

The Ole Store, a downtown landmark and Rising Star's only full service grocery store, was completely destroyed by fire Monday night. The store was owned and operated by Robert and Nance Lee Bostick.

J. P. Heyser, J. P. of Pct. 4, spoke for the group. He said about \$324,000 has been collected in fines and fees this year. Each man receives a yearly salary of \$13,750 except Pct. 5 J. P. V. O. Huff, who earns less.

"We do a tremendous lot of collecting for the County, but we're not just a collection agency," Heyser said. "We are Judges, a J. P. Court, we represent the state.

"We have worlds of people in trouble - we spend as much time talking to people and advising them as working in the office. But we are paid below the poverty level."

Alford Bush, Pct. 2 J. P., told the Court: "We're on call 24 hours per day. The phone rings - - we do inquests - we're busy seven days per week."

Pct. 2 Comm. Calvin Ainsworth chuckled and asked Heyser: "With revenues down, you have the nerve to ask for raises?"

"Yes, gentlemen, we have guts enough to ask you," Heyser answered. Pct. 3 Commissioner L.

T. Owen said, "If we give you a pay raise there's a courthouse full of people that are going to hit us for a raise!"

On another matter, Ainsworth said he had changed speed-limit signs on CR 570 leading to Lone Cedar Country Club.

He said that straight portions of the road will be posted at 35 mph, but that curves will be posted at 15 mph. He said he is also posting some speed limit signs on CR 237 in the Staff area near Lake Leon.

Comm. Reggie Pittman reported that someone in Pct. 4 had offered to sell the County a rock crusher and a "mountain of rock" of the maps of other areas for \$140,000.

The Commissioners also took into consideration a tax matter regarding penalty and interest. This involves taxes on a trailer house once owned by Jerry Don Brittain. The house is now gone from the County.

District Attorney Leslie Vance advised the Commissioners that in this situation they did not have authority to forgive penalty and interest on taxes owed by a citizen. **Extension Agents Janet**

Thomas and Davey Vestal discussed the Extension Service budget with the court, and requested a raise for Linda Stroebel, their secretary. Mrs. Thomas said that only one other clerk in the courthouse is paid less than the \$5.87 per hour Stroebel gets.

"We'd like to keep her," Thomas said.


The Extension Agents were requested to trim their budgets and try to find extra money. Then a raise for the secretary might be possible.

TWC To Delay Implementation Of Used Motor Oil Filter Regulation

Texas Water Commission (TWC) officials has announced the delay of implementation of a law that bans the disposal of used motor oil filters in Texas landfills by commercial generators. A commercial generator is a business that generates used motor oil filters in their daily business operations. Enforcement of the ban, which would have become effective tomorrow, will be delayed until September 1, 1992.

States

Bexar, Tarrant, Dallas and Harris are the first counties in the state to be affected by the law. The law, which was to go into effect August 1, 1992, will be implemented in phases

throughout the state until April 1, 1994. On that date, it will also become illegal for do-it-yourself oil changers to dispose of the filters in Texas'



The Texas Water Commission is granting the 31-day delay to ensure that industries who have expressed an interest in recycling used oil filters, in addition to used motor oil, have enough time to prepare to be in business when the final land ban goes into effect." said TWC Chairman John Hall.

In addition, during the 31-day interim the TWC will develop and adopt a set of rules, which will set managements standards for the recycling industry. The TWC also will create fund to reimburse commercial recyclers and handlers who inadvertently collect used motor oil that may be contaminated with a hazardous waste, such as antifreeze. This will result in the creation of approximately 1,000 additional community waste oil collection centers at no cost to the state of Texas.

Motor oil that is contaminated can not be recycled and must be disposed of at a permitted hazardous waste management facility, which can be costly. The fund will reimburse recyclers for payment of those disposal costs. The reimbursement fund will be financed by a tow cent fee that is collected by the state on the first sale of all automotive oil in Texas.



Vertigo Sufferers Can Learn To Adapt With Exercising

to the dark in a movie theater, people with vertigo can learn to adapt to dizziness-by exercising.

"It is strange but true," says Dr. Helen Cohen, an assistant professor of otorhinolaryngology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "By making them dizzier through special motion exercises, people suffering from vertigo caused by inner ear disorders that destroy balance and orientation can force their inner ear to compensate." Cohen calls the process

"habituation."

"It is no different from entering a noisy restaurant and being overwhelmed by conversations in the room. Soon though, you are able to distinguish individual sounds and conversations."

Vertigo is a common disorder affecting approximately 20 percent of the population sometimes in their lives. It can be caused by head trauma either from accidents or sports like football or boxing, or by autoimmune or rheumatoid diseases. Even a common head cold virus can attack the vestibular organs, the body's system for maintaining balance and spatial orientation.

"Current medications suppress the vestibular system," Cohen said. "The medicine relieves the dizziness, but it does not cure it. When treatment is stopped, the dizziness returns."

Cohen believes that for many vertigo sufferers, performing simple exercises at home may permanently stop the dizziness.

"In essence, these exer-

Just as your eyes adjust head up and down or side to side help the brain to recalibrate its responses to information coming from the inner ear more quickly. How the brain does this is still unknown. Little is understood about the effectiveness of the exercises, the ideal regimen for "treatment," or the disorders for which the exercises are best suited. Cohen is conduct-





Social Security Checks Are Void After One Year


"While Federal checks may be 'as good as gold,' they are not good forever. They must be cashed within a year of the date they're issued." Those words of warning come from Glyn Hammons, the manager of the Abilene Social Security office.

All Government checks issued on or after October 1, 1989, carry the legend **"VOID AFTER ONE** YEAR." Government help solve check-cashing problems. "And it costs less for the government to transact a direct deposit payment than mail a paper check. direct deposit is a safe and convenient way for beneficiaries to receive their payments," said Hammons.

fundsthatindividualsare entitled to but have never claimed. The reasons for the existence of these unclaimed funds include owner abandonment, death, or incomplete or lost records that result in owners or heirs forgetting about or not being aware of assets. "The reasons the time limitation placed on cashing U.S. Treasury checks," explains Hammons, "is so the government will be better able maintain accounting control of its financial resources."

"Congress passed the 'Limited Playability,' law stating that Government checks must be cashed within 12 months after the date on which the checks was issued," Hammons said. Since Social Security checks are written form the trust fund, when checks remain uncashed, trust fund reserves are affected.

"If a consumer presents and expired Social Security or Supplemental Security Income check to a financial institution, the financial institution should direct the customer to the Federal agency that issued the check. Beneficiaries who have an expired Social Security or Supplemental Security Income should take it to a local Social Security office to arrange for a replacement. A replacement check will then be mailed to the beneficiary within approximately 3 to 4 weeks.

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

Two researchers at The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston have developed a weight-management program that emphasizes gradual changes in lifestyle.


Dr. John Foreyt and Dr. Ken Goodrick's The Living Without Dieting Program is a seven-step plan to set up a support system, establish an exercise habit and adopt a low-fat eating habit.

A key element of the program is accepting the reality that thinness may not be possible for some people.

"Genetic inheritance, childhood family practices and a history of dieting may have led to bodily changes and an excessive number of fat cells in the body so that thinness is not a realistic goal," Foreyt said.






