

have closed the door through which they entered into responsible life, and if they view in memory any of those ear. lier aberrations from the path of propriety, they do so with the fond tolerance we reserve for those we love-including ourselves.

Before I became a newspaperman I served a brief tenure as a school principal. In conditioning for that profession, I endured a considerable indoctrination of educational philosophy from Pestalozzi and Rousseau to Dewey and Thorndyke. But nothing of what I learned from between the covers of a book impresed so much as my own experience and observations.

Among the conclusions I have arrived at are these:

Kids are basically sound. There is a small element, of course, who are not, either because of mental or emotional deficiencies or because of what psychiatrists would call early traumatic experiences (the meaning of traumatic being related to damaging emotional blows or shock) and this is the element which makes the most noise.

Kids are adventuresome. They take chances because they like to see what is on the other side of their experiences and they have no concept until then of the law of cause and effect.

Kids like to learn for themselves, to make their own creative discoveries, which is the most effective route to the process of self-development we call education. One of the biggest social and political problems we have is communication — the transference of past experience to present awareness. It is difficult, indeed, to transfer an accurate sense of what has happened. We want our history glamorized. The battle of Cannae in which Hannibal defeated a superior Roman army in the second Carthagenian War reads like a romance, but if one could stand among the 50,000 rotting corpses left on that ancient field, the first hand experience would arouse only disgust and horror.



It is certainly difficult to live in the intimacy of the family circle a life so exemplary that children of that family find models in their parents, and those parents who accomplish it are entitled to be listed in a special catgory. I am not speaking of love, for even children can love a rotter; I am speaking of respect, which is healthily different.
