Please note the contract printed below whereby the May 4-H Club leaders and C.M. Campbell are not responsible for accidents.

"We, the undersigned, May 4-H Club leaders, do declare that this is a 'No-Fault' guarantee to Charles M. Campbell in the

event of any and all accidents which may occur during the dismantling of his building on Lot 21, Block 1, Parson's Addition, May, Texas, which is on the Northeast corner of the intersection of Highway 183 and East Comanche Avenue in the town site of May, Texas.

"As the building is dismantled, the material will be delivered and stacked at the east property line of Lot 26 of the Ford Addition at May, Texas.

"This is to be completed within one year from the date of signing at which time this agreement will be finished and terminated."

It bears the signatures of Kay Whiteaker, Guy Nell West and Lila Lancaster.

"I will not hold the May 4-H Club, its leaders or any other participants in this project liable for any damage to the said property during this activity."

Abilene Firm Files To Drill County Wildcat

Edd Wittie Enterprises Inc. of Abilene has filed for permit to drill the No. 1-A Hurley, a 1,600-ft. wildcat for oil two miles north of Nimrod, Eastland County.

The location is in a 98-acre lease in the H&TCRR Co. Survey, Sec. 108, Blk. 3.

Otto Bendorf of

Breckenridge has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 109 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland

County's H&TCRR Co. Survey, Sec. 50, Blk. 4. The venture has been designated as the No. 6 Abbott-Reynolds. Drillsite is seven miles northeast of Cisco.

Wichita Falls has finalized a new oil producer in Stephens County's Regular Field. The well is designated as the No. 10 G.F. Kennedy, pumping oil at the rate of eight barrels per day on open choke.

The No. 2 B. Emfinger and No. 3 B. Emfinger "A" are both located in the Stephens Regular Field. They have a proposed total depth of 4,000 ft.

The Nos. 3 & 4 B. Emfinger both have a proposed total depth of 2,000 feet. They are located in the Stephens Regular Field.

The No. 4A B. Emfinger "A" is in the L.C. Clevinger Strawn Field. It has a projected total depth of 2,000 feet.

RAW Energy Inc. of Weatherford has staked location for a 4,800-ft. developmental well in Palo Pinto County's Mineral Wells Field. The Tragedy of a Powerless Christian: Acts 1:8. But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. Messages concerning the Holy Spirit are as often or more often taught and preached in our churches than perhaps any other single subject. In spite of this, there is a widespread, crying need in our churches for a real power of God awakening among God's people. We are sorely lacking in the power of the Holy Spirit in our everyday lives. Too many people know nothing of constant, moment by moment victory but are constantly falling before temptation. Their association with

the Holy Spirit is only now and then...like a friend who calls a greeting in passing by. They have no abiding joy and gladness. They do not live in any deep, full all-conquering sense. They simply exist. Instead of a robust, abounding, all-victorious participation in the life of an all-victorious Christ, they are as feeble as children, and too often utterly powerless in the presence of temptation.

My personal experience: I can remember, only too well, that for years my conscience troubled me because of my inconsistent, low-level Christian life. I wanted to work for God. Instead of that, I was up and down, now conquering, now defeated, repenting, then falling again. I was robbed of

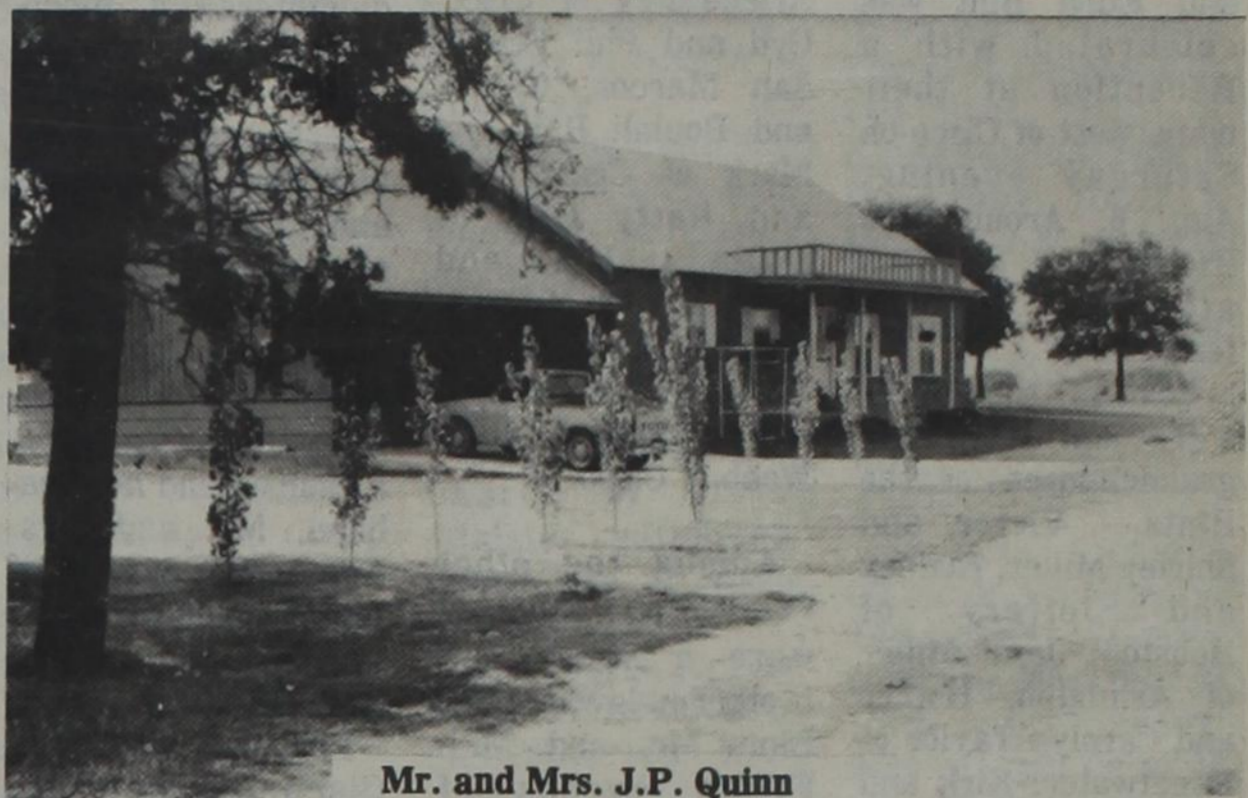
the peace and joy which was my Christian heritage...ashamed of the broken vows and unfulfilled promises to God (and there were many of them)...bitterly lamenting, in my better moments, the shame and dishonor done to my Christ and His cause by my many and repeated failures and defeats. I knew there was a place in God of abiding victory, and yet I was constantly falling before the assaults of the world, the flesh, and the devil. I knew of my Lord's peace and yet my soul was often full of uncertainty and unrest. In my prayers, praise, and songs, I would crown Christ "Lord of all" but much of my life seemed at the mercy of His foes. I'd hear of an exultant, triumphant faith that conquers the world and defeats the Prince of darkness and yet my soul was sorely discouraged by

endless, humiliating defeats. I knew my Lord wanted me to have a constant zeal for Him and to be always toiling for the salvation of others, but the most I could do was now and then a small, spasmodic effort without any zeal power behind it and very little results to accompany it. Many of you have had similar experiences of your own. Looking at our past, the best among us can see such ghastly gaps between our ideal and our actual life that we dare not find fault with others. And yet, thank God, many tasted and do know in glad certainty that there is a higher Christian life than the low type so fearfully common and so widely popular. (More on this next week.)

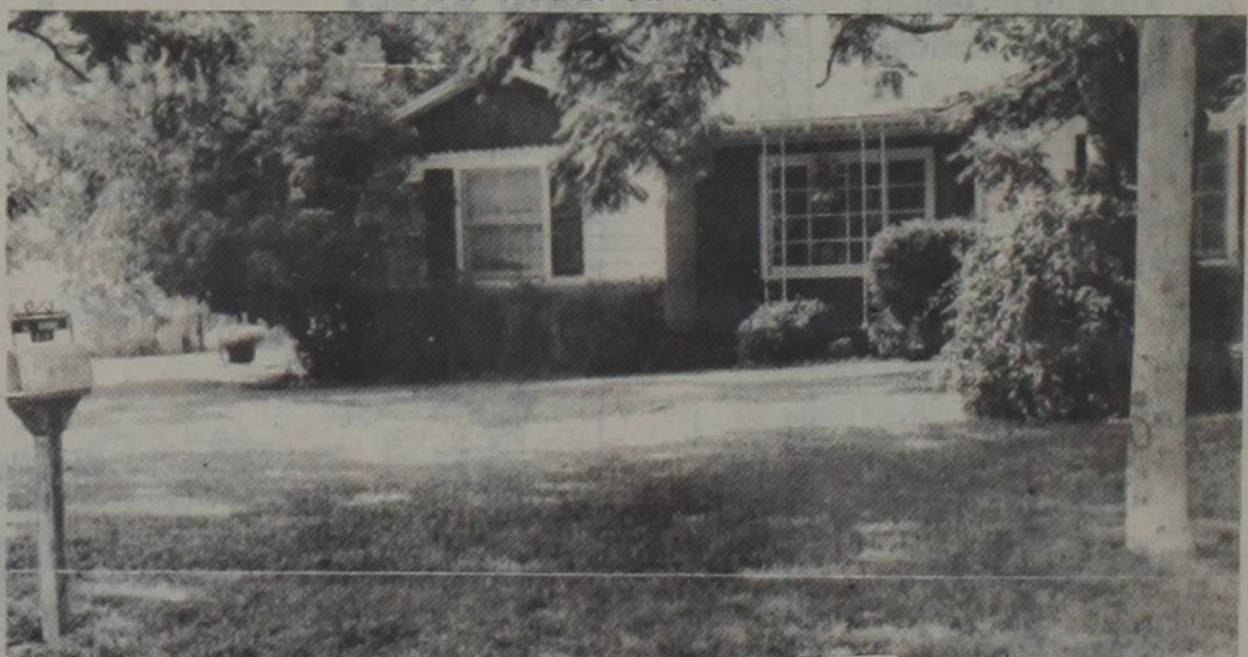

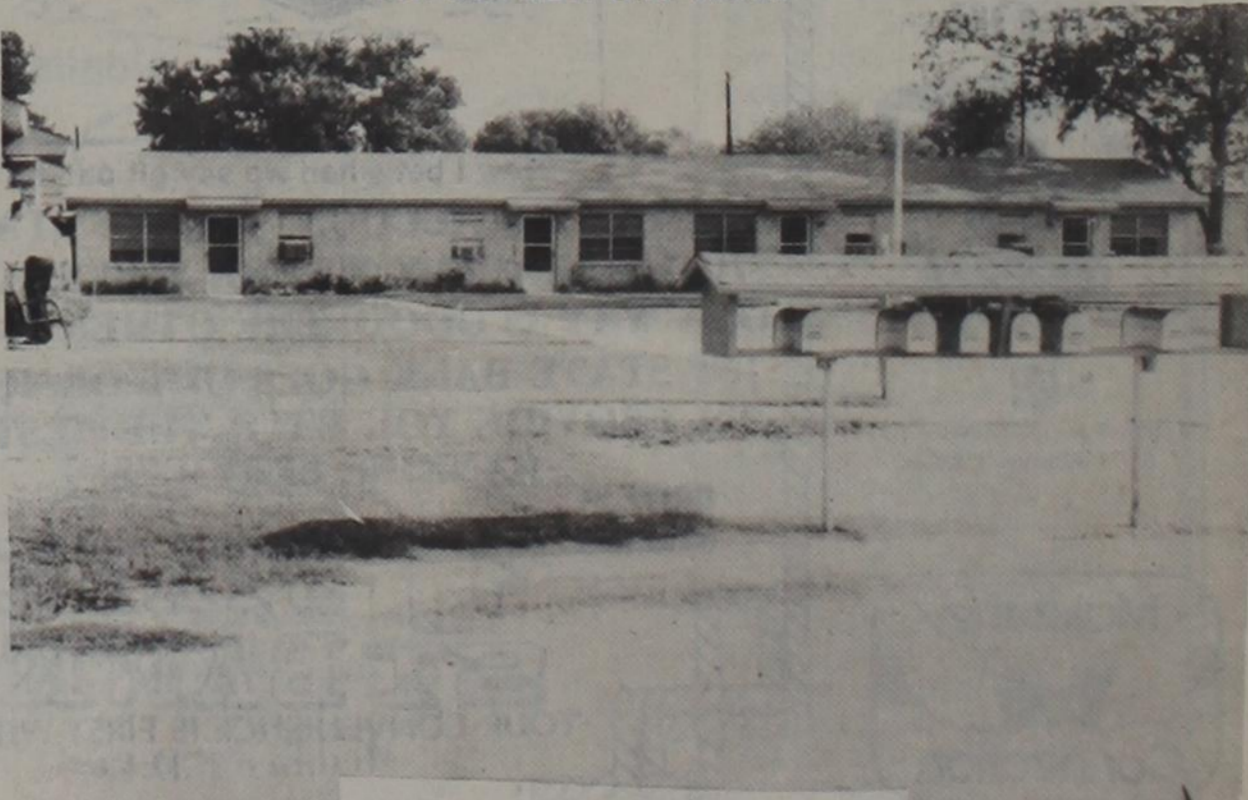

Bench Marks for 1983-84 School District Budgets in Texas

Austin--Texans increased spending on local public schools by \$900 million last year, as trustees in 1,071 school districts adopted school budgets totaling \$8.5 billion. That provided more than \$300 in additional funds for each of the 2,678,000 students in the state, according to the Texas Research League.

State foundation school aid was upped by \$345 million, but local property taxpayers were tagged for an additional \$425 million to pay for the increase. The remainder was funded by increases in special state and federal aid programs and by higher local fees and other revenue.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks for 1983-84 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the league. The Texas Research League is a private, non-profit, Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted for 1982-83 called for spending

\$2,610.23 per student for current operations. Rising Star ISD's budget provided for \$2,309.29 per student based on the 278 students in average daily attendance in 1981-82.

Locally, the Rising Star ISD's tax levy was increased by 4.3 percent for 1982-83 as compared to a 14.8 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Rising Star ISD in 1981-82 was \$15,198 which was 5.6 percent above the minimum salary prescribed by the state. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$17,537 per classroom teacher, or 20.6 percent over the minimum. The legislature further increased the state minimum schedule by \$88-\$196 a month for 1982-83.

There was an average of one teacher for 16.5 students in Rising Star ISD compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio of 1 to 16.4. The pupil-teacher ratio is not the same

thing as the average class size because teachers and students are not necessarily in class the same number of hours each day.

The report noted the share of the total school payroll paid to classroom teachers has dropped from 73.4 percent of the total in 1969-70 to 60.4 cents of each payroll dollar last year as many more nonteaching personnel have been hired. Locally, classroom teachers were paid 66.5 percent of the school payroll in 1981-82.

The average school property tax rate in 1981-82 was \$0.531 per \$100 of market value (selling price) so that the school tax on a property selling for \$100,000 was \$531 in the average school district. Locally, the rate on market value in Rising Star ISD

was \$0.308 or \$308 on a property selling for \$100,000.

If the property were a homestead or owned by a senior citizen, the school tax would be less because of various exemptions. Open-spaced land if qualifying would be valued on productivity value rather than market value and would be taxed less.

The report noted that the 68th legislature increased appropriations for public schools by almost a billion dollars (\$962 million) for the next biennium. However, only an additional \$192 million increase (5.4 percent) in foundation aid to local school districts will be available for 1983-84 school budgets that school trustees are now working on.

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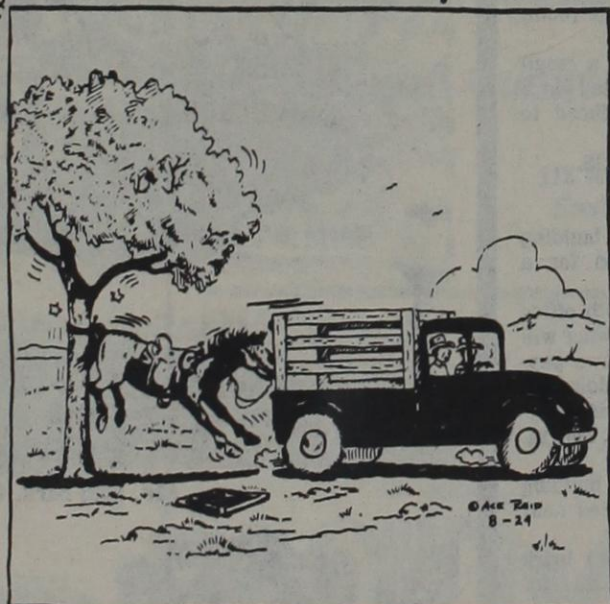

People Must Make SSI Reports

People in the Big Country area who receive supplemental security income (SSI) payments have an important responsibility to report any change in their circumstances which could affect the amount of their payment, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

Not only must the reports be made, but it is very important that they be made as soon as possible after a person knows something has occurred, Hammons said. Late reports can result in overpayments, which must be repaid, and they can also result in a penalty.

People getting SSI must report:

- *Moving or change in address
- *Any change in the household--someone moves into or out of the home
- *Entering or leaving an institution
- *Improvement of a blind or disabled person's condition
- *Leaving the United States for 30 days or more
- *Marriage, divorce, separation, or annulment of a marriage
- *Any change in income
- *Any change in resources owned
- *Any drug addict or

Californian Slices West Texas

A SLICE OF WEST TEXAS

On a thundery Friday noon, I rolled into Rising Star, Texas, population 1,204, and looked for a place to eat.

I cruised Main Street in its three-block entirety and scanned the sagging storefronts. I made a U-turn, parked, climbed the high, stepped curb to the sidewalk and ducked into the Kountry Kitchen Cafe. Working people occupied the five tables; I sat at the yellow formica counter and wished I had not worn shorts and a T-shirt.

This was the second of three days that I spent criss-crossing west central Texas between Midland and Fort Worth, just following the two-lanes that wind through farm and ranch and meadow. People think this land is flat, but there probably is not five or six miles of two-way passing zone in Comanche, of Puerto Rico; Jack Morris of Loco Hills, Calif., Mrs. J.C. Morris of Warren, Tx., and Mrs. Jay Rankin of the community.

At the Kountry Kitchen, Carla, a young, pretty Texan in plaid and jeans, brought me a hot steak sandwich that I imagine keeps Odom's on its toes. While I ate, a customer in greasy denims wordlessly placed his tab and his personal check by the open register - more of a cash drawer, really - waved to Carla, and walked out.

The weather was being discussed: "Think it'll rain?" "Don't know. I felt a big drop awhile ago."

I had paced this line of thunderstorms from Abilene, staying just far enough ahead to stand every little while by the highway and watch it come, the black and windy way they have come for a hundred million years. Next day the Abilene paper said it dropped .66 of an inch in 15 minutes at the airport, but "no severe weather was associated with it..."

A young cowboy teased Carla: "I hope it rains all day tomorrow."

"I hope it don't," said Carla. "But it'll probably get hot, sittin' out in the sun all day."

I smiled. (They're going to have a rodeo; a parade; a barbecue; a barn dance.)

I asked Carla: "Whats going on tomorrow?"

"The Texas Jam," she said, and looked at me. "Rock concert. In Dallas. At the Cotton Bowl."

The Sunday paper said 60,000 showed up for the "Texas(I wished they wouldn't do that) Jam," that featured Uriah Heep, Ted Nugent and Styx.

So today Carla is telling what an interesting time was had at the Texas Jam, and I am bragging that I am the last man in California to have lunched in Rising Star. I also went into Higginbotham's, across the street. Higginbotham's is a dry goods store, large and well stocked, with wood floors. There were two clerks. A phone call came for a third clerk, but she was taking a nap after lunch. I was the only customer. To consummate the experience, I bought a shirt.

Down town Rising Star bustled, comparatively. Typically, small Texas towns appear caught in a generational warp. The old business

districts are mostly stone skeletons, bleaching slowly in the sun.

Modern Texas is a product of mobility. Texas is as much a freeway society as Southern California. Difference is, the Texas network is laid, not over urban industry, but over a hyperactive rural productivity. Every acre from Midland to Weatherford appears covered by crops, cattle or oil wells.

Out in farther west Texas, 43 miles south of Big Spring, rests the dead stump of downtown Sterling City, population 915. Two blocks east of downtown, all in a row along Third Avenue, lie six or seven of the grandest homes you ever saw; monstrous places, with manicured grounds and wide driveways, from which it is only 30 Cadillac minutes to a big city and only four hours, as the kids drive, to the Texas Jam.

Glen Rose has a different kind of problem. I drove to Glen Rose, 55 miles southwest of Fort Worth, to admire the scenery and eat the barbecue at a place called Hammond's.

Poking up from the scenery, I saw an occasional tall pole, to the top of which was affixed a puzzling cylindrical structure, like a futuristic tornado siren. Toward the base of each pole was an

electrical box labeled "Federal Signal Co."

At Hammond's, I ordered brisket and a hot link and said, "I read about you in the book."

"What book?" Mrs. Hammond wanted to know.

"New book called 'Goodfood' I said, happy to be the breaker of the news. 'Lists the best places for regional food in the country.'"

Later I walked to the car, carrying a pound of ribs to go. Mrs. Hammond came out, too, wondering where she could find the book. We were talking about how to find Glen Rose when She pointed to a structure in the distance.

They looked like two grain silos, only monstrous, like a farmer might see in a bad dream. It was the Comanche Peak Nuclear Steam and Electric Station.

Mrs. Hammond gazed at it across the green countryside. "It's changed our town," she said. I didn't have to ask what the signals were for. (Editor's note: The above article appeared in The San Diego Union in June and a copy was sent to Eva Woody, owner of Kountry Kitchen in Rising Star.)
