Bob Turner Wins 65th District Seat

Voss sheep rancher Robert R. "Bob" Turner was elected as 65th District State Representative Saturday, Mar. 2 winning with almost a 2-1 majority over Comanche Attorney Ben Doyle Sudderth.

In the six counties participating, Turner got 6,452 votes, and Sudderth 3,412. The only county Sudderth carried was his home area of Comanche. These district-wide totals are unofficial but complete.

Eastland County followed the general trend, casting 870 votes for Turner and 414 for Sudderth. In voting precincts across the county there were only two boxes Sudderth carried, and these by a slim majority. In Olden the vote was 22 Turner, 23 Sudderth, and at Lake Leon 13 Turner and 16 Sudderth.

Desdemona gave an overwhelming vote for Turner -65 ballots for him and 6 for Sudderth. Other boxes in the county also gave the rancher/ Farm Bureau official a large majority.

The March 2 Eastland County total of 1284 is very light, says Joann Johnson, County Clerk. This is an even smaller number than the 1764 voting in February 9 Special Election, where Turner and Sudderth ran among 11 can-



didates. There are more than 10,000 people in the county

County Clerk Johnson says that Desdemona was the box with the highest percentage of registered voters taking part in this Run Off Election. All the rural precincts had higher turnouts than the larger towns. There were 172 absentee votes

in the overall total. The County Commissioners met Monday and canvassed the Eastland County vote, making the election returns here official. Governor Ann Richards will canvass the District vote.

Charged With Retaliation

Former Eastland County Sheriff Dee Hogan was arrested in Lubbock last Friday morning and charged with retaliation against a witness. He was arrested after leaving his probation officer's office, and is being held in the Lubbock County jail. A hearing will be held next Friday, March 8 before Federal Magistrate J.Q. Warnick Jr. in Lubbock.

The latest arrest stems from an incident in Eastland last Thursday, Feb. 28, in which Hogan allegedly approached a 'key witness' Dawn Beckett, in a Wal Mart store.

Beckett, a Sheriff's Department employee, had reportedly told Federal authorities that Hogan ordered her to change jail records which showed he had authorized the release of Guy Kincaid, who is accused of drug dealing.

While shopping at Wal Mart Hogan reportedly confronted Dawn Beckett. The Federal Government is alleging that Hogan placed Beckett in fear and emotional distress, U.S. Attorney Dick Baker said.

Baker declined to say what Hogan told Beckett. He said testimony on what happened will be given at Friday's hearing.

tion to revoke Hogan's conditions of release will be considered at the hearing. Baker is asking that Hogan be held in jail without bond until his sentecning on an obstruc-

The former Sheriff entered this plea on Feb. 12, and various requirements were established as part of his release on a personal recognizance bond. He was required to report regularly to a probation officer and refrain from contacting any Sheriff's Department employees or witnesses.

Hogan was barred from even living in Eastland County. He was allowed to return after he pled guilty Feb. 12 to the obstruction of justice charge.



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



Discretionary Provisionsof '90 Farm ASCS News Unclaimed **Bill Comments Sought by USDA**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation today asked for comments on several provisions which may be implemented for the 1991-1995 crops of wheat, feed grains, rice, upland cotton and extra long staple cotton.

Keith Bjerke, Executive Vice President of the CCC. said comments are sought on:

-whether targeted option payments should be made available for wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and rice; -whether acreage desig-

nated as acreage conservation reserve for wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and rice may be planted to oilseeds, industrial or experimental crops, oats or any other crop; -whether double-crop-

ping on conserving use acreage under the 0/92 and 50/92 program provisions should be permitted:

-whether malting barley should be exempted from acreage reduction requirements;

-whether loans and purchases should be made available to program participants who cut corn for silage, and

-whether a paid land diversion program should be made available for the crops of wheat, feed grain, upland and ELS cotton and rice.

CCC is proposing that none of the foregoing provisions be implemented for the 1991







Manager:

The City of Eastland recently received notification from the West Central Texas Council of Governments that new regulations regarding "storm water permitting" had been approved under the Clean Water Act of 1987. Permitting requirements will be administered by the Environmental Protection Agency and will require storm water system permits for cities in excess of 100,000 population. We are also led to believe that smalles cities of less than 100,000 population will eventually be required to obtain the same type of permit.

In addition, we have been informed that at the present time cities, counties, and school districts may be required to obtain "storm water run-off permits" from the EPA for such installations a airports, landfills, maintenance shops, school bus barns, and construction sites in excess of 5 acres. Apparently, each such installation may require a separate permit. Estimated engineering cost for applying for individual permits may range from \$10,000.00 to \$40,000.00 each. It would appear that the Federal Government is now in the process of trying to close down all of the various other types of governmental functions. The far reaching implications of these new regulations is not only unacceptable, they will in fact create a tremendous financial burden on local governmental entities which will result in a definite tax increase on our constituents. I can't begin to explain my concerns over these new regulations. Cities, counties, and school districts are presently facing not only the responsibilities of providing acute services for their citizens, they

are now facing a new responsibility of "environmental watchdog" for the Environmental Protection Agency.

To make matters worse, we are also informed that the Clean Water Act was vetoed by President Reagan and then later approved by the Congress of the United States. I would therefore appreciate knowing your position on this issue as it will certainly have an overwhelming effect on your constituents in this re-

gion.

As Mayor of my community, I can certainly see the need for laws which will regulate our environment, but I can honestly say that if these trends continue in the same progressive manner, cities, counties, school districts, and other governmental entities may be forced to shut their doors and simply let Washington provide all of the services which we now provide for our citizens.

Please accept my apologies if this letter appears to be somewhat harsh, but please also realize that this letter probably represents the sentiments of many people within our community and region. I would appreciate your

looking into this issue and would also appreciate your contacting my office at your earliest convenience.

Railroad Commission statistics show Amoco and Exxon to be the top oil and gas producers, respectively, in Texas for 1990, Commis-Krueger announced.

Amoco led all oil producers for the period with an average daily production of 168,102 barrels, some 9.55 percent of all oil produced in the state. Exxon Corp., took second place with an average daily production rate of 139,283 barrels, some 7.91 percent total state production. Other companies in the top ten included Chevron U.S.A., Inc., 109,791 bpd (barrels per day), third; Shell Western E & P, Inc., 90,877 bpd, fourth; Mobil Producing TX. & N.M., Inc., 89,084 bpd, fifth; Texaco E & P, Inc., 84,641 bpd, sixth; Marathon Oil Company, 69,722 bpd, seventh; Amerada Hess Corp., 55,166 bpd, eighth; Arco Oil & Gas Company, 48,050 bpd, ninth; and Oryx Energy Company, 47,444 bpd, tenth.

Krueger said Exxon Corp. was the top Texas gas producer for 1990, averaging 804,245 mcf (thousand cubic feet) per day which represented 6.95 percent of total state production. 


