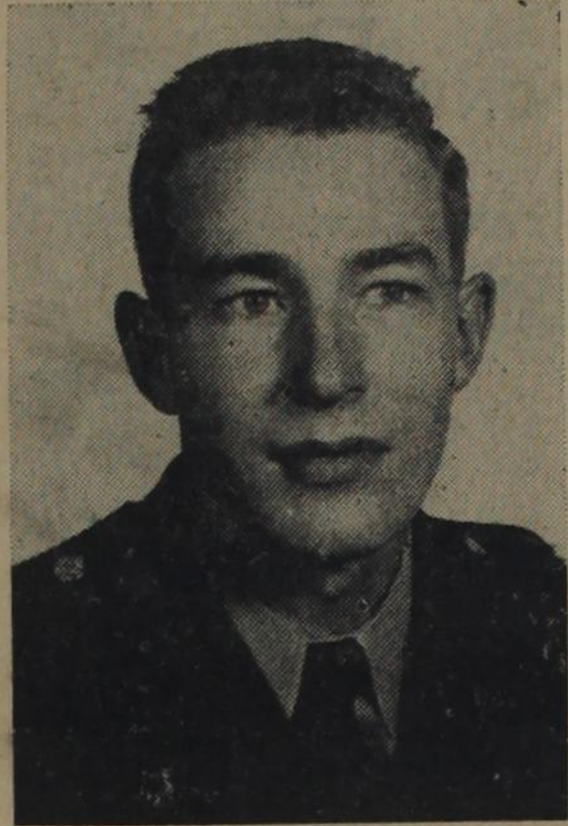
The following article about Cadet Davis appeared in the J-Tac, college newspaper:

This week's Cadet of the Week, Jerry Davis, was promoted last week from first lieutenant to captain and gained the title of Tarleton ROTC Band Commander.

Cadet Captain Davis, a sophomore liberal arts major from Rising Star, has been interested in band work for a long time. When a freshman in high school, he entered district band contests and earned the "first chair" trombone position. He attended summer band school at Texas Tech and McMurry before coming to TSC. Playing a trombone is still one of his favorite hobbies and he occasionally plays with the TSC Tophatters and the Tarleton Orchestra.

This versatile cadet also likes athletics. He participated in football, basketball and track in high school, and was a member of the relay team that qualified for state his senior year. Since coming to Tarleton last year, he has been a member of the intermural track team.

After finishing at TSC this year, Davis plans to continue his studies at Texas Tech. Although he is still a bit undecided about his future plans, Davis is considering a teaching profession or an Army career. Natural sciences are his favorite subjects.

## Post Office Moved Into New Quarters Here This Week

The Rising Star Post Office was moving into brand new quarters this week. Installation of new fixtures in the new building on West Smith Street across from the Roach Motor Company was begun Monday under the supervision of Arthur R. Neely, postal equipment technician out of Washington, D. C., and Postmaster Charlie Smith was hopeful of getting the office settled in the new quarters by the end of the current week. Moving was expected to be started Wednesday if not earlier.

Floyd Harris of Fort Worth is the new landlord and L. V. Bradford of Fort Worth was contractor on the building. It is of brick and masonry construction, with glass and aluminum front, and a loading dock at the rear. The parking area at the back and side is paved.

New bank style counters in the finance room, where patrons are served, give a more personal contact between postal clerks and the patrons. There are no service windows. A glass door separates the finance room from the lobby and the lock boxes.

The move ends twenty years of occupancy of the former location on South Main Street. The office was established there in 1938.

## 148 Watershed Applications Have Been Submitted

College Station - Since passage of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act by the Federal Congress in 1954, 148 applications have been submitted by small watershed groups in Texas for consideration by the State Soil Conservation Board.

In commenting on the status of these applications, Jack Barton, extension specialist in soil and water conservation, said 14 has been approved by Congress and authorized for operations as of January 1, 1959. Plans have been completed on three others and are before the Bureau of the Budget for consideration.

Eight projects are listed by Barton as in the planning process; four were found not feasible after detailed planning began while 42 applications have been disapproved. Another 19 applications are listed as disapproved pending which means they are to receive further attention.

Out of the 148 applications submitted, Barton said, 85 had been approved. Acreages in the watersheds varies from 20,000 to 240,000 and the number of structures required ranges from 2 to 40 per watershed. The average cost per structure has been estimated at \$50,000.

Under the terms of the Act, landowners pay for operation and maintenance of the projects while the Federal government provides funds for the structures. The projects are initiated and administered by local organizations. USDA provides technical assistance, cost sharing and credit in accordance with mutually agreed upon plans.

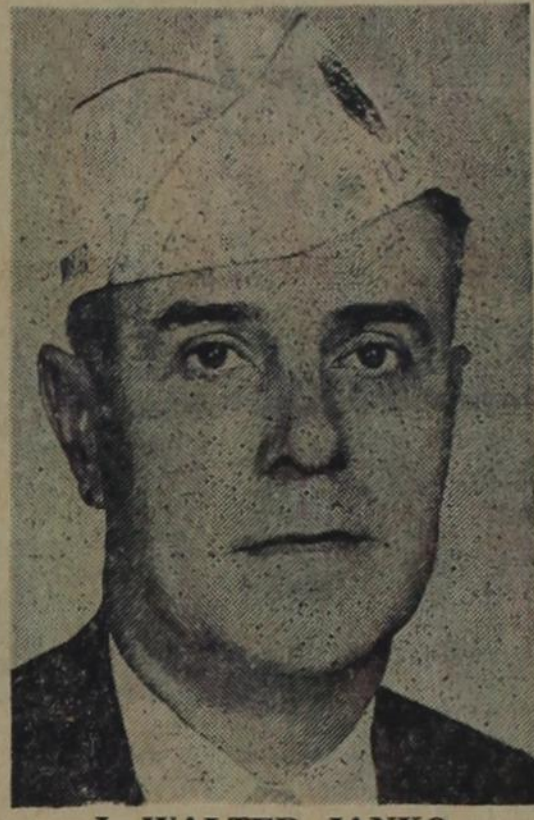
Small watershed groups interested in obtaining detailed information on Public Law 566 are advised by Barton to contact their local Soil Conservation District supervisor or county agent.

## Second Annual Pecan Budding School April 17

The second annual Eastland County Pecan Budding School will be held, in Eastland, April 17, County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper, revealed this week.

The morning session beginning at 9:30 o'clock on that date will be held in the conference room of the Texas Electric Service Co. It will be devoted to when, where and how to bud, types of budwood, condition of stock and scion, how and when to 'force' the bud, cutting and cold storage of pecan budwood and other items relating to pecan propagation Cooper said.

The afternoon session starting at 1 o'clock will be held in the woods north of Lake Eastland where those who attend may practice the actual budding on small pecan trees.

The school is free and anyone who wishes may attend. It is expected to be held annually due to the interest in the development of the pecan industry in the county and also because so few people know the art of propagating papershell pecans on the native or seedling varieties.

Cooper expressed the wish that those who attend be on time for both sessions to get the full benefit of both the theory and practice sessions.

WASHINGTON, D. C. - WHILE UNITED STATES FOREIGN POLICY is concerned with happenings in our front door, our back door may be very much a-

jar. QUITE NATURALLY, OUR FIRST CONCERN in the weeks ahead is what happens in Berlin. The interest on the revolt in Tibet is high because there is some hope the situation may develop into a major revolt against the Communist Chinese.

IN OUR BACK DOOR is the Caribbean and Latin America. In this area there is a foment inspired by Fidel Castro of Cuba and Betancourt of Venezuela. Munos Marin of Puerto Rico is seemingly supporting the Castro

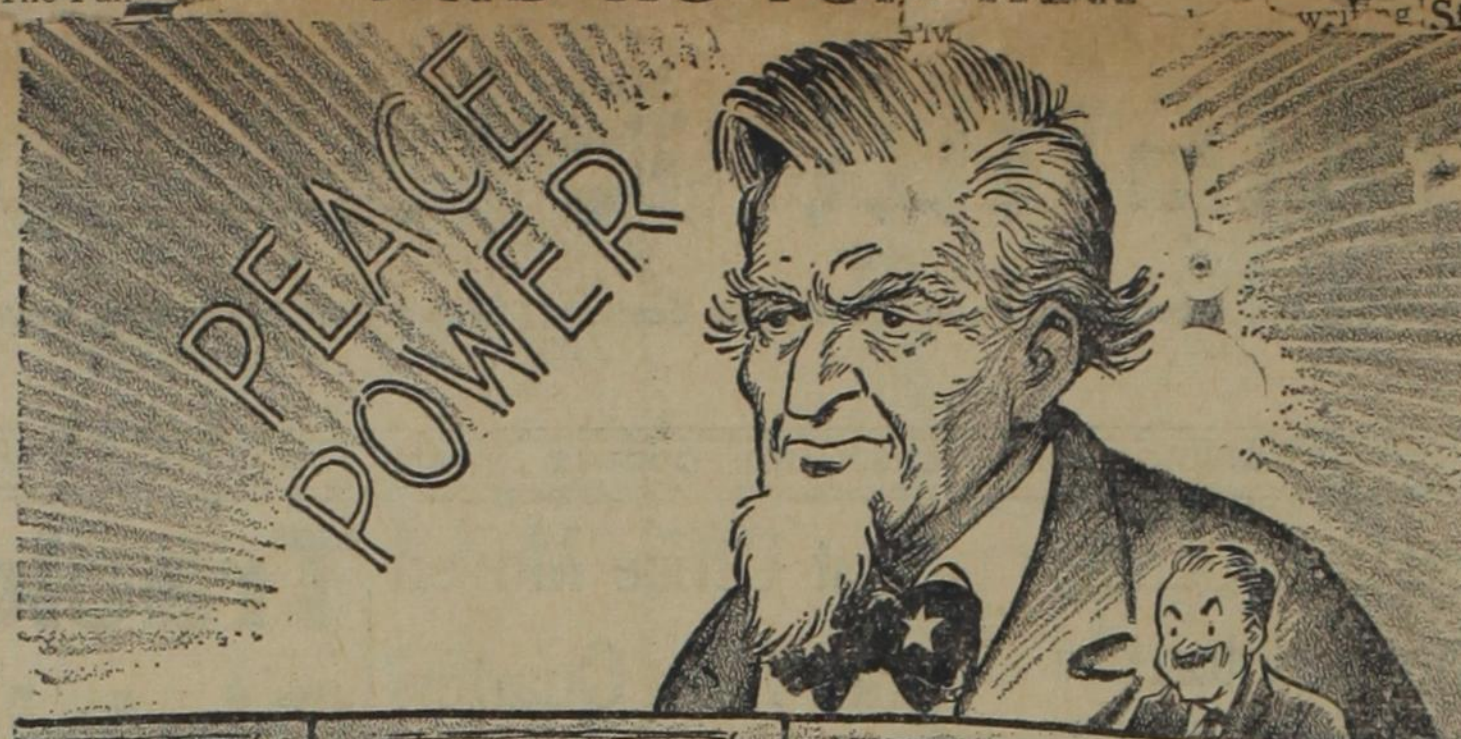

forces against the Dominican Republic's Trujillo.

THERE IS LITTLE DOUBT THAT Communist influence has a lot of fuel for the fire. Moscow would be presumed to have its eye principally on Berlin and Tibet, but we can also be sure their interest is high in the Ca-

ibbean. THE TARGET OF THE SO-CALLED Castro forces is principally Trujillo, whose fall would be a great psychological victory and could start the downfall of several Latin American nations. Nicaragua is seemingly high on the list.

THE UNITED STATES IS CONTINUOUSLY in the middle of the powerful crosscurrents working right at our back door. The interest of American oil companies in Venezuela constitutes one of the dilemmas. Pressures from the oil companies to get a better deal in their take from Venezuela is a major consideration of our policies.

THE BIG NAVAL BASE at Guantanamo Bay on the Southeastern tip of Cuba is another major consideration.

IT DOES NOT SEEM that either of these has any sympathy from the Fidel Castro forces.

CASTRO'S BITTER UTTERANCES AGAINST the United States is, of course, encouraging to the Communists. Nothing could serve their purpose better than for an outright major conflict to develop in our back door. If the revolutionaries are successful in marshalling sizeable forces, the entire Caribbean as well as a considerable part of South America could become embroiled in a conflict. Unless ways and means are found to stop these developments, whatever side the United States takes will be wrong. The Communists are well aware that any conflict will help them and hurts us. Their theme is "peace in the Caribbean," but of course, it means exactly the opposite.

SO WHILE WE ARE WATCHING those places far removed from us which could possibly touch off a major war, a riot could occur in our own back yard which might be about as serious as anything which has ever occurred in the Western Hemisphere.

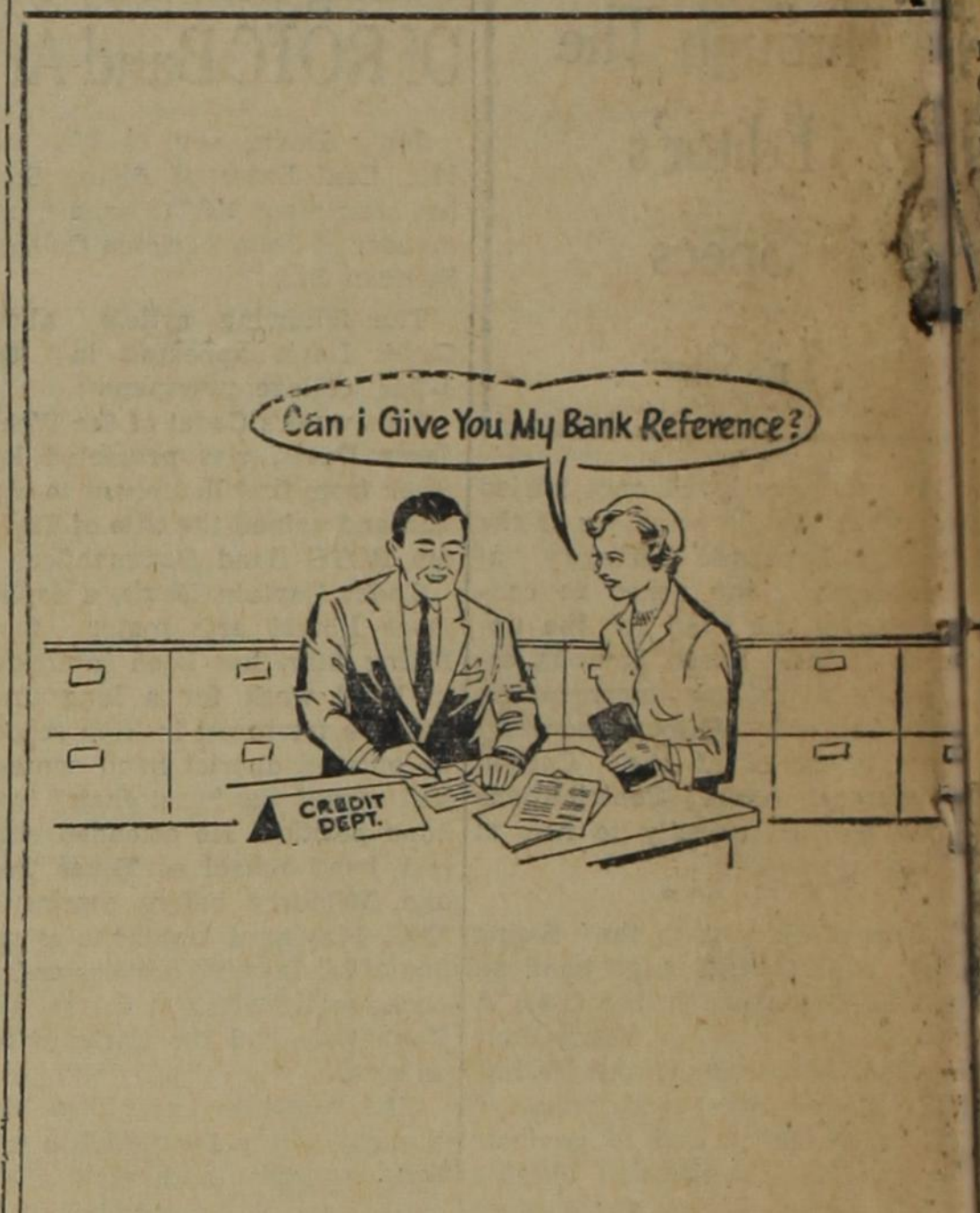

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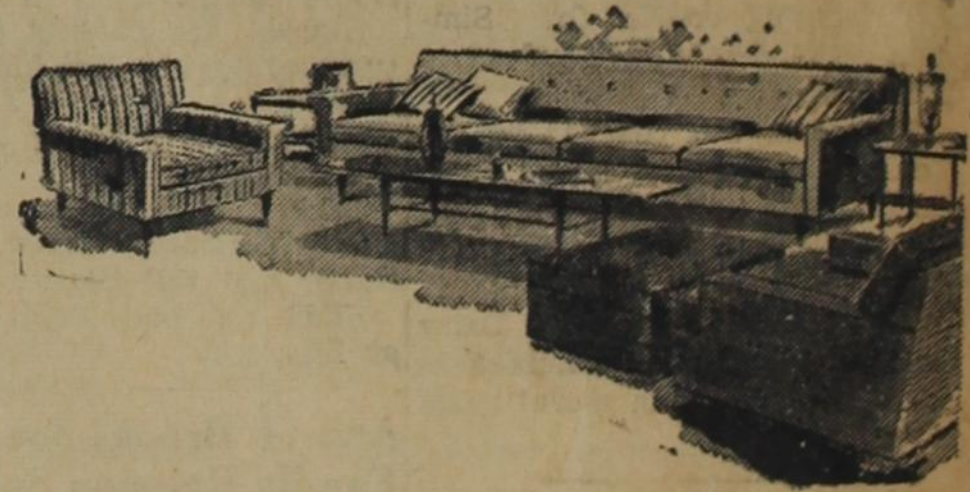


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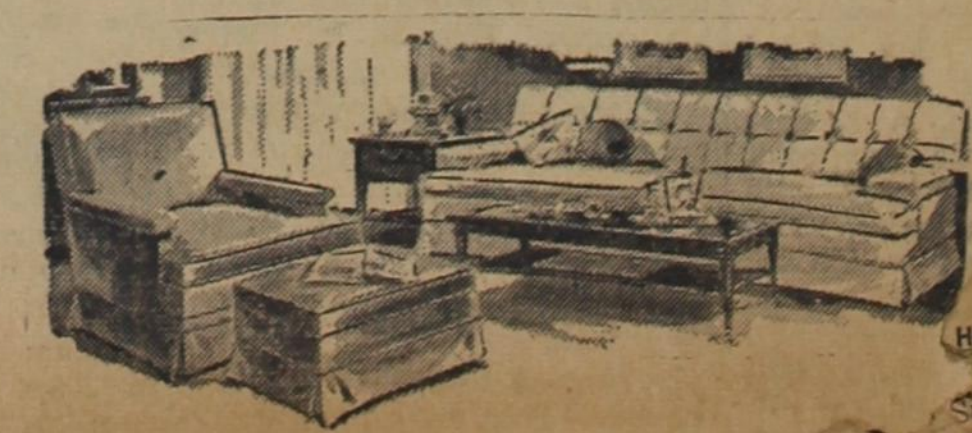

Four o'clock found us on the stage at Trinity University. We opened the show with our theme

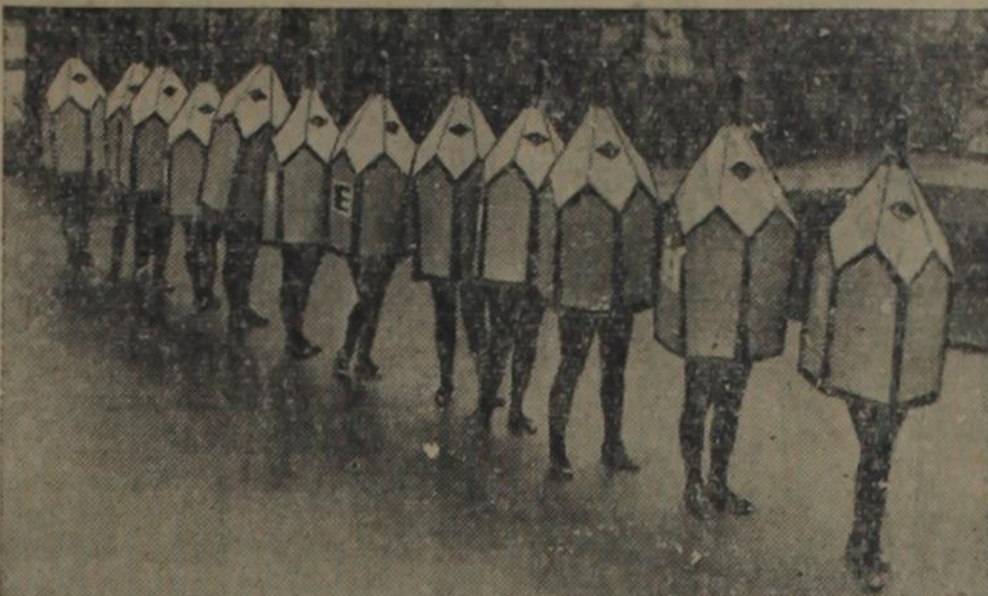

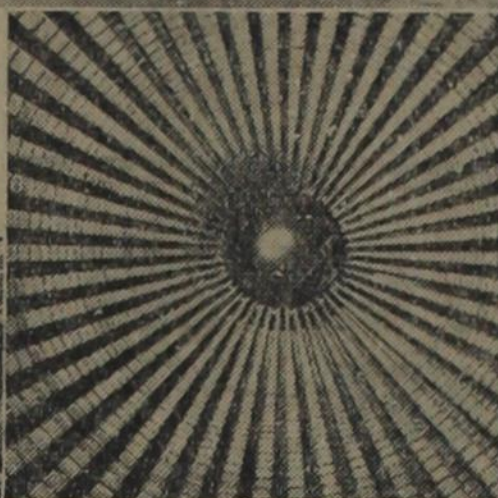

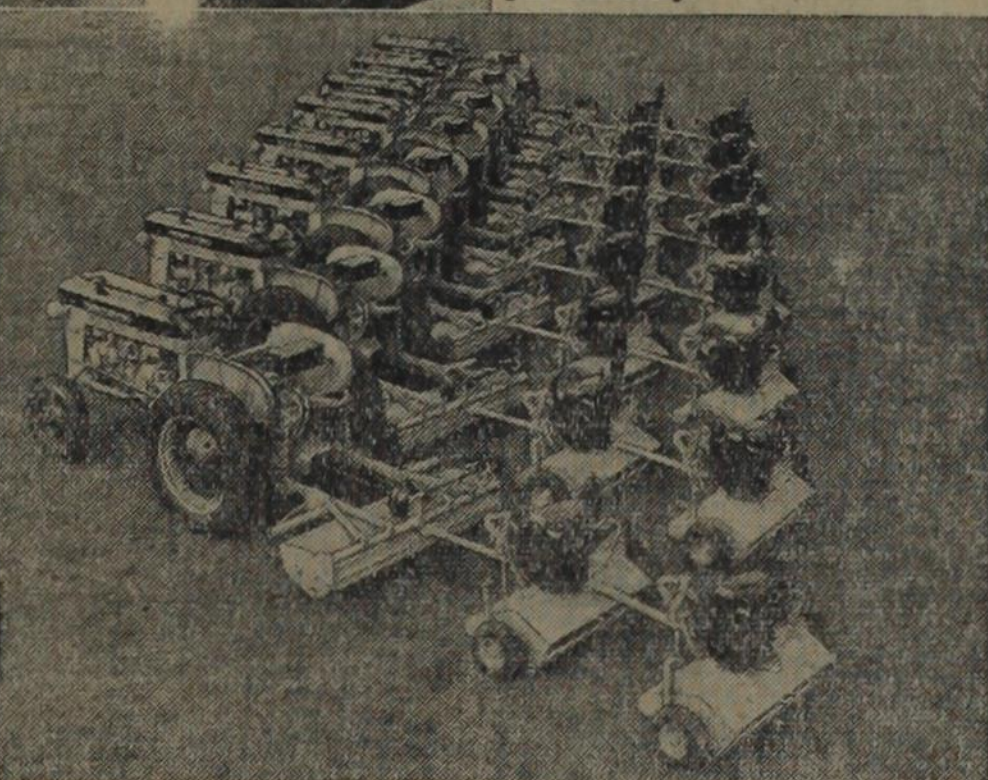
