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Traffic Deaths In Texas Set

AUSTIN-The Texas Department of Public Safety reported today that a preliminary count of traffic deaths in the state for 1963 shows 2,703 persons were killed-by far the greatest toll in history.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, noted that this means 282 more persons died in traffic last year than in 1962, or an increase of approximately 12 percent. He also pointed out that the 1963 toll of lives was 92 greater than the previous alltime high of 2,611 in 1956.

DPS Statistical Services said it is estimated that when all reports are received for the year 1963, the death figure from traffic accidents in Texas will be


