### Pecan Weevil Target of Computer

---Pecan weevils are now the target of the Computer Age. The battle to control these destructive pests is being waged through the "BUGNET" system, notes an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The system uses computer models to predict insect populations based on various bits of in-

formation, including field and environmental conditions. The computer model can determine whether or not control measures are necessary, depending on a certain level of infestation. Pecan weevils usually emerge from the soil from mid-August to mid-September and lay eggs in nuts. Larvae hatch and feed on the kernels.

### Promising Cotton Crop

PROMISING COTTON CROP---The Texas cotton crop looks promising, and a good rain the next few weeks plus a letup in insect activity could result in a bumper crop, says a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Although cotton in southern and coastal areas was damaged some by extended wet weather

this spring, most of the crop is making good progress. Yields could average around 350 pounds per acre across Texas. Harvesting has started in the Rio Grande Valley while irrigation is in full swing in the High Plains and western areas. With all the rank cotton this year, farmers should shred stalks and plow them under soon after harvest to reduce the number of overwintering boll weevils.

**SCREWWORMS**

While there have only been five reported cases of Screwworm thus far this year in Texas, this can still be a potential livestock pest. The number of recorded cases has been reduced tremendously since the USDA began the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program in 1962. However, in 1972 and 1976 major outbreaks occurred.

Eradication officials attributed these rapid and serious outbreaks to large adult fly populations surviving the winters. Moisture and temperature conditions in the Winter and Spring of 1972 and 1976 allowed flies to survive far north of their usual overwintering range. These outbreaks could have been worse without the efforts of the Eradication Program.

The Screwworm is the maggot of a species of Blow Fly which can infest most wild and domestic, warm blooded animals. The Screwworm fly is

about twice the size of the housefly. Full-grown larvae are about 3/4-inch long. The tapered head of the worm contains a pair of dark or black mouth hooks. The tail is flat and has two dark plates with openings for breathing.

The Screwworms feed with their tapered heads deep in a wound with the blunt ends exposed for breathing. They continually tear flesh with the mouth hooks. Deep wounds may result from their feeding. The blood and foul smell attract additional flies, which deposit more eggs on or near the wound.

The Screwworm is not a problem currently, however it is always wise to be aware and alert of potential problems. Inspect your animals regularly for wounds. Postpome operations such as castration, dehorning and branding until cool weather when the fly is inactive. Check incoming livestock for wounds and infestations.

If a suspected case of Screwworm is found, collect the maggots for examination. Collection kits are available from the County Extension Office. The specimen should be collected from the center of the wound and submitted to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory.

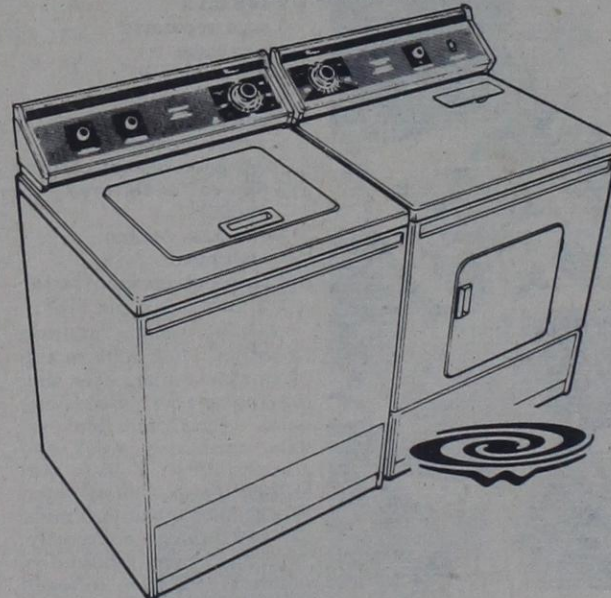

And the pig just grunted. And they painted "unfair" picket signs and marched round and round the little red hen, shouting obscenities.

When the government agent came, he said to the little red hen, "You must not be greedy."

"But I earned the bread," said the little red hen.

"Exactly," said the agent. "That is our wonderful cradle-to-the-grave security system. Anyone in the barnyard can earn as much as he wants. But, under our modern government regulations, the productive workers must divide their product with the idle. You must give four loaves to your neighbors."

And so life went on in the barnyard, as usual. But, the little red hen's neighbors wondered why she never again raised any more wheat or baked any more bread.

## OF AIR TRAVEL, ICE CREAM CONES AND ROTARY CLUBS

In 1905, the airplane had just gotten off the ground, the ice cream cone was a novelty, and the first Rotary club was formed in Chicago, Illinois.

Today, you can travel across town or around the world on everything from helicopters to the SST. Ice cream is a culinary institution. And there are more than 19,000 Rotary clubs in 156 lands worldwide.

At 76, Rotary is growing at the rate of nearly two clubs a day, expanding its old programs and launching new ones. It, like air travel and ice cream, is a thriving part of the 20th century.

Some 6,000, or almost one third, of all Rotary clubs, are in the United States. Each club strives to

meet its community's needs and the diversity of Rotary projects reflects the unique qualities of the communities clubs serve.

In many cities, Rotarians maintain the tradition of service to the disabled that began more than 60 years ago when Ohio Rotarians started the National Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults. Many clubs sponsor summer camps for handicapped children. Others raise thousands of dollars for projects and organizations benefiting the disabled. In Beaumont, Texas, Rotarians are building wheelchair ramps at major intersections.

Throughout the United States, Rotary clubs sponsor more than 1,500 Scout units and 1,200 young peo-

ple's service clubs. Other youth programs include the city-wide youth employment program sponsored by Seattle Rotarians. In Kansas City, Missouri, Rotarians have established an alternative education program to help young people finish school and find jobs.

Rotarian environmental projects range from a regional wildfire alert program organized by Prescott, Arizona Rotarians to an anti-litter campaign in Shades Valley, Alabama.

Special problems stimulate special projects. When the only local doctor retired, the Kerman, California Rotary club established a paramedic program.

In big cities and small, all across America, Rotary clubs are a vital part of their communities. Like ice cream cones and air travel, they're here to stay.

## HOW ABOUT A NATURAL FOOD BUFFET?

Give your guests something really special at your next party: you. Instead of shuffling back and forth to the kitchen, plan a beautiful, bountiful buffet, all made in advance. Enjoy your party and your guests.

A few suggestions and recipes from those world-renowned experts on hospitality, the people of Puerto Rico, might help. This menu should serve eight to ten.

Start your party out swimmingly with Avocado Boats:

- 1 can (13 oz.) red madrilene consommé
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1 envelope instant beef broth
- 4 medium ripe avocados
- Lemon juice and wedges for garnish

Heat consommé. Soften gelatin in cold water. Stir into hot consommé along with instant beef broth. Pour into shallow pan and chill until firm.

Halve avocados. Remove pits and brush surfaces with lemon juice. Chop firm consommé finely and heap into avocados. Garnish with remaining chopped consommé and lemon wedges.

Other easy and tasty appetizers might include an assortment of cheeses and crudites (various cut-up raw vegetables) with a dip combining yogurt and mayonnaise flavored with Puerto Rican rum, Tabasco, grated horseradish and curry.

A hot dish should be the star of your show. Serve one made with brown rice and a generous assortment of fish and shellfish, New World Paella:

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 cup beef or chicken broth
- 2 1/2 cups water
- 1 1/2 cups natural brown rice
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped



- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 cup cooked green peas
- 2 whole canned pimientos, diced
- 1 jar (11 1/2 oz.) whole clams
- 2 pounds firm white fish filets, cubed\*
- Seasoned flour
- 10 small hard-shelled clams, steamed open (or use 10 to 12 mussels)
- 1 1/2 pounds large shrimp, cooked, shelled and cleaned, tails on
- 1/4 cup bottled Italian salad dressing
- 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper

Combine salt, bay leaf, broth and water in large, heavy saucepan. Bring to a rapid boil. Stir in rice, cover, reduce heat and simmer about 45 minutes until rice is tender and liquid absorbed.

Heat oil in skillet. Stir in garlic, onion, parsley and green peas. Stir-cook three

to four minutes. Using a slotted spoon, remove ingredients from oil, draining well. Reserve oil in pan for later use.

Stir sauteed ingredients, pimientos and jarred clams into rice. Spread rice mixture in a greased 14-inch paella pan or large, shallow casserole.

Dredge fish cubes in seasoned flour and brown in reserved hot oil. Drain on paper towels. Add fish to rice. Add clams (or mussels) and shrimp. Sprinkle with salad dressing and pepper flakes. Cover. About 20 minutes before serving, place in a 350 degree oven until heated through. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

\*Use cod, haddock, snapper, sole, or for richer flavor, mackerel. Lobster, crab or crayfish may be used, according to taste and budget.

Assorted muffins and a crisp salad may accompany the main dish. Climax the meal with a

light but memorable Mocha Rum Pie:

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1/3 cup golden Puerto Rican rum
- 1/2 cup milk
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3/4 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels
- 1 teaspoon instant coffee
- 1/2 pint coffee flavored yogurt
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 9-inch baked pie shell

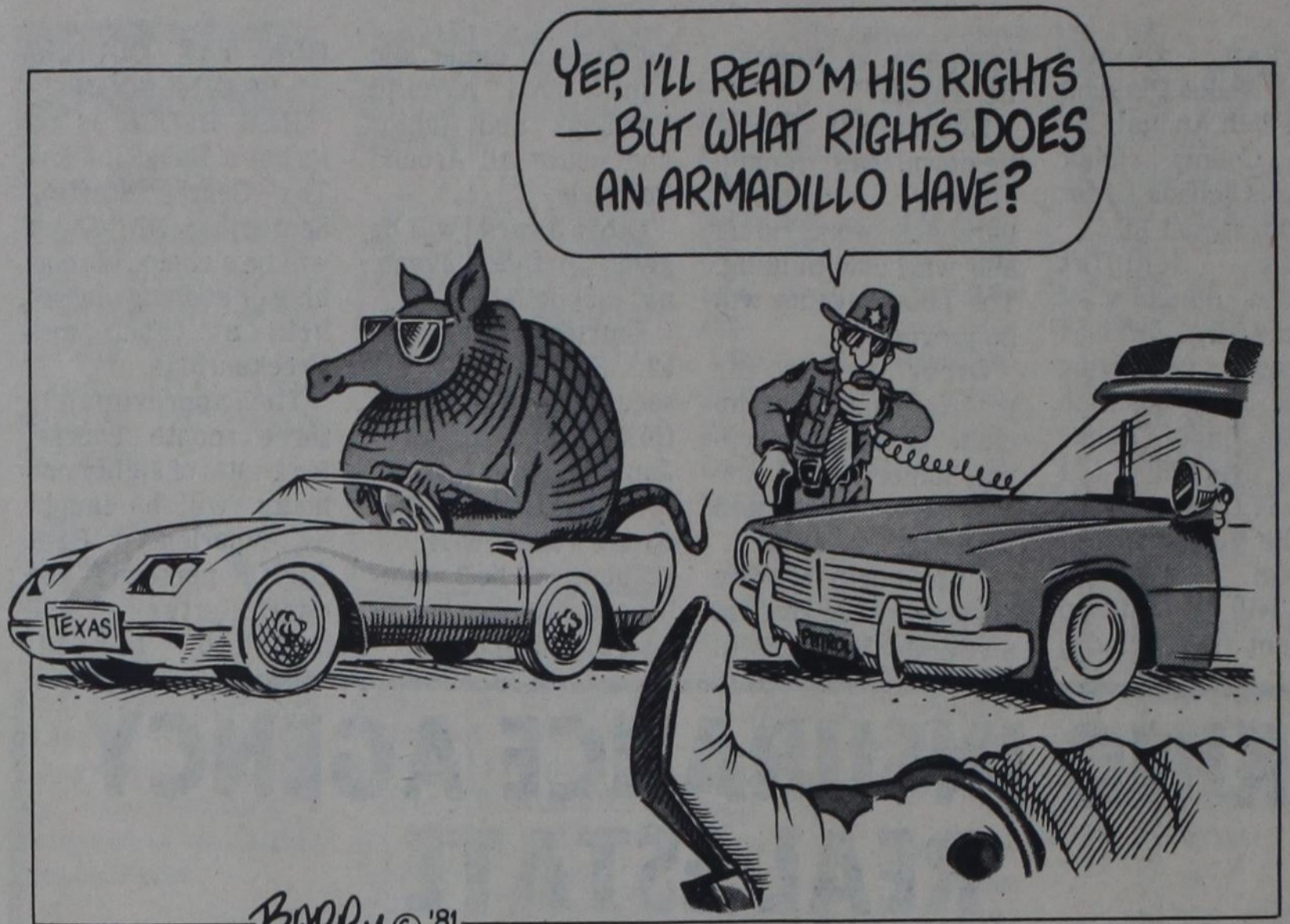
Sprinkle gelatin on rum to soften. Heat milk in top of double boiler, over simmering water. Beat egg yolks, sugar, salt and vanilla until very thick and creamy. Beat a little hot milk into eggs, then stir mixture into remaining milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened (about five minutes). Blend in softened gelatin, rum and chocolate bits. Stir until chocolate melts. Mix in instant coffee until blended.

Remove from heat and chill just until mixture begins to hold its shape. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until soft peaks form.

Fold yogurt and whipped cream into chocolate rum mixture. Gently fold in egg whites. Spoon into pie shell and chill until firm. Garnish with chocolate curls and extra whipped cream, if desired.

Keep thirsty guests happy with refreshing Rum Runners. To make one drink, combine in jar of electric blender: four ice cubes, 2 oz. 151 proof Puerto Rican Rum, 1 oz. Program Keyed To Industrial Development

COLLEGE STATION--Community leaders faced with a faltering economy may be able to find the right formula for breathing new life into their communities through a Texas Agricultural Extension Service program.

The Extension Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System, offers a 10-week home study course followed by a workshop that centers on rural industrial development. Sponsors along with the Extension Service are the Texas Industrial Commission and the Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas A&M.

The study course begins Sept. 21 and the workshop is slated for Dec. 1-3, announces Jack Jones, community development specialist with the Extension Service.

"This program can be a great opportunity for community leaders who are facing a declining population and a low per capita income," notes Jones. "One of the ways a small town can remedy this situation is to attract industrial payrolls, thereby increasing bank deposits and employment and generally placing money in circulation in the local economy."

The home study course and workshop are designed to acquaint officials of towns and cities under 50,000 population with the theory of industrial development. They will also be able to rub shoulders with experts in the field, points out Jones. Workshop speakers will focus on prospecting for and financing industry and industrial site development.

Both volunteer industrial development leaders and elected city and county government officials are invited to take part in the program as well as those working in public or private industrial development agencies, chambers of commerce, financial institutions and public utilities.

## Pioneer News

Mrs. A.C. Halsell

Wherever there are problems, in any area of living, we make efforts to solve the problems. The result is change (a much overused word). Change is good when it is for the best. Where the change results in a worsening condition, in whatever the need may be, maybe it is time to reconnoiter; investigate previous endeavors.

For the week of Feb. 8-12, 1954 the following Devotional was given in the Cross Plains High School. A student read a Devotional each week during that year. Most students and

teachers looked forward to the time set aside for this.

"In Colonial America there were three different types of schools—public schools in New England, church schools in the Middle Colonies, and private schools among the plantation owners in the South. and great because we love and serve thee, Amen."

## Limit to Back Pay

A change in the Social Security Law, that became effective March 1, 1981, will have an affect on people who delay in filing for social security retirement or survivor benefits, Glyn Hammons social security manager in Abilene, said recently.

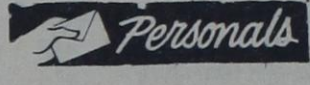
Under this new law, back benefits can be paid for no more than six months before the month of application. Under the old law, back benefits could be paid for as much as twelve months before the month of the ap-

lication.  
The change applies to retired workers age 65 or over and their dependents, and to widows, widowers, and dependent parents of deceased worker over age of 62.

Any one applying for reduced benefits cannot get benefits for months before the month of application. There is no change in this part of the law.

People applying for disability benefits are not affected by this new law. They can still get benefits for up to twelve months before the month they apply.

Six local Gulf transport drivers will compete in the local competition.

These six men operate out of the Gulf Oil Company terminal located eight miles north of Eastland.

They are: Glen Hart of Eastland, Carson Holdridge of Cisco, Gene Zellman of Cisco, Delbert Justice of Cisco, Alan Goode of Eastland, and Dennis Cotten of Cisco.

The top four scorers of the roдео will earn the right to compete in Ft. Worth against drivers from Ft. Worth, Big Sandy and Dawson terminals.

The top four competitors from the Ft. Worth roдео, will then represent the Dallas District in San Antonio October 3rd, against four drivers from the Houston District and four drivers from the New Orleans district of Gulf Oil Co.

A truck roдео is made up of four parts.

First there is a written test which is designed to increase the driver knowledge of his duties and therefore improve his performance. This examination tests the driver knowledge in four areas, the trucking industry, safe driving rules, first aid and fire fighting.

Second, there is a personal

interview of each driver by the judges. This interview is simply designed to judge a driver attitude and appearance.

Third there is the equipment defects test in which the driver is judged on his ability to check out his vehicle as he would during a pre-trip inspection. Five defects are planted on a vehicle (truck) and the driver must be able to find these within an allotted time limit.

Fourth, there is the field test course in which is what will be happening Saturday, August 29th. The field test course demonstrates a drivers skill in maneuvering his vehicle through a course of six problems.

The six problems are:

1. The offset alley - this problem tests the drivers ability to steer and judge distance at all points on the vehicle. Simulating maneuvering through narrow alleys.

2. Parallel parking - as the name implies tests the drivers ability to park parallel to curb as in making curbside delivery. This will involve a driver parallel parking a 40' trailer in a 44' space.

3. The alley dock - tests the drivers ability to back his vehicle into a narrow space and stop within a specified distance. This simulates backing to a dock between two other vehicles.

4. Serpentine - designed to test a drivers ability to maneuver vehicle in and out of tight places in both forward and backward movement. This problem

simulates moving through disabled or wrecked vehicles.

5. The straight line - designed to test the ability of the driver to accurately judge the position of the right wheels of his vehicle, and to hold the vehicle in a straight line. This problem simulates riding the edge of the pavement without dropping off.

6. The stop line - tests the driver ability to judge the position of his front bumper with respect to a fixed line. This problem simulates stopping at a cross walk.

Each of the above problems are worth 50 points making a score of 300 a perfect score. Demerits are subtracted for contact with barricades, unscheduled stops, taking too much time on the course, violation of course rules.

### Supplemental Feeding Tips

Supplemental feeding

of cattle deserves year-round attention since animals can only store protein and minerals in limited amounts, says a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. He suggests feeding salt and an 8-12 % phosphorous supplement of similar calcium content free choice the year round, injecting or feeding vitamin A if in doubt, feeding enough protein to maintain at least 6% ration for proper digestive functions and to increase feed intake, and using cow condition or fatness as a

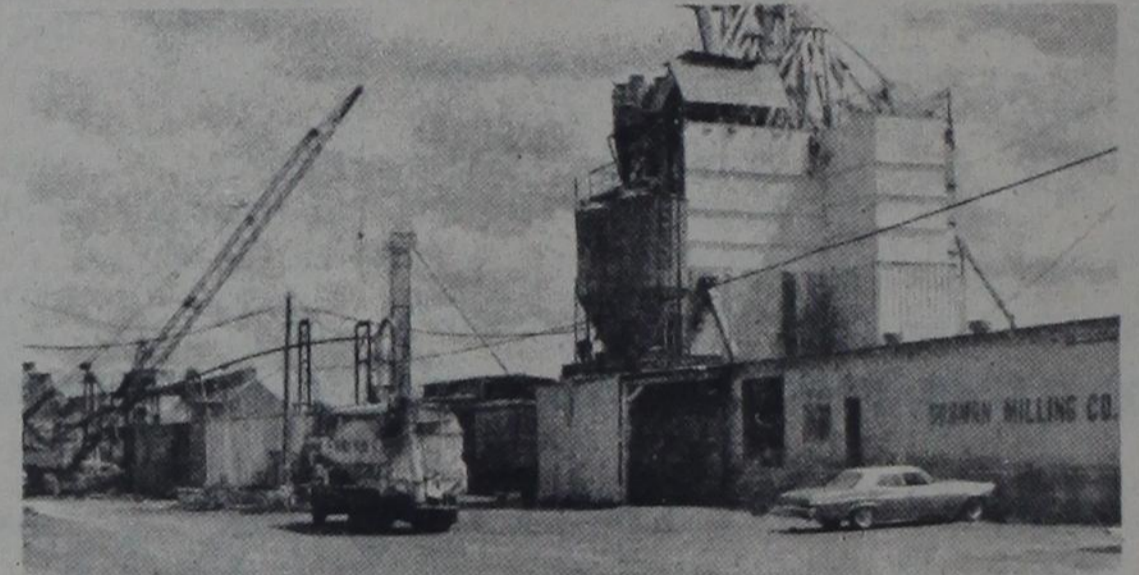
guide to additional feeding. It's important to avoid situations where cattle need high levels of supplementation because that's seldom profitable.

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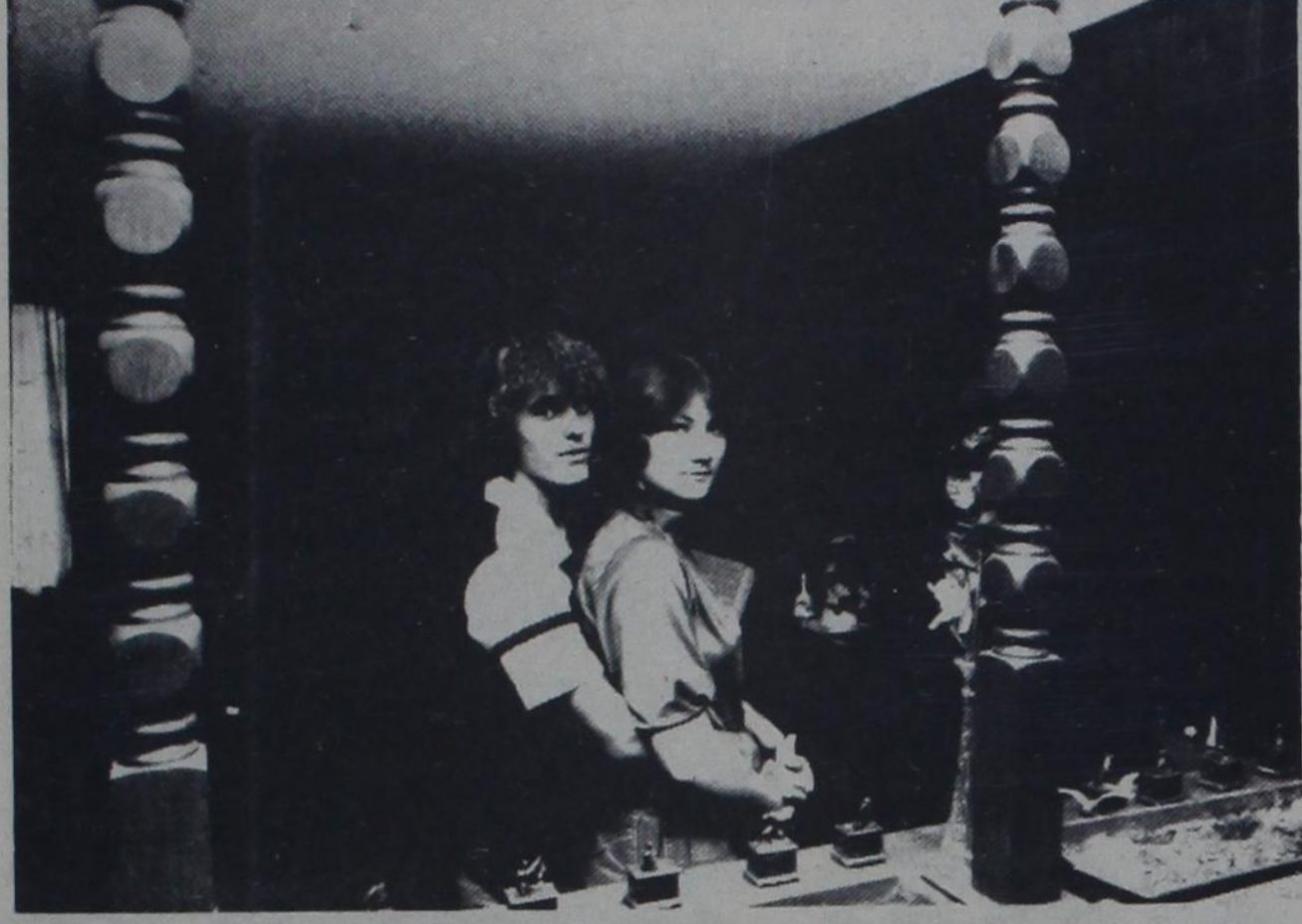

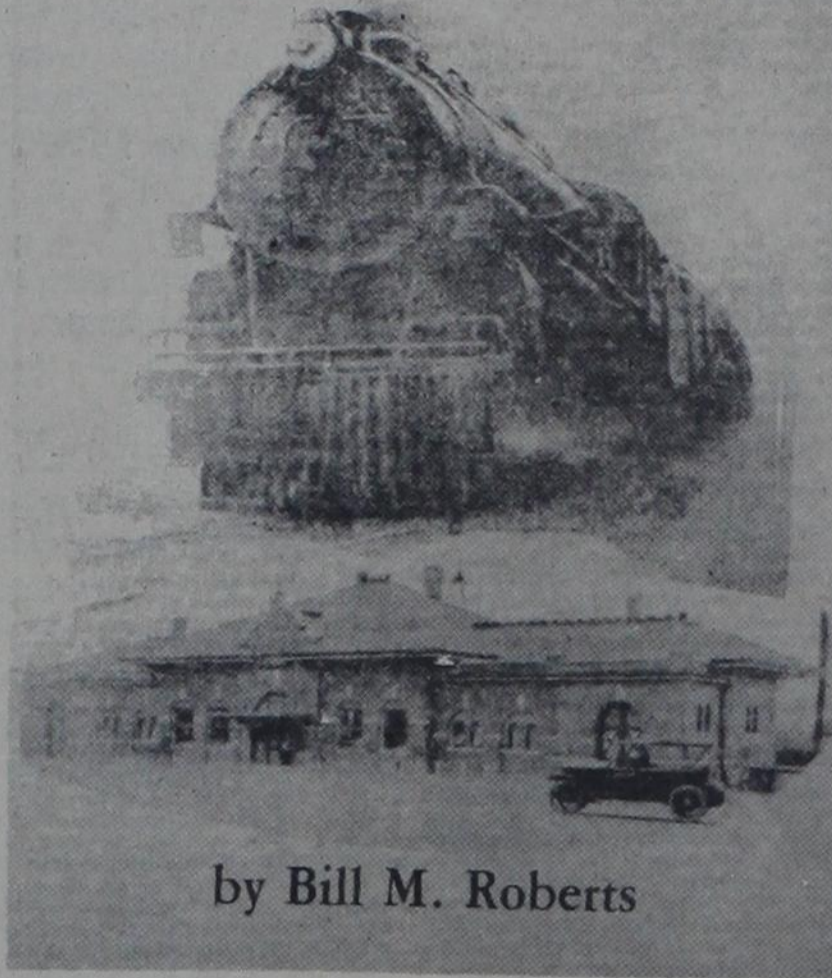

## Book Review

### Where The Rails Crossed

### OF RAILS...AND PEOPLE

Local citizens understand that the rails weren't the only things to cross at Cisco! Widely differing types of humanity - with ethnic backgrounds from Ireland, England and Northern Europe - converged in this area. Here they lived out their dreams, schemes and frustrations, making individual statements as to self government and self control.

"Cisco," says Roberts, a Journalism Instructor at Cisco Junior College, "has had its share of unique movements during the 100 years of its history."

Many of these events, and the people who helped shape them, are recorded in "Where The Rails Crossed" - the book with a symbolic title. Here Roberts has sifted people, places and experiences with journalistic skill, creating a book with something for almost everyone.

The historian will appreciate Robert's careful documentation of material, and the fact that primary sources are used in most cases. Other readers will appreciate the lively, narrative style of the text, while journalist will note the presence of theme, and the weeding of important material from masses of information. Librarians are glad to acquire Eastland County history in chronological, non-verbose style, a way of finally "getting it all together." Photographers and artists will enjoy the numerous photographs and striking layout of the book.

The volume begins with the creation of Eastland County in 1858, the establishment of a County Seat, and the colorful history of Red

Gap, forerunner of Cisco. Then comes the junction of the Texas Pacific and Texas Central Railways in 1881, which actually established Cisco. There is considerable fresh information about the Wall Street financier, John Jay Cisco, for whom the town is named. Other important topics covered are the cyclone of 1893, early businesses, churches, and the importance of religion to the frontier. New material is presented on Britton Academy, Cisco Christian College, Randolph College, and the founding of Cisco Junior College.

Events connected with Lake Cisco and "The World's Largest Swimming Pool" occupy several pages of the book, as do the inventions and enterprises of G.H. Judia. Mining, oil fields, and the Santa Claus Bank Robbery all have their place. The beginning of the Hilton Hotel empire is noted, as well as the community services of various clubs.

The government of Cisco, and some of its difficulties, is treated briefly in the last chapter. The book, Mr. Roberts explains, does not attempt to cover all history after the 1930's in great detail. Future historians will have their chances at that.

Bill Roberts, his wife Donna, and children moved to Cisco in the fall of 1978, after Roberts accepted a position with Cisco Junior College. Bill, with a Degree in Journalism from Abilene Christian College, had written for various newspapers and magazines in the southwest - including the Abilene Reporter News.

While considering topics for Journalism students,

Roberts became aware of the wealth of grass-roots history in this area. By the winter of that year he was spending his spare time in research, and eventually read every microfilmed Cisco newspaper in the CJC library. (These begin with 1918-19.) He also studied two reels of microfilmed material from Texas Tech University, and read every book he could find which included Eastland County history. He also studied documents and unpublished material, and did a number of personal interviews.

By the summer of 1980 Roberts was ready to write the main text of his book, and finished much of it at that time. It should be noted that Roberts also won first in the state for his publication of the C.J.C. yearbook during 1980.

While compiling his Cisco "firsts" for the book Mr. Roberts could well have added "Where The Rails Crossed." For this is not only Bill Roberts first book - it is the first book of straight Cisco history with this sort of insight and range. The book seems to say:

"I'm Cisco, and I'm unique. I've had many outstanding people - Kings and Queens - and probably some jokers and knaves too. But I'm a town, you see, which has always stood at the crossroads of life."

Other venture is No.1 E.R. Brown-Funk, located in the Nimrod (Cross Cut) Field nine southwest of Cisco.

The planned 4,200-foot is located on a 40-acre lease.

Drillsite is 330 feet from the south and 2,310 feet from the east lines of Section 110, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 48 barrels of 43 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64-inch choke. Production is from perforations at 810-20 feet,

treated with 2,300 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 2,369 feet, total depth.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,458-1.

A well was completed two miles northeast of Bangs in the Maxon (Canyon 800) Field.

It is Maxom petroleum Co., Bangs, No. 4 J.R. Brush, spotting 1,750 feet from the south and 300 feet from the west lines of Section 21, HT&B Survey, A-487.

Absolute, open flow was 125,000 cubic feet of gas daily with a gas-liquid, hydrocarbon ratio of 250,000-1 of 61 gravity.

Production is from perforations at 804 to 810 feet. Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 1,250 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 1,410 feet.

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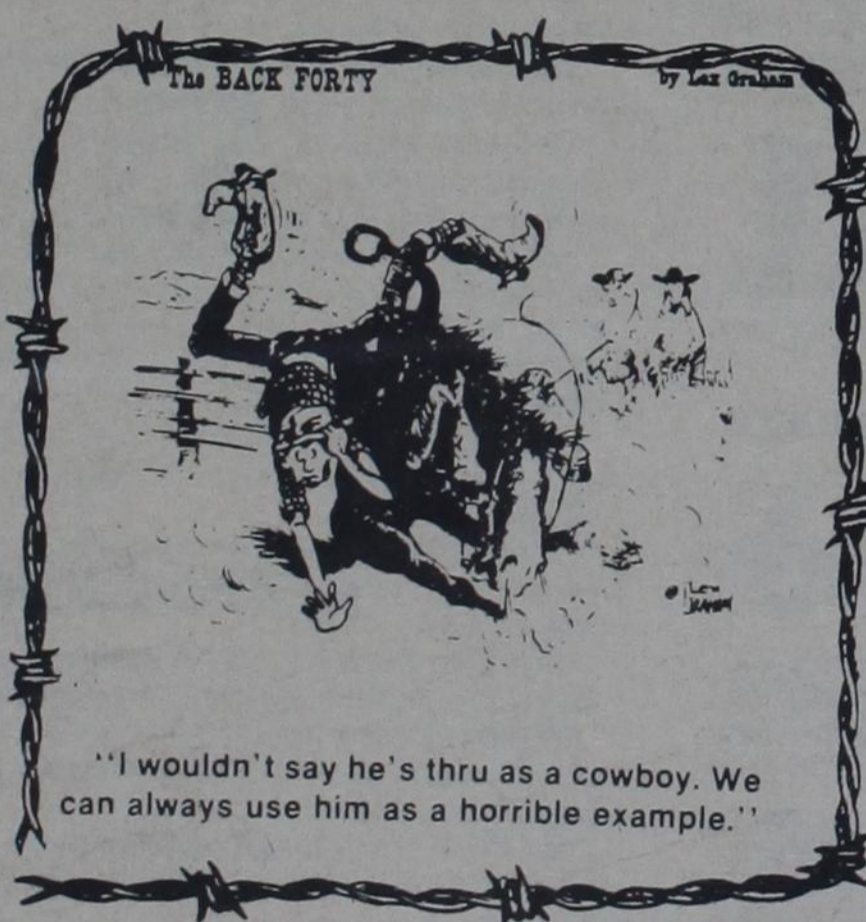
