Talent Abounds in "Oliver"



Hoos-Gow Proposal Presented to TDC

Dr. Charles Barnes, coordinator of the HOOS-GOW project, left Wednesday to deliver to the Texas Department

of Corrections Eastland County's published proposal to obtain a state prison for the county. He was

accompanied by Don Shepard, president of the Eastland County Economical Development

Committee, and manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

The published proposal consisted of 177 pages, including 77 pages of letters and petitions of support for the prison, Dr. Barnes said. The proposal included a resolution from Carbon citizens who oppose the prison. Also included were

letters of support from citizens throughout the county, including Carbon; all Chambers of Commerce in Eastland County; and all principal service clubs.

The balance of the proposal was the technical aspects of the project, Dr. Barnes said.

Dr. Barnes stated, "I am overwhelmed by the number

of letters and petitions we received in support of the prison." He added that if anyone else has letters or petitions, either for or against the prison, he will see they get to TDC.

Selection of the prison site is expected to be announced by the TDC in September.

RC&D Assesses Needs in County

Eastland County was put under the microscope of most serious needs this week by a group of dedicated volunteers and the results include a long list of needs.

Among the items listed as "most needed" are long range water plans, jobs, volunteers, cooperative spirits, hospitals, businesses, industry, promotion of Lake Leon as a recreation area, drug abuse control, emergency management, and promotion of CJC and RJC, among other items.

Apathy and the lack of old-fashioned salesmanship and dedicated leadership were listed as some of the basic causes of the county's problems.

In the brain-session lead by RC&D Coordinator Ernest E. Moravec, the County RC&D volunteers analyzed the county and made suggestions for needs to improve the quality of life here.

Ron Bailey, S.C.S., is local coordinator.

The RC&D Area plan, which was developed in 1971, is being revised by the Executive Council and the Executive Council is requesting that each county RC&D committee meet and identify the problems, needs and concerns affecting the social betterment, economic development and conservation and preservation of the natural resources within their county.

The identified problems will be used by the council in developing objectives, goals and strategies for the RC&D Area. The revised area plan will be a five year, action oriented plan that will focus on objectives which can be addressed and completed within the five year time frame.

The Area plan will be revised and updated every five years.

Loose Dogs

In a recent meeting of Eastland County Commissioners, County Judge Scott Bailey reported that according to the 1981 Rabies Control Act, the county shall appoint one person from each precinct to control animals. It was decided that the constables from each precinct will be in charge of animal control. The constable for Precinct 3, which includes Rising Star, is Gene Hicks.

Numerous complaints about large groups of dogs running loose have been made to the staff at City Hall. Pet owners are being reminded that a city ordinance prohibits allowing pets to run loose. The dogs pose a health and nuisance problem.

Those with complaints are asked to direct them to Constable Gene Hicks rather than City Hall.

And those with pets running loose are asked to restrain them.



News Briefs

EASTLAND

Dr. Charles Barnes, coordinator of the HOOS-GOW project, has delivered a proposal for a prison in Eastland county to the Texas Department of Corrections in Austin. He was accompanied by Don Shepard, President of the Eastland County Economic Development Committee. The published proposal consisted of 177 pages, including 77 letters and petitions of support for the prison, Dr. Barnes said. The balance of the proposal included technical aspects of the project. Selection of the prison site is expected to be announced by the TDC in September.

Mayor C.W. Hoffmann Jr. has been appointed by Gov. Clements to the Regional Review Committee for the State Community Development Block Grant Program.

Over \$35 million in grant money is available across the state, and over \$1 million for a 19-county area including Eastland County. Last year seven of twenty-five applications for funds in this area were approved. Mayor Hoffmann will have to excuse himself from deciding on the City of Eastland's present request for some \$250,000 to repair the Eastland Lake Dam. Reports are that 17 of the 151 unsafe dams in the state are in this region, so flood control has been to high priority in this area.

The City of Eastland has officially ordered water rationing, according to City Manager Paul Catoe. Citizens determine which days they are to water: those who live on the side of the street with odd numbers are to water on odd-numbered days, and

those on the even-numbered side on even-numbered days. These conditions are expected to prevail from 30 to 60 days, depending on rains. The need for curtailment comes about this time every year, when the water plant can't keep the city's towers full in overnight pumping. There can also be breaks and other causes. Citizen cooperation is appreciated, the Manager says.

The Eastland County 4-H Recreation Team will be meeting on Friday, Aug. 11, 2 p.m. in the Courthouse Extension office. The team members will make plans and prepare to go to Albany on Sunday, Aug. 13 from 7-9 p.m. to lead Recreation for the Shackelford County 4-H Awards Banquet.

CISCO

The Rev. and Mrs. Otto Urban are moving from Cisco. Rev. Urban gave his farewell sermon at Redeemer Lutheran Church last Sunday, marking his retirement from the active parish ministry. Vonda Urban has resigned her position as a Special Education teacher in the Cisco School District, and the couple will be moving to the Houston area to be closer to their family. Both Otto and Vonda were active in the community of Cisco, and will be greatly missed. Future plans are for Otto Urban to teach in a College in the Houston area, and Mrs. Urban to teach Special Education in a Houston School.



During a rainfall the road surface can be deceptively dangerous. Be prepared for hydroplaning. Hydroplaning occurs when tires are skiing on top of water or an oil slick and are not touching the road.  Your local post office is appealing to community members and property owners to help keep intersections clear of high grass and weeds this summer. This appeal is issued in consideration of the time of year when conditions are prime for growth of grass and weeds. The potential for uncontrolled vegetation to reach heights that obstruct or produce blind intersections produces an unsafe condition that can contribute to a motor vehicle accident.
 Last year three rural carriers in North Central Texas experienced vehicle accidents where the unsafe condition of high grass and weeds was a major contributing factor. Fortunately, no fatalities were realized with these accidents by either party; however, the potential for this type accident or a serious disabling accident was indeed present. The number of these accidents experienced last year represents a 50 percent reduction from the previous year. This reduction is credited to the awareness campaign sponsored by the postal service with its rural carriers and with community involvement and participation.
 Your postmaster and rural and city carriers would appreciate it if high grass and weeds at intersections be controlled to reduce the safety hazards that blind or obstructed intersections can pose. Correcting or controlling this condition not only benefits postal drivers, but also family, friends and community individuals that also traverse these intersections.

Area health care professionals will learn the latest advances in AIDS patient care, practical precautions and teaching skills in a seminar at the McMurry College Student Center on Tuesday, Aug. 15, in Abilene.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast

cancer at this early stage has a 90-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary

deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women.
