

See Charts Inside **Commissioners Discuss Ambulance Contracts**

Eastland County commissioners Monday discussed Emergency Medical Services in Pct. 2,3, and 4. Contracts are expected to be signed at the next Commissioners meeting August 26.

Back representing Pct. 3 was L. T. Owen, who had surgery several weeks ago.

At the July 22 meeting the Commissioners agreed to provide \$15,000 in the next fiscal year to subsidize ambulance service in Pct. 1. The service is based at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Monday County Judge

Scott Bailey said:"We are somewhat committed to spending \$15,000 in each Precinct, or \$60,000."

This is about half the subsidy now being provided for each Precinct. But the Commissioners decided the County could

not afford the current subsidies so last month all Precincts were given notice that present contracts would end September 30.

Mike Moore, Cisco City Manager, said Monday, "I would like the termination of the contract rescinded."

County Voters Turn Down Constitutional Amendments-Approved Tax Exemptions

In the special elections obligation bonds to fi-Saturday, August 10, Eastland County voted against both State Constitutional amendments.

Amendment 1, in spite of confusing wording, would enable the County Education Districts to give school property tax exemptions and also to tax

personal property. This Amendment received a total of 818 votes 'For' and County.

nance loans to Texas students attending state colleges and universities. **This Amendment received** 768 votes 'For' and 960 'Against' in Eastland County. Around 1749 local per-

sons voted in the state portion of the Special Elections, with more than 10,000 registered voters in the county.

Unofficial totals for the 931 'Against' in the state show that Amendment 1 passed, and Amendment 2 would Amendment 2 failed. Voter turnout was gener-\$300 million in general ally light around the state.

Last Saturday the countywide Education District had three proposals, separate but similar to Amendment 1 in the state election. Through these local proposals voters could approve exemp-

tions on homesteads, exemptions for the elderly or disabled but could also turn down personal property taxes.

Eastland County voters gave a resounding 'Yes' to

Homestead and Disabled Exemptions, and a big'No' to personal property taxation. The vote was 1386

against and 82 for personal property taxations. In the school elections here the personal property tax proposal was placed on top of the ballot, apparently to call voter's attention to it.

The new Eastland County Education District is one of 188 taxing districts created by the state's latest education finance law. These districts are supposed to even out funding for schools in the school. The Eastland Conty Education District, like many others, follows the county lines.

General Rains Benefit County

At the County Commissioners meeting Monday Judge Scott Bailey shared a letter from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The letter was out of the Brownwood office, and was signed by William P. Crumley, P.E., District Design Engineer. The letter informed the Judge that 24-hour volume traffic counts will begin soon on all off-system, at-grade railroad crossings.

No further information ws available at the County Commissioners meeting as to how many railroad crossings will be involved in this work.

After the meeting a newspaper reporter contacted the Highway Department office in Eastland, and was told that the term "offsystem"refers to County road crossings only - that no crossings on Highways are excepted to be involved. The number of county crossings is excepted to be checked out by the Brownwood office, which is handling the project.



COUNTY INDIGENT HEALTH **CARE PROGRAM**

Eastland County will use the following rules and procedures to comply with its responsibility under the Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act.

Application can be requested from/at County Judge's Office, Eastland County Courthouse. Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact the County Judge's Office/Auditor's Office for assistance.

Eastland County will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.

2. Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources in required, if questionable.

3. Net income cannot exceed



To date in 1991, the Commission has levied more than \$438,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed more than \$836,000 in such penalties.





5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Eastland County and NOT RESIDING IN A HOSPITAL DISTRICT.

6. Applicants must provide all requested information and documentation requested or applications will be denied.

7. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.

8. Eastland Memorial Hospital has been designated as mandated provider for CIHCP for persons not in a hospital district.

A 15-pound largemouth bass hardly raises an eyebrow anymore at Lake Fork, unless it's lost a couple of pounds. Huh?

New York angler Scott Abish caught a 15.02pound lunker from Fork on July 17, good for 35th on the Texas Top 50 Largemouth Bass list (Top 50 list toward back of this pocket). The fish was scanned for an internal pit tag by David Campbell, biologist at the Tyler Fish Hatchery. After reading the pit tag, Campbell found out that Abish' fish had been caught before and entered into the Operation Share A Lone Star Lunker program.

The fish was entered previously by Jerry New

short time later. The bass was released once again into Fork.



Bullock cited an example of a teacher who retired in 1970 after 30 years service. Currently, that teacher receives only \$650 dollars per month while a teacher who retired in 1985 after the same 30 years of service receives, on average, \$1,251.

Under the Senate plan, the older teacher's average benefits would go up 21% or an additional \$136 per month, while the teacher retiring in 1985 would receive a 6% increase or \$75 on average. The raises will take ef-

fect in September, Bullock said.

The legislation now goes to a House-Senate conference committee.

A dermatologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston warns that parents should look for signs of head lice (pediculosis) as the new school begins.

"Parents may keep their child clean, however good personal hygiene does not prevent the spread of lice. Also, head lice can appear in anyone regardless of socioeconomic class."

Alzheimer's Disease Expected to Increase

A rapid increase in the number of elderly persons means more Alzheimer's disease cases than ever before.

In the year 2000, about two million Texans will be age 65 and older. Of these, more than 200,000 are expected to suffer from Alzheimer's disease. Though more than

180,000 Texans now have this illness, many people don't know much about Alzheimer's disease. "It is a dementing disease, a thief of minds, a destroyer of personalities, wrecker of family finances, filler of nursing homes," said Morris H. Craig, director of TDH's Alzheimer's Disease Program. "It also is a leading cause of death, after heart disease, cancer and stroke, causing 150,000 deaths each year nationwide. At this time, there are no known cures for this disease, and even the causes of it are not clear, though research continues."

Alzheimers disease begins almost imperceptibly as perhaps an inability to find the right word, especially nouns. the need to write many reminder notes or wearing the same clothes day after day. personalities

There are homes in which a wide range of disabilities are represented and homes with designated Alzheimer's units. In selecting a nursing home, families of Alzheimer's disease victims are advised to visit several to give some basis for comparison. Keep in mind that often there are waiting lists, so it's necessary to begin the selection process before placement becomes nec-





They will make their home in Colmesneil, where Sam is manager of Tejas Limousin Ranch.




