In the office of Mary Sue Lee, Director of Nurses at Eastland Memorial Hospital, hangs a painting of a treeshaded farm home, weathered and gray. The picture is a window into another world, a total contrast to the contemporary health-care scene around her. Corridors, decorated with soft biege and yellow, fan toward bright, clean rooms. The hospital, finished in 1975, is arranged with efficient units and life-saving equipment. It has 85 beds, and employs around 175 person in all the facilities. This includes 65 nurses, with 5 Doctors on the staff. Several other Doctors have Staff priviligies, and can In the midst of all this Mary Lee, R.N., will spend Texas Nurse Week-Oct. 15th to the 21st-at her usual duties. These include record-keeping in the office, attending Service Meetings, being responsible for staffing, and going from room to room to see how the patients are getting along. Rising Star. By this time there were two daughters, with the third one being born in Eastland County. Of these daughters two are nurses: Marcia Duggan, in Waco, and Mary Ann Lee in Abilene. The other daughter, Sherry Mitchell a homemaker and Secretary, lives in San Francisco.

In 1951 Mary Lee began work in the old Eastland Hospital and became Director of Nurses in 1958. In 1968 she left to become an Instructor for Vocational Nurses at Cisco Junior College. Two years later she began the operation of Graham Memorial Hospital in the new building. After her "retirement" she went back to assist Cisco Junior College for two more years in the L.V.N. training program. In 1976 a position as Director of Nurses opened up in the new Eastland Memorial Hospital, and Mary has served here since.

Nurse Lee is the first to credit the smooth operation of Eastland Memorial Hospital to her Staff. "We are quite departmentalized here. We have good personnel, with competent people to take care of each unit." Then she speaks of other things which help people get well, intangible but so very real. As a Baptist, she believes that faith in God is vital force. 'And the will to live--it is so necessary. But much suffering could be prevented, if people would only seek early diagnosis from their Doctor-and treatment."

Of all the jobs in the hospital, Mary Lee says, she most enjoys that of routine Floor Nurse. And a glance about the well-endowed hospital shows that it would be just an empty stage, just another vacant monument, without the nurses who walk the floors and furnish the

"I've been fortunate." Mary Lee finishes. "I've nursed many sick people, but I've never been sick. Just awhile out to have my babies -- that's all. I've been blessed with good health and good

Patients in the rooms would like to add: "And a compassionate heart and a steady hand on the pulse of a whole hospital!"



October 14-15 in May was National American Agriculture Movement Encampment time at the May Community Center. People from any places in Texas attended, and some brought the entire families. Out of State people came from Comanche, Oklahoma about 225 people attended the campout. Some came and went on Saturday. Some came the first time on Sunday. 

Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene stated that everyone who applies for an original social security number (SSN) must furnish evidence of age, identity and U.S. citizenship or alien status. In addition, Hammons said that applicants for duplicate or corrected SSN cards must

their identity. Besides meeting the evidence requirements, all applicants for original SSN's who are age 18 or older must come to a social security office for an in-person inter view. 



It is tempting to save leftover seed or seed collected from favorite plants. Old seed, especially if stored in a warm place, often has a lower germination rate and reduced vigor. If you do store seed, store in a refrigerator or cool

basement (35 to 50 degree) in tightly sealed containers. Many of the seeds collected from improved varieties are hybirds and will seldom come true. The offspring may have little or no resemblence to the parent

With cooler weather insects begin seeking a warmer place, and homes are ideal locations.

The most common household invaders are earwigs, crickets, pillbugs, spiders, millipedes and cockroaches. These pests will damage fabricks, feed on food products and may also transmit diseasecausing organizms within the home.

The first control step should start outside. Remove hiding places such as plant debris around the foundation and perform any needed

If insects are already inside the home, it is usually best to hire a certified pest control operator rather than to take care of the problem





"As It Looks From Here" **OMAR BURLESON** Congressman 17th District

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE WASHINGTON, D.C.--ON AUGUST 22, THE INTER-NAL REVENUE SERVICE published in the Federal Register what they call "Procedural Guidelines" for a network of Federal controls over private schools. Unless efforts are successful in setting aside this order, the wise. independence of private

may be greatly curtailed. THESE SCHOOLS COULD BE COMPELLED to implement a rigorous program of racial and ethnic quotas or be deprived of their tax-exempt status which is the basis of their financial existence. The directive would have the effect of law, like many such actions of this kind. The IRS imposes the regulation as they decide it ought to be and not as the public or even the stated will of Congress intended.

THE ANALYSIS OF THE IRS DEALS WITH TWO KINDS OF PRIVATE SCHOOLS targeted for what is absolutely punitive action. One type of school is called "discriminatory" which would mean they would lose their tax exemption with no more questions asked. The other type is what they call "reviewable" which entitles such a school a chance to prove that they are not discriminating because of race or sex. Both these embrace virtually every private school in the Nation.

THAT FEDERAL COURTS AND AGENCIES have recently professed to find discrimination in all-boys choirs and spankings greater frequency on boys than girls, the implication of this provision by itself would seem to be sufficient to lose their tax

for racial integration and which do not have a quota of at least 20 percent of the "minority" school population in their communities. Few of these types of schools would measure up to the IRS requirements and all would likely be presumed discriminatory until the schools proved themselves other-

IN A STATEMENT THAT 62 OF US IN THE CON-GRESS have submitted to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, protesting this action, we said that, "The purpose of tax legislation and regulation should be to raise revenue and not to coerce certain classes of individuals in society toward government ends." We further said that, "If these regulations are accepted as valid, this implies that we can be forced in the future to conform to the notions of social good proclaimed in Washington, not just as to race but as

to any matter.' IN THE REMAINDER OF OUR COMMENT ON THIS PROPOSED REGULATION we stated that, "Selection based on fair and unbigoted standards is a goal for which we hope all men strive. Guidance of this ideal, however, is not a governmental function. Government should govern the basic freedom in which we make selections. Other institutions such as the family and the church are the ones who have been given the province of guidling such selections in this Western society and should continue to provide this guidance. For government to have the authority to engineer its interpretation of equality is for government to become the most powerful discrimi-

nator of all.' COMMENTS ON THE IRS DIRECTIVE ARE OPEN UNTIL OCTOBER 23 and we hope that our protest, and others to the Internal Revenue Service, will cause the regulation to be dropped.

#### Winter Pastures Increasing

and more famrers and course, October plantings ranchers throughout Texas can sill provide high quality, are planting winter pastures lush spring forage. If

Why? There are several reasons, believes Dr. Neal favorable during late October Pratt, forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

First, the drought over most of the state this past summer has reduced hay supplies and pasturage. Also, winter pastures can provide high quality forage and can be put to good use in growing out stocker calves. A fourth reason for the increase in winter pastures is that farmers and ranchers are recognizing these many benefits.

For best results, winter pastures should be planted in late summer or early fall in most areas of Texas, emphasizes Pratt. Later plantings limit the amount of forage produced for late fall

COLLEGE STATION--More and winter pasture. Of temperatures, moisture and sunlight conditions are and November, good forage growth can be available for limited grazing during December and January.

> Planting in a prepared seedbed usually provides the greatest amount of forage, notes the specialist. However, planting during October into bermudagrass sod can minimize equipment time and costs of preparing a seedbed. Of course, lower forage production can be exptected during the winter.

> County Extension agents throughout the state have publications on winter pastures, including results of actual field demonstrations, adds Pratt.


