back to its original bricks and mortar. The same thing is happening to masonry construction all over the country. Already the brick walls and plastered interior of the store have become seamed with cracks caused by the sonic shaking it gets every time one of these faster-than-sound jets goes over. The big plate windows out front dance a 1,500-mile-an-hour twist every time one of these fast planes drags its earthquake over the town. It seems almost as if they will jump out of their channels. One of the windows at the Record office very nearly did a year or so ago. It split with a report like a high-powered rifle shot.

So, we have a bumper problem, and it is one for the architects. We are not going to be rid of jet-power. We are going to have more, not less, of this sort of thing. It is up to our engineers and architects to design buildings that can take this constant sonic punishment and remain intact. No doubt they will be equal to the only alternative we have, with further safety values in the event of a nuclear attack. In that event we would all profit, although it is certainly disgusting, not to say disheartening, to watch the costly structures we have erected to serve the needs of our time slowly disintegrate under the rewards of our own progress.
