

> A white powder, Rug-Hug, needs only to be sprinkled under in a light film conforming to the size and shape of the rug. Powder keeps anchoring the rug until after it is washed out or vacuumed off, then it must be replaced.

> Although it must be painted on, Griptex Rug Guard lasts and lasts. Rugs can be washed and washed time after time without any effect on the anchoring adhesive. The back of the rug can be completely coated or a large "X" painted on the center with a wide border coating near the edges may be sufficient.

A sheet of light plastic foam cut to the size of the rug is another solution. It may be purchased in carpet stores or in variety stores.
