> A copyright is the right to prevent unauthorzed copying of such things as writings, musical compositions, pictures and works \$45,000.00 can be spent for soil lic Health Education Division, of art. Registration of a copyright must be secured by first printing a copyright notice on each copy of the writing or other material, and then filing an application for the subject in the Library of Congress.

This inventor's camera, then, could not itself be the subject of copyright, but the advertising copy, instruction manual or other written material relating to the camera and its operation could be copyrighted to prevent being copied by competitors.
