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### May Advances to Quarterfinals

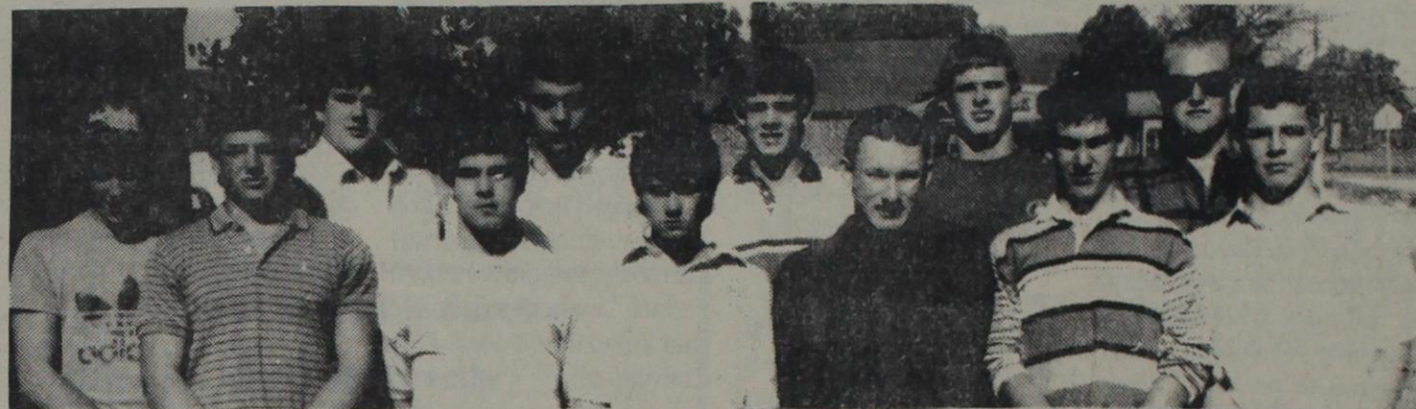


**Tigers Face

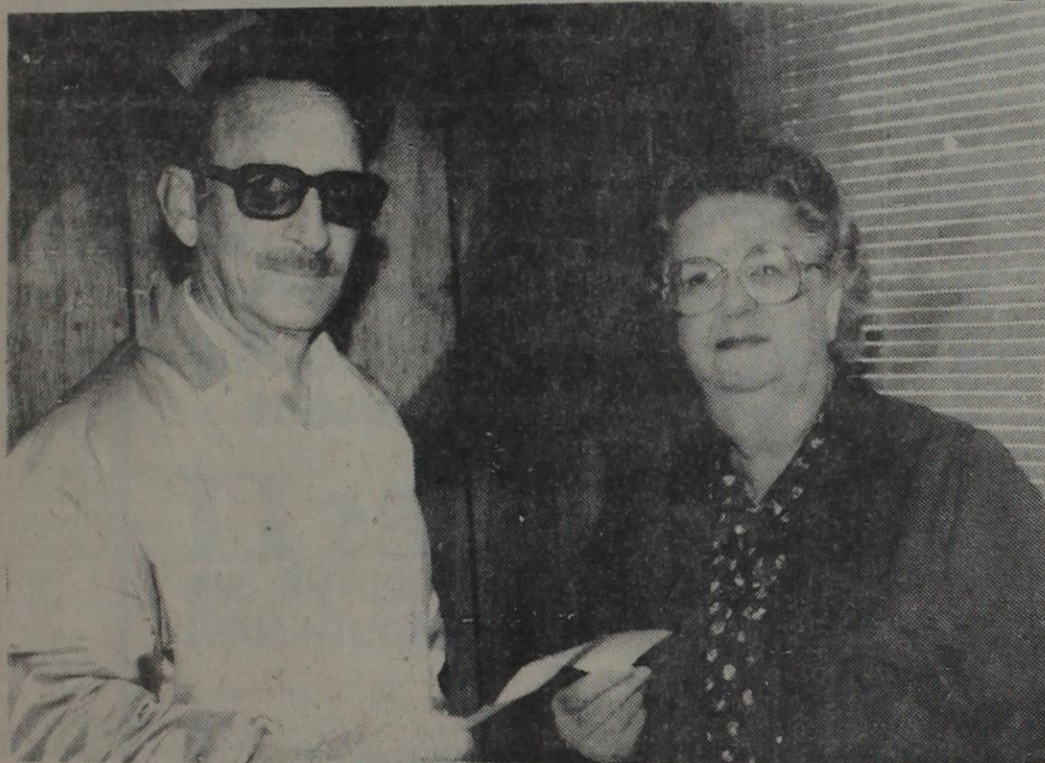

### Countians Tour Prison

A large delegation of Eastland Countians went to a Texas Department of Corrections unit Thursday — and returned the same day.

What they saw was not pretty, as in the same sense that a cast on a broken leg is not pretty, but very efficient and necessary.

The purpose of the trip to the Michael Unit of T.D.C. at Palestine was to consider the advisability of seeking such a facility to be located in this county in the near future, when the state expands its prison facilities to handle its load.

What the locals saw was the newest and most secure of the prison systems' 29 units which collectively hold some 39,000 inmates across the state.

At Michael, as guests of Warden Jack Garner and his assistants for a three-hour tour, the visitors were given an over-all view of the operation and had their hundreds of questions answered about safety, economic impact and general concern for such a facility. Among many other things, they learned that Texas can take pride in the fact that with its emphasis on self-sufficiency, the Texas system can house inmates at a cost of some \$27. a day per inmate, compared to other states where the per-prisoner cost runs as high as \$99. a day.

Michael is Palestine's fourth unit, and since the first was established there in 1965, is its chief economic boost. In visiting with local citizens there, the Eastland Countians learned that the revenue from the facility is great and that the danger to citizens is small.

Estimates are that a unit like Michael with a capacity of 2,250 inmates and some 800 employees, the monthly payroll exceeds \$1.5 million.

With the anticipated funding for more facilities expected by the next legislature, there is expected to be a rush of applications across the state for the new units. With the establishment of units at Snyder and Amarillo, T.D.C. is broadening its operation across the state, which is a switch from its long experience of housing inmates in the south and east part of the state.

The Palestine area, which knows the system well, is expected to be among those asking that additional units be situated there. They recognize the value.

Our area is seen as an ideal mid-state location, with a lot of pluses for T.D.C., not the least of which is superior highway access.

Thursday's tour was a special courtesy extended those from here, and the visitors were given the opportunity to tour, photograph and ask questions inside the highly-

guarded facility. The entire unit lies within double-fenced protective enclosures, but from a distance, appears no more formidable than a manufacturing plant might be.

In selecting new site, T.D.C. will be vitally concerned with security, supervision and control as primary factors, as well as consideration for the availability of hospital, fire protection, law enforcement, education systems, court systems and other necessary services.

It was understood that many factors will figure into the final selection of the new units, which are expected to include two additional maximum-security units and as many of four small units.

All prisoners would continue to be processed at the main Huntsville unit, brought to outlying units to serve their time, and returned to Huntsville for release, it was learned.

Locals had lunch with the wardens in a trustee-operated cafeteria, of food raised, processed, cooked and served by inmates.

A visit to the Administrative Segregated section where the most violent-prone prisoners are held convinced the locals that T.D.C. does its job well. The some 500 prisoners in that unit are cell-bound for 23 hours a day, within a highly efficient network which permits them to be controlled

## Fisher Makes Hole-In-One



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# Mary De'Armand Walks Across America For Children With AIDS

Mary de' Armand said she was looking forward to celebrating the 50th year of her life, and decided to mark

that time by walking across America. She has devoted this walk to the plight of babies and children who were born with the AIDS disease, through no choice of their own.

Mary said she has visited hospitals where some of these children are, and it breaks her heart. She said there are no volunteer workers with these children, because people are still afraid of contacting AIDS from them. She is sharing information about AIDS to schools, clubs or any individual who ask her to speak.

She came through Eastland County last week and was expected to be in Dallas over the weekend for the open house of "Brians House." This is a care project for children and their mothers with AIDS. She said children and adults with no homes will be given support and a place to live there. Dallas will be the 2,000 mile point of her walk, which is half way. She will finish her journey at Boston, Massachusetts.

Mary began her travels on February 27, of this year, 125

miles north of San Francisco. She is the mother of seven children and has three grandchildren. Her children are very supportive of her making this trip. She said one son, who is a DPS patrolman, was concerned with her safety, but she has never had any trouble.

After reading a book by a friend of hers, Elisa Beth Kubler-Ross, on AIDS she decided to make the walk. She said the 1900 mile mark of her walk was 3 miles east of Eastland.

She started training four years ago with bike riding, exercise and weight lifting. Mary said people should not think they are just going to start walking across America without training. Three of the four years training were intensive training. She said even with the training, it was hard the first 700-1,000 miles. She averages about 125 miles per week.

Mary had sponsors to help with traveling expenses. She made it to Amarillo and ran out of sponsoring and then Jack Spencer, of Amarillo, volunteered to help her make it from Roscoe to Dallas. She also has shoe

sponsors.

Mary has talked to several colleges, universities and schools about AIDS. She said a lot of people do not know about the number of children who are suffering from AIDS. These children contact this disease from their parents, who have AIDS. The last official count was there are 1,250 of these children.

Mary said less attention is focused on AIDS in rural communities than anywhere else. But, AIDS is in the rural communities, even though these cases are usually kept well hidden. Most communities are uninformed and are afraid of contacting AIDS in other ways besides, sexual contact with an infected partner, sharing an intravenous needle with an infected person or receiving infected blood during a blood transfusion.

She said AIDS is not an epidemic, it is pandemic, which is described in the dictionary as occurring or prevalent over a wide geographical area. She said, AIDS is worldwide. There is not a country in the world where cases of AIDS have

not been reported.

She said AIDS is spreading fast and people need to get scared and take precautions! Parents and schools need to learn the facts themselves and then speak frankly to their children, both girls and boys, about the dangers of contacting AIDS.

Abstaining from sex before marriage and abstinence from extra marital sex, is the only sure of never contacting AIDS. But, this has to be from both partners. She said the gel or foam contraceptive that contains Nonoxyl-9, (and only that one kind) kills the AIDS virus on contact. But it was reported this is not 100 percent effective.

She said when California DPS officers receive a call about a highway accident with injuries, they put on a pair of latex rubber gloves and then put the gel or foam over them and then put on

another pair of latex rubber gloves. This keeps them from accidentally receiving a cut and the injured person's blood getting on them.

She said not all young boys and girls will stay abstinent from extra sexual partners. Everyone, no matter what their age, need to demand that their sexual partners use latex condoms and the gel or foam with Nonoxyl-9. The latex condoms do not break as easily as others. These can be bought from any local drug store.

Mary said unfortunately there are several youngsters who contact the AIDS virus through molestation.

She said if parents or school officials do not want to teach the facts about AIDS to their children, then they should go ahead and contact a funeral home and plan their funeral. She said at the rate AIDS is spreading, 50 percent of the children now, will contact the AIDS virus.

She said the hope for the world tomorrow is in the hands of the youth, but how can this be, if they are dead?

Mary said she wish everyone in Eastland County could walk through the hospitals she has walked through and hold a baby that is dying with AIDS or hold the hand of a dying teenager and they would want to spread information about AIDS the way she wants to.

Mary has two traveling companions, a black Labrado dog named Yom who was a gift from a sponsoring group in California and a Texas mutt, Halfway. She said Yom is a good friend and has kept her from being bothered. She found the other dog just as she was crossing the Texas border. He was starving and she took him in.

Mary was eating at Tradition's Restaurant in Cisco when the interview was made. She spent the next night in Eastland at the Classic Inn, as a guest of the city of Eastland.

# Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson

It's "Pig 'N Time" folks. With area water temperatures falling into the 50's the old stand by falls into its prime. Pork, has long been recognized as an excellent trailer for jigs and spinners and cold water has to be the best place to apply it. When the water temps begin falling into the 50's a bass' metabolism begins slowing. This tells anglers two things they should do (1) slow your presentation move your bait an inch at a time and place your presentations closer together. Old bucket mouth isn't going to move as far to get that meal now. (2) Use bulky baits, large rubber jigs dressed with pork offer a larger and slower meal. The forage of bass will slow down just as the bass do and if that lunger is going to put out the effort to go after a meal he want it to be a mouth full. Large crankbaits can also be effective cranked at a snails pace, and a slow stop and go retrieves. Spinners dressed with pork trailers can be worked slowly and also jigged much the same as a jig and pig.

Remember the two keys for those cold weather lunkers is a slow full meal. As new materials and techniques have become available, the Zebco 33 has been upgraded. But for all practical purposes, its unchanged. Other models have been introduced such as the 33XBL and 33 Classic and the special 33 25th anniversary model. But the plain vanilla Zebco 33 is still the world famous Zebco 33.

As far as statistics go, its taken over a billion parts to build the 22 million 33's which have been manufactured in Tulsa in the past 33 years. And for the sake of example, if you wanted to transport all those reels from one town to another, it would take 5,500 elephants, each carrying a ton, 2,000 pounds of reels, to make the trip.

If elephant train is too slow a method of transportation, you could fill box cars with the past 33 years production and start the train down the track at six miles per hour. You might make the folks at the railway crossing a little

mad because it would take more than seven hours for the train of 33's to pass.

In 1980 Zebco changed its program that had recognized anglers for catching trophy fish to recognize fishermen for releasing their catch.

Three years later in 1983, the Fish America Foundation was created by Zebco. The Foundation generates monies for the purpose of funding local grassroots programs that enhance and preserve fisheries across the country.

The leadership by Zebco and its parent company the Brunswick Corporation paved the way for what is now an industry wide program, a program that has funded more than \$500,000 through 80 plus projects in 30 states and three Canadian provinces as of early 1987.

Those projects have included stocking lakes, assisting hatchery operations and restoration of spawning habitat. Simply it's meant more fish for fishermen. And chances are a lot of those fish will be caught on a Zebco 33.

Till next time fish it slow and long for your wall hanger.

## Report Fails To Include Findings

State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) today said the proposed report of the Tax Equity Committee does not adequately fulfill the Committee's mandate, by failing to include its findings, among other issues, on the impact of a State personal and corporate income tax.

While Senator Glasgow does not now support a State income tax, he does believe the Committee's report must include sections on the effects of a personal income tax to fund the longterm needs of Texas, along with the Committee's findings on the impact of the Federal Tax Reform Act of 1986 on Texas.

"Fourteen months ago this Committee found Texas' tax policy was inequitable, and that a major overhaul was needed. Now the Committee's report, in its present form, says that our tax system is in need of only minor changes to make it fair and just."

"Even though I would vote against any type of personal income tax at this time, I do feel it is the duty of the Tax Equity Committee to report to the Legislature its findings for an equitable tax system in the future."

"Our Committee's mission is not to lay out a tax bill, but report the several theories of a fair tax system. I agree with our Committee's earlier opinion that Texas' present tax system — the franchise tax, sales tax and property tax — is unfair due to the unequal burdens it places on its citizens to include homeowners and small businesses."

## Amendments Adopted For Bingo Games

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday adopted emergency amendments to clarify general restrictions on bingo games in Texas.

"This should answer any questions on the spot about whether or not a bingo game is being run fairly," Bullock said.

The amendments state that winning bingo cards must now be verified by one or more players other than the winner. Players may also ask to see the numbers on the bingo balls that remain in the machines.

The emergency ruling gives comptroller personnel the right to inspect bingo equipment at any time. The amendments also call for bingo balls to be replaced with new ones every six months.

Bullock said that tampering with or modifying bingo equipment so that numbers are not chosen randomly is now expressly prohibited. Changing numbers or symbols on the face of bingo cards is also prohibited.

Licensed bingo organizations are still responsible for seeing that all bingo equipment is in proper working condition, according to Bullock.

The Comptroller's office is responsible for regulating charity bingo in Texas.

The office issues bingo licenses and has the authority and responsibility to interpret the law and write the rules governing bingo in Texas.

The amendment to Rule 3.538 is adopted on an emergency basis under Texas Civil Statutes, Article 179d.

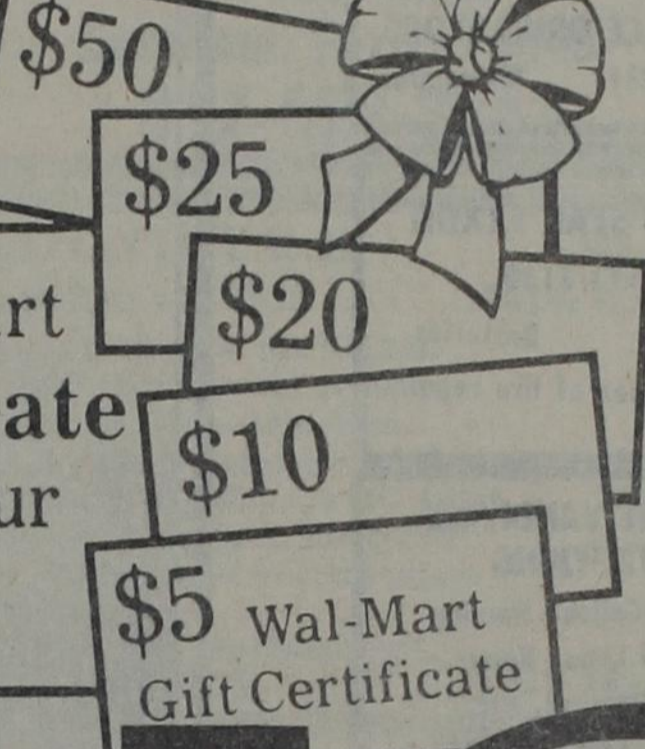

learned about our natural resources by placing them on the map. The map was placed on the hall inside the Junior High building.

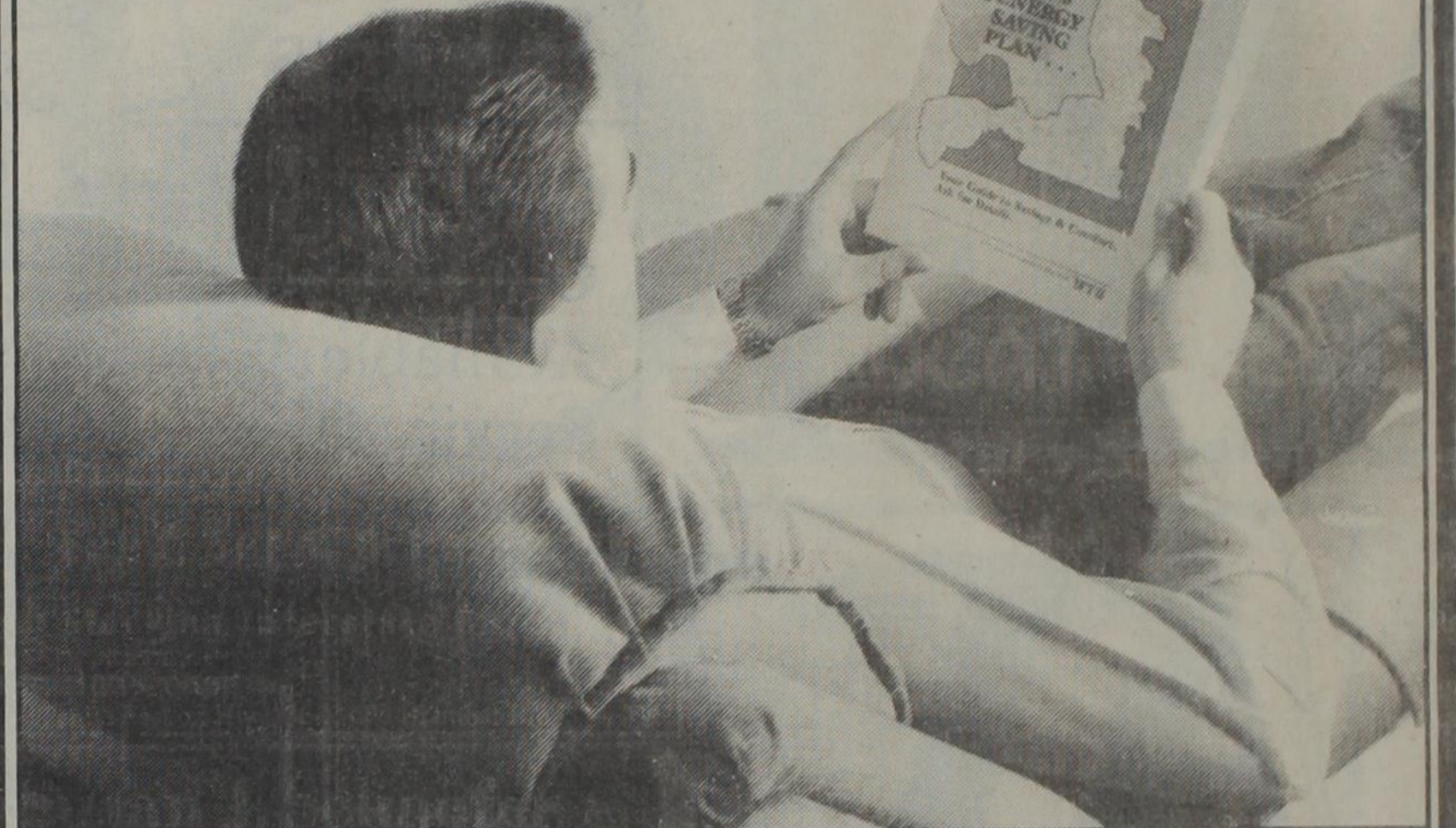

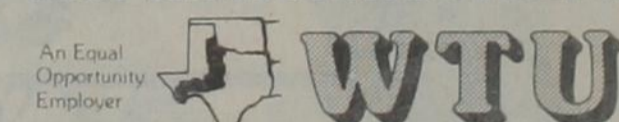

**Jr. High Girls**

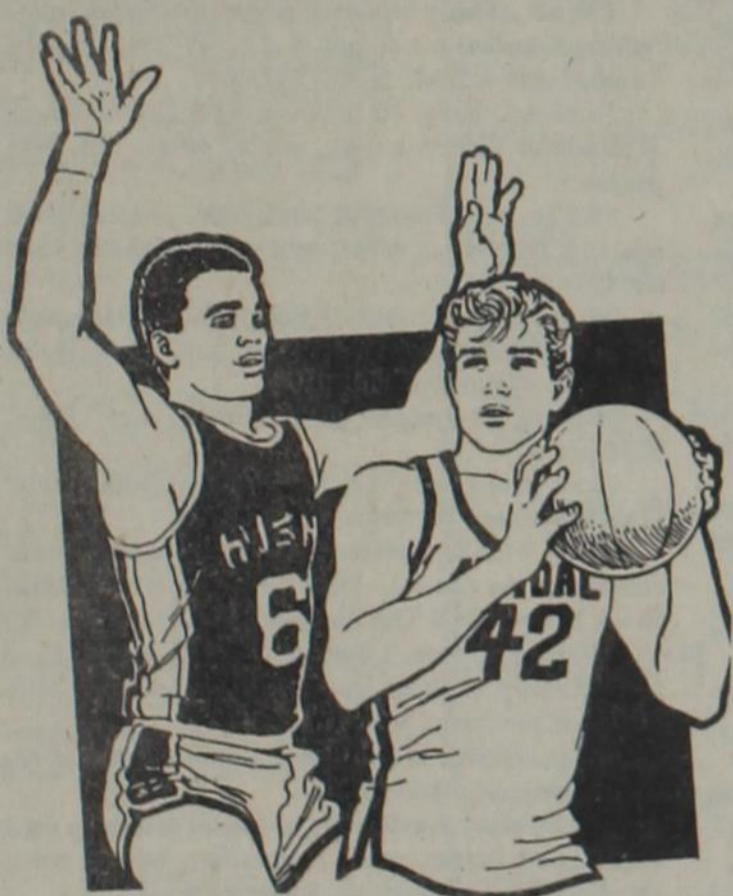
The Rising Star Junior High girl's basketball team traveled to May once on Thursday and twice on Saturday.
