2.8 Inches Are Recorded by City Gauge Over Week

A total of 2.8 inches of rains, as recorded by the City gauge, and which appeared to be general over a large part of the Rising Star area, brought broad smiles to the faces of farmers and businessmen alike during the week just past.

The rains, breaking a long summer dry spell which threatened to cause another peanut crop failure and retarded feed crops and pastures, fell most heavily in the sections north, east and south of Rising Star. The sections west, northwest and southwest, received lighter showers as a rule, according to

reports here. The August moisture, coming at a most opportune time, brought new vigor and promise to the peanut crops, revived pastures and insured a better

In many sections farmers were further showers in late August or early September, observers said, the yield would be heavy in many places.

The showers began with light precipitation Wednesday of last week, when .3 of an inch was recorded. The heaviest rainfall came Thursday, August 11, when the gauge recorded 2.25 inches. A quarter of an inch of rain fell Tuesday morning of this

There was a promise of more rains as skies remained clouded and a cool, humid air covered
