WWI Veterans Honored At Trail Blazers Meeting

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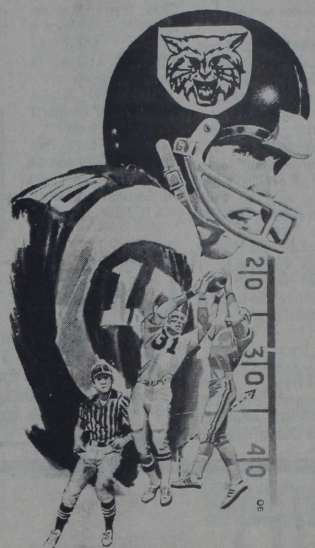

Great Western Natural Resources, Eastland, will drill No.1 James Wright as an Eastland County wildcat four miles southeast of Eastland.

The planned 4,000-foot venture is located on a 160-acre lease.

It spots 1,470 feet from the north and 467 feet from the east lines of Section 13, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Cone & Petree Oil & Gas Exploration Inc., Lubbock, No.1 Hamilton is a planned 2,000-foot wildcat for the area one mile north of Nimrod.

Location is on a 110-acre lease, spotting 1,500 feet from the north and 60 feet from the east lines of Section 113, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Site is 150 feet from the south and 1,720 feet from the east lines of Section 128, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

H.L.R. Inc., Tyler, spotted No.2 Amalene Isaacks in the J.S. Lewis (Marble Falls) Field in Brown County.

GORDON SPOT

Just how "good" was the hay you harvested this year? It's really hard to tell without a forage test. The forage test is the only way that a definite feed value can be assigned to a particular lot of hay.

While a forage test may cost a few dollars, it can save you dollars in supplemental feed or livestock condition.

Feeding low quality hay without supplementation can result in livestock weight losses and reduced rebreeding percentages. At the same time, feeding supplement with top quality hay may not always be necessary.

Only when your hay's feeding value is known can you make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement.

The hay's feeding value might be such that no supplement is needed or it might be such that the animal is slowly starving with a supplement. A forage test can give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tested for protein, fiber, nutrient and mineral content can bring samples to the county Extension office where information forms and mailing containers are available. Forage samples will be sent to the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory, Soil and Crop Sciences Department, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

One way to learn the quality of your hay is to enter the Eastland County Hay Show. All you need to do is to bring one bale of each kind of hay you may have to the Vo-Ag teacher or farm supply store in your community Wednesday, September 16. The hay will be tested for pro-

tein and on October 2 it will be judged on both physical and protein content. There is no fee for entering.

Hay shows provide an opportunity to compare different samples of hay and help producers evaluate what makes high-quality hay. Hay is a major portion of the roughage diet of many ruminant animals, so an evaluation of food value and protein content can help growers determine hay quality more easily so that livestock can be fed according to hay value.

An individual entering a hay sample will know the value of his hay when the show is over. Samples will have a protein analysis run and physically evaluated as to leafiness, steminess, color, foreign material and maturity.

Livestock producers preparing to feed hay will know if their hay is adequate to meet animal needs or supplements are needed. Hay shows can take a lot of guesswork out of livestock feeding.

Besides, providing a hay analysis, hay shows can be educational. Discussion topics often deal with such areas as hay production, haying equipment, soil fertility, hay storage, hay quality differences, feeding value, forage testing and forage for hay production. It can be placed where interested individuals can learn a lot about hay production and feeding value.

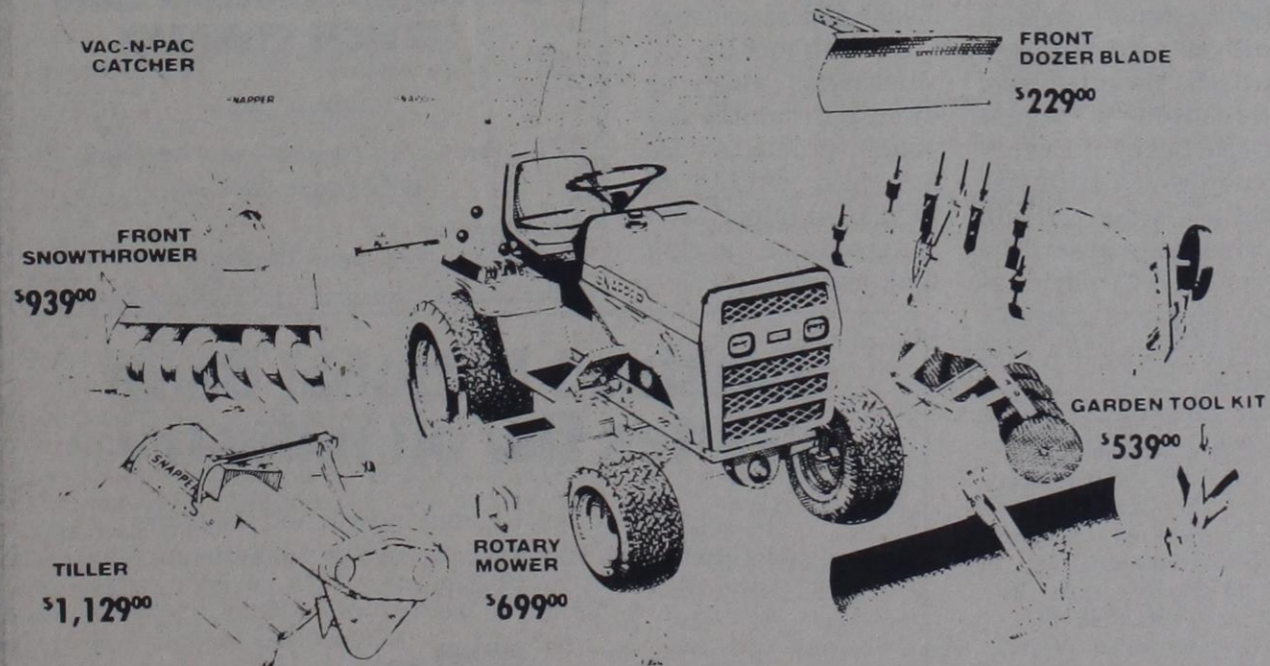

Texans May Pay For Doing Without

AUSTIN--Texans face the "looming spectre of living in the midst of rich gas field, unable to get adequate supplies, and paying artificially bloated prices for the privilege of doing without," said Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent as press conferences in Austin and Dallas this week.

Nugent said Texas consumers face higher natural gas prices and probable shortages in supply unless changes are made in the federal Natural Gas Policy Act.

As the act now stands, an estimated 40 percent of all U.S. natural gas will remain under federal price controls after 1985.

Most of the low-cost, price-controlled gas continue to flow to other states under the federal law. The department of Energy estimates that this so-called "old interstate" gas will cost \$1.01 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) in 1985, compared to 93 cents per Mcf in 1978.

By contrast, old intrastate gas prices will cost Texas consumers \$3.29 per Mcf in 1985 under the NGPA.

"This is the gas you and I burn every day, and we'll be paying over three times what it costs our northern neighbors," said Nugent.

Problems multiply for Texans when interstate customers use the dollars they save to bid up the price of new gas supplies. Nugent seriously questions whether the intrastate pipelines can compete for these new supplies without a base of controlled low-price gas. He cited a recent Department of Energy study which estimates that half-a-trillion cubic feet of gas will be transferred from intra- to interstate markets in 1985 under the NGPA.

Even if state pipelines do compete successfully, Nugent said they will have to pay higher-than-market price for the gas. "If Texans are to burn gas, they will have to pay more than the free market price, because they will be subsidizing the costs to consumers in other states, particularly the Northeast," he said.

Other factors add to the problem, noted Nugent. Not only will interstate customers have privileged prices, they will have privileged access to new supplies as well.

With few exceptions, he said, once gas is placed in the interstate market it is forever committed to that market. In many cases, the sale of gas from a single well binds the gas from an entire field until the field is depleted and abandoned. In other words, gas can move freely from Texas markets to the interstate market, but not back again.

Finally, Nugent said, federal rules effectively preclude intrastate pipelines from bidding on any gas produced from the Outer Continental Shelf, one of the most promising new areas for gas discoveries.

Nugent called on Congress and the Administration to:

1. Change the federal law which guarantees privileged prices to interstate buyers, and
2. Change the federal laws which guarantee privileged access to interstate buyers.

Nugent recently returned from a round of talks with congressional and administration officials in Washington where he discussed natural gas policy problems. He has also written to Texas senators and congressmen urging their assistance.

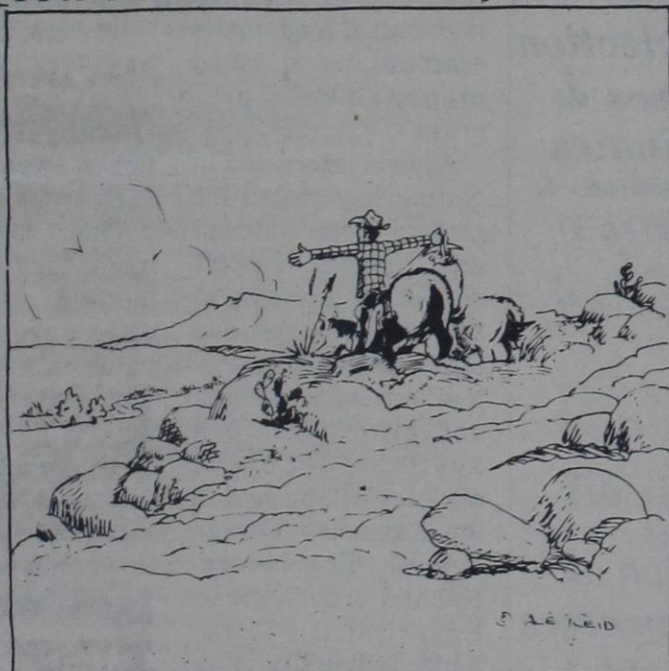

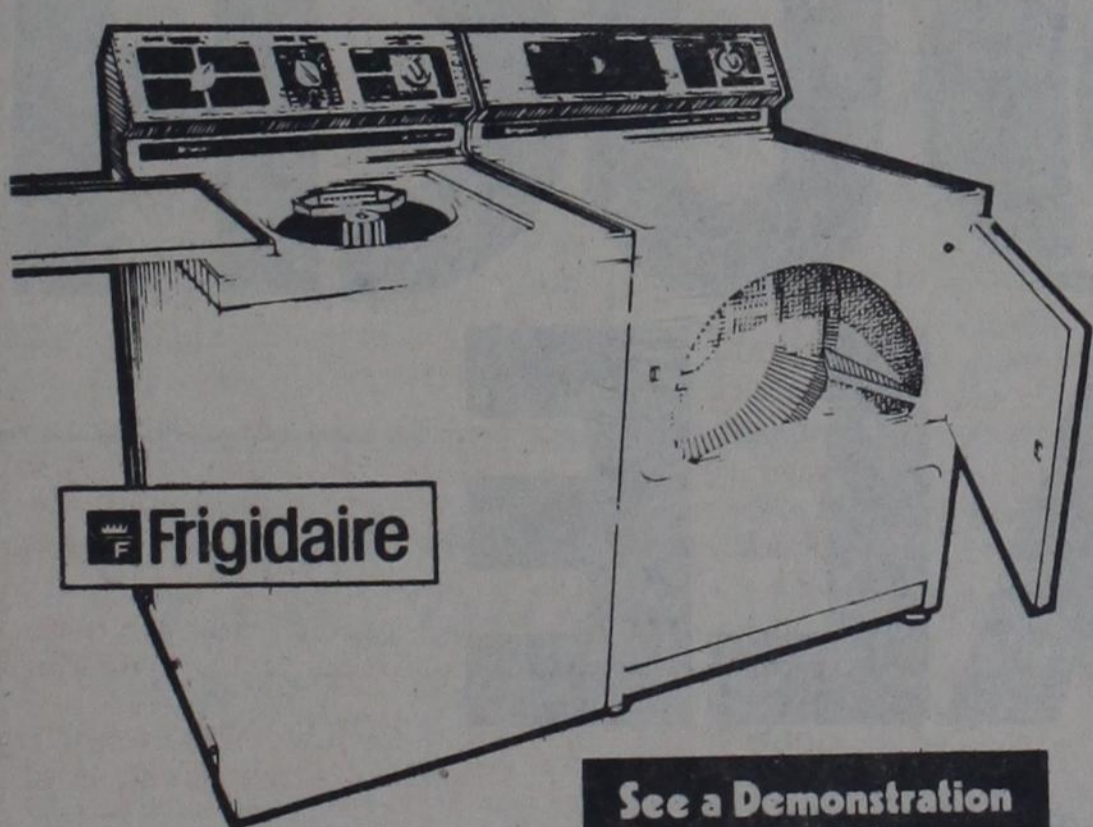

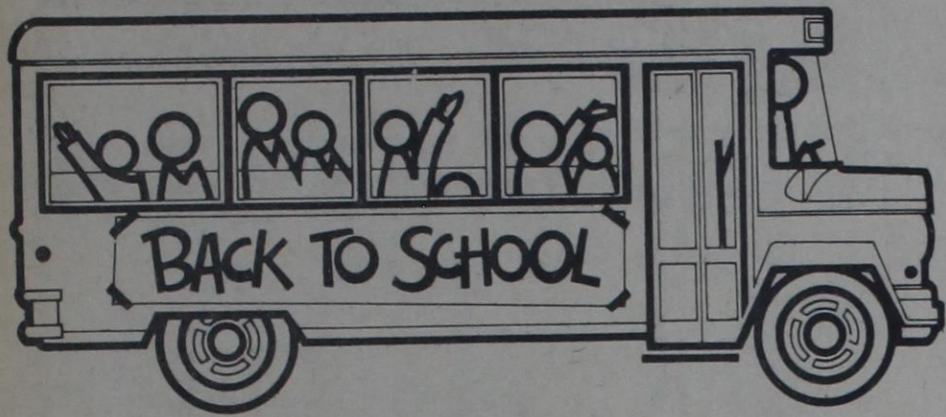

The Junior High Kittens lost their opener to Lometa, 44-14. The Kittens scored two touchdowns.

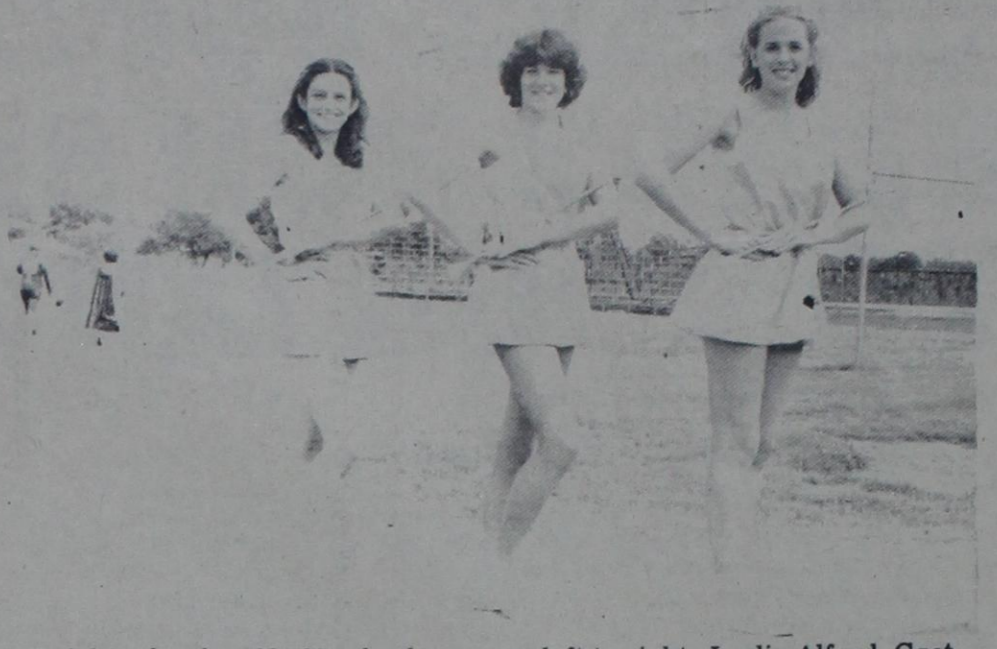
