Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent-

BEWARE OF FISH OIL CAPSULES:

Popular fish oil capsules may cause a deficiency of vitamin E, according to the new study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Previous findings have shown that some capsules on the market may contain dangerous levels of vitamins A & D and cholesterol.

Dr. Simin N. Meydani of the USDA, working at Tufts University's Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging, found that mice given fish oils require six to seven times more vitamin E. The researchers are now studying human reactions, but caution against use of fish oil supplements until the final word is in.

Elderly people may be more vulnerable to a Vitamin E deficiency because the aging body needs more the nutrient. Dr. Meydani says, that because the fish oil in capsules is so concentrated, the risk of vitamin E deficiency is greater than with fish itself. It's not yet known if the vitamin E added to fish oil capsules is enough to



The Sonics International site, located less than five miles west of Ranger on Highway 101, was recently listed as the 6th most hazardous waste site in Texas on the State Superfund Registry. HOW THE DELEGATE PROCESS WORKS IN TEXAS

During the Special Session, the legislature passed S.B. 4, which set up a same-day March 9 Primary for President and all state-local Democratic offices.

Aside from the same-day provision, the bill was amended in the House Elections Committee to fit all Party preferred positions. There was no way to pass a split-day primary because the 6-10 million cost could not be justified during state budget deficit problems. Critical changes include:

a. No less than 75% of the delegates will be directly allocated in proportion to the popular vote. Voters will vote directly for the Presidential candidate. Individual delegates reflecting the 75% directly allocated by popular vote will be chosen through the convention process.

b. Up to 25% of the delegates may be selected from the caucus/convention process in the manner all delegates were selected in the past, as in 1984-in the County/Senatorial convention, signing in with your Presidental Preference (caucus name or uncommitteed).

Those pledged delegates will be carried to the State Convention.

Be sure and mark your calendars for the Precinct meetings March 8th, after the Polls close, Precinct One will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the Court House. This provision keeps alive the precinct meetings.

Texas' 25% is greater than most states delegate totals, so candidates will have to return to Texas after March, since delegates will still be at stake.

We get one precinct delegate for every 25 votes cast for Governor Mark White in November, 1986. One State Delegate for every 300 votes cast.







"Recent survey show that it's not unusual for consumers in small towns to spend more than half of their income in larger cities," notes Stebbins, a community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "To a large extent, higher prices are not the problem. If necessary, most consumers are willing to pay slightly higher prices and support local merchants if they are satisfied in other ways."

That means excellent customer relations--a low cost, effective way for merchants to keep present customers and gain new ones.

"Good 'word of mouth' advertising is the cheapest and best advertising that a merchant can get," emphasizes the specialist. "More merchants need to do a better job and make sure that satisfied customers are spreading the word."

Good customer relations include asking questions to understand customer needs. "Many times customers need assistance in selecting the correct model, size or quality of some product," points out Stebbins. "It's important to know enough about the product to help the customer make the best choice."

A sincere smile on the

face of a courteous, well groomed salesperson who is giving a customer full attention can make a favorable impression. On the other hand, an indifferent attitude by the sales person can easily send a customer to a competitor. Even the best managed store will occasionally have a dissatisfied customer, notes the specialist.

"Experts in customer relations tell us that there are effective ways to deal with the irate person," says Stebbins. "The important thing is to allow the unhappy customer to express his feelings and then find an agreeable solution."

Stebbins advises community business leaders to take the initiative in encouraing and assisting merchants to adopt improved customer relations procedures. "Everyone in the com-

munity benefits if the retail trade and service sector is pleasing customers," says the specialist. "Businesses are more likely to be profitable, customers happier and jobs in retailing more secure. And more dollars stay in town to possibly create more job opportunities."

Community development specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service offer training in customer relations. Interested merchants can contact their local county Extension agent to arrange a training program.

Social Security rates increased to 7.51 percent, up from 7.15 percent, on January 1, 1988. This increase applies to both employees and employers. The self-employed now pay 13.02 percent, up from 12.3 percent. Texas employers will face an increase in federal unemployment rates

soon. According to reports, about 60 percent of Texas employers will see unemployment rates more than triple.

In a report to Texas employers in October, 1987 issued by Texas Employement Commission (TEC). the increase is a result of a declining Texas economy and that the Unemployment Fund has been broke since January 1986. TEC had to borrow from the Federal Government in order to continue payments of unemployment compensation to eligible persons who were unemployed. To find a solution to the trust fund deficit a joint business/labor Trust Fund Work Group was

ed into law. HB979 and HB 2090 were designed to return the trust fund to solvency at a minimum cost to Texas employers. A brief review of this legislation and its impact on employers is as follows:

HOUSE BILL 979 Under current law, your tax rate is composed of a general rate, a replenishment rate and a deficit rate, also an interest surtax may be assessed to pay the interest on the trust fund debt. HB 979 amends current law so that when the deficit rate is calculated the deficit ratio is applied to an employer's total tax rate rather than the general tax rate for rate calculations effective January 1, 1988. However, the rate is capped at 2 percent and as the condition of the fund improves, the deficit rate will decrease. Most employers can anticipate a deficit rate increase from .1 percent to 1.4 percent as a result of the new calculation.

HOUSE BILL 2090

•Authorizes TEC to levy an interest surtax of no more than 0.2 percent to insure the timely payment of interest on trust fund indebtedness; •Increases the taxable wage base from \$7,000 to

\$8,000 in tax year 1988 and to \$9,000 in tax year 1989; •Allows TEC to issue bonds as an alternative to federal advances or to refinance the trust fund debt.

Sonics Site Ranks in State's Most Hazardous

The Sonics International site, located less than 5 miles west of Ranger on Hwy. 101, was recently listed as the 6th most hazardous waste site in Texas on the State Superfund Registry.

To recall events, a public meeting was held in Ranger on February 17, 1987 where citizens of Ranger were able to discuss and tell what they knew about the Sonics International site with representatives of the Texas Water Commission (TWC). The meeting was held in regards to Sonics International's Well No. 116 and Well No. 137, former injection wells which reportedly were involved in a series of blowouts in 1979, contaminating the ground around the site.

According to TWC at the time, the main concern at the site dealt with contamination of the soil with hazardous chemicals including hydrocarbons. Soil samples were taken to see if the site qualified as a hazardous waste site. Apparently it qualified and was listed, among 27 other sites, in the State Superfund Registry, ranking No. 6 on the list. The registry ranks the sites in priority of need for cleanup. Making the list is the first step toward the state paying for cleanup of the site. At the time of the meeting held last February, there was great concern about whether or not water wells in the area, lakes and rivers were being contaminated by the seepage or run-off from the Sonics site. In speaking last week with William Colbert, Public Informattion Director with Texas Water Commission, Colbert said he felt there was no immediate threat to area water or a

health hazzard at the time. If + there was immediate danger, Colbert said action * would be taken immediately. Colbert added that the site could be a potential danger if the matter were to go uncorrected for a long time. He said that at this time, efforts were still being made to contact those that were involved with the site in any way, in order to hold someone responsible for the cleanup.


