
Local Contractor Expands Business



Sam Justice and his brother, Dave, of Potosi have completed their first house ready to move in their joint venture.

Sam Justice, a local contractor, and his brother, Dave, of Potosi have joined together in expanding their construction businesses to include the building of houses ready to be moved.

The Justice brothers returned to the Big Country from Oklahoma City about eight years ago, one shortly after the other. They had lived with their family in Cross Plains when they were growing up and each had a yen to return to this area.

The two have worked in construction for twenty years or more, in Oklahoma and Texas. Dave was Building Inspector for the City of Abilene for a few years after leaving Oklahoma City.

Pooling their experience resources, Sam and Dave decided a few months ago to use their spare time to build houses to be moved. Dave drives from Potosi to the construction site, Sam's property two miles east of Rising Star.

The Justices now have one house completed. The 960 sq. ft. house is completely finished except for the carpet, which will be installed after the house is set on its foundation. In this way, Sam said, the carpet would be kept new and fresh for the owner.

With other plans available, the brothers can build different sized houses, pricing them from \$9,500 up. The houses are to be

moved to the home buyer's lot; the foundation and setting the house on it are included in the price of the house. Sam cautions that lot owners should have clear deeds to their property before a house can be set there.

The Justices will also sell houses as hulls or partially finished, to be completed by the owner.

They offer 90% financing to qualified applicants.

May just said goodby to an old landmark located on the north corner of the blinking traffic light where Highway 183 and Comanche Avenue in-

The building has really been an eyesore for May for some five or six years, ever since a large transport truck driver lost control of his vehicle and slammed into the front of the beautiful old store building, knocking out members

all the roof braces and letting the front of the building fold up. Since then, winds, rain and time have added to the disintegration.

The May 4-H Club offered to dismantle the derelict, and owner Charles M. Campbell agreed to a contract allowing the club one year to complete the job of clearing the lot and stacking the materials.

job this week. Fifty-three volunteers participated. Area residents came with two large trucks, four

pick-ups and a large trailer, loading and moving the materials as fast as the 4-H'ers tore the building down. Men, women, boys

and girls all helped, and the job ran smoothly. Barker, supervisor for the project, made sure precautions were enforced for the sake of the boys' and girls' safety. Campbell did not assume any responsibility for ac-

4-H leaders Kay Whiteaker, Nell West and Lila Lancaster were on hand all day. The report says the women and girls worked all day and did a

good job. The May Home Demonstration Club furnished and served the noon meal. 4-H members served plenty of cold drinks for the day and Anderson General Store furnished the ice.

This landmark building was erected before 1902, and has housed a number of businesses, including May Post Office, O.E. Wilkerson Drug, Willitt Grocery, Myrtle Brown Drug, Nichols Barber Shop and many more.
