Rising Star's New Peanut Dryer Is Now In Operation

Rising Star's newest industry, the Gene Hill Peanut Company began operation in the Rising Star Market building Friday morning, Nov. 9 with all new

equipment and has been running to capacity most of the time since opening day.

This industry is a badly needed enterprise based on the ag-

ricultural resources of the area and it is being financially assisted by the Rising Star Development Corporation which was organized for just such purposes.

The drying equipment in installed in the market building and the peanuts are brought to the dryers in trailers each capable of handling 13,000 pounds of peanuts. The peanuts are dried while they are in the trailers.

The equipment is manufactured by the Long Manufacturing Company and was supplied through the local Long dealer, G. W. Gunn, Jr.

The equipment is all automatic with heat control that insures against over heating and impairing the quality of the peanuts.

With its present capacity the plant can dry 50,000 pounds of peanuts in a 24-to 36-hour period. Enlargement of the equipment will greatly increase this capacity.

The City of Rising Star is furnishing the building and supplying the gas for the plant operation.

Present plans are to enlarge the plant considerably in time to handle next year's crops.

The plant now has ten trailers with two more to be added to give adequate capacity at all times. The Market building has easy approach for trucks and an excellent unloading place. Mr. Hill's two sons are assisting him in the business and Mrs. Weldon Hill is the bookkeeper.

District Grid Title Hangs On Wildcat-Blanket Duel Friday

The Rising Star Wildcats, standing on the threshold of a district championship for the first time in 13 years, will argue the matter with the Blanket football team at Wildcat field here Friday night at 7:30.

Coach Weldon Hill and his associates, Frank Gray and Joe Eddie Henry have brought the Wildcats along to a successful season, undefeated in district play, with the title hanging upon the final game of the regular season.

"The boys have really shaped up since we've hit district play," said Coach Hill. "Every boy is giving his best, both in the workouts and in the games, and this effort has been the determining factor in placing us first in the district thus far."

Neither of the two district games so far played has been

won by a large score, indicating that the teams are fairly evenly matched in strength.

The battle with the May Tigers was a toughie, and the Wildcats won only when a May fumble gave them the ball on the Tiger 20. In a do-it-now-or-never effort the Rising Star boys drove to the May 1 yard line from which Kenneth Nunnally plunged for the score. The game ended 6-0.

The Wildcats defeated the Gorman Panthers 8-0, taking advantage of an opportunity in the first quarter to post an 8-0 advantage on the board. Terry Geyer, youthful Rising Star quarterback, found Ted Cawley with a 20-yard pass for the score and Tommy Alford ran over for the two points after Frazier Clark fakes a place-kick.

The Panthers came within one

inch of scoring later in the game but the fine Wildcat defense paid off.

The coaches were well pleased with the defensive play of the Rising Star team all the way. Kenneth Pittman was singled out for special commendation for his fine effort.

The Rising Star offensive, while effective, suffered especially from penalties.

A victory over the Blanket team Friday night will give the Wildcats a clear district title. Blanket is credited with a fine passing offense. They have a 5-2-1 record, the same as Rising Star.

One of the Blanket defeats has been in district play, a loss to the May Tigers. If they should win Friday night the result would throw the district standings into a 3-way tie, provided May gets by Gorman.

THROUGH THE EDITOR'S SPECS

They have been subdued with massive doses of antibiotics with some admixture of a sulfa complex, so I understand — why do doctors tell you so little of what you don't need to know? But in every case some reproductive cadre seems to have taken refuge in a secret doubt from which, given the least opportunity, they swarm forth in gleeful pasturage. Doc tells me I am at fault because I don't prosecute the war to win, but only to arrive at a truce.

"A case like this belongs in the hospital," he growled. "How the heck do you expect to win if you just chase 'em to the border?" It's Korea all over again.

So here I am taking his advice because there's really nothing else I can do about it. If the Rising Star Record comes to you this week it will be by the grace and neighborliness of two newspapermen, who if not the best, are certainly among the best country publishers in the state; by the determination of Mabel Ellis, who presides over the financial department of the Record and doubles in brass now and then, with assistants from my daughter and J. But for those of us who are capable of appreciation, it sometimes takes adversity to give it exercise. While we are self-sufficient we are not inclined to think how much the other fellow means to us. It should be apparent, of course. If the human race has achieved anything, it has been through cooperation. Alone man is a feeble and insignificant unit, equipped with only the merest of weapons. His strength exists in his intelligent ability to form a circle of togetherness, each contributing to the

The best coaching is ineffectual without good material, and I believe we can say that the 1962 Wildcat squad has that kind of young men.

But the responsibility doesn't end there. If the game of football means anything to the building of character the spectators must make perhaps the biggest contribution. It is the attitude of the fans, the ideals they insist upon, that makes the game worthwhile or perhaps a detriment.

Our boys and their coaches are entitled to the thanks and wholesome support of all Rising Star Friday night.

You've often heard the trite — but true — remark that Rome wasn't built in a day. Neither an illustration of the philosophy behind that fact. A fortunate and certainly timely illustration. Some months ago a group of imaginative people formed the Rising Star Development Corporation dedicated to the economic growth of the community. Its function is to help worthy and promising prospects receive necessary financing.

There were a number of opportunities to give aid. The corporation directors were cautious and the money stayed in the bank.

DEER HUNTERS FIND BEST TROPHIES IN LOCAL AREA

Local nimrods travel as far as Colorado and Wyoming to hunt deer, few realizing that chances for a big buck with a trophy rack are probably better right here at home.

October issue of Texas Game and Fish, official publication of Texas Game and Fish Commission, reports that the only set of whitetail antlers unusual enough to be included in Boone and Crockett Records of North America Big Game, was one killed on the McInnis Ranch, between Rising Star and Brownwood, last year. The prize buck was shot by Kelton S. Tillery, Fort Worth taxidermist, two days before close of the 1961 season. The buck's rack had 17 points and by trophy scoring was rated at 167, seven grade points above minimum for non-typical racks by Boone and Crockett standards. Tillery's buck was the only one from Texas to win such distinction since 1916.

THE HOUSE TO HOUSE SALESMAN

Joe Greenriver had been traveling to various cities selling magazine subscriptions. At each new town he would go from house to house selling subscriptions to the occupants.

He had been selling in Pleasantville for a couple of days when he was arrested and fined for violating a city ordinance which prohibited such door to door soliciting.

"You can't do this to me" screamed Joe. "This ordinance violates my rights of free speech, free press, and my right to work. It's unconstitutional!"

Can a city pass an ordinance prohibiting uninvited peddlers or solicitors from going onto private property to sell goods or solicit orders?

Yes, said the U. S. Supreme Court. Persons seeking private gain cannot be permitted under the guise of free speech or right to work to infringe upon the rights of others. Such a case calls for an adjustment of constitutional rights in the light of the particular living conditions of the time and place. Different communities may well call for different laws and regulations as to methods and manners of doing business. Everyone cannot have his own way but each must yield something to the reasonable satisfaction of the needs of all.

Communities can control such practices by ordinance. The court ruled that this ordinance was constitutional.

As an integral part of the homemaking program, F.H.A. provides opportunities for students to have experiences in planning and carrying out activities related to homemaking.

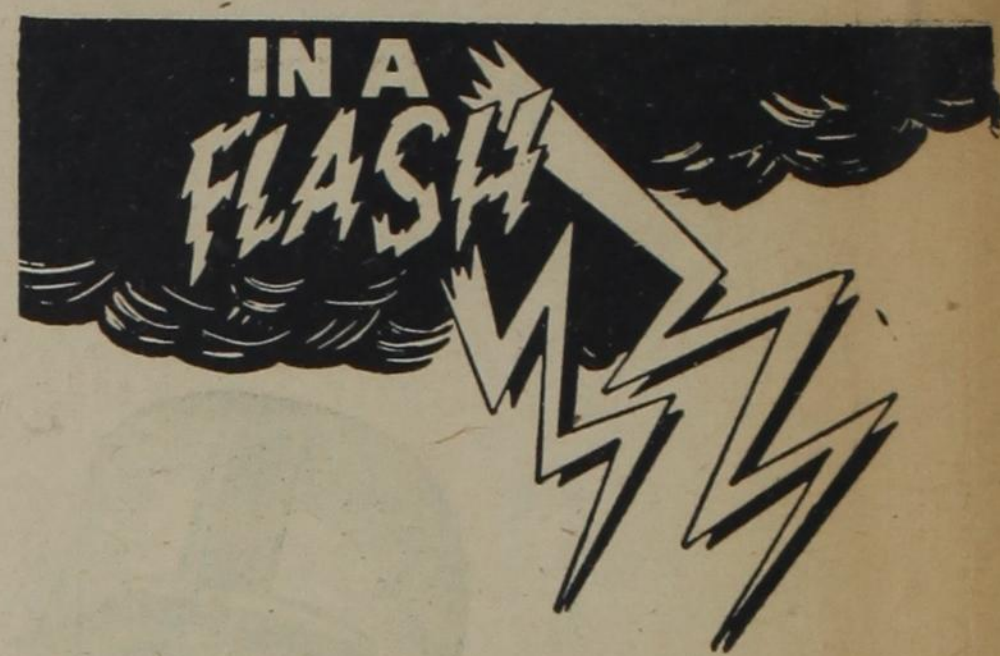
