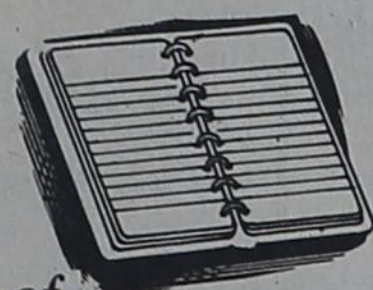

One Drowns-One Injured At Lakewood

An inquest verdict of accidental drowning was returned Monday in the death of Troy Lindon Beggs, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J.T. Beggs of Route 2, Rising Star, at Lakewood Recreation Center Swimming pool Sunday afternoon.

It was the first fatality to occur at the Center Pool, located between Rising Star and Cross Plains, since it was opened several years ago.

Funeral services for the boy were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church of Cross Plains with the Rev. E.V. Brooks, pastor of the church, officiating. Higginbotham Funeral Home of Cross Plains was in charge with interment in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Justice of the Peace B.A. Butler of Rising Star, who returned the verdict, said evidence taken during the investigation, tended to support a belief that the fatality occurred as the result of an underwater and head-on collision between young Beggs and Patricia Rector, 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.R. Rector, Jr., also of the Pioneer Community. Miss Rector, taken to Eastland hospital by her father, was found in X-ray examination Monday morning to have suffered fracture of the top vertebra of the neck, the father said.

The Beggs boy and a 13-year-old friend, Kenneth

First State Bank Receives All-Electric Building Award

The First State Bank of Rising Star was presented with the All-Electric Building Award last Wednesday, July 27.

Our beautiful new bank building meets all the requirements specified by the Edison Electric Institute to qualify for this award. The presentation is administered by the West Texas Utilities Company.

There are seven requirements which must be met in order to receive this award. They are:

1. No other source of energy shall be used for air conditioning, space heating, cooking or any other services than can be done electrically.
2. Lighting levels should be equal to or exceed IES Standards.
3. Space conditioning design and installation should conform to the good engineering practice set forth in the ASHRAE Guide & Data Book and provide for satisfactory operation and comfort conditioning as indicated by local climate and the anticipated utilization of the building.

4. Water heating system design and installation should provide for adequate quantity and temperature of hot water as indicated by anticipated utilization of the building.
5. Cooking equipment selected, arranged and installed to provide for an efficient and convenient food service operation in accordance with the anticipated utilization of the building space.
6. Authorization to use or to modify plaque shall be the responsibility of EEI or its agency.
7. The administration of the plaque is the sole responsibility of issuing electric utility company.

G.C. Osborne, Jr., manager of WTU's Commercial Department, said "This is one of the most beautifully designed buildings in our service area, outstanding in architecture and working environment. We know your city is proud of it."

Meanwhile when young Troy did not reappear in the pool, his 15-year-old brother, Rex, and some other boys went looking for him. As Mr. Rutherford came from the lounge where he had helped take the Rector girl, Rex had come to the surface of the pool bearing his unconscious brother.

The Rising Star Fire Department Rescue Unit was summoned and Fire Chief Charlie Benson and Mr. Rutherford made heroic efforts to revive the young boy by artificial respiration, mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and other first aid means until the arrival of Dr. Billy Carpenter who took charge. Willie Vandiver and John Bishop were other members of the department who helped in the effort to revive the boy while the agonized parents looked on and the Rev. E.V. Brooks, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Cross Plains, prayed.

The boy was pronounced dead some time after 6 p.m. and the body taken to the Cross Plains Higginbotham Funeral Home for burial arrangements.

The accident cast a pall over the pool area and the adjoining golf course where a large number of Cross Plains and Rising Star residents were enjoying the recreational facilities. The pool was quickly deserted and play on the golf course was much less spirited.

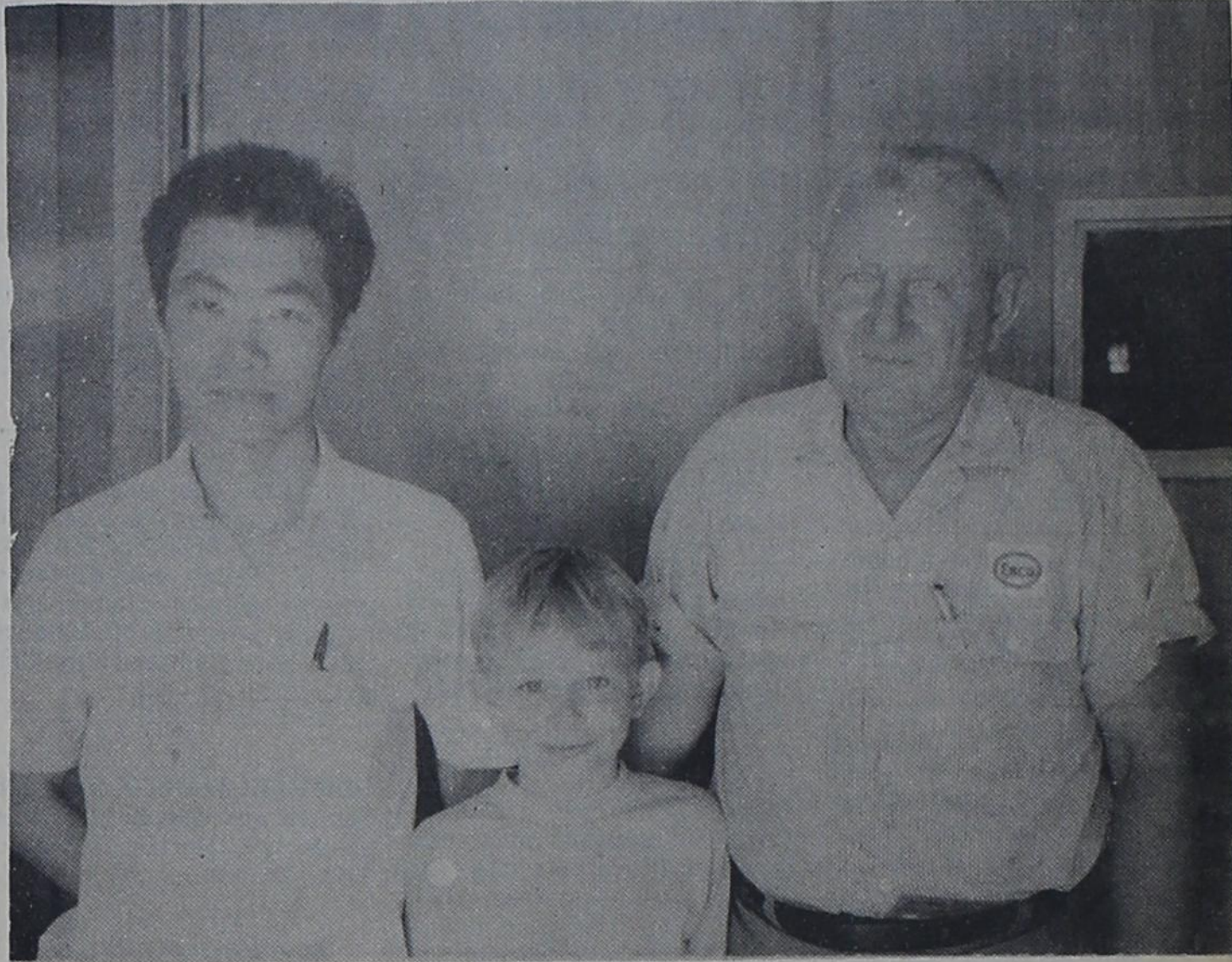
Junior Rodeo Aug. 10-12

A Rising Star Junior Rodeo sponsored by the Future Farmers of America Chapter of Rising Star High School, will be held August 10, 11, and 12, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. Performances are scheduled at 8 p.m. each evening. Events scheduled for boys are bareback bronc riding, tie-down roping, and bull riding. Girls' events include goat tying, barrel racing, and flag racing. Also, ribbon roping will be included for boy and girl teams.

Buckles will be given for first, second, and third places and for all-around cowboy and all-around cowgirl in the high school division, with similar awards for junior high.

NOTICE

BE IT RESOLVED that the Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees at the regular meeting July 13, 1972, set the 1972 tax rate at \$2.08 and an over-all valuation increase of 20 percent. This is a rate change from \$2.26 to \$2.08. The Rising Star ISD has not had a value increase since June 3, 1965, which was a 20 percent increase on overall Real Estate.

In 1971 there was a rate increase of 76¢ from \$1.50 to \$2.26. This was to cover Bond payments only. This did not increase the Local operating funds. The Bonds were absolutely necessary in order to maintain a plant that would meet state requirements, such as gym, school buildings, etc.

At this time it is necessary to increase the operation funds monies, because of the increase in cost of all supplies; teaching and maintenance, and the Teacher Salary increase passed by the State Legislature in 1968. This leg. was passed in order that we might be able to keep qualified, dedicated teachers in our school systems as we were rated number 46 across the United States in Teacher salaries. The Leg. States that the increase will range from 5 percent to 15 percent depending on the degree and years experience of the teacher and that this increase will continue until 1975. This means a \$6,000.00 to \$9,000.00 increase in teacher salaries for the Rising Star ISD depending on personnel changes. (There has not been an increase in taxes since 1968.)

In 1970 the Equalization Board put land values at \$20.00 per acre which in some cases meant an increase and in some a decrease in values. This was done by the Equalization Board in order to equalize land value. This was not an increase to help sustain cost increases of operating our school system.

The total 1972 - 73 Rising Star ISD Budget is \$254,877.00. Total Salaries are \$177,929, bond payments are \$26,703.00, leaving a total of \$50,245 to operate, maintain, and supply the Rising Star Schools with a plant and a system to educate the students in the Rising Star ISD.

The Rising Star ISD receives from the State a total of \$146,214.00, and from Activity, Lunch Room, and Band Boosters a total of \$17,075. The District Collects from Taxes \$58,000.00 for operation and \$27,000.00 to cover bond payments. This leaves a deficit of approximately \$19,000 in the 1972 - 73 budget, a budget which has been cut and minimized in every way possible in an effort to cut operating expenses to the bone. Therefore, a 20 percent value increase is necessary; however, the taxation rate will be decreased 18¢.

This increase in value and decrease in rate will mean to the farmer a 4 3/4 cents per acre increase in taxes and to the home owner or business man a 24¢ increase in taxes for every \$100.00 1971 valuation.

Jack Hetzel, candidate for State Representative of the 54th District, running on the Republican ticket, and his wife, Lilian, visited in Rising Star and its surrounding area Monday.

The Hetzels are residents of Jacksboro, and his mother, Mrs. R.L. Gilbreath resides in Brownwood.

Mr. Hetzel met his wife while serving in the military in England during World War II. Mrs. Hetzel was the first war bride to live in Brownwood. Mrs. Hetzel related that since red shoes could not be purchased in England, due to lack of availability, the first thing that she wished for upon coming to Brownwood was a pair of red shoes. The headline "English War Bride Buys Red Shoes" appeared on the pages of the Brownwood Bulletin when she made her purchase.

Mr. Hetzel was born in West Monroe, Louisiana on November 18, 1921. Jack's values for honesty and integrity were formed early in his life. His Father was a Pastor and Home Missionary with the

Assemblies of God Church. He also learned the meaning of responsibility in his youth, being one of 16 children.

After he completed his high school education Jack attended college at Springfield, Missouri; Waxahachie, Texas and Texas A&M. He later graduated from the School of Missions, CBC in Springfield.

Jack spent more than 20 years on active military duty and nine years in the reserves. He saw service during World War II in England, France, Belgium and Germany. Later, he served in Italy and Korea. Prior to his retirement from the service, he was ROTC instructor for four years at Texas A&M.

In addition to his military and ministerial training, Jack has had special instruction in public speaking, business administration, domestic counselling and personnel management.

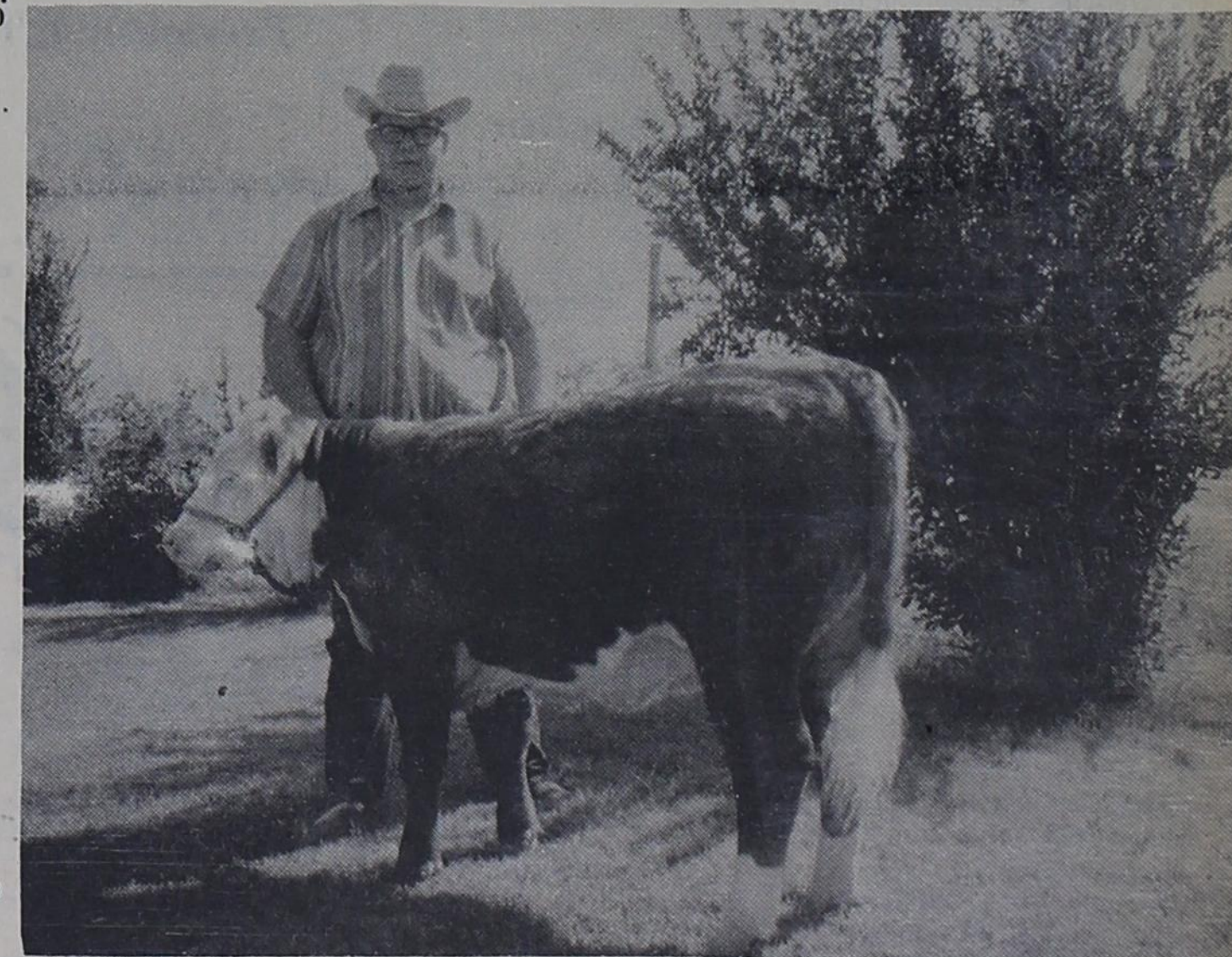
Today Jack and his family are permanent residents of Jacksboro where he is pastor of the Bethel Assembly of God. He serves on the General Council

of the Assemblies of God and is a member of the Lions Club, VFW, Farm Bureau and Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Hetzel has been Jack's wife for over 28 years. She is a licensed Vocational Nurse. They have two children, Rodney David Hetzel, and Mrs. Jacqueline Marie Hubbell.

In an interview with the editor of The Rising Star, Hetzel said "I am enthusiastic about the election in November. Most people have never had to privilege of voting for a Republican in the office of state representative. We have had 100 years of Democrats in this office." 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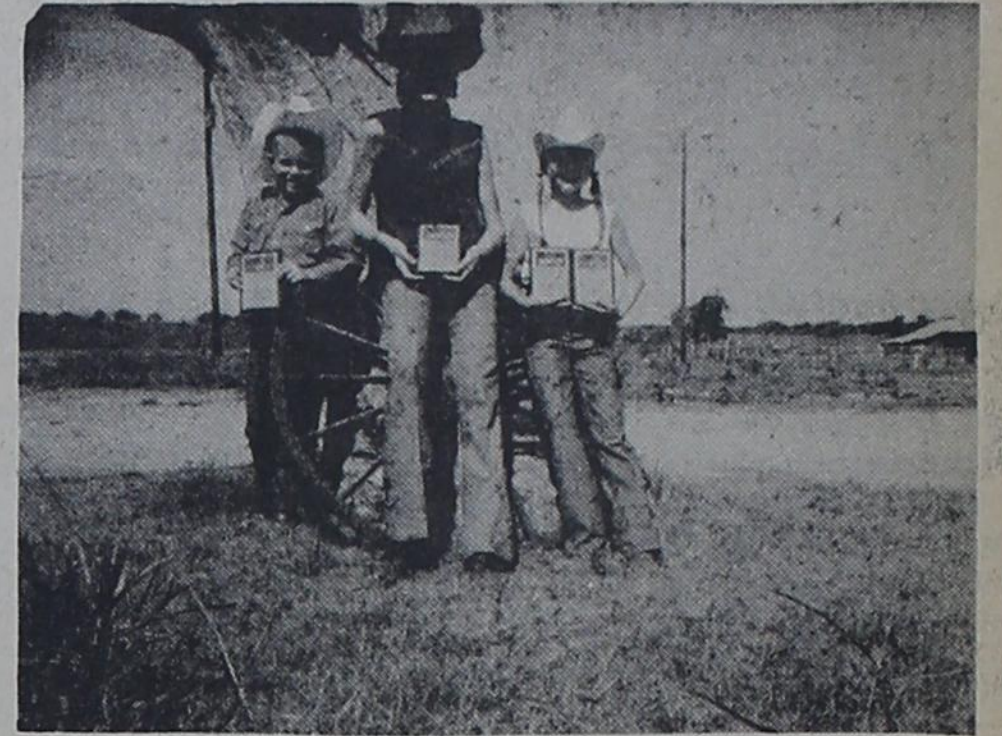

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time more than one office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man of the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein."

State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a nonselective State officer may hold other nonselective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 11 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 95)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 17 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be succeeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. During the time the Lieutenant Governor administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the

time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office."

Sec. 2. That Article III of the Texas Constitution, be amended to add a new Section 24a to read as follows:

"Section 24a. The Lieutenant Governor, while he acts as President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the public treasury an annual salary of \$22,500."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 7, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a salary of \$22,500 for the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows:

"Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provisions specifically setting rates in conflict with this provision are hereby repealed." This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

Program Themes Announced For Scout Troops

Familiar Scouting activities will be planned by Troops in this area for the 1972 - 73 program year, but new program themes will reflect the improved Scouting program to be launched in September.

The traditional hiking, camping, pioneering, other outdoor activities, patrol cooking, and first aid are included, according to Vernon Honea, Council Commissioner of Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America. However, a new program feature is team sports, and another suggestion is communications which has nothing to do with the old skills of signaling by Morse code and semaphore.

Questions and Answers

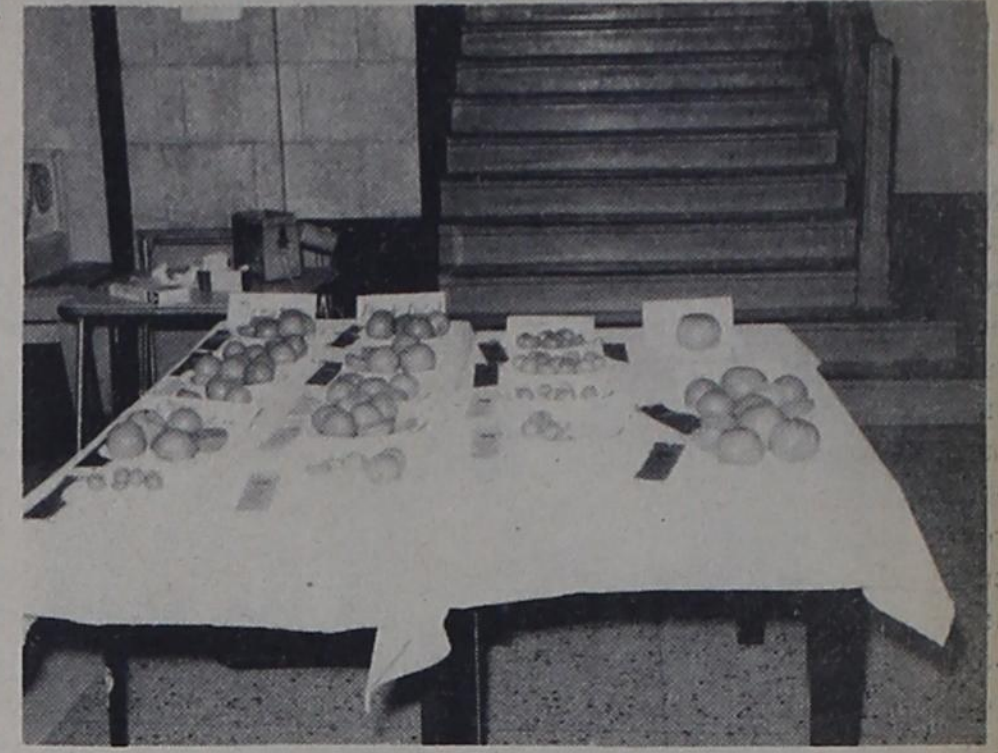

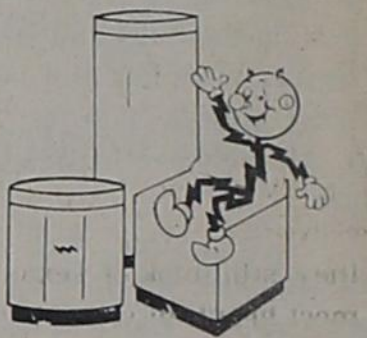

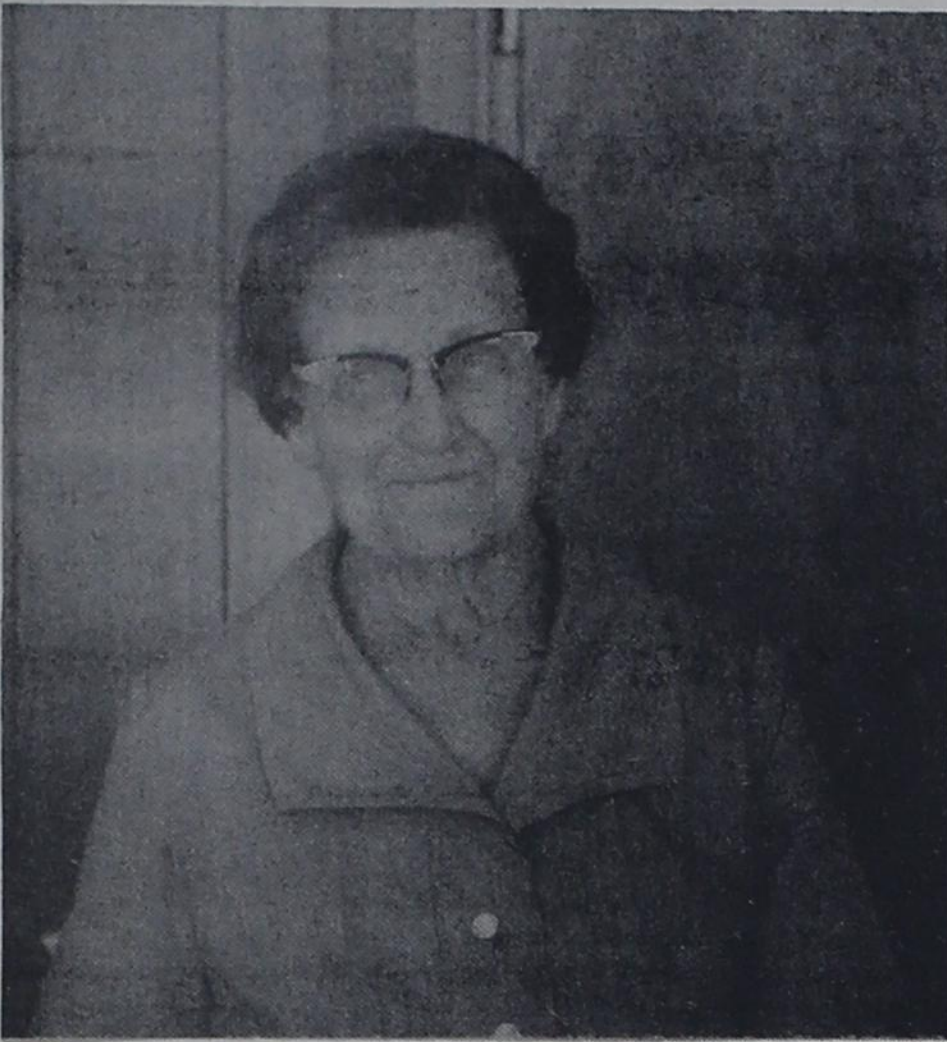

CARMEL PUDDING

One and three - fourths cups white sugar, melt 1 cup in skillet. Mix this with 4 cups sweet milk, 4 egg yolks, and 4 heaping tbsp. flour for thickening in double boiler. Put the other 3/4 cups of sugar in this and cook until thick. Add 1 tsp. vanilla. When this is thick put in a shallow pan and set in oven and cover with the beaten whites and brown.

BOHEMIAN POUND CAKE

Two cups sugar (white)
1/2 cup sugar (brown)
1 cup, Crisco
Blend until fluffy, beat in four eggs, adding one at a time. Keep mixer at medium speed. Add 2 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. vanilla, and 1 large can of milk.

With mixer still running, add 1 cup broken pecans, 1 cup or can angel flake cocoanut. Bake in bundt or tube pan for one hour and 10 or 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

This cake is good to freeze if wanted. I sprinkle the pecans with a little water and then a little flour before putting in so they will not sink to the bottom.

The people of Texas and the United States use upwards of one million tons of paper a year. This is roughly 575 pounds per person. By comparison, the average annual consumption of paper in Canada and Sweden is just over 375 pounds. Russia uses only 50 pounds per person. And in China, where it all began with the first century discovery of the elementary papermaking process, the average consumption is estimated at no more than 10 pounds per person per year.

Employment And Payrolls For Each Of Texas' 254 Counties Reported

Employment in the private sector of the Texas economy totaled 2,992,413 in March 1971, an increase of 7,877 from March 1970, and payrolls amounted to \$4.7 billion, up \$210.8 million, according to a report issued today by the Bureau of the Census, Social and Economic Statistics Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce.

Harris County had the largest employment, 645,996, an increase of 15,769, and payroll, \$1.2 billion, up \$79.7 million from a year earlier.

The report, *County Business Patterns, 1971, Texas*, is the latest in a series of annual reports providing first quarter economic statistics for States and counties. It presents data by detailed industry classification on mid - March employment, first quarter taxable payroll, and the number and employment size of reporting units for those private, non - farm business firms reporting to the Social Security Administration under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (F.I.C.A.). A special mail survey is conducted to obtain industry and county detail not reported to the Social Security Administration.

About three - fourths of all employees in the United States are covered in the reports for the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Guam, and the U.S. Summary.

Not included are employees of Federal, State, and local governments, self - employed persons, farm workers and those employed in domestic and certain transportation services.

The detailed reports are useful to business and governments in administration and planning, analyzing market potential, setting sales quotas and budgets, and measuring the effectiveness of sales and advertising programs.

Copies of the Texas report are available for \$2.00 from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402, or from Department of Commerce field offices in major cities.

Information by county and by industry also will be available at cost on punchcards and computer tapes from the Economic Statistics and Surveys Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

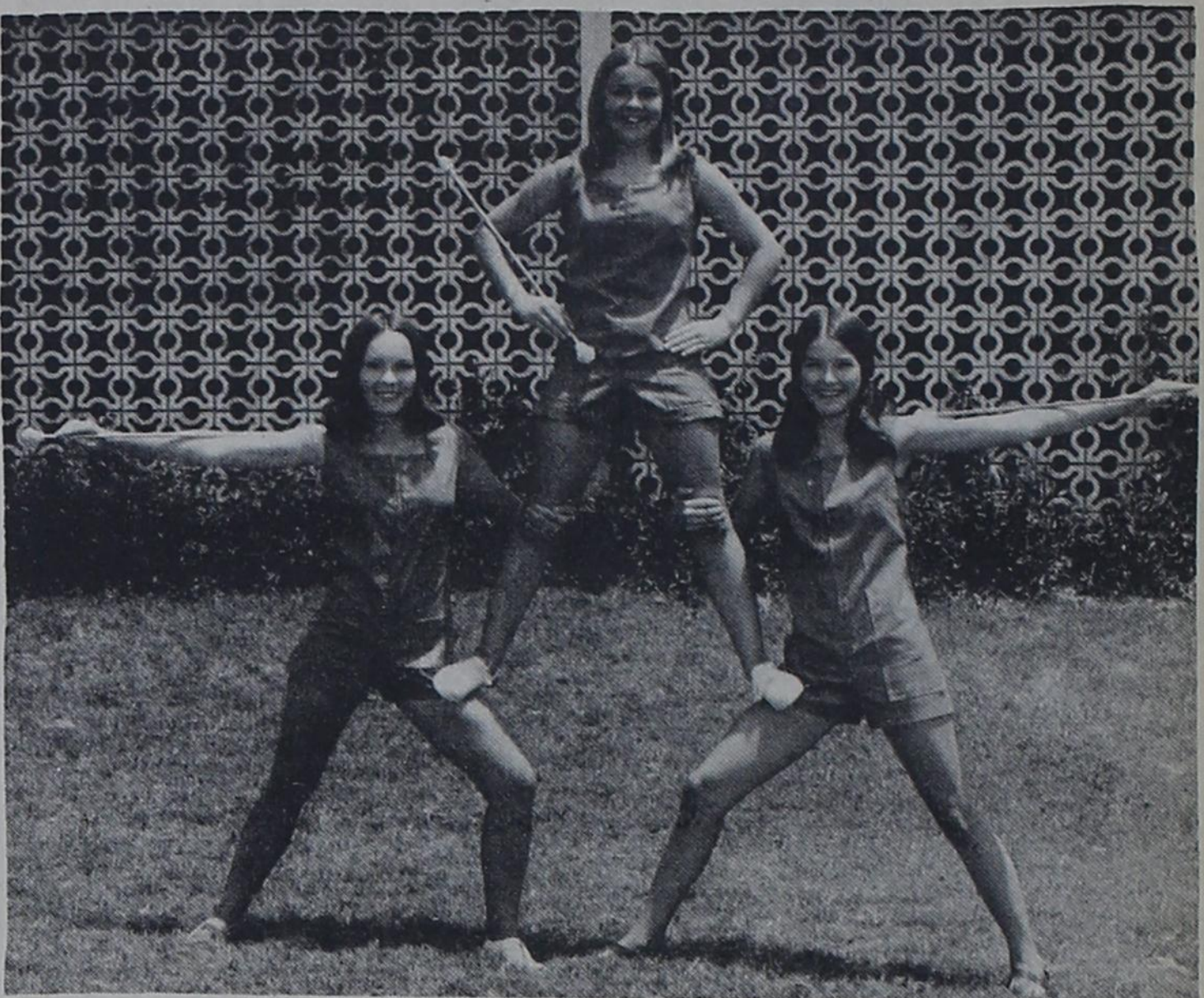

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

If six to eight people eat outdoors with disposable plates, cups, spoons and forks, it will cost them no less than \$1.56. Those same people can eat from the everyday kitchen dishes and wash them in their Kitchenaid or Magic Chef dishwasher from Higginbothams for 5c or less and up to 7c. This figure includes the cost of heating the water, the electricity for running the machine, the water, and the most expensive detergent. The cost is based on estimated national averages. In most areas the low figure applies.

At home it's a simple matter to load everything into the dishwasher, fill the detergent cups, set the dishwasher for the full cycle, and let the machine do the rest. While in the kitchen, be sure to add \$1.51 to your cookie jar bank, too!

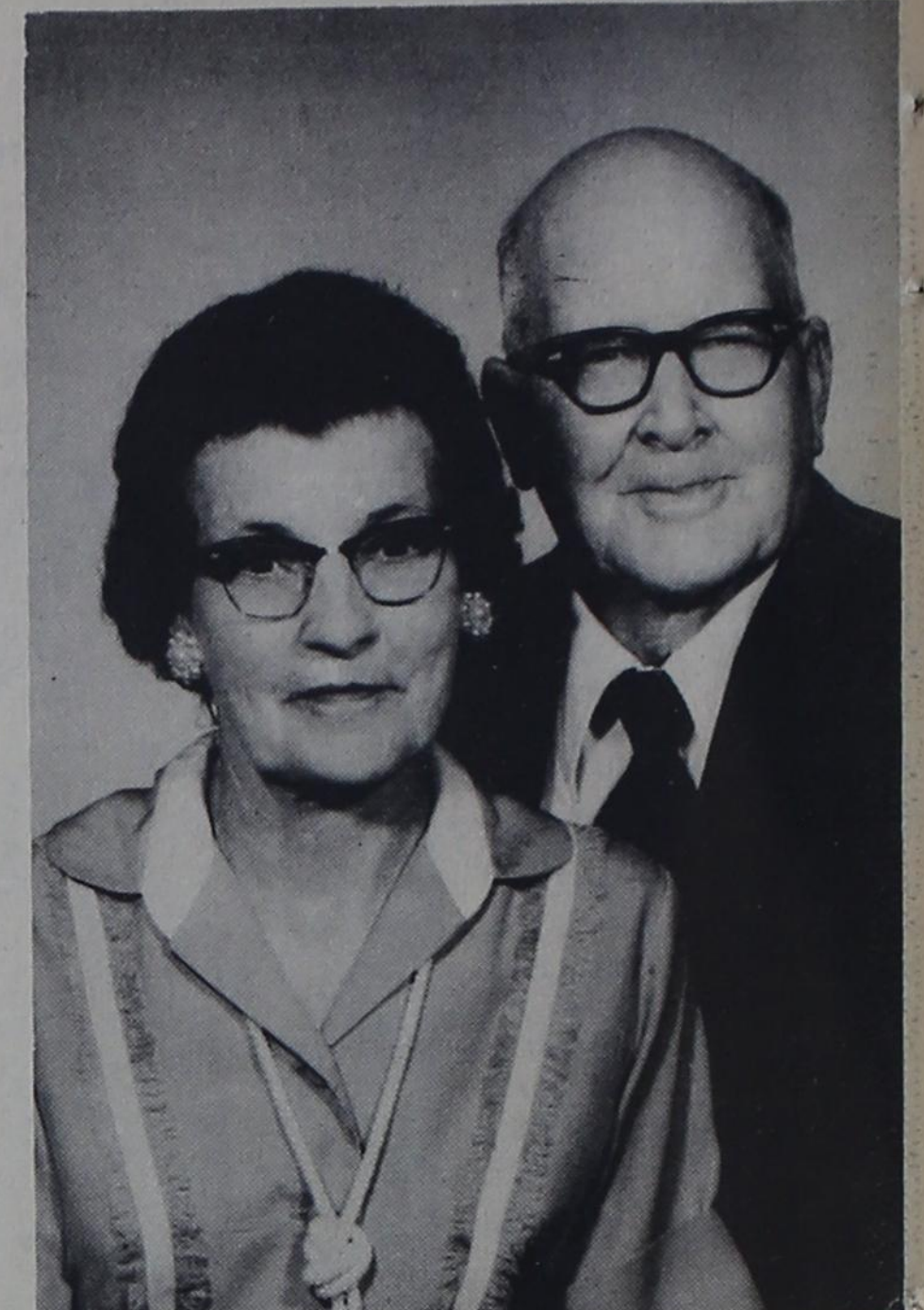

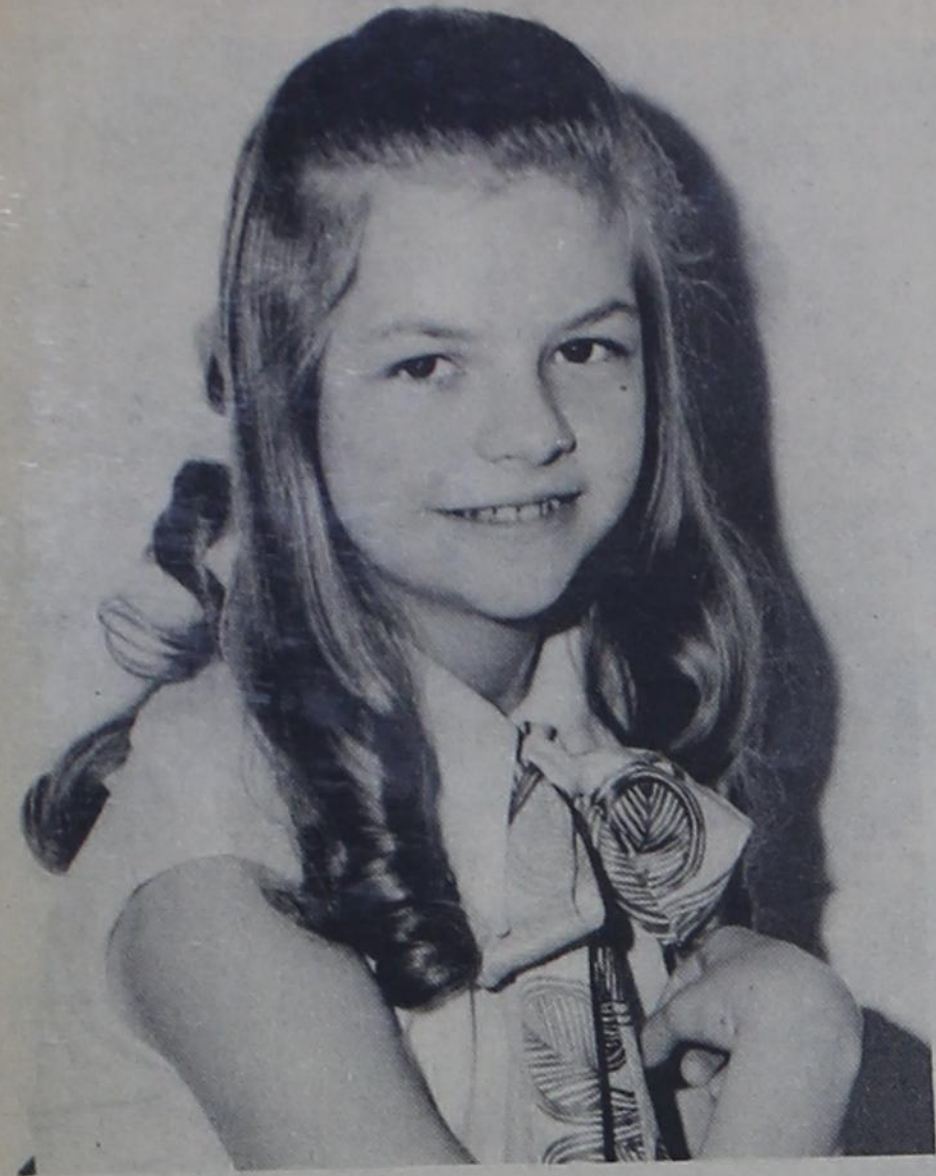

Accent on Health

Some say "everyone talks about the weather but no one does anything about it." However, the truth is that all of us, assuming normalcy, are constantly doing something about it.

Each of us is equipped with our own private thermostat.

When changing weather conditions cause the atmospheric temperature to vary from the 98.6 degree F. at which the body temperature of a healthy human being has been standardized, the thermostat triggers the mechanism which

helps the body maintain its normal temperature.

One of the most remarkable facts of human physiology is that the temperature of warm blooded animals remains unchanged at 98.6 degrees, even though the temperature of the surrounding environment may vary from below zero to over 100 degrees.

Provided the air is perfectly dry, a man can exist and maintain normal body temperature in an atmosphere that will actually grill a beefsteak. There are experimental cases on record where human subjects, by drinking great quantities of water to sustain perspiration and stripping to the waist to facilitate evaporation, have withstood temperatures up to 260 degrees for extended periods without suffering ill effects.

The sensation of heat or cold is not due to a change in body temperature but to change in temperature of the skin surface. And skin temperature is affected when our private thermostat goes into action.

This built - in regulator is a tiny maze of nerve cells located in the mid brain, part of the brain area known as the "hypothalamus". If the day is hot, it re - routes blood from internal organs to skin capillaries to cause perspiration. Body temperature is reduced when the perspiration evaporates.

If the day is cold, the thermostat concentrates the blood and, instead of flowing through skin capillaries, blood flows deep within the body. Sweating

is minimal. Result: you feel cold and have to put on a sweater or an extra blanket to stay comfortable.

Did you know you perspire even at room temperature? You do, but since it evaporates instantly you are really unaware of it. When you are at rest indoors fully clothes,

visible sweating begins when the air temperature reaches a level between 80 and 90 degrees.

The old saw - "it isn't the heat, it's the humidity" - is perfectly true. The same man who withstood 260 degrees in a dry atmosphere would be in

serious trouble if he tried to endure a 120 degree temperature in a damp, humid atmosphere. Body temperature rises rapidly in such a situation because the rate of evaporation is influenced by the extent to which the atmosphere is already saturated with moisture. You feel sticky when the humidity is high because sweat which is not evaporated simply drips from the skin and in no way increases heat loss.

Suppose you, a male, and your lady are caught outside in the first norther of the season. You have a coat but she does not. You would probably be gallant and give her your coat. However, she is physically equipped to withstand the cold better than you. You both have built - in insulators - a layer of fatty tissue beneath the skin - but hers is thicker than yours.

Other conditions besides the weather can affect body temperature. In the presence of disease or infection, the pulse quickens as the heart hastens more blood - laden with antibodies - to the body areas involved. The speed - up in circulation raises body temperature and a "fever" is produced. There are also body conditions such as malnutrition, anemia, and senility which produce a drop in body temperature.

In any 24 hour period it is normal for temperature to vary.
