

More study will be required and specific techniques will have to be worked out before the method can be generally used, investigators say.

But once the technique has been perfected and proved safe, it may greatly simplify con_ trol of mosquitoes. Meanwhile, you'll have to go along with old methods if you're interested in a summer relatively free of mosquito depredations.

Despite being more costly and difficult, the old methods do work. They consist of spraying inside the house with aerosol bombs, and keeping your back yard free of tin cans, old tires, grass cuttings, and anything else that can breed or harbor mosquitoes.






