The thieves, who invaded Madison's property also, took loose the five wires of a fence Dean had recently built around his place, but they put only the top wire back.

When Madison learned that four of his fence wires had been left hanging, he and Willis made a quick trip Monday to check on the situation and the CJC president discovered Star. his loss.
