## County Commissioners Set 30.5 Cent Tax Rate - Adopt "No Growth" Budget

It appears that a raise in Eastland County Tax rates from 28 to 30.5 per \$100 valuation will be approved at the Commissioners Court meeting on Monday, Aug. 22.

The Commissioners will also adopt a Budget for the fiscal year of 1989, advertise for insurance and finalize election judges at this meeting.

The 30.5 rate was discussed at a County Budget Workshop Thursday, and is slightly under the 3 percent raise allowed by law without extensive hearings and a possible rollback election.

On Thursday County Auditor Ray Pruitt told Judge Scott Bailey and the Commissioners that revenues were down, and that more money would be needed to even maintain the budget at last year's level.

The Commissioners again requested that Department Heads hold their budgets on the 1988 level, with allowances for higher insurance, workman's comp and increased Social Security deductions.

They seemed to be united against a percentage pay raise, such as the 3 percent "cost of living" raises of former years. (There was no pay raise last year.)

"I won't vote for a percentage pay raise again," said Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1. "It just gives the best raise to the people already making the most, and the gap just gets wider and wider."

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, agreed with this. There was some talk, however, of possible wage "adjustments" in some departments, if any extra

"line item" money could be moved.

In other budgetary matters, Norman Christian, Pct. 2 Commissioner, made the motion that all expenditures covered by the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund be transferred to the General Fund. L.T. Owen, Pct. 3 Commissioner, gave a second to the motion.

Judge Scott Bailey suggested an amendment to this motion, stating that the tax rate levy for the General Fund be sufficient to accommodate this increased expenditure.

The Commissioners approved both the motion and amendment.

There was considerable discussion about the cost of County Insurance, which has gone up around \$57 monthly per individual for next year.

A letter from the Association of Counties reportedly said that "None (of certain

insurance companies) were interested because of the age bracket of the people involved. They don't want the County's insurance policy."

Various other items from the budget were discussed, such as Constable's salaries, car allowances, etc.

Commissioner Billy Bacon made a motion that the salary of the Constable of Pct. 4 be cut back to the 1972 level.

That is the largest salary rollback possible by law. The Constable presently makes \$6900 annually, and has a car allowance.

None of the other Commissioners would second this motion, but Bacon says he would like to see the motion stand.

Probably this matter will receive further attention Monday - along with the taxes, budget, and other items.

## Jury Selection Underway

Jury selection for the Garcia Crime Trial was underway in the 91st District Courtroom Tuesday morning, with Judge Herman Flitts of Palo Pinto presiding. Five hundred people have been called as prospective jurors.

Accused in the case is Joe Perry Sr. and Barbara Williams. They are represented by court-appointed attorneys Leslie Vance and Steve Davis, both of Eastland. Attorney Bill Hart is Special Prosecutor in the case.

At press time prospective jurors were still being questioned, with some told to return at 1 p.m. It appeared that a number of

people were asking to be excused from jury service. The selection is expected to take most of this week.

## 4-H Dog Dip Is Saturday

The public is invited to bring their dogs out to a free dog dip which is being sponsored by the 4-H County Council. The dog dip will be on Saturday, August 27th from noon to 4:30 p.m. on the parking lot of Ace Hardware in Eastland.

The 4-H Council is sponsoring this as a citizenship and community service activity. Although the dipping is free, donations will be accepted. Any money made from the dog dip will go to further 4-H projects in Eastland County.

Eastland Council members and Natalie Stevens, chairman of the activity, will be present and working.

The Rising Star Wildcats, led by the new coaching staff of Nathan Allen, Roby Stuteville and Le Jones, traveled to Roby Friday, August 19, for the first scrimmage of the 1988 football season: Rising Star 2, Roby 0.

The Cats are learning to use a Wing T offense this year. The first offensive series started slowly but once the butterflies disappeared the Cats settled down and went to work amassing 11 first downs to Roby's two.

Quarterback Jimmy Evans connected with Reil Barron on a long pass which set up the first touchdown. Stacy Green scored from the 10-yard line and the Cats led 1-0. The last scoring play came when Evans hit Reil Barron on a 70-yard pass and run, bringing the final score to 2-0.

The Wildcats are experiencing changes on defense as well as offense. Roby was simply no match for our new defense as the Cats held them to two fast downs for the entire scrimmage. According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

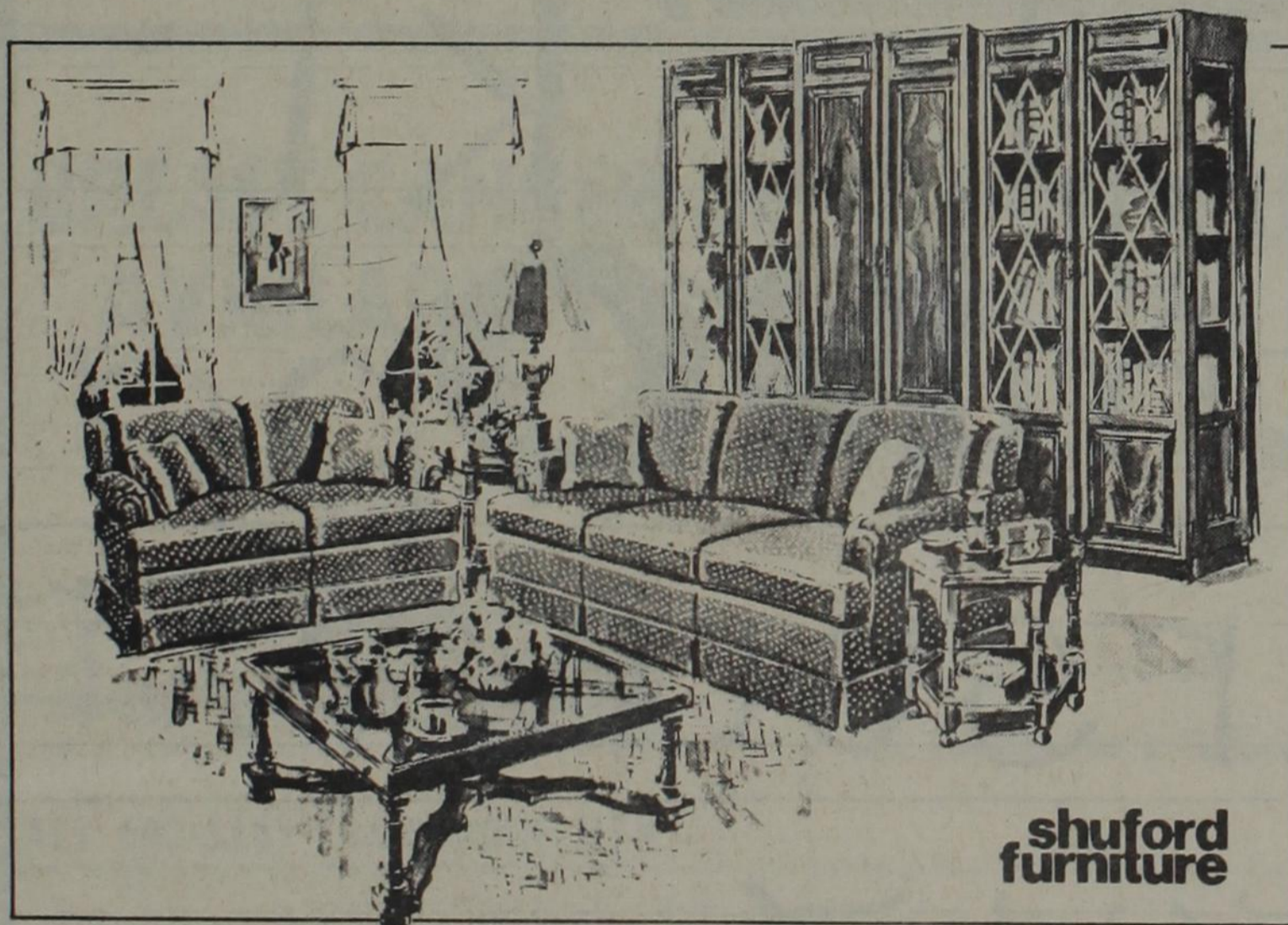

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# Fishing Outdoors

## FISHING OUTDOORS

I know most of you probably don't want to hear this, but Leon's Lunkers struck again over this past weekend. We learned of a 7 pounder two over 5 pounds and a special 4 pound plus fish taken by Dr. Bass. What's special about this fish is it was reported to have been taken on a buzz bait not a Dr. Bass jig. Congratulations to all these hawk hunters on Leon now, most of these larger fish are being caught by just 2 or three anglers. What's their secret? Well of course with the upcoming E.C.B.C. Bass Tourney September 11, 1988 information of this sort is guarded more closely than George Bushes running mate's name was. But we are sure if you don't have a hook in the water, chances are you won't catch on of these Lake Leon Lunkers.

Boaters caught in unexpected summer thunderstorms sometimes make a tragic error by trying to outrun the storm back to the boat ramp.

If you're caught in a storm you should head for the nearest sheltered shoreline. Many lives have been lost when boat operators for some reason feel they have to get back to where they put their boat in said Capt. Larry Williford, water safety director for the T.P.W.D. Law Enforcement Division.

Afternoon thunderstorms that form quickly in Texas can be turbulent and dangerous, but they generally subside within a half-hour or so, Williford noted. "Most landowners will be understanding about boaters taking temporary shelter at their boat docks or shorelines when the weather gets rough."

Fishermen and other boat operators should make a check of weather forecasts a standard procedure before launching, and then keep a sharp eye for the threatening clouds. Areas with dead standing timber in the water also should be avoided when high winds threaten.

All safety equipment, including U.S. Coast Guard approved personal flotation devices for all passengers, should be on board. To learn more about required equipment and boat operating procedures obtain a free Texas water Safety Act leaflet by writing the T.P.W.D., 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744 or call toll-free 1-800-792-1112.

Hunting permits for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Type II public hunting lands program have gone on sale across the state, offering holders of the \$35 permits access to 670,000 acres of land.

The Type II program is entering its second year with a number of new regulations aimed at improving the quality of the outdoor experience on the areas. This includes for the first time at \$10 Limited Use Permit for those who want to visit one or more of the 84 units but do not hunt or fish. A survey of Type II permit purchasers indicated that approximately 53 percent utilized the areas for nonconsumptive uses.

Type II units are scattered across Texas, with most of the acreage in the East Texas, Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions.

The new acreage includes 17,000 acres in the Panhandle that is available for pheasant hunting along with some waterfowl areas. New

forest project corporation lands opened for hunting this year are Temple-Eastex (64,980 acres), Kirby Forest Products (22,030), and Champion International (3,564 acres).

Other additions to the Type II system include U.S. Forest Service areas: Caddo (Fannin Co.), Alabama Creek (Trinity Co.), Bannister (San Augustine Co.), and Moore Plantation (Jasper and Sabine Co.). Public use of these areas previously was administered under the Type I public hunting program.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission adopted several new regulations that should increase public participation and provide for better hunting. These include restriction of all motor vehicles to designated roads; restriction of camping to designated campsites, prohibition of buckshot on all Type II areas; delaying opening date of the general deer season on four National Forest Areas (Alabama Creek, Bannister, Caddo and Moore Plantation) until Dec. 1, and requiring all persons on Type II areas to wear hunter orange during the times when taking of deer is permitted.

Restrictions on vehicle use and camping will permit hunters to range further afield without encountering disturbing influences. Some areas will permit waterfowl hunting only Tuesday, Thursdays, and Saturdays to avoid constant hunting pressure from displacing the migratory species.

Persons who purchase the Type II Wildlife Management Area-Public Lands Permit are permitted to enter and hunt, fish, camp and hike on all 84 units of the system. A 61-page map booklet is issued to each permit purchaser. It includes detailed maps of each unit and legal game available.

Children under 13 may

enter and participate in all activities free as long as they are accompanied by a permitted parent or guardian. Holders of the \$35 Type II permit are eligible to enter in drawings to select participants in limited hunts for mule deer, pronghorn antelope and one mature desert bighorn sheep ram.

Type II permits are issued on the basis of one permit per 15 acres of land, which this year adds up to approximately 40,000 permits. The limitation is designed to help prevent overcrowding in most instances, although opening day of deer season is the one event that attracts most hunters.

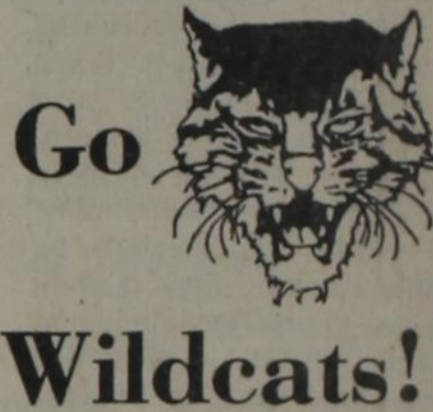
## Will Tax Be Repealed

A trade bill which includes the repeal of the Windfall Profit Tax, a tax which has penalized the oil industry in the United States, has been passed by Congress and sent to President Reagan for his signature. Senator Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen of Texas have worked for the repeal of the tax.

The price of oil is so low there is no tax being collected, but the tax law is costing the hurting American oil industry \$100 million a year due to the administrative and reporting costs it requires, and tens of billions of dollars in lost revenue, according to Senator Gramm. It is also estimated to be costing the government, or taxpayers, another \$15 million to administer the tax, even when it is not being collected.

Repeal of the tax is described as a first step toward allowing the American energy industry to stay in business.

The tax has also been costly to local people with oil and gas production on their property.

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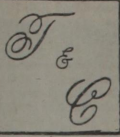
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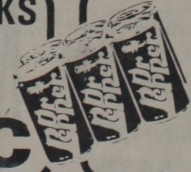
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# News Briefs

# Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent

Fleas attack both man and animals and often become a major problem during the summer months in Texas.

The tiny pests cause annoyance and discomfort and can also spread certain disease, a major one being bubonic plague.

Adult fleas cause the most problems as they have piercing sucking mouthparts and suck blood. Adult fleas may live from two months to two years. After each blood meal females lay four to eight eggs, which hatch in two to three weeks. They may deposit as many as 500 eggs in their lifetime.

Flea control may be difficult due to the circumstances under which the pests occur. Home infestations are often discovered a short time after a pet has been taken out of the home. Immature fleas have completed development and, with the absence of the normal host, turn to man for their life-sustaining blood meal.

Satisfactory control of fleas for any length of time depends on these factors:

- Both adult and immature fleas must be eliminated from the home and yard by proper chemical control and sanitation measures, such as replacing infested bedding materials and cleaning carpets and

stuffed furniture.

- Pets must be rid of fleas by using registered chemicals. In the case of rat or mice fleas, these hosts must be eliminated.

- Reinfestation must be prevented by protecting pets with flea collars or other preventative chemicals during times of likely infestations.

Chemicals registered for indoor flea control include Baygon, DDVP, dursban, malathion, methoprene, Ronnel and SBP-1382. Use a coarse spray on floors and baseboards. Treat one foot up the walls and under the house where possible. Check product labels prior to use.

Chemicals registered for outdoor flea control include Baygon, Cygon, diazinon, dursban and malathion. Treat animals' bedding or remove and replace with new material. Good coverage is necessary for good control.

To control fleas on host animals, use dursban, lindane or Vapona on dogs and Korlan, lindane, malathion and Phosmet on cats. Since some of these chemicals have specific restrictions, be sure to read the label prior to use. Some compounds may be harmful to greyhounds and whippets. Do not treat
