, like Mr. Brown, is getting dependents parent's benefits, or she can marry someone who is eligible for benefits as a dependent widower or as the disabled son or daughter of a retired or deceased worker.

Marriage to a person who is not receiving social security benefits will still end the benefit rights (present and future) of a dependent-beneficiary. But another change in the law will help dependent-beneficiaries who marry persons who are now or who may soon be getting old-age insurance or disability insurance benefits. Until now, such a marriage would have ended the dependent's benefits and he or she would have had to wait at least 3 years to get benefits as the dependent of the new spouse, or in the event of his death, she would not have been able to qualify for benefits as his widow unless the marriage had been in effect for at least 1 year.

The 1958 amendments to the law provide for these changes. Some check could there be an who is getting old-age benefits and a wife's on his social security account.

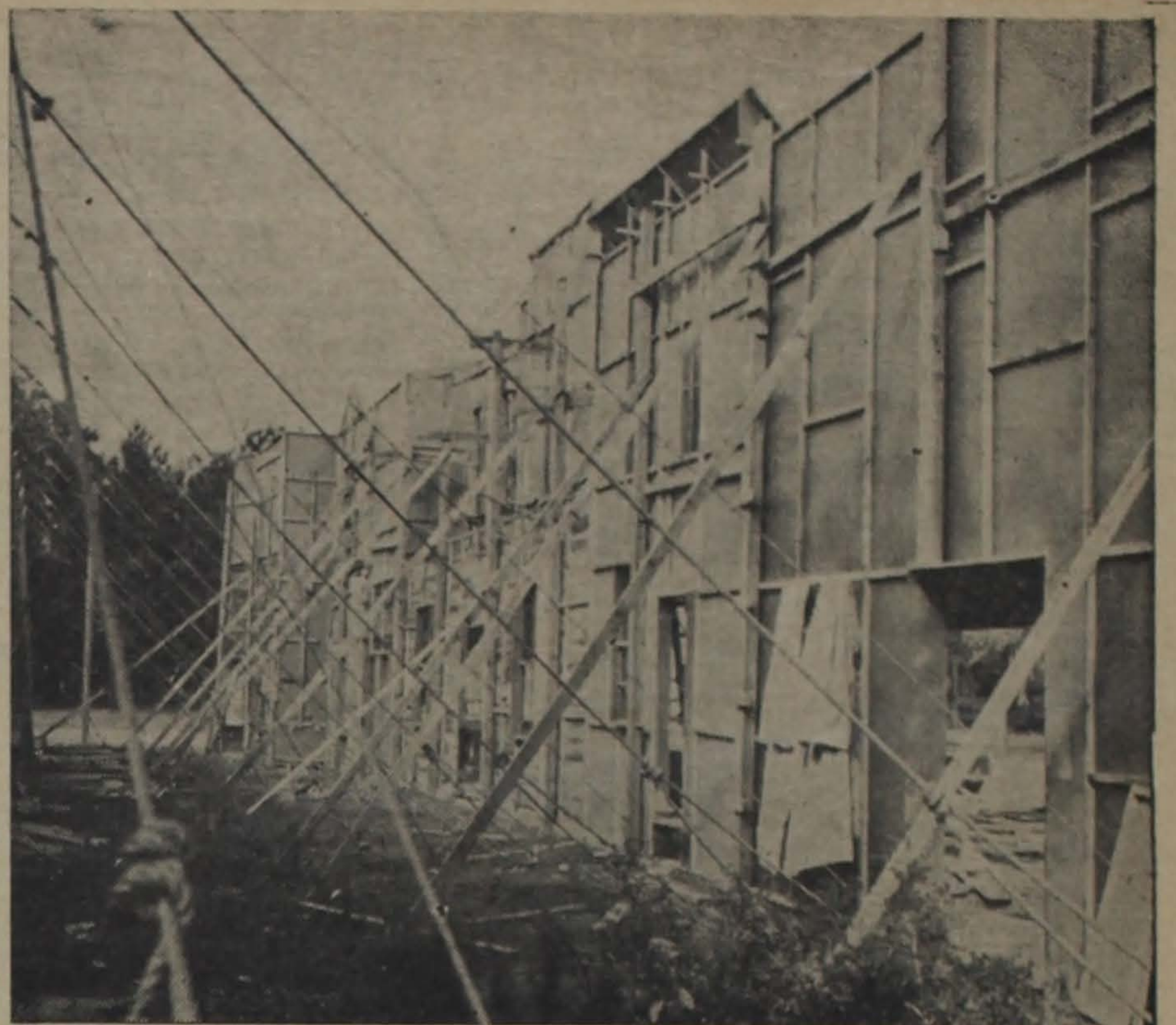

## Entire New Town, Livery Stable, Roads Built in Harris for \$4,000

Harris County got a new town last week and to home buyers who get dizzy at some of the prices builders flash before them its cost may be interesting.

The "town" has a livery stable, some 12 to 15 frame fronted establishments, a stage coach station and a church.

Its total cost, including the roads which lead into it, was about \$4,000.

The only thing behind the bank, merchandise stores, haberdashery, barbershop and other establishments is a network of support poles.

Rising Star is located on the

Atascocita Country Club grounds on Lake Houston. Some of the old iron ore roads in the area will be used in the movie.

The film company started shooting the first portion of the movie at Fort Clark in South-west Texas early this week. That is expected to take 10 to 12 days, according to Ross.

THE REMAINDER of the film - another 10 to 12 days - will be done at Rising Star.

Interior shots will be under a huge tent erected some 15 feet behind the one-walled city. Panels for different scenes can easily be put into place.

The tent cost more than the small Western town did itself.

Despite the low cost of the city - or high cost to a budget-conscious company official - it is no cheaper than other scenes which flash across screens each day, whether they be a Western town or a colonial mansion.

As a general rule the towns are easy to put together, easy

to take down and move, easy to alter.

Instead of Rising Star being torn down and moved, however, it will simply change its identity. Soon after the "Five Bold Women" movie is completed the town will be given a new face.

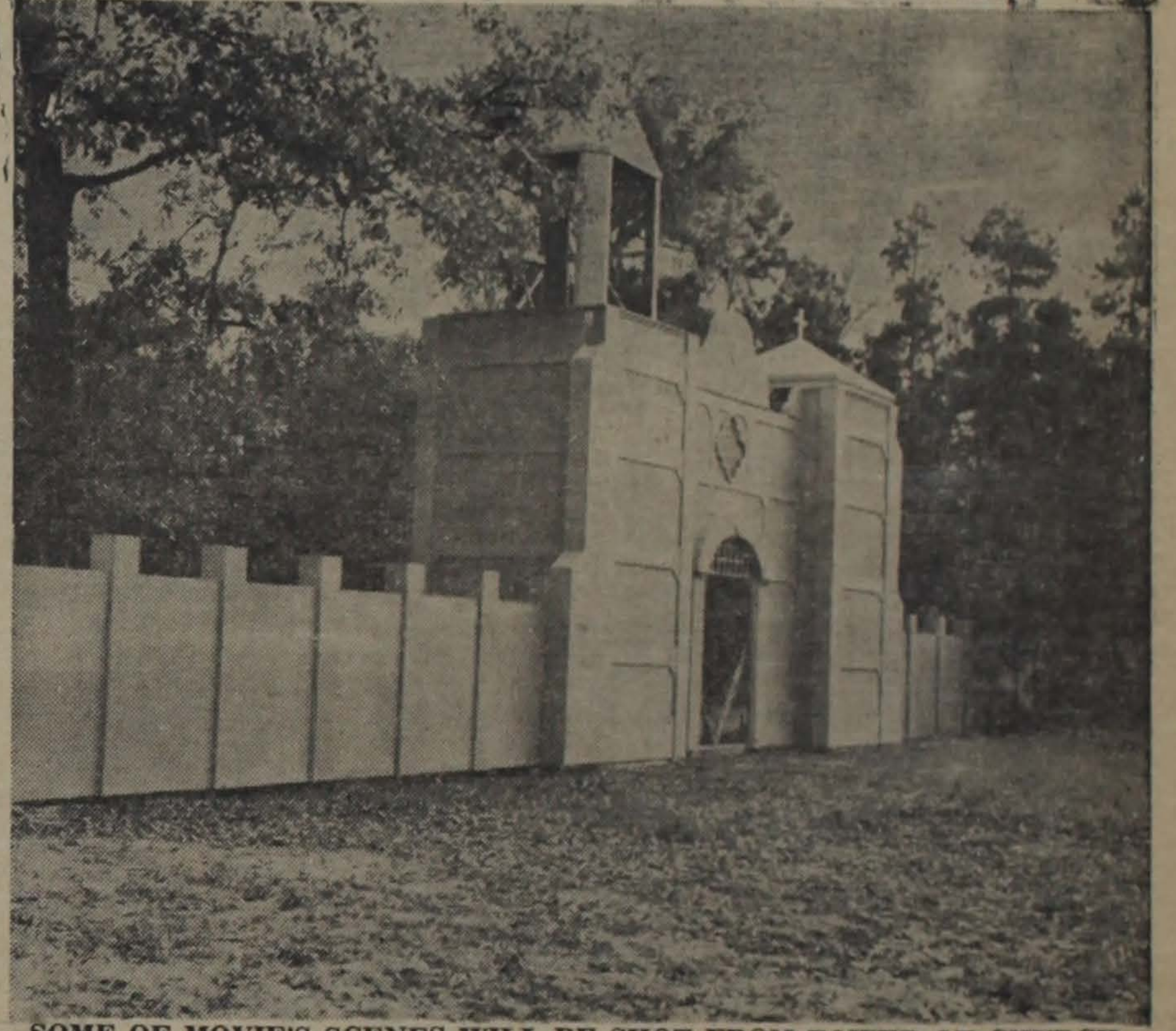
IT WILL SHIFT from Texas in 1881 to Oklahoma after World War II. It will be a typical, small Oklahoma town, according to Ross.





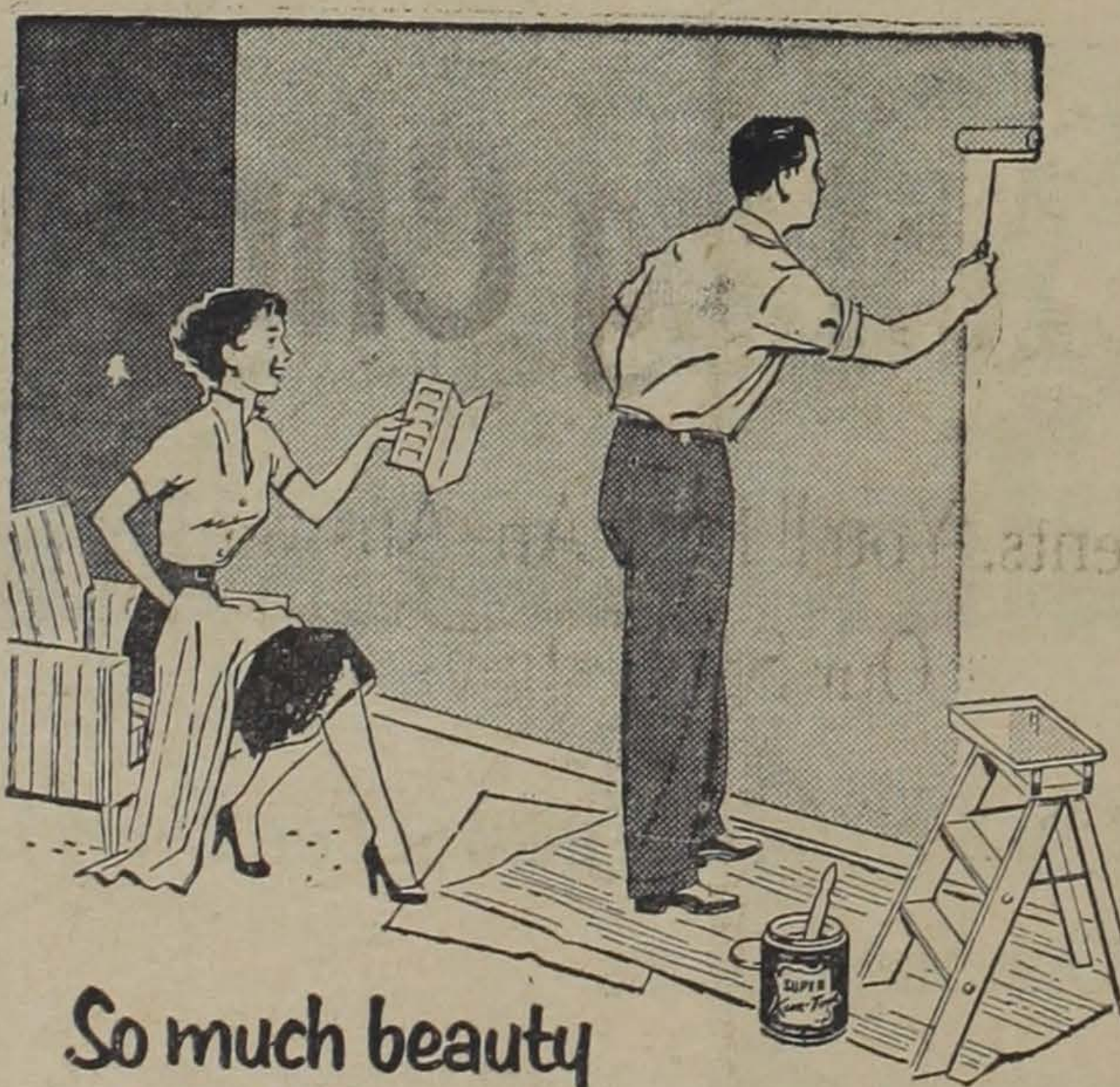
