Members of the First Baptist Church were on their knees this week. As a matter of fact, as Robert Butler remarked, looking over the crowd on the parsonage lawn Monday evening, "You never saw so many Baptists on their knees at one time in your life!"

It wasn't altogether a posture of piety, although devotion to their church and its cause was the greatest influence behind it, and their new pastor, the Rev. L. R. Pendley, was the inspirer.

The congregation, some 60 members of it, was planting grass. This act of faith—and who says this isn't a dry country—was fortified by a good well the church owns on the rear of its lot, and motivated by a desire to make the parsonage and adjoining church grounds a worthy adjunct to the already beautiful building in which the church worships.

## Events To Be Run At Stephenville Next Saturday

The Rising Star Wildcats, with another district title already in their trophy case, go to Stephenville Saturday of this week, seeking further honors in the regional track and field meet of the Texas Interscholastic League.

The Cats qualified in ten events by taking first and second places in these events at the district track meet at Bangs, a meet in which they squeezed out a victory over the heavily and now revenge-minded Bangs Dragons.

Boys and the events in which they qualified for the regional are:

- 440-yard relay—Gene Burns; Dwight Carter, Bobby Burns, Franz Pittman and Doug Fisher;
- 220-yard dash—Bobby Burns;
- 100-yard dash—Bobby Burns;
- 440-yard dash—Dwight Carter;
- 120-yard high hurdles—Danny Schaefer;
- 180-yard low hurdles—Robert Clarke;
- Mile run—Ronald Hunt and Willie Ezzell;
- Mile relay—Jimmy Rutherford, Danny Schaefer, Dwight Carter, Franz Pittman;
- Discus—Kenny Butler;
- Shot put—Danny White and Kenny Butler.

Preliminaries at the regional will be run Saturday morning and the finals in the afternoon.

In the Dragon Relays at Bangs April 15, subsequent to the district meet, the Cats placed third behind Goldthwaite and Bangs. The Rising Star boys placed first in the mixed mile relay and in the discus which Kenny Butler threw 132 feet.

Dwight Carter, 440, Franz Pittman and Danny Schaefer, 330, and Jimmy Rutherford, 630, ran the heats of the mixed mile with Jimmy besting his Goldthwaite in the final heat by two or three yards.

The Cats ran third in the mile relay with Rutherford, Schaefer, Carter and Pittman running. Ronaud Hunt ran a 4:53.5 in the mile, a considerable improvement over his former records.

A group of Sophomores and Freshmen ran an 8-man mile and did a fine job, according to Coach Weldon Hill. The boys were Ronnie Cotton, Robert Wilson, Jackie Bibby, Carl Clark, Weldon Starks, James Gerhardt, Curtis Bishop and Ronnie Green. Each ran a 220-yard dash.

In the Grade School and Junior track meet at Comanche Saturday, the Rising Star Juniors placed fourth with 18 points.

Junior boys were Mike Rhodes, Tony Geyer, Craig Schaefer, Ronnie Wilson and Dalton Hughes. Dalton, however, came down with the measles and did not run. Tony Geyer won the 60-yard high hurdles and Mike Rhodes the 8-pound shot put. Mike Rhodes took second place and Tony third in the discus.

The grade school squad ran the May Grade School a close race for first place picking up 36 points to 41 7/10th for May.

Tony Long won the 440; Carter Hounsell the 60 high hurdles, and Dick Clarke the high jump.

The Grammar boys also won second places in the 440 relay, the 100 low hurdles, the 50 dash, the 880 relay and the discus; two third places and two fourths.

## Nursing Home Open House Sunday Will Exhibit Growth

Twilite Acre Nursing Home will show itself to the public Sunday afternoon, coincidentally with the opening of a new wing—the third addition made to this Rising Star residence for the elderly since it was opened in 1963. The home will have Open House from 2 to 5 p. m. and everybody is invited.

The new wing, constructed at the rear, contains four private and four semi-private rooms, offering accommodations for 12 more elderly guests.

In addition a separate and masonry building has been built to house a laundry, completely equipped with washers, driers, extractor, mangle and so forth, to handle the laundry of some 60 residents and the staff. In the same building is a cold storage department.

The Home is semi-fireproof in construction, of a brick veneer design, and it contains within its thousands of square feet of floor space most of the essentials of a small community.

It is a hotel with kitchen and dining quarters, facilities for visiting and entertainment, baths, therapy rooms, and even a bar-

ber and beauty shop. It is a hospital with most of the features of a modern institution for the care of the sick except X-Ray and operating facilities. A staff of 13 nurses and aids keep individual charts and medication records on all of the residents under medical treatment and supervise or administer prescribed therapy. A doctor treating a patient there has the same records and assistance that he would have in a well-ordered hospital.

Most of the residents of the home prefer the showers where they may sit or even be bathed in a wheel chair, Mrs. Vernon Walker, who is in charge of the nursing staff, said.

All furnishings and physical accommodations of the home are the most modern. There is even a portable device with which the smallest nurse can lift and transport a person three times her own weight. The furniture is sturdy, attractive and comfortable, the decor charming, and central air conditioning and heating insure the comfort of the residents at all times.

But it is the homelike atmosphere, the personal interest and the care that each resident receives, and the sense of security that the home provides for its people that is the distinguishing feature of the Twilite Acre. This is the reason that the home is always full and its rooms spoken for in advance.

From the standpoint of community economics, Twilite Acre with its 19 employees—more when the new wing is in operation—and its heavy purchases of foods, utilities and other supplies is one of Rising Star's best assets.

Mr. and Mrs. Newton and their staff hope that the people of Rising Star will take advantage of their invitation Sunday afternoon. They have something to show.

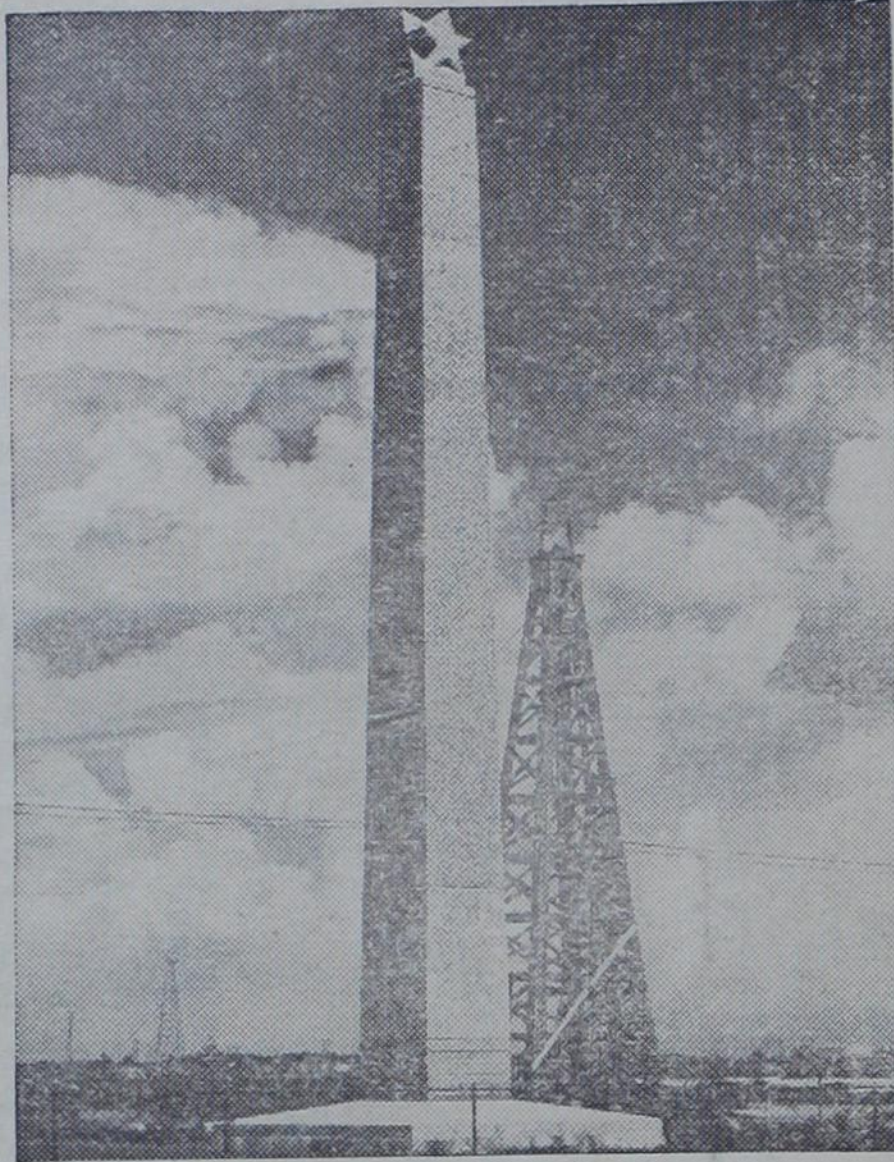
**12 Members Attend WSCS Meet Monday**

**Browsing With Bev**

Spring sewing for homemakers is well under way. Many new fabrics are available and some of the more familiar ones are back with new finishes and characteristics.

Bonded fabrics are plentiful in the form of laces, knits, or woven fabrics with a tricot or taffeta type backing. This backing is attached with a heat locking process and makes underlining a garment unnecessary.

Since the backing makes the straightening of the fabric difficult, check the fabric before purchasing it to see that it is not off-grain. It has usually been preshrunk, so shrinking is not necessary.

Choose a pattern with few seams and without intricate details. Lay the pattern on the right side of the fabric, following a lengthwise rib. It is easier

to handle if only one layer is cut at a time. To eliminate bulkiness on bodice fronts, bodice backs or jacket fronts, cut facings as part of the main garment, rather than a separate piece.

For ease in sewing, use a thread suitable for the outer fabric, a medium to light tension and pressure, a medium to long stitch and fine to medium machine needles. Since ripped machine stitching may show, hand baste and fit the garment before permanently stitching the seams. If the fabric is extremely bulky, use a matching lining fabric for facings. Understitch collars, facings and pocket edges where an underseam might show.

Press darts, using a pressing ham to give shape to the garment. Press them toward the center of the garment. Bulky darts can be split and trimmed slightly. Press seams open. If they do not lie flat, top stitching can be added close to the seamline. When pressing the garment either a steam or a dry iron with a damp press cloth can be used. Use a temperature for the outer fabric.

To prevent the hemline from showing on the right side of the garment attach the hem only to the bonded lining.

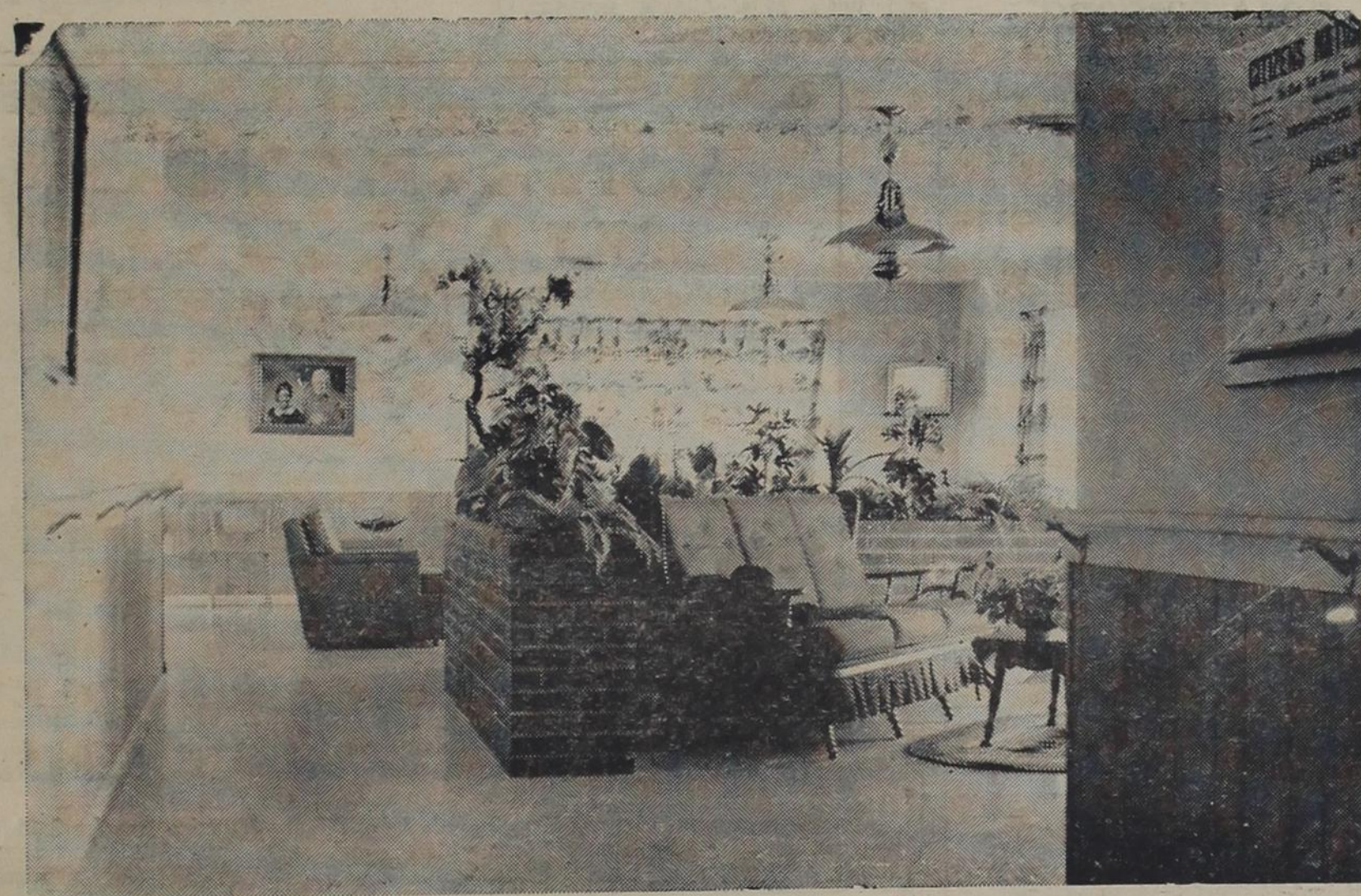

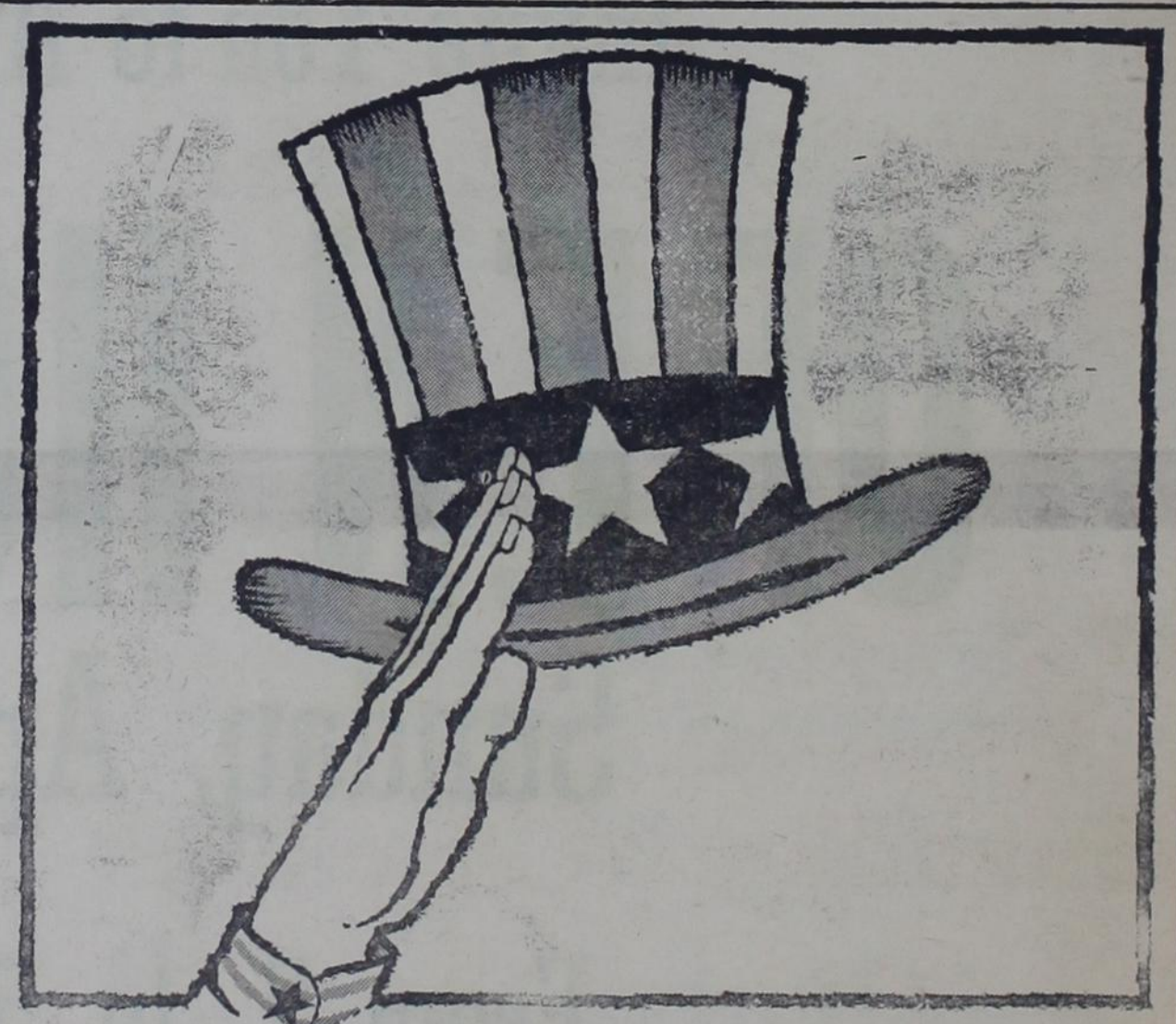

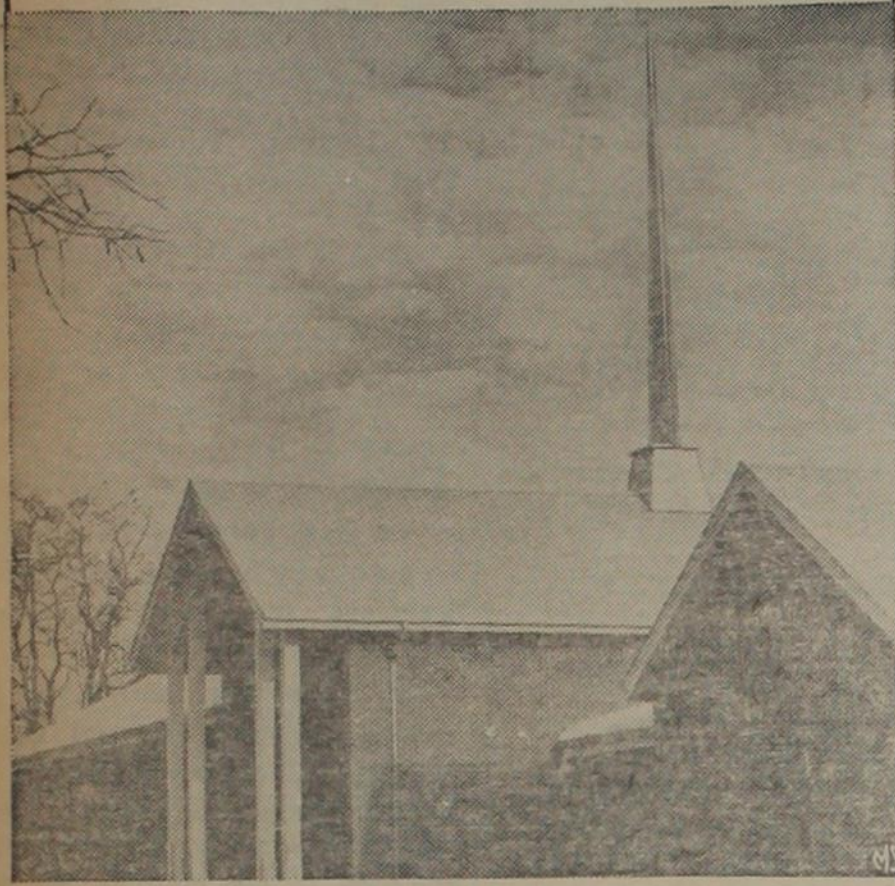

## Ruble Johnson Dies At Wichita Falls April 3

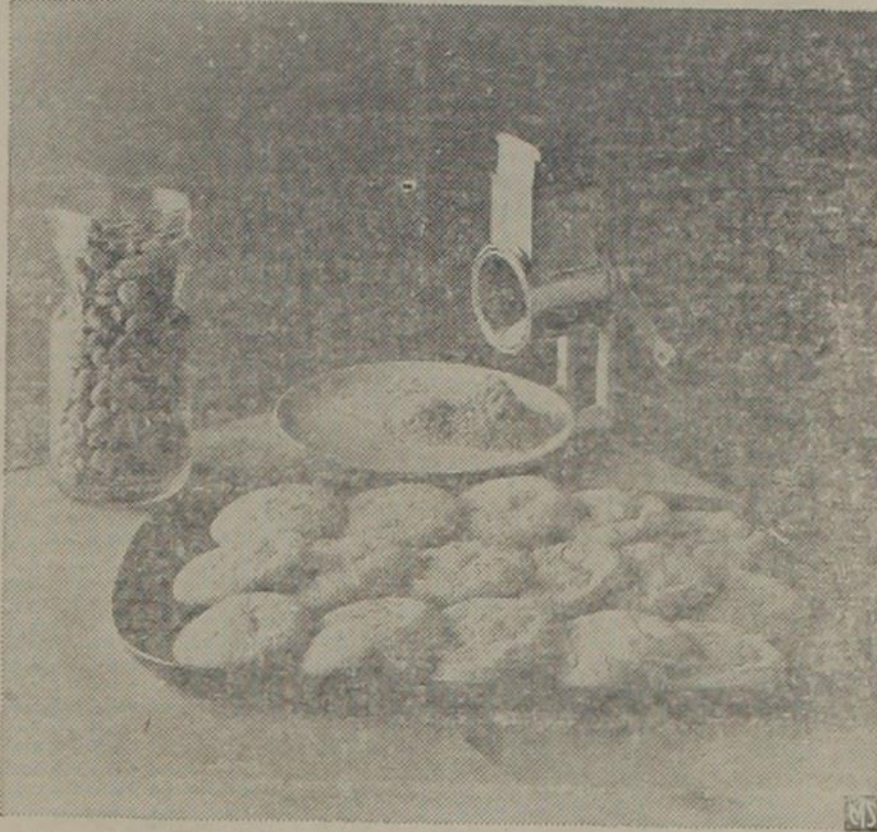

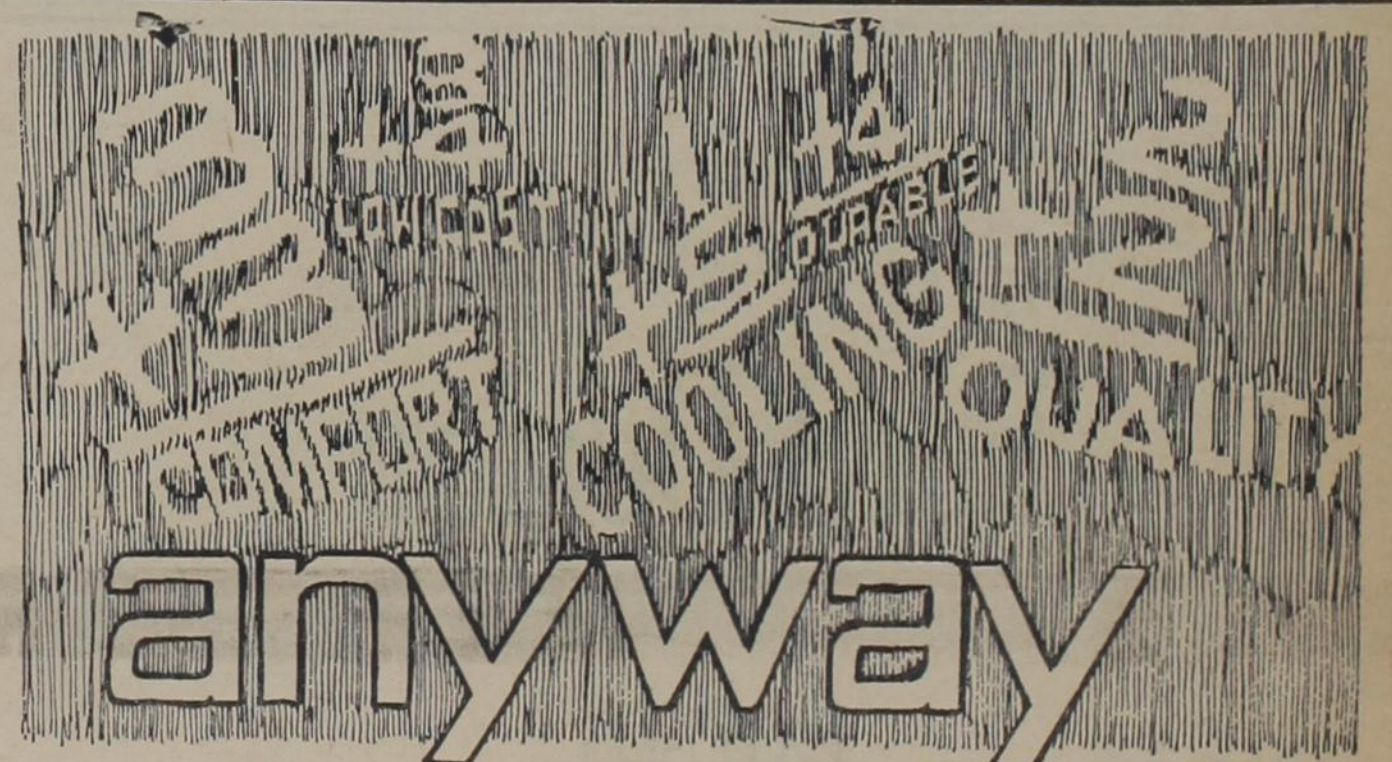

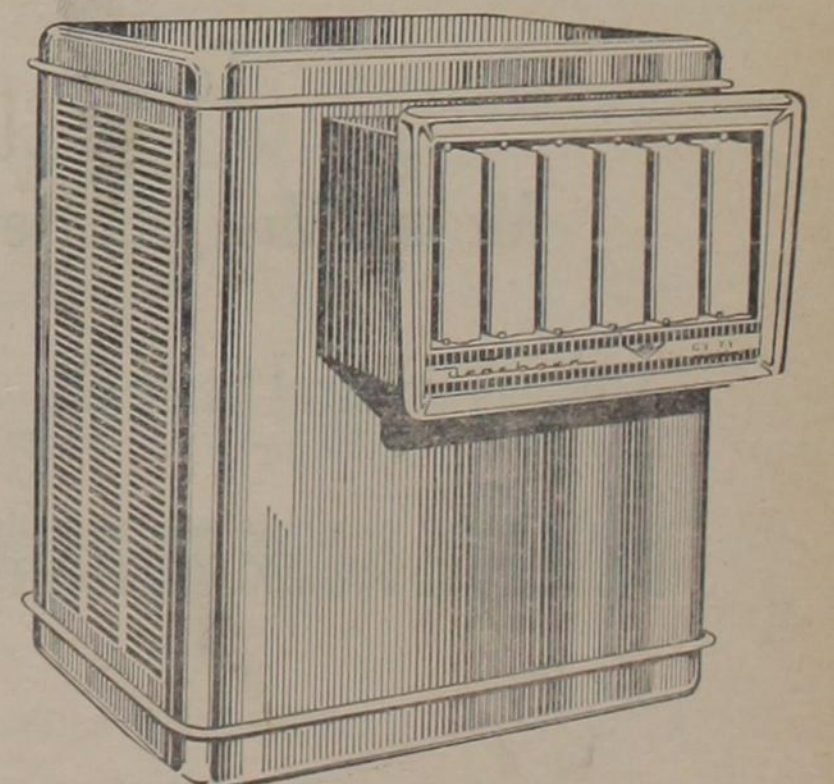

**HIGGINBOTHAM'S**

**It Has Been**

In this issue of The Rising Star there is a picture of an albino bluebonnet grown in the yard of Mrs. Flara Westerman, which indeed is a rare freak of nature.

Things of unusual growth and discovery have been a part of our community for all the years of its life and development.

There is the story of the tall, slender trees that were much higher than any common variety of trees in this section—trees which once covered the Rising Star territory thousands of years ago, possibly before the prehistoric animals that roamed the wilds of the State of Pennsylvania and were known to have inhabited the plains of Central Texas.

Some years ago, 1934, to be exact, several of these trees were located and dug up on the J. W. Steddum farm about five miles southwest of Rising Star. Thousands of small round rocks that were thought to be nuts or fruit of some kind were scattered profusely over 35 acres of the farm.

A large trunk was discovered 80 or 100 feet in length lying about four feet under the surface of the ground on the side of a gently sloping field Mr. Steddum had under cultivation. Workers succeeded in removing about 30 feet of the trunk; the brittle sandstone substance of the rock was broken into several sections while moving it from its bed. One 10-foot section was taken out whole and, according to a statement by Mr. Steddum, it was the longest single piece to have been moved out of the area since the discovery of the deposits.

Out of the thousands of smaller pieces of petrified tree trunks and limbs came material used in the building of the present city hall in Rising Star. Not many cities can boast of a municipal building constructed of its own "Petrified Forest."

The small round rocks scattered over the area were hollow

when cracked open and some of them contained bits of wood and splinters of charcoal, as if they had ben burned.

Mr. Steddum realized profit on the underground trees taken from his land. He sold several of them for a good price. He was paid \$100 for the 10-foot piece of a big tree removed by Tom Bryant, Cross Plains oil operator. There was another trunk lying near the surface of the ground only a few feet from the "big one," and this was dug up a short time after.

Scores of plows were dulled and ruined on trunks lying near the surface on the land in cultivation. The market value of the trees was the only feature that prevented Mr. Steddum from losing money because of black-smith bills.

Curious visitors from all over the State and from other states were numerous, carrying off many of the unique specimens found, some of them to be used as borders for flower beds or as mantle piece decorations. One man found a number of large, hollow "nuts" and planned to plant native cactus in them.

Who knows what lies under this ground we walk on?

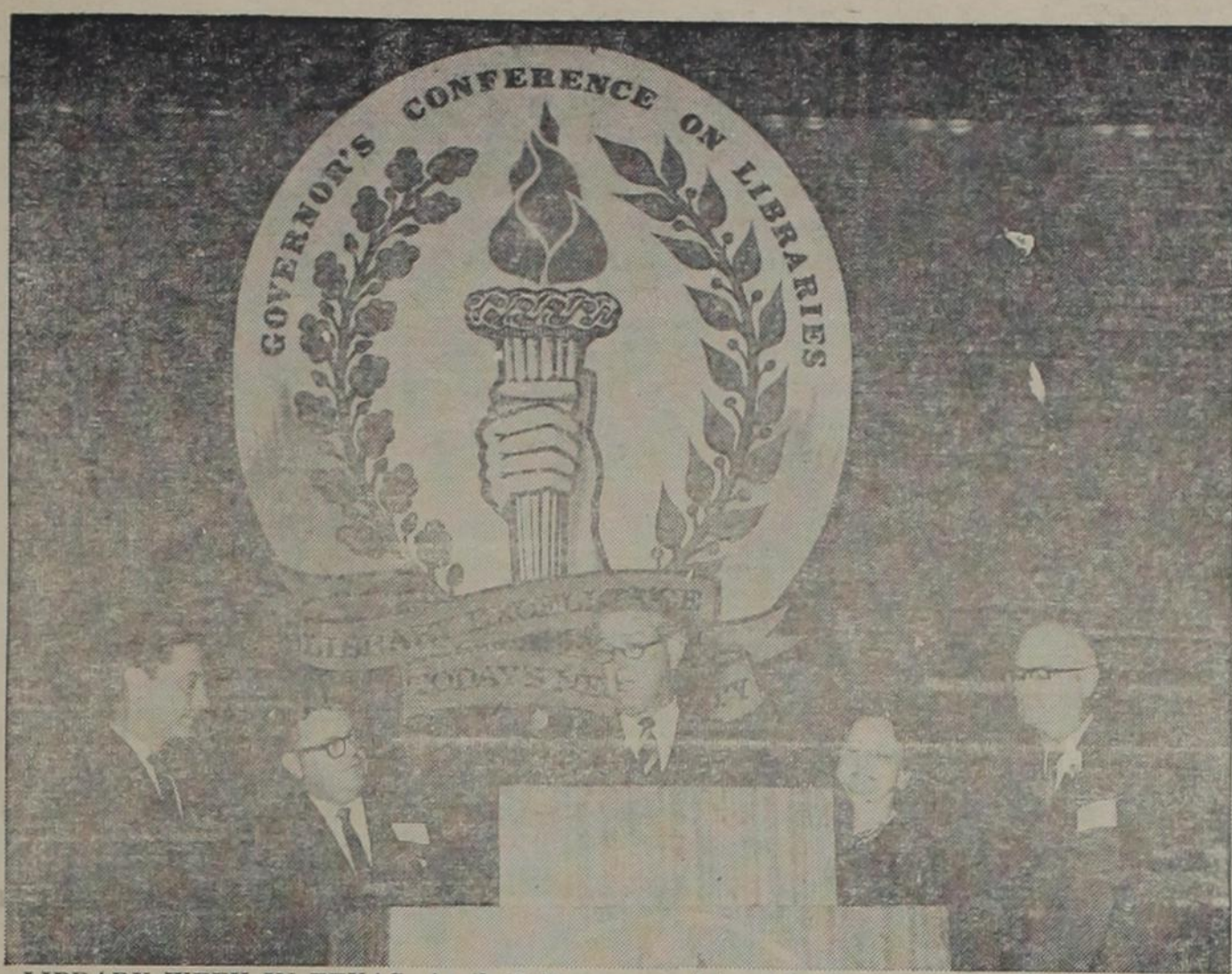

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**

**WHEN GUEST SUES HOST**

"One of these days," mused a well-meaning homeowner "I've got to tighten up that loose railing on the back porch."

But for months he kept postponing the needed repairs. One day a woman visitor leaned on the railing, broke through, and plunged to the ground—nine feet below.

In due course the woman sued her host for damages, and won the case. The judgment came to \$5,000.

Claims of this kind, by guest against host, are arising with growing frequency. They illustrate the fact that, although your home is your castle you with due regard for the safety of your visitors.

How great is your responsibility? Clearly you are not liable for an accident if the premises are kept in proper condition. Thus a guest who tripped on a carpeted stairway failed to collect damages, since there was nothing defective in either the carpet or the steps.

Even if there is a defect, it must be substantial in order to support a damage claim.

For example: A three-year-old visitor stumbling on a driveway, bruised his cheek on a little mound of cement. Strictly speaking, the mound—about the size of a saucer—did not belong there. But a court held it was too trivial a defect to win any blame on the homeowner.

Furthermore, to justify legal liability, the defect must have a cause-and-effect connection with the accident. A guest who hurt his leg jumping on a diving board was denied damages, because he could not prove any connection between his injury and a slight looseness in the board.

On the other hand, the law usually does not hold you responsible for the household booby trap (like that loose railing), known to you but not likely to be discovered by outsiders.

You must not let the unsuspecting visitor fend for himself amid hidden dangers you have created. As a matter of law, as well as etiquette, that is no way to treat a guest.
