RISING STAR FIRE RECORD AND WEED ORDINANCE.

With the cost of taxes always on the up and the cost of everything else on the increase, our people are still burdened with a huge fire loss of 15 per cent. This is the result of a fire or fires that have happened in the past several years.

A letter is being published in the Record today trying to get the people more fire conscious. Trying to get them more interested in the fire department and in any other way that will save them dollars over It will pay each and everyone of us to read the letter and then all go to work to get this burden off our backs.

A community that attracts outside capital simply must have three major assets:

First, a plentiful supply of cheap water, electricity

Second, it must have an abundance of willing la-

Third, it must be a community of cleanliness and

sanitation.

This writer never saw more cooperation among our people when the call went for a clean-up of the premises that would prevent sickness and also fire. Most all the people helped—some did not. Their places are like they were last year and will be like that next year. It seems there is no way to enforce city ordinances. As one man told the editor of the paper "they are just bluffing"—that is he meant the "city commission is just plain bluffing and everybody knows it."

However, the ones that cleaned their premises will do it next year without the threat of being fined when they know well and good that will be the end to the whole matter," he said.

This writer sat in on part of city commission meeting not long ago and was told something would be done to enforce the ordinance or else it should be repealed and forget the whole matter. One thing that causes many people to lose respect for the law is to see it abused by a few people who will not obey

It then added, "Cattlemen may pride themselves on being rugged individualists but if they will not or cannot work together to solve a problem of overproduction they will be opening the way toward a stronger demand for price supports and the controls that inevitably would fol-

A short time ago the critical beef situation, which has been intensified by the prolonged Texas drought led Secretary of Agriculture Benson to call an emergency meeting of a special livestock, credit, and retail food committee. This was in line with Mr. Benson's firm belief that agricultural problems should be solved so far as possible by cooperation between the interests concerned, and with a minimum of government interference or financial assistance.

In the meantime, one optimistic sign is found in beef slaughter and consumption figures, which are running well ahead of comparable periods last year.

The decline in prices has naturally led to increased beef buying by the general public. beef buying by the general public.

Perhaps the best sign of all is found in the fact at only a small minority of beef producers are asking the government to attempt to solve their problems for them. 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

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

You'd have to buy back the stock in bits and pieces from 116,000 women share owners. And 83,000 men. You'd have to get in touch with about 25,000 trustees and guardians. And a few thousand insurance companies, universities, hospitals and pension trusts to buy back the stock they own.

We wouldn't blame these people if they didn't sell to you. They don't have to, you know. Maybe they want the stock for the same reason you do.

Not even a thousand millionaires, each putting in a million dollars, could "own" General Electric. The "man" who owns General Electric has 248,404 names. There are that many owners on the books.



Merrill said one of the most encouraging signs has been the new attitude of people in the drought-hurt area. Farmers and city residents alike have seemed to realize the threat that drought.

Merrill recently said that in his opinion there should not be a return to wind erosion conditions of the 1930's. He gave the following reasons: (1) farmers and ranchers have the "know how" to prevent widespread erosion; (2) owners cooperating with soil conservation districts are using sound erosion control practices on hundreds of thousands of acres of farm and ranch lands; (3) owners have more and better machines with which they control erosion; (4) larger areas have irrigation facilities available for growing plant cover, and (5) farmers and ranchers have too much "horse sense" to




