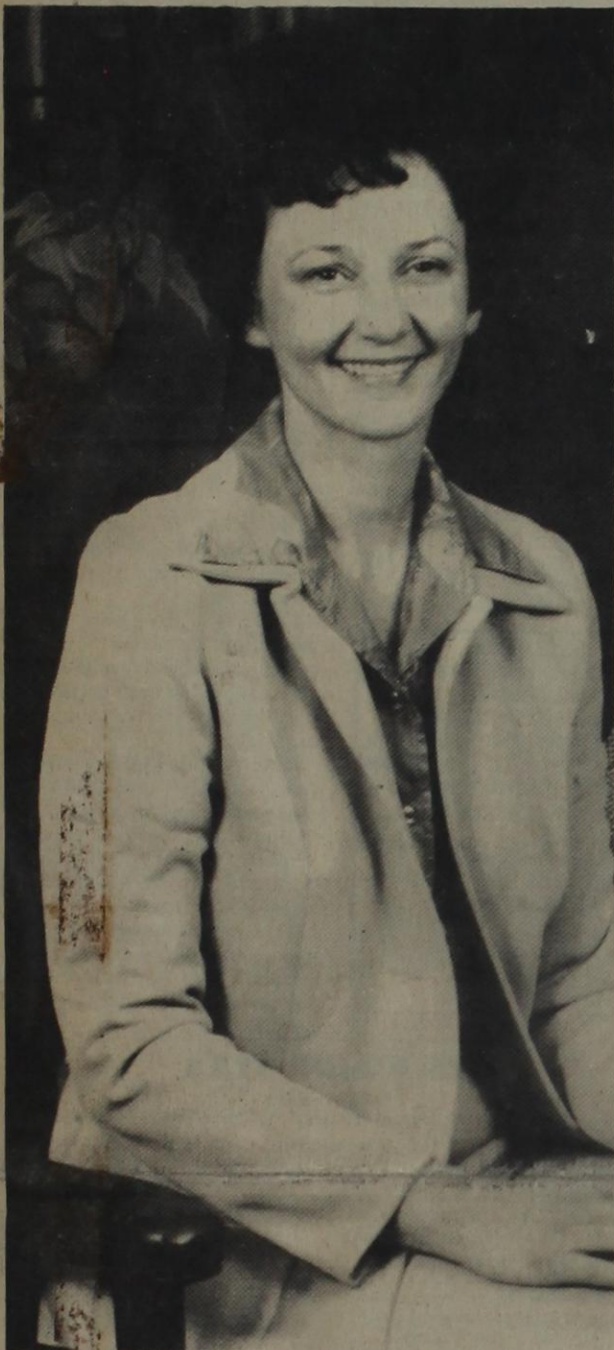


Tragedy Hits Small Town Of Rising Star As Young Mother Of Two Is Killed In Plane Crash

Tragedy struck the small, quiet town of Rising Star Tuesday evening as word was received of the death of Sharon Ann Geye, 32, as the 19-passenger Prinair Airline commuter plane her and other Texas Baptist from the Clyde, Abilene area crashed shortly after take-off from St. Croix airport in the U.S. Virgin Islands. The crash occurred at 7:22 a.m. CDT. Also killed in the crash were Stephen Sapaugh, 15; Jack Rosinbaum, 49; J.O. Connel Jr. 52, and his wife Betty Connel 50 all of Clyde, the co-pilot William Pineiro of Mayaguez, Puerto Rico; Inez Bradley of St. Croix and Rev. Godfrey Tennessee of Jamaica.

The twelve-member church group left Monday at 7 a.m. from Dallas-Fort Worth airport and flew non-stop to San Juan, Puerto Rico. On Tuesday morning, the Prinair (Puerto Rico International Airlines) Flight No. 610 took off towards its destination in St. Kitts, 125 miles away in the Leeward Islands. It had stopped in St. Croix to pick up 8 passengers. Prinair's De Havilland Heron is specifically designed for flying between islands. It is a relatively small aircraft with single seats on each side of the aisle. The

major advantage it has for "island hopping" is that it has four engines.

The fatal crash was the first ever at Alexander Hamilton International Airport and the third in 10 years for Prinair Airlines, according to the "San Juan Star".

The Texas group was on one of several mission trips that had been made over the past years under the direction of Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Clyde. The eight adults and four young people were on their way to Antioch Baptist Church on St. Kitts Island for a 10 day Bible School and evangelistic meeting. They also planned to help with revivals and build some church pews during the visit. Sharon Geye was especially looking forward to the missionary trip to St. Kitts Island, where the islanders had recently purchased a number of sewing machines and Sharon was going to teach them how to use them.

Survivors include 7 other West Texans, among them the Rev. Riley Fugitt who remains in critical or "very guarded" condition after suffering 13 broken ribs and multiple internal injuries. Caleb Watson, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Watson of Clyde was

listed in guarded condition at Charles Harwood Memorial Hospital in Christiansted. Other Texans surviving the crash and in fair condition at Harwood Memorial were Mrs. Preston (Murlene) Porter of Abilene; Pam Patton, Angelo State student from Clyde and Mrs. Riley Fugitt of Clyde.

Bill Kelly, a charter pilot who witnessed the crash, said that the four engine de Havilland Heron climbed steeply to 150 feet, stalled and veered to the right, crashing into a cargo area. The plane then cart-wheeled and broke apart. The plane was ripped longitudinally across the right side. A federal official said that the absence of fire prevented an even greater loss.

Frank McAdams of Washington, D.C. a member of the National Transportation and Safety Board said, "I'm somewhat amazed there wasn't a fire." McAdams said because the plane's wing fuel tank did not rupture and because the plane hit the ground in an unpaved area, chances of sparks igniting fuel spilled in the crash were lessened.

Bob Burgin, investigator in charge of the National Transportation and Safety Board said the Prinair De Havilland Heron was 1,000 pounds overloaded and was also out of balance. The rear of the plane contained too much weight compared with the front of the craft, pushing the balance "well beyond the normal limit," Burgin said Friday. Test data is not available on the handling effects of the poor weight distribution and we don't know whether the pilot could have controlled it or not," he said.

The plane crashed because it apparently stalled—its wings were at the wrong angle to the plane's path and it was moving too slowly, National Transportation Safety Board member Francis McAdams said.

Officials state that it often takes up to six months before final data is announced pertaining to the cause of the crash.

Although the crash occurred Tuesday, the bodies of the deceased were not brought back to the states until early Saturday morning. Delays resulted when coffins had to be shipped from Miami to St. Croix. Further delays

occurred when autopsies were performed as part of an investigation conducted by the Federal Aviation Administration, National Transportation Safety Board, Prinair Airlines and the Airline Pilots Association.

Three bodies arrived early Saturday morning at D-FW. Among those was that of Sharon Geye.

Services for Sharon, the first of the crash victims to be buried, were held at 4 p.m. Saturday in the First Baptist Church in Rising Star.

Hundreds of people were present to share their love and respect for this young mother of two and a vital part of the community. The Church, balcony, aisles, and hallways were filled to capacity. The church altar was a solid mass of flowers in tribute to Mrs. Geye.

The service was led by Rev. Dick Williams, pastor of the First Baptist Church. He was assisted by Dan Mitchell, Baptist layman of Clyde.

Williams told those assembled, "Most of us never open ourselves to the opportunity of getting hurt in the service of the Lord," and "I sometimes wonder, 'have I given my best to Jesus, who gave His life for me?'" Sharon's life was one of commitment—to the Lord and her students.

Mitchell recounted special moments he had spent with Sharon during the Geye's six years in Clyde. He would accompany her on visits to the Nursing Home as she made her monthly visit with the girls from the Homemaking Department. The residents always looked forward to her visits which always brightened their day. She always had a smile on her face for everyone—young and old. She was always giving of herself to others. Mitchell said, "She planted everlasting seeds of love in each of our hearts." He emphasized Mrs. Geye's dedication to children through her work in Sunday School classes and in high school where she taught Home Economics.

Sharon began her teaching career in Belton. She and her family then moved to Abilene where she taught for one year. The Geye's then moved to Clyde where she taught six years before returning to her home in Rising Star.

Sharon had taught

the past year in May High School. Superintendent M.H. Buchanan termed her "one of the best teachers in the state. We are really lucky to have had her." He went on to say, "She was always taking the initiative with school affairs and participated in everything that went on with the schools." In addition to her teaching duties, Mrs. Geye was sponsor of "The Tiger", the May Annual, FFA and the Beta Club.

Sharon was a member of the First Baptist Church and also served as an adult Sunday School teacher.

Sharon was born August 13, 1946 in Fort Worth, Texas.

She married Terry Geye, July 31, 1965 in Rising Star.

Survivors include her husband; a daughter Debbie, 13 an eighth grader at May; and a son, Brandon 5, all of home; two brothers, Don and Mike Donham and her mother, Helen Donham of Rising Star. She was preceded in death by her father, Capt. R.D. Donham in 1953.

Pallbearers were Doug Ford, George Welch, James Alexander, Jimmy Seider, Winford Hogan and Lee Savell.

A memorial fund for Mrs. Geye has been set up at the First State Bank of Rising Star and the People's State Bank in Clyde.

Fifty-two junior high schoolers—four from as far as Michigan—are taking part in the Gifted Students Institute at Texas A & I University for two weeks, from July 22-Aug. 4.

The whickering siren of an ambulance is an echo of anxiety, but today in Rising Star the lack of it is more frightening than its reality.

A person in this community who suffers a heart attack or a serious injury wherein time is of the essence, gives up many precious minutes, sometimes an hour or more of hope because it is silent.

We have no ambulance service; the telephone does not answer no matter how frantically we ring!

A swift, professional means of transportation to a doctor or hospital is certainly one of the most important assets a community can have.

But in Rising Star we are forced to depend upon the services provided in neighboring communities—at double the time required, or the chance that some private means may be available.

Transportation by car is a desperate alternative. Serious cases must be carried with the patient lying down, and often enough skilled personnel and oxygen equipment are indispensable to survival between the sit and medical aid.

In recent weeks we have had several exciting instances in which these facts have been emphasized. In one sense we have been fortunate; there have been no fatalities en route. We are fortunate also that there have not been more cases, considering the high median age of our population.

But the 'sword of Damocles' hangs over the head of every citizen in this town, and none will know when the hair will break, the blow will fall, and the telephone will not be answered. No one, not even the youngest or the healthiest, is immune from chance.

Highway Use Tax

(City,State)—August 31,1979, is the date by which most owners of large trucks, truck-tractors, or buses must file a Federal Highway Use Tax Return, Form 2290, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

The tax year for the Highway Use Tax begins July 1, 1979, and runs through the following June 30, 1980. Vehicles placed in service after July must have Form 2290 filed with the taxpayer's Service Center by the last day of the month following the month a vehicle is used on a highway for the first time.

According to the IRS, the tax generally applies to single unit trucks weighing 13,000 pounds or more, 2-axled truck-tractors weighing 5,500 pounds or more, 3 or more axled truck-tractors regardless of weight, trucks of 9,000 or more pounds equipped for use in combinations, and buses with a gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds.

Revenue from the Highway Use Tax program assists states in financing the Interstate Highway System, but the tax is imposed on those vehicles using any public highways, city streets, state roads and interstate roadways.

Form 2290 and the free IRS Publication 349, "Federal Highway Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-Tractors, and Buses," are available from IRS District Offices.
