Meanwhile, it was understood that the city is taking steps to foreclose upon the site of the original project, under a pro vision of the deed which returns title of the lot to the City through default of the builders i. completing the structure.

Mr. Newton is said to have in sisted that some such steps be taken in order to remove th possibility of a rival.

Meanwhile eight new units of public housing for the Rising Star Low Rent project on North Main were expected to be announced soon, with recertification by the Home and Finance department of the Public Housing Administration of the City's Workable Program. Under this program the City has agreed to take steps to improve housing standards in the city to comply with approved standards.

Engineers of the City were also putting the finishing touch es upon the plans for the sewer modernization project, for which the city voters approved an issue of \$64,000 in revenue bonds and a grant of \$25,800 in federal funds was awarded through the Texas State Health Department.

Mayor Walter Smith said that it was expected that bids on the project would be asked within a month.

The project calls for relocating the city's sewage disposal plant and modernizing it. Sewage would be carried to the new plant through underground pipe.

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

Editorial Responsibility

A Federal Court jury in Atlanta, Georgia, has awarded a former Georgia University football coach whopping damages of over three million dollars on his claim that a national magazine libelled him when it charged that he ws involved a a

A significant fact in the verdict is that only \$60,000 was awarded as general damages, the remaining three million being assessed as punitive damages to which the jury held the plaintiff was entitled because of malice involved in the publication of the article in suit,

Even though Wally Butts had asked for ten million dollars in his suit against the Saturday Evening Post, the size of the jury's award was surprizing. The case is subject to review by the appellate courts, to which no doubt appeal will be made, and the verdict it not yet conclusive, but it can be said now that the decision does little honor to the "new image" in which a longtime highly respected and beloved American family magazine has endeavored to rise above the competition of TV and shine again in the American journalistic firmament.

There is no way of knowing how much weight the jury gave to testimony that Butts had talked by telephone with the coach of a rival school and gave him classified information shortly before a game. Under the circumstances a conversation between the coaches would appear highly improper to say it charitably. But as has been pointed out, coaches, though rivals, are not necessariy enemies and like members of other professions, are addicted to "shop talk". The jury perhaps took this view of the evidence.

But although the Post may have had factual grounds for for the charges it made, it was in a poor way to prove them when it based its story upon the casual interception of a long distance telephone conversation by an insurance salesman who admittedly knew next to nothing about football. It would appear that the Post editors allowed their enthusiasm to overrun their judgment.

It is known that the Post of late has not been the profitale institution it once was, and a number of rather drastic changes in editorial direction and policy have been undertaken in an effort to repair its fortunes. It may be oble to survive the expense of this and other suits resulting from the Butts story; indeed it may even profit from them,

But the more serious implications arising from the Atlanta verdict do not concern financial prudence; they point a more sober regard for editorial responsibility in the conduct of a medium hitherto so highly respected and influential. In particular it points editorial concern for the rights of individuals to be secure in their good names, their properties and liber-

It is a serious thing to destroy a reputation, to ruin a career. It is something not to be taken lightly, on doubtful evidence, even in good faith and indignation. The duty of the press is a duty of fact, not of judgment, and facts often lie deeper than mere appearances.

There may be some nobility of mind and policy in a dedication to ferreting out impropriety and exposing corruption provided one thinks of the good to be done rather than personal profit—but turning a great magazine into a Fifth Avenue Police Gazette is no way to do it.

RIGHT OF WITNESSES

By far the most vital people in our system of justice are witnesses. Everyone else in a trial exists to hear what they say.

Our courts need witnesses. A jury to find the facts. The judge to apply the law. The lawyer to tell his client's

Chances are vou worry about stepping up taking an oath, and telling your story in court.

On some rare occasions you could he called upon to tostify about something affecting your own standing in the community.

As a witness you too may have the right, for example not to testify against yourself in somebody else's lawsuit or crime trial.

If you are in such a bind, consult a lawyer of your own choice on what to do. The lawyer who called you to testify as a sworn duty to protect his client, not you. But your lawyer is sworn to keep what you tell him secret and to advise you in your own interests

within the law. Wise lawyers tell their witnesses to obey twelve rules:

1. Go to the place (say the scene of an accident). Check your memory before you go to court. People forget and get caught up on details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on solid

2. Visit a court, hear how other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand.

3. Wear clean, conservative clothes.

4. Don't memorize your story word for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But think of what you saw and heard.

5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer throughtfully.

6. Give a simple, direct answer in your own words. Don't be rushed.

7. If you err—and people often do-correct yourself at once. If you can't remember some detail, say so. Don't bluff.

8. Tell the truth. Don't figure which side you may help. Don't identify yourself with either side.


9. Stop when the judge breaks in, and done try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. What you might say could end in a

10. Keep cool and don't sass back.

11. If they ask you: Certainly, you have talked to other people—the lawyer, for example; and yes, you ma' be reimbursed for certain of your expenses incurred in attending the trial.

12. Remember, without witnesses our law would fail to do justice. If you are called be a good witness.

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C .-IT IS A PARADOX THAT newspapers and columnists who support the Administration, and the Republicans who oppose it, both accuse the Congress of not doing any-

THEIR MOTIVES ARE VASTLY DIFFERENT but they say about the same thing. Obviously the Republicans criticism is a build-up of a political record to be used in future campaigns. The liberal press and liberal writers want to goad the Congress into passing all the Administration's programs.

DOUBTLESS IT IS A more commendable trait to act positively on anything, rather than negatively, but negativism, in the opinion of many of us, can produce results which we feel to be for the good of the Country.

IN OTHER WORDS, TO prevent something from happening can be as important as being a part of that which makes it happen.

THERE IS NO QUESTION but that the Congress is proceeding at a snail's pace. Thus far it has only enacted a small percentage of the Administration's recommendations. At the rate it is going, it is admitted the Session may last well into November and probably longer.


AT THE BEGINNING OF the 88th Congress the demand for stringent Civil Rights legislation was not anticipated. Neither could it have foreseen that measures to avert a crippling railroad strike would demand attention of the Congress and, then, of course, there is the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty with Russia.

THESE AND OTHER MAT-ERS TAKING on the status of an emergency naturally divert attention from those things planned and consider ed essential of passage.

THESE UNEXPECTED PROBLEMS ARE BY NO means the entire reason for the slowness of the Congress. But even mild elevations in blood pressure considered no ral for the person involved if the increase persists may cause the walls of blood vessels to toughen, exactly as callouses are formed on hands by regular use of an axe or hoe. Research has shown that temporary increases in pressure do not really make the difference.

In the most common types of high blood pressure called "essential hypertension," the tiny branches of arteries which carry blood to all body tissues (called arterioles) begin to tighten up. Blood passages become smaller and smaller, and the heart has to work harder to push the blood through. After a time the blood vessels lose their elasticity and the heart muscles





Powdered graphite may be used, also, but it may also darken floor color. Then, too, you can rub yellow laundry soap into cracks. This might stop squeaks for a month or more.

These cures are not permanent and will not fix the source of the squeak, only the noise.

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

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

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
