hours. If sunburn does occur, the safetest treatment is to apply cold compresses to the painful area. There are a number of soothing ointments available, but many doctors do not encourage patients to use them because the individual may develop an allergic reaction. If the sunburn is so sever that the skin blisters. it is wise to check with a doctor to prevent infection and get relief from excessive pain.

Some people who have had a sever sunburn may be highly sensitive to sunlight for many months. And if someone

chronically gets sunburned. even mildly, the skin can develop a prematurely wrinkled and leathery appearance. For some persons chronic sunburn will increase the likelihood of developing skin cancer. Another problem for some people is that some medicines increase sensitivity to the sun. If in doubt, chech with a doctor or pharmacist.

Office for the Visually Handicapped (GCOVH) helps visually handicapped Texans gain access to all available services in the most efficient manner. It hopes to make its presence known to those it seeks to serve.

The GCOVH is a young state agency--created in 1975 when the 64th Texas Legislature passed H.B. 1673, the Texas Bill of Rights for the Handicapped. A two-year House committee study had found a lack of coordination among the state and local agencies providing services to the visually handicapped.

The GCOVH attacks this problem through four major

When its goals are fully realized, the GCOVH program benefits both the state and the individual.

First, large numbers of citizens are taken off welfare and made self-respecting. productive members of society. Secondly, the whole human service system becomes more economical by converting people from recipients of services paid for with tax dollars to tax-paying workers.

Case in point is found in the GCOVH's state office: Dr. Robert J. Winn, Executive

Director, is himself a blind person. He heads a compact core of highly professional experts with practical in working with the various agencies that deliver services to the visually handicapped.

The streamlined GCOVH mandate is to develop plans that encourage cooperation across agency and service delivery "boundaries" to ensure that handicapped individuals receive comprehensive services.

The major state agencies that serve the visually handicapped are the Texas Commission for the blind, the Texas Education Agency, the Texas School for the Blind, the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, and the Texas State Library.


