





Energy Corporation Gets New Gas Well

The Shoaf-Mergner Field gained a new gas producer when the No. 1 Nelson was completed by Command Energy Corp. of Ft. Worth, three miles southeast of Carbon.

On a half-inch choke, the well showed ability to yield up to 76,000 CF gas per day. Location is in a 200-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-859. Command Energy took the

hole to 3,494 foot bottom and perforated for production 3,311 to 3,408 feet into the wellbore.

Southeastern Resources Inc. of Rising Star has posted intitial production figures for the No. 1 M.K. Courtney "B", new oil well in the JMJ Field, five miles northwest of Eastland.

The well indicated potential for 10 barrels of oil and 490,000 CF casinghead gas on an open choke. With drillsite in an 80-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, the well had total drilling depth of 4,053 feet. It entered the pay horizon at 3,473 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 3,469 to 3,477 feet into the wellbore.

A natural gas wildcat has been successfully completed five miles north of Eastland by C.R. Gallagher Jr. of Lubbock. The new Eastland County producer, designated

as the No. 1 Conners, is situated in a 78-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-297.

It was drilled to total depth

of 3,800 feet and will produce

from a perforated interval 1,780 to 1,810 feet.

Showing daily potential to yield 74,000 CF gas on a 3/8 choke, the well was given an absolute open flow rating of

80,000 CFD.

At a location two miles west of Eastland, Chase-Mann Petroleum Inc. of Ft. Worth has completed the No.

1 R.L. Rush, new oil well in the Cameron Two Field. Drillsite was in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 47, Blk. 4.

The well showed daily potential for 9 barrels of oil on an open choke. Production will be from an interval 3,798 to 3,800 feet. Well's total depth was 3,916 feet, with top of pay logged at 3,798 feet.

Texas' deepest producer at 26,566 feet is a Wheeler County gas well.


Texas produced 34,4% of U.S. natural gas in 1981.

Texas had 4,209 gas producing companies last year.





I wish I could ignore the problem and it would go away but it won't. So this week I will attempt to address the D.W.I. issue.

The pieces of legislation dealing with D.W.I. almost outnumber the sum total of legislators, but can be grouped, generally, under one major heading, that being more stringent application of punitive measures taken against persons convicted under the Act. Perhaps it would be helpful to commence with a little legislative history of the issue.

The 1979 Session passed legislation whereby a person first convicted of drunk driving would, mandatorially, forfeit his driver's license and subjected, additionally, to fines, probation, etc. The effect of the legislation was apparently perceived by the judges across our state as being too harsh, in as much as it inordinately deprived the family breadwinner of means of transportation to and from work. The judges were, of course, not blameless but one can understand how it would be much easier in theory to do serious economic damage to a statistic than to an individual from the judge's community and well-known to him.

The most controversial part of each measure is the process of selection of the Commissioners for the Public Utility Commission. The bills by Senators Doggett, Mauzy, Caperton and Parmer call for elected members in various ways while Senator Jones' bill calls for Commissioner to be appointed by the Governor. Senator Doggett's bill calls for an expansion of the present three commissioners to six who would be elected from six single member districts and serve six year staggered terms.

The measure by Senator Mauzy would expand the membership to nine, and these commissioners would be elected from nine single member districts. The terms would also be six year staggered terms. Senator Caperton's bill

would retain the present membership of three, and these three would be elected state-wide and serve six year terms.

The measure by Senator Parmer would also retain the present membership of three and would be elected state-wide. Their terms would be for four years.

Senator Jones' measure retains the present membership of three and would be elected state-wide. Their terms would be for four years.

Probably the most Senator Jones' measure retains the present law by providing for three commissioners who are appointed to six year terms by the Governor with the advice and consion.

sent of the Senate. Another area being considered is the representation of residential ratepayers by public counsel before the PUC. Senator Doggett's bill Committee. provides that the Attorney General's office would represent the residential

ratepayers. Senator Caperton's bill provides for a public counsel which is to be funded by charging utilities one-sixth of one percent of its gross receipts. An office of Public Utility Counsel would be created. The chief executive of such office would be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The measure by Senator Parmer provides public counsel to be appointed by the Governor, and the office would operate under the authority of the Governor's office.

Senator Jones' bill would require the Commission to set up a procedure for consumer complaints to be resolved by the Commission. The measures by Senators Doggett, Caperton and Parmer prohibit automatic fuel adjustment passthrough. Instead, the fuel cost would be considered by the Commission as part of the operating expense.

All of the bills are extremely long and complex. They deal with a variety of the issues including methods considering rate of return and how to deal with construction work in progress. Bryan Man Uses Schools To Defraud Educational Foundations

Postal Inspector in Charge D. C. Strader, Fort Worth, announced that a Fort Worth Federal Grand Jury on March 3, returned a 13 count indictment against a Bryan, Texas man. The indictment alleged Robert P. Hicks, age 32, dba The Hicks Foundation, used the mail in a scheme to defraud numerous companies and their educational foundations, out of t several hundredthousands dollars.

The Grand Jury charged Hicks entered into agreements with Bishop College of Dallas and the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association of Lubbock to donate \$100,000 to the academic scholarship endowment fund of each school.

Hicks, a graduate of Texas A&M, alledgedly told officials at both schools that he had obtained contributions to their scholarship funds from employees and retired emloyees of ap-

proximately 12 companies whose educational foundations match contributions made by their employees to educational institutions. Companies affected included Exxon, Pennzoil, Atlantic Richfield, Shell, Union Oil of California, Chevron, Standard Oil of California, Cities Service, Ashland, Mobil, Halliburton, and Alcoa.

The investigation revealed the employees named in the matching gift applications did not make any contributions to either school.

According to Assistant U. S. Attorney Cheryl Wattley, Hicks allegedly made false representations to officials at each school about the donations which caused fraudulant matching gift applications to be mailed to the various companies' foundations. Matching gift checks were mailed back to each school.



Cisco Woman Found Dead, **Husband Is Missing**

CISCO-Doris Eileen Lundstrom, 27-year old wife of Cisco business man Loyal Lundstrom, was found dead of a gunshot wound in the bedroom of the family home at the Cisco Motel, 708 East 8th Street, at 8:15 a.m. Saturday, March 5.

Police Chief Randy Whittle, who is directing an investigation, reported at a press conference at 6 p.m. Tuesday that Mr Lundstrom, member of the Cisco city council and mayor pro tem, was being sought for questioning. He had not been seen or heard from since last Thursday afternoon.

Justice of the Peace A.C. Holder was withholding an official inquest verdict until he received an autopsy report from a Dallas laboratory. The initial report received by Mr. Holder by telephone said that Mrs. Lundstrom died from a shotgun blast to the abdomen and that she probably had been dead between 24 and 48 hours, placing the death time Thursday night. The body was discovered by the Rev. John Clinton, close family friend, who went to the motel to help a bus patron.

Mr. Whittle told representatives of Abilene television stations and newspapers Monday night that leads in the case were few. He said that Ray Wallace, Thrift Mart market employee, was the only resident of the motel and he told authorities that he saw or heard nothing Nazarene where she unusual.

Mr. Lundstrom, 59, was not a prime suspect but "we want to talk to him." He added that "he could have been kidnapped or murdered." No weapons were found.





IRS Notes for Taxpayers

Do you expect to owe the Internal Revenue Service on your 1983 individual income tax return? Do you expect to receive income not subject to withholding in 1983 (i.e., royalty income, rental income,

c.). If so, you may need to file a declaration of estimated tax for 1983, says the Internal Revenue Service.

Whether you must file a declaration of estimated tax, Form 1040ES, for any year depends on how much come tax will be for that year. The IRS says not to include income exempt from tax in deciding whether you must file a declaration.

Further information is detailed in IRS Publication 505. "Estimated Tax and Tax Withholding," out, regardless of the which can be obtained by using the order amount of earnings.

If you have previously made ES payments, you may expect your new vouchers for 1983 to be mailed to you.




