Decision to hold the fair sometime late in September was made by an unopposed vote of the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce at its noon luncheon at the Elite Cafe Tuesday.

The chamber delegated authority for the organization and conduct of the fair to a committee of three to be chosen by the officers of the CofC and agreed to let this group select suitable dates. for holding this popular fall event.

Decision to again hold the fair was taken after the recent good rains had given prospect of a good crop and had brought a spirit of optimism and confidence to the community.

Last year's remarkable success in spite of the drouth was also considered as an encouraging indication that there is a place for such a community event and a desire on the part of the people to hold it as an annual attraction. In submitting the matter to a vote, President B. A. Butler told the group that before they voted in favor of holding the fair, they should be ready to cooperate in making the program a success.
