

Proper Filing Volleyball Tournament Of Form W-4 From IRS

On the form W4- E is a statement which reads "for use by employees who incurred no tax liability for 1976 and anticipate no tax liability for 1977." What this means is that you can use the form only if you did not owe and pay in tax last year, and do not expect to earn enough money this year to

require a payment of tax. And there's a civil penalty for tax law violation which might be imposed. Persons who do not have tax withheld from salary checks must estimate their tax every 3 months and send this estimated amount to Internal Revenue Service. (Self employed persons sdo this- - the woner of a small family business for example.)) If the taxpayer does not have the tax withheld from his slary, or pay

quarterly estimates of tax, the IRS will add an estimated tax

panalty of 7 percent What withholding form should the taxpayer use? The correct form is the W- 4, "Employees Whitholding Allowance Certificate." Mc-Canless advises workers to make certain that it is current. The one now in use was revised in October 1976.

In working out the allowance on the W- 4 try to make the amounts of tax whthheld each payday add up to the total tax you will pay at the end of the year. Proper withholding is a painless way of meeting the responsibility of payuing Federal taxes.





"Actually, with the measles vaccine, there is no need for a child to suffer from measles at all, but out breaks still occur. Texas reported 266 cases last year," she said.

Texas law requires certain immunizations for all children entering Texas Schools. Because many parents wait until immunization is required, pre- schoolers are left unprotected. One- year of age has been the


usual time for measles immunization -- but last October, the American Academy of Pediatricts recommended delaying until 15 months of age for infants in communities where the disease is not

In the event of measles outbreaks, the Academy recommends the vaccine be given any time after six months of age- - followed by a second


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



Abe Lincoln's Boyhood Timely Reminder For 1977 Real Estate Buvers Austin- Texas- - Most everyone remembers the tale of young Abe Lincoln at home, doing his sums by fireplace

light in a log cabin. With observance of the birthday of the sixteenth President on February 12, another aspect of the Lincoln- at- home story emerges to bring a strong precautionary reminder for home buyers in the 1977 market.

During Abe's boyhood, his family lost three Kentucky farm homes because of land title problems- - a type of hazard that still can prove costly to real estate purchasers. Land title difficulties finally proved so onerous that the Lincolns moved from Abe's native Kentucky and that state lost a future President.

Title trouble first emerged when Abe's father, Thomas Lincoln, tried to sell a family farm and found it measured 39 acres less than it was supposed to cover. An obligation on a second farm proved to be larger than represented, and the title holder demanded money instead of merchandise as origally agreed upon. The Lincolns lost a third farm through a suit of ejectment to remove them from the real

After these misfortunes, the Lincoln family moved to Indiana in search of secure home ownership.

Writing of the departure years later, Abe recalled, "Thi s removal was partly on account of slavery, but chiefly on account of th difficulty in land titles."

Home buyer safeguards against possible land title hazards are as important in 1977 as they were in Abe's time, according to James H. Garst, President of the Texas Land Title Association. When title problems arise, they stem from the enduring nature of land and claims that different parties may file against it. Advance precautions include a title search of public records so that possible land title difficulties can be disclosed before a real estate transaction is completed- - and the owner's title insurance to protect against title hazards including those a search cannot reveal.

The TLTA president said advance preparation and safeguards are necessary for the full protection of home ownership, regardless f whether an upcoming purchase involves free-standing home, town house, condominium unit, or log cabin. Garst, who is Vice President of Commonwealth Land Title Insurance Company, Houston, pointed out that a home still represents an excellent long-range investment despite rising costs and suggested these guidelines for buyers in the 1977 market:

- - Study the particular

advantages and disadvantages of a free standing home, town house, condominium or other type of residence before deciding what to purchase.

Thursday, February 10, 1977

- - Consider the condition of and outlook for the neighborhood where the residence is located

- - Check the distance from the prospective home to public transportation, shopping, schools, and other conveniences of importance; estimate the gasoline mileage that would be required to reach these and your place of employment.

- - Carefully go over the design and structural condition of the residence; if a freestanding home or town house is involved, it may be desirable to call in a structural expert for his opinion.

- - Give special attention to the fuel needed for heating the residence and check insulation.

- - Shop for the mortgage financing that best suits your need; ask about interest rate, late payment penalty, amount of insurance required, whether taxes and interest will be included in monthly payment, refinancing requirements, and prepayment penalty


- - Learn in advance the facts on closing costs and services in your area and obtain an estima te of related charges you will be required to

- - Ask about the protection of owner's title insurance that you may be required to pay for protects only your mortgage

As an example of the need of advance precautions, Garst recalled the experience of a modern day Illinois home buyer who purchased real estate with an apparently clear land title. After moving in, the buyer received notice that property taxes from a prior year were past due on the home. The problem was not found in earlier title search of public records before completion of his purchase because of a mistake by public employees in posting the county tax rolls. Fortunately, the owner's title insurance of this buyer paid the tax claim to save the insured financial loss and possible loss of his real

In another instance, a Georgia property owner charged that the home of a neighbor extended onto his land. After a new survey proved the claim to be correct, the title company insuring the encroaching neighbor was able to arrange for the insured's purchase of a strip of landincluding that occupied by part of his house- - to solve the

Brace'Em With All You Got

At today's steadily rising wage rate and equipment cost, it is estimated that two thirds of th total cost of constructing a fence goes to labor. Yet the labor cost to build a poor fence is little if any, less than for building the very best. The difference in the cost of keeping a poor fence in repair can eat up the fifference in price between good and poor materials

in a ralatively short time. In checking fencing the past 21 years in Eastland County, I have discovered that the reliance of a good fence rest with the construction of the corners and barace post. Three types of fences are considered to be permanent. The 4 or more stranded barbed wire fance. the net wire fence with 1 or 2 strands above the two or three stranded suspension fence with line post 100 feet apart with stavs are commonly used.

When wooden post are being used, all corner post should have 6 inches of top diameter. The posts should be at least 8 feet in length allowing 3 feet underground with 5 feet exposed. Wooden line post should be at least 6 feet in length with 2 feet underground and 4 feet exposed. Barbed wire should be 1212 gauge using 9 guage. 112 inch long staples. All corner. angle and gate braces need to be constructed with a deadman against the line of stress. Generally braces are needed every 1320 feet on straight line fences.

In this area cedar post normally last 15 to 20 years. Steel and line post will stand firm, true and durable for 25 to 30 years... frequently longer. Additional information on specifications for building fences is available from the local Soil Conservation Service office without regard to race. creed, sex or religious preference.





Prune Roses For Top

COLLEGE STATION-February is rose pruning time in Texas. Heavy purning makes hybrid tea roses more manageable and also m akes for large, top quality blooms, says a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"In most areas of Texas, roses will become too large and difficult to care for unless they are severely pruned each year," explains Everett Hanne, "The PANHANDLE AREA IS PROBABLY THE ONLY EXCEPTION TO THIS, AND EVEN THERE ANNUAL PRUNING KEEPS THE PLANTS SHAPED AND HEALTHY."

A good set of hand shears, a sharp pruning saw, a pair of long-handled loppers, pruning paint and a pair of heavy eather gloves are essential tools when pruning old, wellestablished rose bushes. believes the Texas A&M University System specialist. To begin with, the gloves will protect the hands from the sharp woody thorns. The saw is the only way to remove heavy basal canes over two years old while the loppers should be used on large canes of the past season. The shears are for smaller branches. Cover all cuts and ends of canes with the pruning paint to prevent entry of disease, and insects.

As far as the actual pruning process is concerned. Janne suggests cutting back the top growth to 12 to 15 inches above the ground. "Retain four to six of the healthy canes arising from the graft or bud union or those within 4 to 6 inches above the union.

"Also remove all dead, diseased and injured twigs and branches as well as all of the thin spindly growth frequently found at the base of an old established palnt."

Since most climbing roses produce a great abundance of flowers in early spring thse should receive their major pruning aftertheopring flush of blloms, points out the horticulturist. On healthy. vigorous climbers, any cane over two years old should be removed or cut back severely. Thin last season's growth at

least one- half and cut back to within several feet of the base to encourage new growth.

"Roses will usually start Quality Blooms growing within two to three weeks after prunin g," notes Janne. "Be ready to start your preventive disease control program against Black Spot at this time and make an application every two weeks until

Remember, three or four properly cared for rose bushes will provide all the cut flowers needed in the average home. Determine the size of your rose bed by the time you can devote to their care - and not by the space available, advises the horticulturist.
