## May 18 Date for Pre-registration for Kindergarten

Pre-registration of kindergarten children eases pressures of enrolling a large group at one time, alerts the parent to get necessary records together and allows the teacher to plan for the coming year.

At pre-registration time parents can pick up forms for immunization records and census forms.

Before a child begins kindergarten in the 1982-83 school year, the parent must have these records for the school; a certified copy of the birth certificate, (a photostatic copy will be placed in the child's permanent school record); a record of 3 DPT and 3 polio immunizations,

plus a booster after the 4th birthday; and an MMR vaccination, or doctor's certification that the child has had measles, mumps and rubella.

Plan to pre-register your child May 18 at the Rising Star Elementary School.

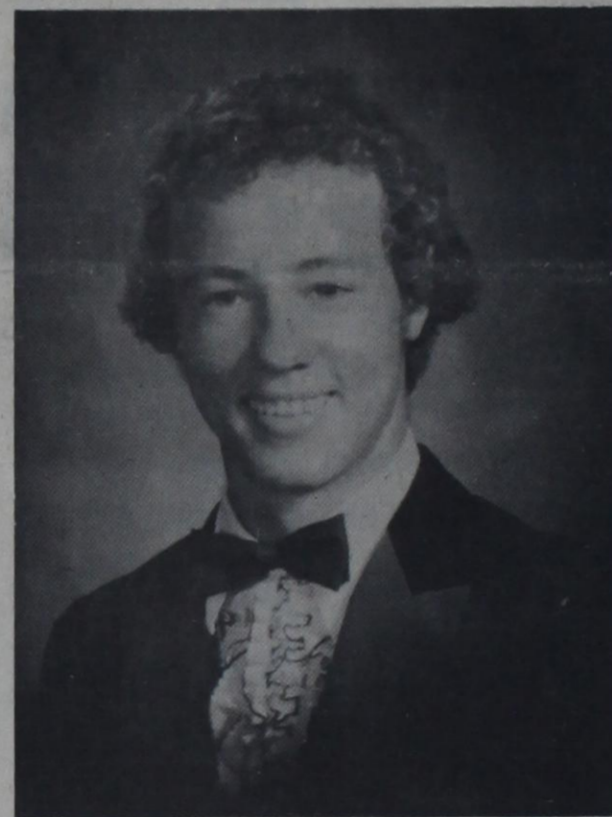

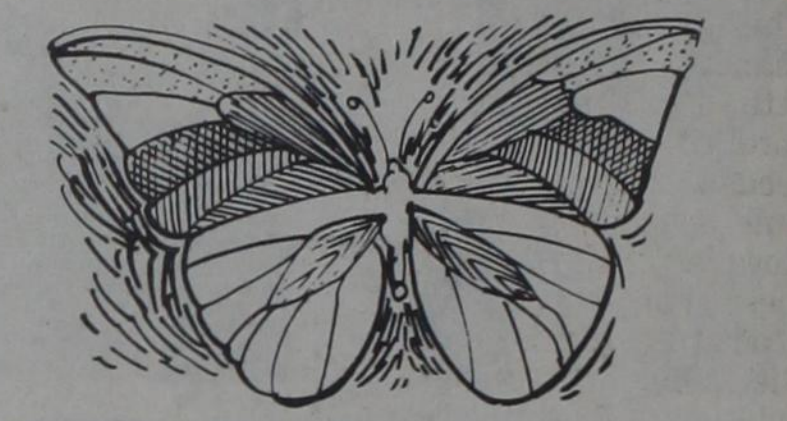

## Students Reminded Of Social Security Changes

According to Glyn hammons, Social Security District Manager in Abilene, students 18 to 22 getting Social Security checks are reminded about important recent changes that will reduce or eliminate future benefits. How students are affected will depend primarily on the type of school they are in and when benefits started:

1. If you attend college (or other post-secondary school)—Payments can continue until you finish school, reach age 22, marry, or through April 1985, whichever comes first, provided you meet both of these conditions: You were entitled to a Social Security check for August 1981 when the law was changed; and you were attending (not just enrolled in) a post-secondary school full time before May 1982. However, be aware of these changes:

You will receive no checks for May, June, July, and August even if in school full time. You aren't eligible for cost-of-living increases that are given most Social Security beneficiaries each summer.

Your benefit will be reduced 25% each year, starting with the September 1982 check (due October 3).

If you attend post-secondary school and first became entitled to a Social Security check for a month after August 1981, benefits can be paid only for months of full-time attendance through July 1982 (including May, June, and July if you are in school or intend to return to school). You are not eligible after that.

2. If you attend high school--Starting August 1982, payments generally can continue only up to the month you are 19 or until the end of the semester or quarter in which you reach 19, if later. If

your school is not on a semester or quarter basis, checks will be paid until you complete the course or for 2 months after the month you are 19, whichever is first.

If you have any questions about changes in student benefits or about completing the form, contact any Social Security office. The Abilene office is located at 142 S. pioneer. Telephone number is 698-1360 or you can use 1-800-392-1603 if you don't live in Abilene.

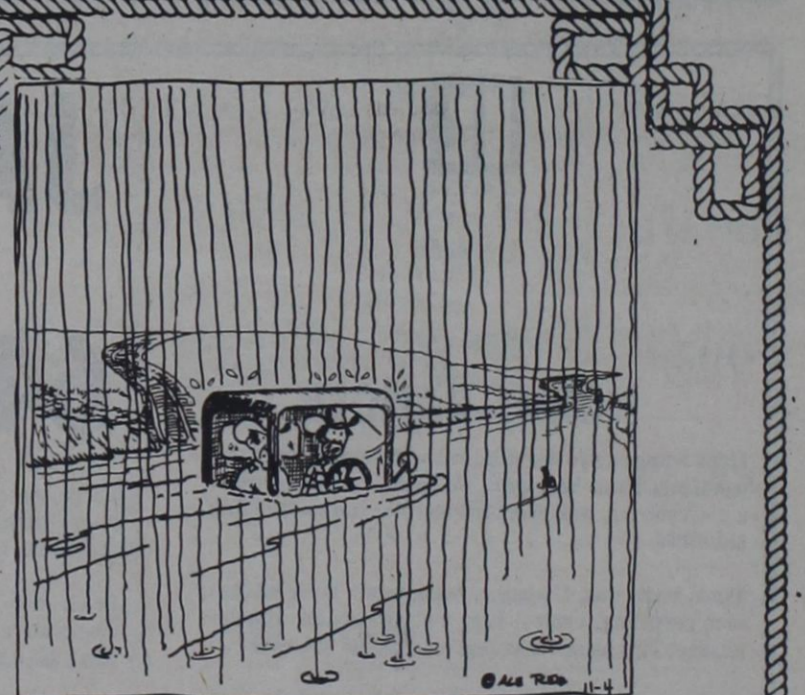

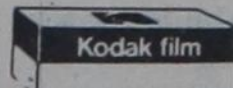

## Oilfield activity report

Producing 2,046,000 CF of gas per day, the No. 7 Corbett was completed successfully in the Corbett Field by Jones Company of Albany.

Drillsite is six miles northeast of Ivan.

It was drilled to 4,223-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 4,084 to 4,092 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on 1.375 choke, and absolute open flow was estimated at 7,200,000 CFPD.

The location is in a 3,343-acre lease in Stephens

County's Ruthy Campbell Survey, A-37.

A 4,200-ft. wildcat is planned by Snow Oil Company of Fort Worth at a drillsite one mile south of Gunsight, Stephens County. The location is in a 160-acre lease in the SPRR Survey, A-1445. Well's designation is the No. 1 Poe-Fambro.

Piranha Production Inc. of Graham has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 J.T. McDonald, a 4,500-ft. wildcat 3/4 mile south of Eliasville.

Location is in a 160-acre lease in Stephens County's J. Roach Survey, A-1057.

At a location ten miles east of Moran, The Way Oil Company of Weatherford has finalized a new oil producer in Stephens County's Johnny Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Whitfield, pumping oil at the rate of 40 barrels per day on a 6/64 choke. Tubing pressure was 200 PSI. The well also showed potential for a small amount of casinghead gas per day.

Location is in a 243-acre lease in the Orphan Asylum Lands Survey, A-2650. Bottomed at 4,226 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,150 to 4,217 feet into the hole.

Snow Oil Company of Fort Worth has revealed plans to drill a 4,200-ft. developmental well in the Ledbetter Field. The operator has 1,040 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's SPRR Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 7 Harrell. Drillsite is one and one half miles south of Gunsight.

Kadane Oil Company of Wichita Falls has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the Bob Richards Ranch Field. The No. 2 Brierton Unit No. 2 showed potential to make 1,400,000 CF of gas per day on a 3/8-inch choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 3,500,000 CFPD.

The operator has 162 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's Alex Kelly Survey, five miles east of Gordon.

The well will produce from an interval 3,458 to 3,468 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 3,450 feet.

A 4,400-ft. developmental well is planned by Mitchell

Energy Corp. of The Woodlands at a drillsite three miles west of Lone Camp, Palo Pinto County. The location is in a 176-acre lease in the C. Veale Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1 Heath-Jones Gas Unit. It is in the Southwest Palo Pinto Field.

Oilwell Operators Inc. of Pampa has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Harrington, a 4,100-ft. developmental well five miles east of Santo. Location is in a 160-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T. Whiteley Survey. The Harrington well is in the Harken Field.

A Weatherford-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Moore, a developmental well to be located one mile east of Mineral Wells. With projected total depth of 4,700 feet, the well is in a 21-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Survey. The operator is RAW Energy Corp.

Reagan M. Waskom Jr. of Dallas has revealed plans to drill a 4,700-ft. wildcat. The operator has 240 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's TE&L Survey, A-598 and has designated the venture as the No. 3 Hart

## Maximum recovery rate hits 10th year

DALLAS—The 10th consecutive year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil and gas fields pushed the state's output of crude oil and condensate last year to nearly 929-million barrels.

The total of 929,710,351 barrels included more than 897-million barrels of crude oil. Figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association also indicate that more than 31-million barrels of condensate were produced.

Texas' drilling boom, spawned by crude oil price decontrol, continued last year. Figures from the

Railroad Commission's Oil & Gas Division show 24,998 new holes drilled in the state last year, an 18.1-percent increase from the 1980 total of 20,490 wells. Oil completions stood at 15,627, up 21.2-percent from 1980, while drilling applications jumped 17.8-percent between 1980 and 1981. A total of 47,940 applications were received last year, compared to 39,442 in 1980.

Last year's crude oil and condensate production total was 31.6-million below the 1980 figure, a decrease of 3.3-percent. It marked the ninth consecutive year of a downward trend since Texas' output peaked at near 1.3-billion barrels in 1972. However, 1981 production from the nation's No. 1 petroleum producing province pushed the all-time cumulative total since 1866 to more than 46.6-billion barrels of crude oil and condensate.

Avery Rush, Jr., of Amarillo, chairman of the Dallas-based Association, noted that although the production decline continued last year, the 1981 decrease reflected a slowing in the rate of decline. It was the lowest percentage drop in the past five years.

"It is very encouraging to see that the unprecedented drilling activity of the past two years is beginning to have a positive effect on Texas production," Rush said. "Only by increasing our reserves can we eventually turn around our production decline. And the only way to increase reserves is by drilling," Rush said.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 1,837,637 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 5,035 barrels per day. Production in 1981 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 130,107,557 barrels.

Just as in 1980, 21 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil. The following listing shows 1981 production figures for the state's five

top producing counties, all with production in excess of 42-million barrels.

Gaines became the state's top producing county, with Yoakum, the 1980 leader, dropping into second place. Ector, which has held third place for six consecutive years, dropped to fourth behind Pecos, fourth last year. Gregg retained the fifth place spot it held in 1980.

Harris, which was No. 19 last year, was the only county to leave the top 21. It was replaced by Lee, which, as indicated above, also ranked No. 19 this year.

Gregg, the first Texas county to produce more than two-billion barrels of crude oil and condensate in the history of recorded production, remains the all-time leader with a cumulative total through 1981 of 2,773,158,932 barrels. Ector, through the end of last year, had produced 2,351,571,490 barrels, while Andrews also joined the ranks of two-billion barrel producers with 2,015,569,194 barrels.

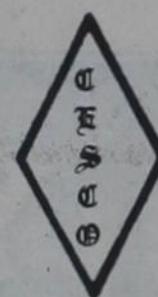

## Texas Crude Oil Production 897 Million Barrels in 1981

Dallas— The 10th consecutive year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil and gas fields pushed the state's output of crude oil and condensate last year to nearly 929-million barrels.

The total of 929,710,351 barrels included more than 897-million barrels of crude oil. Figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association also indicate that than 31-million barrels of condensate were produced.

Texas' drilling boom, spawned by crude oil price decontrol, continued last year. Figures from the Railroad Commission's Oil & Gas Division show 24,998 new holes drilled in the state last year, an 18.1-percent increase from the 1980 total of 20,490 wells. Oil completions stood at 15,627, up 21.2-percent from 1980, while drilling applications jumped 17.8-percent between

1980 and 1981. A total of 47,940 applications were received last year, compared to 39,442 in 1980.

Last year's crude oil and condensate production total was 31.6 million barrels below the 1980 figure, a decrease of 3.3-percent. It marked the ninth consecutive year of a downward trend since Texas' output peaked at near 1.3-billion barrels in 1972. However, 1981 production from the nation's No. 1 petroleum producing province pushed the all-time cumulative total since 1866 to more than 46.6-billion barrels of crude oil and condensate.

Avery Rush, jr., of Amarillo, chairman of the Dallas-based Association, noted that although the production decline continued last year, the 1981 decrease reflected a slowing in the rate of decline. It was the lowest percentage drop in the past five years.

"It is very encouraging to see that the un-

precedented drilling activity of the past two years is beginning to have a positive effect on Texas production," Rush said. "Only by increasing our reserves can we eventually turn around our production decline. And the only way to increase reserves is by drilling," Rush said.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 1,837,637 barrels of crude oil condensate at the rate of 5,035 barrels per day. Production in 1981 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 130,107,557 barrels.

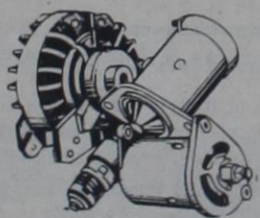

# First Ladies of Eastland County

Outstanding people deserve special recognition. These Eastland County mothers of 1982 have much in common: they are all intelligent, attractive, caring women who have given much to their families and communities.

Another thing in common is that they are wives of the Mayors of Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, and Rising Star, and have supported their husbands in many civic endeavors. So meet the "First Ladies" of Eastland County, mothers who are making our towns good places in which to live.



"Dedication" and "devotion" are words often used to describe Lois Bolding Marshall, homemaker, teacher, mother, and wife of Eastland's Mayor, Charles Marshall.

The Marshall sons, Charles and John, were both Honor Graduates of Eastland High School and the University of Texas in Austin. Charles is now an Attorney in Dallas, Texas, and John is a C.P.A. in Houston.

A native Oklahoman, Lois Marshall graduated from Forney High School, Forney, Texas. Further education was at Texas Woman's University, Denton, where she received a B.A. Degree, and at the University of Texas, Austin, graduating with a M.A. Degree.

Charles and Lois Marshall met when they were both teaching at Olney, Texas. In 1952 they were married in a Chapel on the Denton T.W.U. Campus. They moved to Eastland in 1955, where Charles Marshall became High School Principal. At this time he is Counselor at the school, in addition to his duties as a Mayor.

During her years as a teacher Mrs. Marshall has taught all grades, from first through Junior College. She taught at C.J.C. Summer Sessions in 1971, '72, and '73. For the past 9 years she has been teacher of English III and IV in Eastland High School, where she sponsors the National Beta Club and U.I.L. Ready Writing and Journalism.

Lois Marshall is involved with the work of the First United Methodist Church in Eastland, where she serves as a Sunday School teacher and a member of the Administrative Board.

Professionally, she is a member and Past President of Beta Upsilon of Delta Kappa Gamma, a member of Texas State Teacher's Association and National Educator's Association, and the National Council of Teachers of English.

During the years Mrs. Marshall has inspired her journalism and English students to compete in U.I.L. contests, where they have won a number of honors. She has assisted in the production of the "High School Page" for the Eastland Telegram, and has brought students out on the annual newspaper tour.

But even more rewarding has been the encouragement given to her two sons in their achievements, and the support given to her husband in his civic affairs.



Dark haired, hazel eyed Annita Hartzell Ritchie would win recognition anywhere. But fortunately she has found a life in Cisco which has special meaning for her - as the wife of Eris Ritchie, Mayor and businessman, as the mother of four outstanding children, and as a homemaker.

The Ritchie family includes two teenagers, Matt, 17, and Robin, 13, and two younger children, Holly, 7, and Michael, 4. This age span has worked well, the Ritchies say.

Music also works well for the family, since most members are gifted along this line. Eris Ritchie, a former Band Director, plays a number of Band instruments and the piano. Mrs. Ritchie, a soprano, plays the piano, and Matt plays the coronet and Robin the flute.

The Ritchies are members of the Cisco Interstate Church of Christ, where Annita has taught children of all ages. She sings in quartets and groups, and has worked for family life enrichment in both Church and community. Among other projects, she has worked with the School Advisory Council of the Homemaking Dept. The Ritchies have also kept a number of children during Holidays from the Foster Children's Home in Stephenville.

Annita Ritchie was born in Louisiana and has lived in various places, but feels that her deepest roots are in Cisco.

"I've been here longer than any other place," she notes - "Twenty years. This is my home."

The Ritchies met at Abilene Christian College, when Annita Hartzell was working toward a Major in Speech, and Eris Ritchie toward a Master's Degree. After their marriage Ritchie became Band Director at Cisco High School, then Director of Public Relations at Cisco Junior College. At this time he manages his own business, taking the necessary time to serve as Mayor of the City.

Mrs. Ritchie taught school for several years after marriage, then worked part time in fashion merchandising. She recently purchased the Lemon Tree Boutique in Cisco, a shop managed by her mother, Juanita Hartzell.

Mrs. Ritchie lists other special interests, such as sewing and art. But her thoughts always go back to children - not just her own well-cared for family, but disadvantaged children in the area.

"They need so much love. How I want to help them! Children are such a blessing."



La Juan Jenkins Killion, wife of Mayor H.L. Killion of Rising Star, has had a number of events occur in this area.

Her birthplace was at Gorman, where she was the first of four children born to J.D. and Gracie Jenkins. Due to her father's work, La Juan Jenkins left the area and spent most of her Grade and Jr. High school years in various places across Texas. The family moved to Rising Star about the time she entered High School, where she graduated in 1951.

Soon afterward La Juan married Lovell (H.L.) Killion at the home of his parents, Floyd and Myrtle Killion, in May, Texas.

During the next years the Killions moved about to different parts of the world - Iran, Borneo, Holland, and England. The family had three children: Yvonne (McCutchen), Wesley, and Sybrinna. It was quite a challenge to bring these children up among the various moves and cultures.

Moving back to Rising Star was a homecoming for the Killions. While her husband established a business, La Juan attended Cisco Junior College. She later obtained an Activity Director's License, and served in this capacity at Rising Star Nursing Center. She gave personal attention to the social and

**MEALY BUGS--** Slow-moving pests covered with a mealy wax, these insects look like dabs of cotton not more than 1/4 inch long. Like aphids, they suck the juices from plants. Infested plants are stunted and eventually die. Found on stems where stems and leaves join, and on leaves--especially along veins.

**MILIPEDES--** Millipedes are found in the soil or any place near plants where there is plenty of organic material to feed on--including seeds, roots and stems.

**SCALES--** These insects resemble brown barnacles that attach themselves to the underside of leaves, main stalks and shoots. Scale insects obtain food by sucking plant juices; this causes poor growth and stunted plants.

**SPIDER MITES (Red Spiders)--** Barely visible to the naked eye, these eight-legged pests are named because they spin tiny webs in the various fleshy parts of the

plants. They are found first on the undersides of leaves and when numerous spread to other plant parts. These sucking pests are particularly troublesome during warm, dry weather. Infested foliage appears rusty or bronzed. As feeding progresses leaves may drop from plants.

**WHITE FLIES--** These small, wedge-shaped, white insects fly away when disturbed. They resemble small snowflakes or bits of paper ash. White flies are found on the underside of leaves. They damage plants by sucking the sap. Infested leaves become pale and mottled and may eventually turn yellow and die.

Pesticides, such as pyrethrum and malathion, will work wonders in eliminating houseplant pests without damaging plants. But if you are in doubt about which spray to use, consult your county extension service. Once the proper spray material has been determined, select the right sprayer for proper application. For more information contact your County Extension Office. And remember always read and follow label instructions.

## Pest Alert

Gordon Woolam

There is nothing more discouraging to the houseplant lover than to find plants suffering the effects of insect attack: leaves with holes, ragged edges, brown spots, and stems that are stunted and dying.

If you have houseplants, you're likely to have insect problems at one time or another. The following precautions and remedies for houseplant insect attack are suggested.

It is relatively common for new plants to already be infested when they are brought home from the store. Also, tiny insects can come in every time you open the door or raise the window. And if houseplants are taken outdoors during the summer months, they will be susceptible to the same insects as the plants and flowers growing in your garden.

To prevent trouble, examine new plants to be sure they are free of pests. It's also a good

idea to isolate new plants and watch for infestations. Insects spread quickly and easily to adjacent plants if left unchecked.

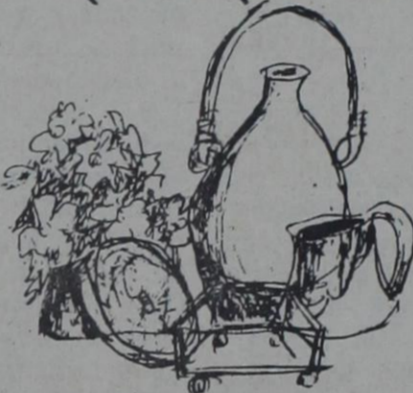
Fortunately, the most common houseplant pests are few and easily controlled with the proper spray material and application equipment.

What follows are the more common pests you are likely to find on your houseplants.

**APHIDS--** These plant lice are soft-bodied, round or pear-shaped, and come in many colors. Typically, aphids cluster on the undersides of leaves or on young, tender leaves and stems. Aphids feed by sucking plant juices; this feeding causes poor growth, stunted plants and distorted leaves.

**CYCLAMEN MITES--** Adult mites are too small to be seen with the naked eye. Mites are found mostly in protected places on young tender leaves,

# Letters To The Editor

I was pleased to read in last week's paper that our teenagers want to include alcohol in the local Anti-Drug Campaign. Alcohol is the number three killer in our county. It is used by our teenagers here. Some of our children just drink, some just use drugs, and some are mixing both. Something has to be done to control this abuse of drugs and alcohol in children whose bodies and minds are still growing and developing.

The article the girls came up with is true. We read about such terrible things everyday. Every paper we pick up has some horror article in it that was the end result of a joint, the last drink, or one too many pills. But you never read about babies born addicted to alcohol and drugs. Babies are born everyday deformed, brain damaged or dead because of alcohol and drug abuse. These horrors you don't read about in a newspaper everyday. Everytime you drink up or light up you are taking a chance on having a child like this. Drugs affects your body's reproductive system. Marijuana interferes with female and male sex glands and their growth and development. It will affect your ability to have normal children.

The number one social and criminal problem in the county today is drugs. The drug industry ranks in size with A.T. & T., General Motors, and Exxon—it is a 55-70 billion dollar a year industry. The United

States spends as much money on marijuana as it does on imported oil; approximately 48 billion dollars a year.

Marijuana is composed of 421 known chemicals, only one of which has been studied extensively, Delta-9-T.H.C.

Compared to cigarettes, five (5) marijuana cigarettes have the same cancer-causing capability as smoking 112 cigarettes. Marijuana has more carcinogens than tobacco tar.

Marijuana compared to alcohol: Alcohol is water soluble, it is washed out of the body in 12-24 hours. T.H.C. is fat soluble and it is stored in the fatty tissues of the body. The brain, reproductive system, lungs and the immune system. It also builds up in the body because it takes so long to leave the body. A week after smoking just one joint 30 to 60 percent of the T.H.C. is still in the body in active form. Marijuana stays in the brain and keeps operating long after the high is gone. This time element is anywhere from six weeks to six months.

How often do you smoke? Do you know what is considered heavy use? Heavy user-five or more joints in one week; Regular user-one or more joints in one week; Infrequent user-less than one a month; Experimental-tryed once or twice and gave up.

Are you addicted to drugs? Could people look at you and say "there goes a dooper, pot head." Would you admit to look at

yourself and know you were addicted to marijuana or other drugs?

As for physical damage, it alters the fundamental cellular defenses against diseases. White blood cell count is reduced 41% with regular use. Reaction time is down 40% after one joint, 60% after two joints.

Marijuana causes irreversible brain damage, shrinkage and brain atrophy. It shortens attention spans, reduces performance levels and disrupts memory. Chronic exposure of marijuana smoke produces serious alterations of lung tissue, including inflammatory response, breakdown of air sacs in lung tissue and the formation of cholesterol clefts in the lungs.

All information was taken from the latest reports and studies from the Texas War on Drugs.

I am not pointing fingers or accusing anyone. I am not being a hypocrite. I do drink every once in a while. I am a grown mature woman. I am of an age to make up my own judgements on alcohol. I make my own living; I don't depend on anyone to support me. I never have hid or lied or went to the trees, snake pit, gate, fox grounds, or the rodeo grounds to drink. I am not proud that I do drink but I don't feel I have to defend my right as an

adult to a child. I am not being a hypocrite nor am I embarrassed to go to the anti-drug meetings. We did have a drug problem in our family. Lanna did use marijuana. And yes she's told me about the other drugs she's used. I feel that it is partly my fault she started using them. That maybe I wasn't there when she needed me. Maybe a part of it was peer pressure, but I feel the main part was she didn't know what those drugs could do to her. If she knew then what she does now about drugs, I don't think she would have used them.

Lanna has had to learn the hard way who to trust and who her true friends are. Friends don't hurt each other, not with words or deeds. And it sure wasn't a good deed whoever gave her the first joint she smoked or the speed she took.

I want her to know how proud of her I am and how much I love her. We had sure missed our good hearted, easy going "Lu Lu" at our house.

The main object of our meetings are to make drugs and alcohol unavailable to our minor children.

As for not signing notices about the meetings it would take a lot of space to write down everyone who is "concerned". Anyone concerned enough about who attends, will

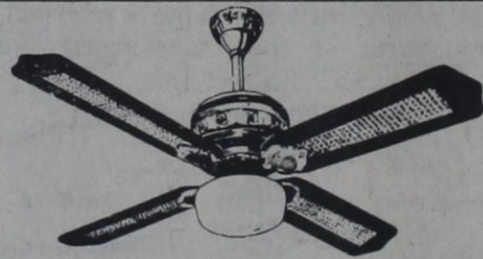
