



The figures make it clear that the more education a person has, the greater his or her earning capacity. Although there are likely to be exceptions, most high school dropouts cannot expect to earn what college graduates do.

Young people who are disenchanted with school and wait impatiently for the day when they can leave may think that the money they will earn will buy a fantastic lifestyle. That is because compared to zero earnings, anything sounds good. The fact is, meeting basic needs costs money. Financing an imagined lifestyle is even more costly.

If a person earns the median income for high school dropouts, he/she will earn \$7,914 per year, or \$659.50 a month before taxes. With apartment rentals and utilities to pay, car payments and insurance costs to cover, very little money will be

A Face In Spring

but as the old saying goes, he's not forgotten. Each spring when the flowers begin blooming and the vegetable plot puts forth its first green shoots, I think of him. Grandpa could grow anything that came from a seed, bulb or cutting. He always had a garden, even when the family lived in the arid reaches of West Texas. Though he spent most of his life working for other people, in his heart Grandpa always dreamed of being a farmer.

As a child, my most vivid impressions of Grandpa were his height and the funny way he walked. The walk was a result of an accident which happened long before I was born. One day as he was unloading a wagon a barrel somehow came loose, rolling over his legs and breaking both knees. My grandmother once told me he suffered excruciating pain whenever the weather turned cold or

Grandpa's gone now, wet and the rest of his life Grandpa was stiff legged, ergo the funny way of walking I recalled as a

Since I lived in South

Texas I didn't get to visit with my grandpa much while I was growing up, but I remember going to see him once when I was a teenager. Those were the days when my generation wore bell bottom pants, hurachi sandals and hair down to our backside. Seemed like everybody in the family had a real negative opinion of hippies they were eager to share with me. So I expected to hear some of the same when I saw grandpa. Instead, he wrapped me in those long arms of his and told me how proud he was to see me. He couldn't have been thrilled with my appearance but he made me feel as though exterior things were secondary to the person inside. It's a lesson I've never forgotten.

After I was grown we

visited a little more frequently albeit not as often as I wish now looking back. When we were together I liked to listen to grandpa recount his life from the days when he grew up in the piney woods of Northeast Texas. He was one of 12 children, the son of a county judge. I listened to him tell of walking seven miles each night after working all day when he was courting my grandmother. Another time he told me how parents in those days built something called a "whirligig" for their children. They'd take a 2"x6" plank about 10 or 12 feet long and drill a hole in the center of it. Then they'd attach a wooden handhold close to each end of the plank. Next they'd locate a stump about 2 to 3 feet high and drill a hole in the center of its top. Using a wooden peg they'd attach the plank to the stump. Their kids could then spend hours pushing themselves around the stump, astraddle that plank.

I loved to listen to grandpa's vernacular. A favorite expression when things went wrong was "dagnab it." If a person was stingy they were "chinchy." Folks hard to get along with were "ornery." He always referred

to my grandmother as "old woman." I can't remember a day with grandpa when he didn't read his Bible, yet more importantly, he lived what he read in those well worn

I remember a story grandpa once told me about some fellow back home everybody thought was backwards because he didn't seem too quick on the uptake. As the story went, one day this guy up and married a widow with 14 kids. So the next time he showed up at the old country store of of the local men began teasing him about his recent marriage. Grandpa said the fellow listened to 'em for a few minutes then grinned sort of slow like and asked, "Ya'll ever seen how much cotton 14 kids can pick in one day?"

One lesson grandpa seemed intent on imparting to me was the importance of a man's word. He told me once abut the time when he moved out to Colorado City, Tx. "I went to the local storekeeper, introduced myself and told the man I wanted to open an account at his store. In those days your word was your honor and a handshake was all two men needed to make a binding agreement." He destained written con-



By comparison, the Commission issued 63 permits for horizontal wells in March, 56 in Feb., 59 in Jan., and 60 in Dec., 1991.

Time To Spray Pecan Trees

Eastland County Pecan Growers who want to maximize their opportunity at making a good nut crop should consider controlling the pecan nut casebearer. May 25-27 has been determined first significant nut entry date by this burdensome pest.

The pecan nut casebearer is the major pest of Texas pecans. In early spring, larvae of the overwintered generation feed first in buds, then developing shoots, causing them to wilt and die. Larvae of succeeding generations feed on nuts during late spring and summer. Severe infestations may destroy the entire pecan crop.

This insect overwinters as a partially grown larva in a tiny silken cocoon called a hibernaculum that usually is attached to the base of a bud. In spring, as pecan trees start their growth, larvae feed for a short time on buds, but soon begin tunneling in developing shoots and continue until reaching maturity. Pupation may occur in these burrows, or some larvae may crawl down the limb to pupate in the rough bark of larger limbs. In Texas, moths from the overwintering generation emerge in late April and early May.

Young larvae are white to pink in color, then later become olive gray to green and attain a length of about 1/2 inch. The adult is a light gray moth about 1/3-inch long. Its wings are gray and forewings have a ridge of dark scales across them about a third the distance from the base. The moths fly at night and spend the day in concealment.

Two or three days after adult females emerge, they deposit 50 to 150 eggs on tips of nuts. Eggs, just visible to the naked eye, are greenish white when deposited but later become reddish. After hatching, the egg shell is opaque white and remains in place. First-generation larvae hatch from eggs in 4 to 5 days and crawl to buds below the nut cluster to feed for a day or two before crawling back up to the small pecans. They will continue to feed on the pecans until full grown. This migration makes them very vulnerable to insecticides entering their bodies if the nut cluster is covered prop-

A single larva can destroy all nuts in a single cluster. Bits of frass and webbing can be seen projecting from injured nuts. Upon reaching maturity, larvae pupate in nuts and emerge as adults. They require 42 to 45 days to go through a life cycle, so second-generation pecan nut casebearer will appear in late June or early July.

Adults deposit eggs in grooves on the tip or base of the nut. Second-generation larvae also feed inside the pecan nut. A second-generation larva causes less damage because it requires only one or two nuts to complete its growth. Pupation takes place inside hollowed-out nuts and moths emerge from late July to early September.

The third generation usually follows, but as nut shells harden only a few of the nuts are penetrated by larvae. Instead, larvae feed in shucks. Many third-generation larvae construct a hibernacula, while the remainder pupate and appear as adults, emerging from late August to October. Adults deposit eggs that hatch into fourth-generation larvae. If nuts are available, their shucks constitute the principle food for this generation. In the absence of nuts, larvae feed on buds and leaf stems. Partially grown larvae construct overwintering hibernacula by mid-November.

Control: Need for casebearer control can be determined by examining trees when shoots start to grow in the spring. If many shoots are wilted, close observation for egg laying is encourage.

Trees should be sprayed when eggs of the first generation appear on tips of young nuts in late May. Egg deposition commonly follows completion of pollination, when nut tips turn brown. Several chemical control measures are available for homeowner's - they include Diazinon, Dursban (Ford's label) Sevin and Malathion. Commercial growers labels include Asana, Lorsban and Zolone. Biological control labels include Javelin and Dipel.

Recent research shows that one well-timed in secticide application will control first generation pecan nut casebearer. A day-degree model has been developed for predicting the best time to spray for pecan nut casebearer each year in Texas.

If pecan trees surrounding the treated area are not sprayed, moths can enter the sprayed area and a serious infestation of second-generation larvae may develop. Under these circumstances, an application may be required in June or early July when second-generation eggs are deposited. Close observation for eggs will help determine this.

convinced that this would save them thousands of dollars in interest payments. They live in Texas, were over 59 and 1/2 years old, owed \$69,000 on the house and were paying a 10.25% interest rate with eight more years on their loan. What would you suggest?

After running the numbers here is what I came up with. If this couple payed off their house and saved their monthly payment of \$1,002.75 at the 4% interest rate available today they would have their home and \$79,830 in cash after taxes in eight

If they were however to leave the \$88,320 in their retirement count(\$69,000 for mortgage and \$19,320 to pay

the income taxes on that amount) and use its return to make their house payment for them, they would after eight years have their home paid for, and \$188,817 in cash. This would come from the earn-

ing power of their retirement money left in their qualified account and if they continued to save the monthly payment.

Option 3 would be if they refinanced their home, paid the new payments with the earnings of their retirement account and continued to save the monthly payment. In eight years they would have over \$249,621 in after tax cash, an 314% increase in retained capital. Add to this the facts that in Texas one cannot borrow against the equity in their home, (money in

your residence is locked up until you sell), and that the IRS still allows a deduction for interest payments on your home, and it would not be advantages at all for these folks to pay off their home.


