

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

Do you think the American people would vote to spend more than \$300,000,000 of their tax money on a project which could be financed and built with private funds under the private enterprise systemand which, once in operation would become a large taxpayer instead of a tax-consumer? It hardly seems likely. But that's just what one clique in government wants to do at Niagara Falls.

As a result of modifications in a Canadian-American treaty, a huge amount of additional water is available at the falls for hydroelectric development. The sole question-which must be decided by Congress-is whether government will do the job with our tax money, or whether a group of business-managed utilities, which are all ready to go ahead, will be permitted to do it with capital. The issue isn't complicated by flood control or navigation. The project will produce electric power and nothing else.

Identical bills have been introduced in House and Senate whose stated purpose is to preserve the scenic beauty of Niagara Falls; to further the national security; and to assure the development of low cost electricity under the private enterprise system. They should be passed without delay.

"COMPETITION IS TERRIFIC."

The Anaheim, California, bulletin, recenty editorialized on the shopping situation in its region. Anaheim merchants, it observed, have kept abreast of the public demand with better stores, improved and expanded lines of merchandise, and increased parking facilities.. However, the Bulletin stated, "Competition is terrific. On all sides, and within very short distances, there is every conceivable type and size mercantile center. This area is constantly bombarded with literature and advertising to attract the customer away."

The same is true, in varying degree, in thousands upon thousands of American communities. And this is the reason why retailing, in America, has reached a peak of efficiency and service unknown abroad. That hasn't happened because merchants are any more public spirited than the rest of us. It has happened because, where competition is free and open, survival depends upon keeping up with the swim.

Furthermore, in this kind of a system anyone can rise to the top — there are no artificial checks on growth and progress. The small store of today becomes the great store or chain of tomorrow. And today's great store, if it fails to meet the competition, swiftly goes downhill. The prizes go to those who honestly earn them.

SUBSIDY MEANS DEPENDENCY.

It is difficult to see how exception may be taken to Agriculture Secretary Benson's statements that price support programs should be avoided, except as insurance against disaster and to help stabilize food supplies. If the country had not been conditioned to dependency by years of living under a benevolent, tax-squandering government the fundamental rightness of the Secretary's position would be recognized by all.

The idea of looking upon perpetual prosperity as a patural right to be subsidized by government, regardless of cost, should be repulsive to every American citizen. In the first place, it is inconsistent with the ideal of a self-reliant people, and secondly, as everyone should know by this time it leads nowhere but to more bureaucracy and ultimate nation-

al bankruptcy. Our national administration should seek to preserve the political and economic liberties of the individual, and to protect the nation from the communist menace. It should endeavor to halt a trend in domestic policies which destroy our freedom. It should strive to stop wasteful spending and depreciation of money caused by government promising too much to too many.

Men of Secretary Benson's caliber are trying to prevent our fifty-cent dollars from becoming twobit dollars or ten-cent dollars. They are opposed to the false security of the welfare state or. in plainer words, the police state. They are proceeding on the assumption that the people agree with them and are worthy of the responsibilities as well as privileges bestowed upon them by our constitutional republic.



Recommendations were made in view of the anticipated limitations of practices to those of a permanent nature and the possible reduction of ACP funds. called for in Secretary Benson's

It was pointed out that the primary object of the 1954 Agricultural Conservation Program is to provide assistance needed for enduring and permanent type soil and water conservation practices that contribute to the accomplishment of the basic conservation objective of the Department of Agriculture, which is "The use of each acre of agricultural land within its capabilities and the treatment of each acre in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement".



McCain has 53 acres of pasture land about four miles south of Carbon that produced 4,350 pounds of beef during a 3-month period in 1952. This seems like some tall talk until we look at all the factors responsible for this production.

This 53 acres of grassland consists of 35 acres of old Indian grass and 18 acres of new Indian grass seeding - seeded in 1950. The condition of this pasture was excellent and the growth and vigor of the grass was good on April 1, when McCain started grazing it with 29 head of steers. The most widely adapted varieties of alfalfa in this area are Common (Chilean), southwest common, and improved common such as buffalo (a variety highly resistant to bacterial wilt). Alfalfa has a very high fertilizer and lime requirement. Since it is intolerant to acid soils, the soil should be tested.
