Hogan Family Story Recounted

Eighty-five years have come and gone since Jim Hogan was born on the old Hogan place on Copperas Creek South of Sipe Springs. But the years have been kind to Jim and his wit and outlook on life are those of a man many years younger.

Our story begins in that unsettled era following the War Between the States when families were seeking to leave wounded memories behind and hoping to find better opportunities in the West.

Grandfather Hogan was a victim of the war, leaving a young widow and four small children to fend for themselves. Grandmother Hogan joined a calvacade of wagons headed for Bell County driving a yoke of oxen with all her earthly goods stowed in the Constenoga.

The family grew up in Bell County and Grandmother Hogan died and is buried there. Jim's Parents, Frank Hogan and Cordelia Childress Hogan were born in 1853 and 1856, respectively. His mother's people were one of the earliest settlers in Bell County, where she was born. Frank was a native of Arkansas.

After Frank and Cordelia were married in Bell County, Frank decided to join others in moving farther West. The oldest boy was born in a covered wagon enroute to the new home in Comanche County.

Settling in the Copperas Creek vicinity led the Hogan children to enjoy social activities in and around both Sipe Springs and Stag Creek. Jim recalled Professor La Roque's music schools in more than one community. Around the turn of the century, when cotton was still the basic source of revenue for the farmer, the Hogans sold their farm South of Sipe Springs and moved to the old Jewel community, northwest of Indian Mountain.

By this time Jim had grown to school age and attended his first school at old Jewel under Mrs. Laura Ella Robinson. He was delighted to learn that his teacher is still living.

With a group of eleven children there was no lacking for entertainment Jim said. Any time Father didn't have the boys harnessed up in the summertime they were at the Epsom Hole on old Sabanno on the

Tyrone place. Once Jim and brother Ed found a bee tree in the Tyrone pasture. They decided to rob the hive for the honey, but the bees got too thick, and the boys took to their heels and fled.

A popular sport was "possum hunting". The family dogs enjoyed the hunt as well as the Hogan boys and their friends did. Nobody got rich from selling the pelts. Opossum hides brought .20 to .25 cents in the .30 to .35 cent bracket.

Jim recalled a woman in the vicinity who bought live,

healthy opossums, put them in coops and fattened them out to eat, much as you would a chicken or a hog.

And "boys will be boys." One Christmas Jim, his brothers, and their buddies, staged a Roman candle fight on horseback. Jim said it was a bit tough, taking aim, keeping your balance on a bucking horse, and staying in the game!

Once when Jim was a little tyke of some 12 years of age he was riding one of the work animals in for the noon meal. Suffering from a seasonal spring plague of boils, Jim was riding gingerly and favoring his seat when his horse

was boogered by an old hog. The lad was dumped to the ground with a bang. The episode took care of the boil, as Jim limped towards the house.

Music played an important role in the Hogan family. Jim and his brothers and sisters enjoyed the singing schools, music schools and popular dances around Davis, Jewel, Indian Mountain and Sipe Springs.

Jim's sister, Minnie, was at the piano; brother Joe, on the guitar; and John Brown of Gorman on the fiddle.

The popular dance steps of that era were the waltz and square dance. Jim recalled with a twinkle in his eye the popular square dance callers, Lock Morton, Cecil Sutton, Euewell Poynor, and Martin McDaniel.

In memory he could hear Martin McDaniel yet as he called the steps to, "Figure 8," "Balance 4," "Under the Rainbow," and "Ocean Wave."

The Fourth of July meant the BIG celebration at Bass Lake. There would be a "Wild West Show," political speakers, pink lemonade, and swimming in the Bass Lake swimming pool if you were rich enough to own a bought bathing suit. Jim said he enjoyed all of it but the swimming, but he couldn't qualify in that department as he had no swimming trunks.

Baseball on the pasture glades was a Sunday afternoon favorite. Jim played backstop. The team's pitcher was George Carter. Players would be drafted for the various positions as available until the nine would be filled in. The Jewel team took on Indian Mountain, New Hope or Bear Springs as these communities were near enough by that the players could walk to the game if they had no horse to ride.

Breaking horses was a must when you raised your own, but Jim said he did a lot of his courting by mule back. He only had one problem. If he ever courted at a girl's house, the mule would stop at her house every time he passed there again, even though the new girlfriend might be living on down the road.

Once Jim and Ed were coming in from Gorman at night. Jim was on his mule. He struck a match on the iron saddle horn and the mule ran away! The combination of the scratching noise and flash of light was just too much!

Jim was drafted in the 4th Division in May of 1917 at the beginning of World War I. It was
