


SENIOR CITIZENS



The current drought is putting a strain on the City's water distribution system. We are pumping 250 to 500 gallons of water per minute into our overhead tower. This i is the maximum amount of wate we can pump into the tower. In addition, we have five wells which are pumping directly into the distribution lines. They pump about 50 gallons per minute. All the wells and pumps are operating at maximum capacity.

Therefore, I asking that all citizens who are on the City's water system stop all watering of lawns and gardens.



For Renewal

In an effort to avoid subscription increases because of recent postal increases, your local newspaper to adopting a new renewal plan which hopefully will keep postal costs down so that subscription rates may remain as low as possible. A calendar-year subscrip-

tion plan is being adopted, and all subscriptions will become due on January 1 of each beginning next year. There are of course already many people who subscriptions now run past Jan. 1, 1979.

Beginning in December, the local newspaper will begin running notice announcements in the newspaper to advise subscribers that they will need to renew their

subscriptions in January for cription costs.

the remainder of the new year. Subscri bers between now and Jan. 1, 1979, will be asked to subscribe only until Jan. 1.

Those persons who now pay monthly may of course continue to do so, but along with all others, they will not be notified, and their subscription stopped if they don't renew.

This will permit the local paper from sending out periodic notices (now at 15 cents each), which will in turn help keep the subscription costs down. After careful consideration it was decided that this method will be better than cost increases to help offset the ever-spiraling postal costs.

It may be a little confusing in the beginning, but in the longrun, it is felt that it will serve everyone better than would an increase in subs-

Many customers mailing heavy envelopes are not aware that postage is only 13 cents for each additional over one ounce, Postmaster Don Boyett said today.

Spots checks of large evelopes deposited in the Rising Star Post Office indicate that families are often using two or more 15-cent stamps in mailing items weighing over one ounce,

Postmaster Boyett finds. Postal rates effective May 29 call for 15 cents for one ounce or less and 13 cents for each additional ounce through 12 ounces.

Because many families have a surplus of 13 cent stamps on hand, Postmaster Boyett suggests that in addition to matching them with two-cent champer they may have ad for

mailing large evelopes or small packages weighing more than one ounce. Beyond 12 ounces, first class mail is called priority mail. Packages weighing up *Published weekly,

Basically, there are three things which indicate genuine faith in God and Christ by an individual. This is in keeping with the statement of James that the real, living faith must be "shown" by "works", or deeds (James 2:17-18). Jesus also affirms that a "tree is known by its fruit" (Luke 6:44). The kind of faith that saves

and, at the same times, glorifies God, is that sort which can not be contained. It instinctively bursts forth, as was the case for the prophet Jeremiah and his knowledge of God (Jeremiah 20:9). In the New Testament, the word most frequently used to describe the message about God's love and the salvation now available through the death of Jesus on the cross is Gospel, or "Good News". Because it is truly such, it is no wonder that the apostles and others 'went every where preaching the word" (Acts 8:4; Mark 16:20). Those possessing real faith, and who are possessed by the same, must vocalize it; they can not contain themselves. The Biblical faith also mani-

fests itself by a transformation of life: often one of a radical nature. Animated by love (desire and decision to act for the good of others), inspired by the example of God and of Jesus, the individuals will seek to please God by adopting his nature and characteristics (Colossians 3:9-10,12-14). Not only that, but the true believer will constantly seek to "work that which is good toward all men", even though his priority is to be in the direction of his brethren in the Lord (Galatians 6:10). For it to be authentic, faith must express itself in a complete transformation: of attitude and life (Romans 12:1 -1). But faith also demands an expression through sharing with others. The "fatherless and the widows" are to be "visited"--assisted, in the afflictions (James 1:27). The hungry, cold, unclothed, emprisoned and others who

sumer, are to be the objects of a "cup of cold water" in the name of the Lord (Matthew 25:34-40). One can not love God and be insensitive to the woes of others; spiritual, emotional and material (1 John 3:16-18).

In summary, then, the faith that saves is the faith that "works", that demonstrates its presence by deeds (James 2:14-26).
