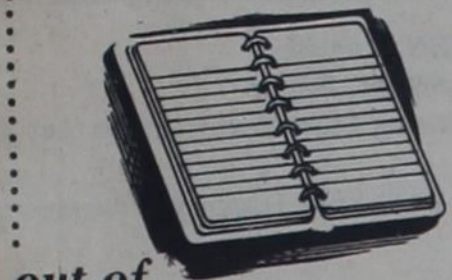

City Sewage System Receives Abuse

The city of Rising Star is having trouble with its sewage disposal system.

The trouble stems from the illicit discharge of oils, possibly motor crankcase oils, into the system. While the disposal plant is one of the most advanced, using a technic of treatment that is as efficient as possible, it cannot handle, that is "break down" this discarded oil, which if allowed to pass through the treatment system into the fluent will contaminate the waters of the stream into which it is discharged.

The Texas Quality Water Board doesn't like this a little bit. Neither does the Proctor Dam authorities, into which the effluent from the local plant ultimately finds its way. Neither do the cities which use water from Proctor, nor the farmers who irrigate or the sportsmen who use the facilities of the lake for their amusement and recreation.

As a matter of real concern to the city, and to those who are unthoughtfully, perhaps, dumping this waste oil into the city sewers, the state has

stringent laws against this practice. The State Water Quality Board has power to investigate such violations of the water anti-pollution code and to inflict penalties of considerable severity.

The city is itself responsible for the quality of the effluent from its plant - which must meet standards of purity that make it potable, and when a quantity of the "indigestible" waste is found in the plant, the plant must be entirely shut down and cleaned from top to bottom at considerable expense.

In an advertisement in this issue of The Rising Star, the city is appealing against this violation of the water purity code, asking these responsible to desist, and offering a reward for information leading to the apprehension of anyone guilty of this act of pollution.

Let's hope that it will not be necessary to pay the reward, that those who are letting their waste oil drain into the system will correct their error.

We are confident that it is an error of understanding and not of intent.



PTA 1897 1972 Parent Teacher Association U.S.

DESIGN OF A POSTAGE STAMP to salute the 75th Anniversary of the National PTA is a blackboard with the lettering chalked in a child's script. The blackboard is bordered in yellow and the chalk is in white. Print order of the 8-cent stamp is 135 million by gravure. The PTA was founded in Washington, D.C. in 1897 by Phoebe Apperson Hearst, wife of U.S. Senator George Hearst and mother of William Randolph Hearst, and Alice McLellan Birney, wife of a prominent Washington attorney. During its 75 years of working for the welfare of all children, the PTA:

- In 1899 petitioned Congress for a National Health Bureau (14 years before creation of the U.S. Public Health Service).
- In 1906 played a key role in the passage of the Pure Food Bill.
- In 1946 was named primarily responsible for the passage of the federal school lunch program.
- In 1951 conducted a national conference on narcotics and drug addiction.
- In 1965 shipped more than a million books to mountain schools in Appalachia.
- In 1970 initiated Project RISE (Reading Improvement Services Everywhere).
- In 1972, under federal funding, integrated alcohol education in its smoking and health project with plans for several pilot programs to be tested at the state level.

ICING

- 1 stick oleo
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 6 tablespoons milk
- 1 box powdered sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup nuts

TEXAS HOT COCOA CAKE

- 1 stick oleo
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup Crisco
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups flour
- 4 Tablespoons cocoa
- 1/2 cup buttermilk

- 2 eggs beaten
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Pinch of salt

Add oleo and Crisco to water and bring to boil. Sift sugar and flour in a large bowl. Pour liquid mixture over flour, sugar mixture and beat until smooth. Pour in large oblong pan at 400 degrees for 25 minutes.

Melt oleo and cocoa in saucepan with milk. DO NOT BOIL! Stir in sugar, vanilla, and nuts. While icing is hot pour over cake, still in pan as soon as it is removed from oven.

SALAD

- 1 can crushed pineapple
- 1 can black cherries
- 2 pkgs. raspberry jello
- 1 1/2 cup juice of pineapple and black cherry juice.

Heat juice. Add 2 bottles coca cola. Add pineapple and cherries. 1 cup pecan meat also diced celery and 2 pkgs of cream cheese. Stir often while congealing.

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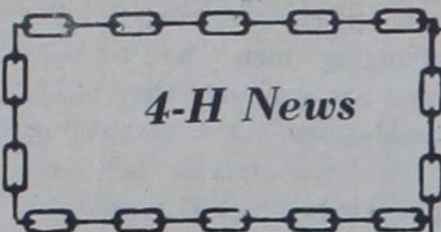

Applicants must be males between the ages of 20 and 35; a height of not less than 68 inches nor more than 76 inches; a weight of not less than two pounds nor more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height; visual acuity no less than 20 - 40 correctable to 20 - 20; have at least thirty college hours; in excellent physical condition; good moral character; and a citizen of the United States.

EMPLOYMENT
The Texas Department of Public Safety is an Equal Opportunity Employer. Interested young men are urged to contact any Texas Department of Public Safety office or patrolman for an application. After completing the application take it to the nearest regional, district or sub-district Texas Department of Public Safety office for verification and certification. If all is in order then the written test will be administered which will qualify or disqualify the applicant for further consideration. Successful applicants will be given an agility test, a character investigation and a physical examination. Those accepted for employment will be notified prior to the beginning date of the next training school.

TRAINING
Cadet patrolmen will be assigned to the Texas Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, Texas, for a 17 week training period. The cadet will receive some 800 hours of intensive classroom work and supervised study. The training is designed to equip the cadet to handle any of the various situations he may encounter as a patrolman. The training of a patrolman is a test of an individual's intellectual, emotional and physical stamina. It is also an educational process which prepares him for a rewarding career in law enforcement.

In addition to classroom work the cadet is taught self-protection by means of judo, boxing, wrestling, and other police-protection methods. The salary during training is \$600 per month. Room and board while at the academy will cost the cadet approximately \$55 per month.

BENEFITS
Upon being commissioned a patrolman, the salary is automatically raised to \$743 per month. Patrolmen receive additional longevity pay for each five years of service to a maximum of 25 years. Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and necessary equipment are furnished. They are also granted a monthly uniform cleaning allowance, and receive travel expenses when away from their assigned station. Group life and hospitalization insurance is provided for the employee. The patrolman become members of the Texas Employees Retirement System and the Social Security System. Vacation, holidays, and sick leave are also provided for the patrolmen.

Assignments will be made to one of the four uniform services - Texas Highway Patrol, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or the Driver License Service. After two years of experience each patrolman is eligible for promotion to Sergeant in the uniform services and also eligible for transfer into the Narcotic and Intelligence Sections. All interested young men who feel they meet these requirements are urged to contact the nearest Texas Department of Public Safety office or patrolman for an application and details.

Fever Tick, Fire Ant, Screwworm, Black Fly Inflicting Punishment . . . Sixteen, One, One, Twelve, Three . . . October 22 and 23 . . .

Texas agriculture continues to be punished by the screwworm, fire ant, citrus black fly, and cattle fever tick. Programs are underway to eradicate or control these pests. Screwworm eradication officials at Mission continue to urge livestock producers to check all livestock regularly, treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control, and submit suspected screwworm samples to the fly laboratory for verification. Plans are being made now for 1973 eradication program. Knowing the exact whereabouts of the screwworm and the intensity of its infestations will be a big help in mapping the sterile fly-drops for next year.

CATTLE fever center at Alice reports progress is being made in controlling the spread of that pest. Because of the reproductive ability of the fever tick, it could take two years before the pest is eradicated. Complete cooperation of cattle producers in the affected area-in South Texas-will be needed to eradicate the fever tick.

PLANS to combat the fire ant in Fort Bend County are now underway. State, federal, and county officials are working in a county-wide campaign against the fire ant.

Mirex ant bait is being used throughout the county on about 495,000 acres. All necessary precautions are being taken to assure safety. Federal and state officials will constantly check the progress of the program.

CITRUS black fly continues as a threat to the citrus industry in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. The pest has been centered in the Brownsville area in home orchards, but recently it was detected in Mission.

Infested trees are being sprayed in an effort to eradicate the pest.

SIXTEEN, One, One, Twelve. This is not a quarterback calling football signals. It is the rankings of Texas in various field crops for 1971 as compared with the rest of the nation. Texas, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service is:

First in rice production; first in grain sorghum production, second in hairy vetch seed production, third in peanut production, fourth in broomcorn production, twelfth in production of all hay, fourteenth in sugarbeet production, sixteenth in corn production, twenty-seventh in soybean production.

The top ten counties in grain sorghum production are Hale, Parmer, Swisher, Deaf Smith, Castro, Floyd, Lamb, Hidalgo, Nueces and Hansford. Top hay producing counties in the state are Grimes, Leon, Lamar, Hopkins, Red River, Wilbarger, Fannin, Cooke, Kaufman, Gaines.

Top peanut producing counties are Comanche, Frio, Eastland, Atascosa, Wilson, Erath, Mason, Fannin, Houston and Gaines.

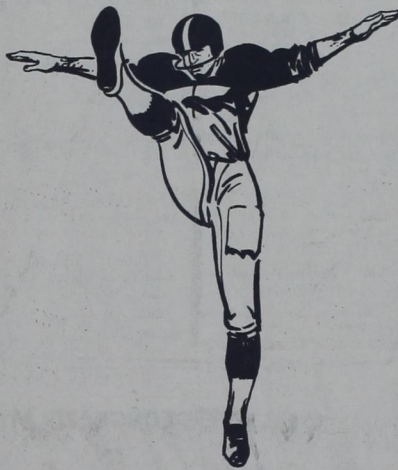

Every team member played as Coach Fortune let each boy have some of that much needed experience on the field.

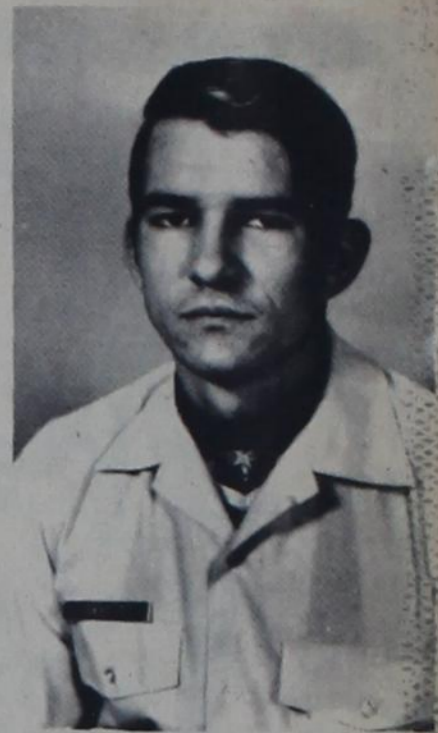
Gorman had big strong looking boys, good passes and powerful kicking but just couldn't seem to get it all
