

The Stewarts had already begun work on the new structure when they vacated the building they had occupied in the downtown area at the end of April. Optimism ran high as they made plans to reopen their tire store within a few short weeks. They were constructing the building themselves with the help of relatives.

Jury Takes 48 Minutes To Find Lundstrom Guilty

Sentenced To Life For Murder of Wife

A jury of four women and eight men returned a verdict of guilty at 11:40 a.m. Tuesday in the murder case of the State of Texas vs Loyal Edward Lundstrom, 60, Cisco church and civic leader for more than 10 years, in the 91st District Court,

"deadly weapon" was used in the shooting and, under criminal law, this will require Lundstrom to serve a minimum of 20 years before being eligible to be considered for parole. Otherwise he would have been eligible for parole consideration in about seven and one half years.

Sheriff Johnny Morren took Lundstrom into custody and transported him to the county jail immediately after the sentencing. It was understood that he will not be eligible for release on bond if the defense appeals

There was no immediate indication as to whether the verdict would be appealed to a higher court. It was understood that the defense has 10 days in which to file notice for appeal.

The jury received the case at 10:52 a.m. Tuesday after attorneys completed their arguments. Proceedings, which had been recessed last Friday until 8 a.m. Tuesday, began with the defense resting its case without presenting witnesses. The

defendant did not testify, as expected.

Judge Wright read his charge to the jury. In this, he interpreted the law as it applied to the case. He read a portion of a letter that Lundstrom wrote to his pastor in which the defendant said he only wanted to scare his wife...not kill her. The judge explained accidental death cases and noted that evidence of guilt had to be "beyond proven reasonable doubt."

The charge cautioned that the jury could consider only such matters as were introduced in evidence by the state and its witnesses and that they were not to consider a possible punishment in their deliberations.

The district attorney, in the opening argument, spoke some 30 minutes to review the crime from the indictment to the trial. He summarized the testimony of the various witnesses. He quoted from the Lundstrom letter and he reviewed testimony which, he said, proved that "Doris was literally a slave - looking after the needs of five children, being their motel maid, working in their tombstone monument shop, looking after office details and helping with the bus sta-

Mr. Walton said he did not consider the murder of Mrs. Lundstrom as an act of "criminal negligent

homocide." He said he couldn't believe a defense theory that "Loyal Lundstrom wasn't there," adding "if he wasn't there, why did he run off and stay for 13 days?" He told the jury that "this is a case of a domestic quarrel, he shot her and took off for Florida.

Defense Attorney hart used an hour and 15 minutes in his argument to the jury, noting that "you are dealing with a man's life." He reminded the jury that any or all evidence in the case must be weighed and that they could ask the court reporter to read any part of it to them and could examine any exhibits offered in evidence.

Mr. Hart told the jury that they sould note the "time" element in many instances in their study of the case. He asked them to read the Lundstrom letter in its entirity. He refuted the "slave" statement, noting "my wife works, I work." He asked them to consider the relationship between Mrs. Lundstrom and some of the witnesses.


The credibility of crime lab statements as to the time of death being determined after the body had been dead for more than a day and of Cisco police not finding the shotgun unti! several days after their first search were among items mentioned by Mr. Hart.

Marital discord as indicated by several witnesses was questioned by the defense attorney when he noted that "Rev. Reneau, their pastor for three or more years, told us he knew nothing of this." He wondered why a coffee cup and glass found in the kitchen sink at the Lundstrom home wasn't tested for fingerprints.

The argument was concluded with a reminder that "the state's case must be proved beyond a reasonable doubt."

In a rebuttal, Mr. Walton told the jury that "the state's case has been proved beyond any doubt." He described questions raised by the defense as "rabbit trails." He concluded that "somebody should stand up for Doris Lundstrom and her five motherless children." He said that a number of witnesses, including her father and her stepdaughter, knew of the young mother's marital troubles. "The evidence points to a verdict of murder," he said.

During some two hours of argument, Lundstrom sat at the defense table, staring straight ahead. He has been free under a \$200,000 property bond since a few days after surrendering March 16th and being charged with the March 3rd shotgun shooting death of his 27-yearold wife.

TSTA Tips For Parents

Good reading skills developed early will your child throughout his schooling. The following is the second in an eight part series to assist parents in helping children learn. The first series continues on 'reading.'

Developing Good Readers, Part II

Introduce your child to the wonders of the public library at an early age. Stop at the library and browse, answering questions about various books and other printed materials

As soon as possible, a child should be allowed to apply for a library card and choose books. Encourage frequent use of the school library. Read and discuss books brought home for possible school projects or during family sharing periods.

Subscribe to a chilren's magazine. Children love the idea of having their very own periodical.

Make certain the reading area is comfortable and well-lighted.

Take spcial note of any signs of reading difficulty that may be caused by poor eyesight. If such problems are noted, take prompt action either through your own physician or through the school nurse's office.

Search out the better television programs for children. Watch some of the productions along with your child. Discuss the programs. Note comments and try to answer questions. When words are shown, ask that they be read to you or you read them to the child.

Encourage the writing and addressing of personal greeting cards, invitations and thank-you notes, writing your grocery lists, putting names in your address book. Suggest a backyard "mailbox" for exchanging regular letters with the child next door.

If at any age your child seems "turned off" by reading, don't make an issue of it. Casually "irresistible" leave books around-books on whatever the child's current interests are.







Liz's Chocolate Pie 1 cup sugar

3 Tbsp. cocoa 6 Tbsp. flour ½ tsp. salt

1 cup evaporated milk 1 cup fresh whole milk 3 egg yolks

2 tsp. vanilla ½ stick oleo

Mix together the sugar, cocoa, flour and salt. Stir in both kinds of milk, cook over medium heat until it starts to heat. Beat the egg yolks. Carefully stir a few spoons of the chocolate mixture into the egg yolks. Pour the egg mix into the remaining milk and cocoa mixture and return to medium heat. Cook until it bubbles and thickens, add the oleo and the vanilla, stir. Let it cool slightly, pour into a baked pie shell (9 inch).

Make a meringue with the three egg whites and six Tbsp. sugar, added gradually as the egg whites are beaten. Don't quit beating too soon. Place meringue on top of pie, brown in 275 degree oven, about 10 minutes.
