Protecting the environment is not a new slogan for farmers and ranchers. Most agricultural producers have been very conscious of pollution and contamination of the environment for many years. I'll admit that a few have been careless and negligent; but most producers are very careful about the use of chemicals on the farm.

In my experiences, the worse offenders of pesticide misuse and carelessness, are home gardeners.

Misapplication of pesticides carries serious consequences. Fine mists of herbicides can drift to nearby vegetables and landscape plants and kill them. Applying the wrong pesticide or the right pesticide in the wrong amount or at the wrong time can have serious consequences.

You can prevent harm from pesticides if you follow safety precautions and use common sense. Before buying a pesticide, identify the pest to be controlled. Find out which pesticide will control the pest. If there is a choice of several, choose the least toxic product.

At the time of purchase read the label of the pesticide you intend to buy and find out if the host plant and pest are listed on the pesticide label. Read safety conditions and restrictions on use. Find out what equipment is needed to apply the product and protective clothing needed to apply

the product. Then before applying the pesticide read the label again to find out what it can be mixed with, how much to use, mixing instructions and application instructions. Never use more than the recommended amount. Many think that if one tablespoon of pesticide is recommended, two will do a better job. Too much could be harmful to the plant and it may not be as effective

Rabies can be controlled if you understand the problem and know what to watch out for.

You should watch out for these situations:

* Bold, "friendly or apparently tame" wild animals.

* Night animals such as skunks or foxes that are seen during the day.

* Pets that have difficulty walking, eating or drinking. * Signs of excitement or viciousness in normally quiet animals.

A veterinarian should be consulted immediately, if any



of these signs are noted. If a person is bitten by an

animal, treat the bite as if the animal were rabid and follow these steps: * Identify the animal - by

kind, size, color, and location. Caution children to seek the help of a policeman or other adult.

* Have the animal caught, and immediately report the incident to animal control officials or police. Keep the animal in sight until it is apprehended. Trying to catch the animal without professional help means added risk. * Cleanse the wound immediately and thoroughly by washing with soap and water. Rinse well and disinfect with alcohol, iodine, or other dis-

infectants. This lessens the

chance of contacting the rabies virus.

* See a doctor immediately after washing the wound. The physician will decide on the need for treatment to prevent rabies.

* If possible, have the biting dog or cat tested for rabies or placed under observation. If it is alive and normal after 10 days of observation, the animal was not infected at the time of the bite. A veteri-

narian should be consulted concerning all aspects of this confinement period. The 10 day observation period is not valid for animals other than dogs and cats. Wild animals such as skunks, bats, foxes, and raccoons should be immediately submitted by a veterinarian for laboratory rabies examination.

Major steps toward community control of rabies can be achieved by: 1) Immuniz-

ing all dogs and cats over three months of age annually. 2) Registering and licensing all owned dogs and cats. 3) Impounding all stray dogs and cats. 4) If there is no animal control officer, appoint one and provide pound or shelter facilities. 5) Testing all biting dogs and cats or quarantining

them for observation for a period of 10 days.

Pioneer Patchwork By Irma Miller

Pioneer area residents have indicated what the commerce and industry was near the turn of the century. A 90-year-old lady said, " We grew maize and what they called 'higear.' We even grew broom corn and all of our brooms were handmade brooms. We children worked with everything, we peeled apples and then we put them on a cloth on the top of the porch roof to dry in the heat. We dried peaches, apples and pears." One 87year-old lady said her father raised mostly cotton, corn and feed stuff. Cotton was the money crop, whereas today it is peanuts.

It is indicated that farming and ranching were the main industries. Of course there were building and transportation - horse and wagon, buggy, stage and train after the track was laid about 1909. Teachers and students rode horseback to school.

By 1910 there was a general mercantile store (groceries, ready-made clothing, cloth, hardware and other items), a barber shop, a drugstore with a fountain, a chili joint and an ice cream parlor; a wooden sidewalk and porch ran along in front of the buildings. There was a cotton gin and the railroad ran just north of the gin.


Lafayette King built a house about 1905 with lumber hauled from Cisco. He came here from Grayson County in 1876, bought land in Brown County for \$2 an acre, and in 1906 moved to a farm two miles south of the town of Pioneer. He was the father of Ethel Maybelle King, born in 1897, who grew up on the farm and went to school in Pioneer. She went to college in 1915 and be-

came a school teacher, teaching first at Macedonia in 1919 for \$40 a month. She paid \$12.50 a month for room and board. She taught at Liberty, Cross Cut and then Pioneer. She married Richard Coleman Brown in 1921.

Ethel Brown remembered there used to be a cemetery work day scheduled and some folks in the community would work hocing weeds and cleaning up the grounds. Before the fence was built in 1948, cows would graze and walk across the cemetery, and there were many briers, vines, weeds and shrubs so that the graves were hard to find.




